COLLEGE STATION -- Another source of sugar-sweet sorghum may be added to the market in the near future, says Extension foods and nutrition specialists at Texas A&M Uni-

versity. U.S. Department of Agriculture scientists have been looking at sweet sorghum for many years but starch in the juice made sugar recovery either uneconomical or impossible.
