DRAFT BOARD QUESTIONS

Editor's note: Below are questions now bing asked at draft boards about the new Random Selection System prescribed by the President November 26, 1969. The answers are by Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 209 W. Ninth Street, Austin, Texas 78701. He will wel-

come your questions.
Q.-- My birth date was drawn number 216 in the lottery. I am in school and will be until June 1973. Will the 216 number apply when I enter the pool in 1973 or will that year's number control?

A. -- The random sequence number you acquired in the December 1969 drawing will apply so long as you remain subject to induction for military service.

Q. -- Presently I am in Class II-A but this deferment will expire on February 28, 1970. I have number 306 from the lottery. I will become 25 on May 1970. If the local board does not reach my number before my 26th birthday, what will my status be?

A. -- If the local board has not reached your number before your 26th birth-day, you will, upon reaching age 26, leave the pool of those available for induction as part of the 1970 first priority selection group.
Q.-- If a local board

must select three men to fill a call today for five, all of whom have the same birthday, which tree would they take?

A -- In the event that two or more men have the same birth date within a local board, their sequence of induction will be determined by the first letter of their names (last name and, if necessary, first name) which have been arranged in a random sequence of the alphabet established during the drawing that was conducted on December 1, 19-

Q--I am 19 years old, have no basis for deverment, and have sequence number 300. If I am not inducted in 1970, can I be inducted in 1971 or in subsequent years?

A -- You are liable for induction to age 26 or to age 35 if you are or have been deferred. In 1971 you will have a decreased vulnerability. However, if the calls for manpower in 1971 are so high that they cannot be met by the 1971 selection group the local boards will then select from the supply of manpower that might be left over from 1970. As each year goes by without your induc-tion taking place you will have a decreasing vulnerability.

Q--Next February I will turn 19. Do I enter the lottery pool on that date? A -- No. You won't be included in the random selective sequence until 1971. The 1970 pool is limited to those born on or after January 1, 1944 and on or before December 31, 1950. Q--Will there be any

more drawings? A--Yes. A new random sequence will be made for each calendar year for those registrants attaining the age

Q--My birthday in the lottery gave me sequence number 325 and I will be in Class I-A next year, Can I count on not being induct-

A -- No, because the total manpower requirements are not known and cannot be reasonable estimated at this

Q--I have random sequence number 75. When my local board inducts me will other local boards be inducting registrants with this same sequence number?

A -- Not necessarily. It is expected that all local boards will be proceeding at about the same pace, but because local boards have varying percentages of their registrants in deferred status, and do not have the same number of registrants with the same birthdays, they may not be inducting at any one time all available registrants with a particular random sequence

Q--I have sequence num-ber 250. If I want to volunteer for induction, will my local board wait until they reach sequence number 250 before they will accept me as a volunteer?

A -- No. They may accept you as a volunteer prior to reaching your random sequence number in the induction processing.

Q--I am 19 years old and now deferred as a student. My random sequence number is 300. If sequence number 300 is not reached in 1970 in my local board, will I be home free when my deferment ends in 1973?

A--No. If at the time you are classified I-A in 973 your local board has not reached for induction in 1973. You will still have sequence number 300. If at the time you are classified I-A your local board has reached random sequence number 300 in 1973 you will be subject to induction at the head of the 1973 selection group.

CANYON, Tex--The traditional picture of the Ol' West cowboy being rough, chewing tobacco and displaying only a little horse and cow sense is fast becoming part of the same fading American scene as the big cattle drive and the six-shooter.

Although he may still wear his boots and wide-brimmed hat, the cowboy of today has a growing knowledge of such seemingly unrelated fields as agri-business, marketing, computer science, nutrition and real estate. He may even have a college degree.

In the Texas Panhandle -whose 25 counties comprise 25, 601 square miles, larger than 10 of the states -- the cowboy, who once spent most of his working day in the saddle, now devotes more time to riding a swivel chair behind a desk. The Panhandle is rapidly becoming the leading cattle feeding region of the

What is the reason for this change?

"Well, first, there are many more supervisor jobs and management jobs available today than when I got out of school in 1949," says Dr. Charles Smallwood, head of the department of agriculture at West Texas State University

"This is because there are fewer numbers of people on farms and ranches, but larger units, and very specialized units, such as feeder cattle production or finishing operations like feedlots or farm management in irrigated farms," he says.

"it use to be a farmer did not have to know too much about fertilizer, feeds, nutrition and nutrients and he could get by because things did not change. But our knowledge explosion is tremendous, and we have to have a scientific basis on which to build, other than learning just how to put down fertilizer.

Modern technology, com-munications and transportation have shaped, revised and radically changed the face of modern agriculture to only a vague resemblance of itself less than half a century

Charley Gerald, 47, long-time dairyman and rancher in the Canyon area, says "we milked 30 cows by hand for 20 years. It took four people to handle those 30 cows. Today it just takes three to handle 200. We've done this with machinery and auto-




