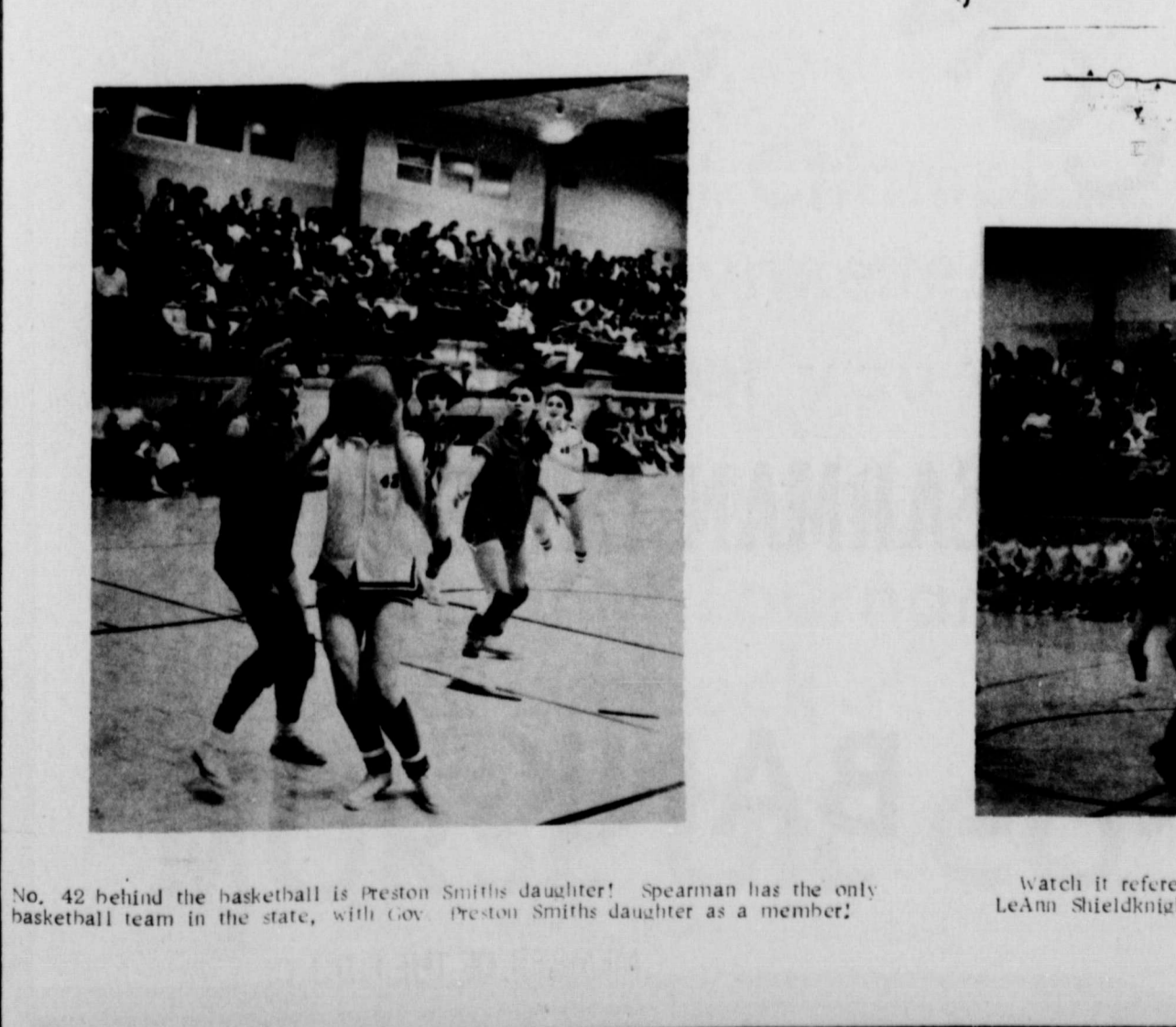
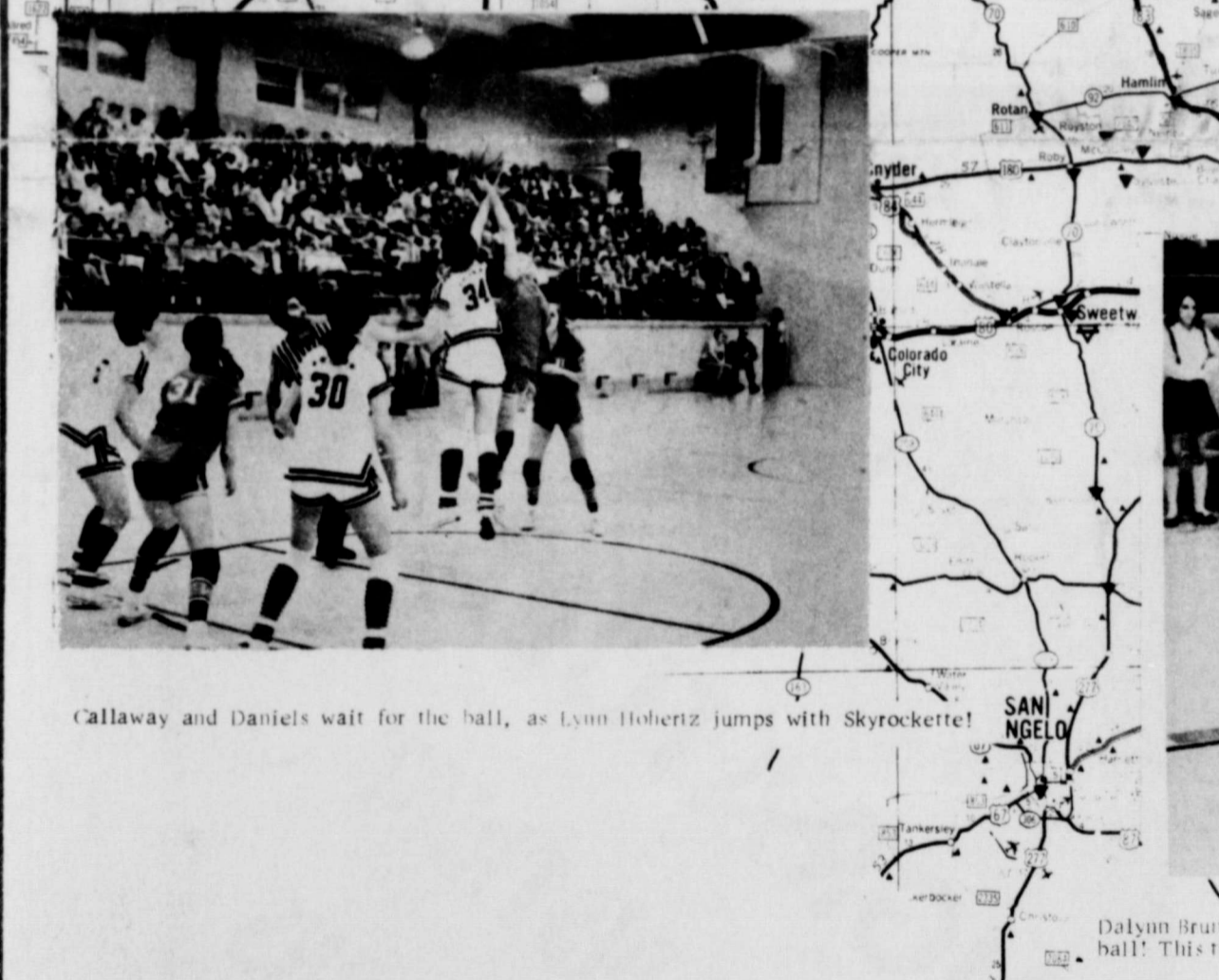

Lynxettes Make It 31 In A Row, With Bi-District Win

The Lynxettes will meet the Stanton girls at 1:00 P. M., Saturday. Stanton has won 13 games, and lost 13. Comanche and Post will be the other two teams to make up the 4-team regional tourney for AA.

Spearman's Lynxettes put the jinx to the Wellington Skyrockettes in the bi-district game, played in Miami, Texas, Monday night. The Lynxettes won the game 59-30, winning the right to advance to the Regional Tournament, in Raiderland Saturday.

Miami's beautiful new school-gymnasium complex, was almost as startling as the performance of the two girls teams Tuesday night. As a matter of fact, the gymnasium drew almost as many Oh's and Ah's as the Lynxettes! Incidentally, the town of Miami was a wonderful host, and the fans from all over the Panhandle who jammed into the gym, from both Wellington and Spearman wish to thank school officials and the entire town of Miami for their courteous treatment of the teams and the fans.

The Lynxettes played well enough to win Monday night. Coach Weese seemed to be keeping a tight reign on his charges; and it was learned that the game was being scouted by many of the coaches who might be playing the Lynxettes either at Lubbock, or at a later date. Also, some of the girls seemed to be suffering from stage fright.

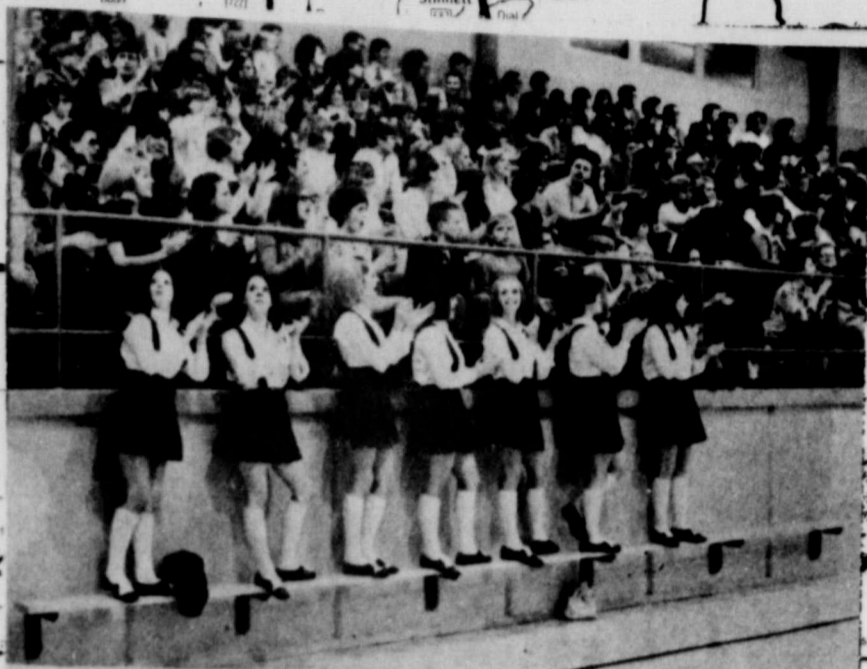
In the first quarter, fans got a glimpse of the finest defense in the state, as the Lynxettes held Wellington to 3 points, and scored 12. While scoring the 12 points, the Lynxettes missed many, many shots. In fact, their percentage for the first half was only 33%. Much below their seasons average of about 54%. The Lynxette defense was so good, that the district champion Wellington team only scored 17 points the first half, and 13 points the second half!

Leading 28-17 at half-time, the Lynxettes came back and captured a 43-21 third quarter lead, to ice the game away! Coach Weese substituted rather freely the entire game, and everyone got into the "action".

Shelia Patterson picked up three fouls in the first half, and this did cause some concern from the fans. Shelia hasn't fouled this much all year, it seems, but she did finish the game with only 4 fouls, and never did foul out. Hohertz and Kirikland picked up three fouls. Jyniece Callaway played an outstanding game, and did not pick up a foul. The Spearman guards were really something Monday night.

The game never was a close contest. With Spearman jumping into a 12-1 lead, it appeared that Wellington was never going to get a shot away! And that was the story. Just too much defense, and even when the Lynxettes aren't hitting their usual 54% (average), they can beat a lot of good teams with their defense.

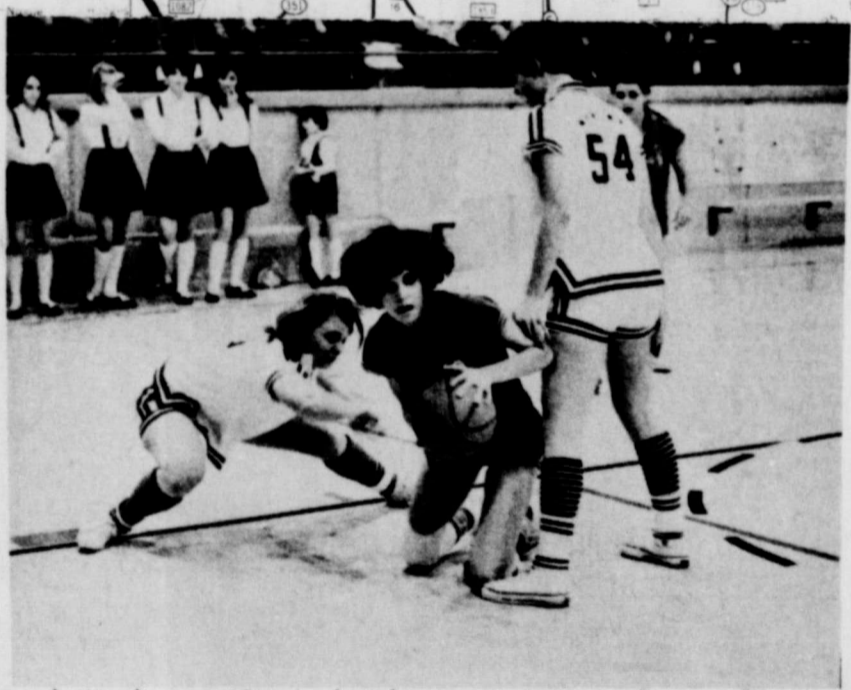

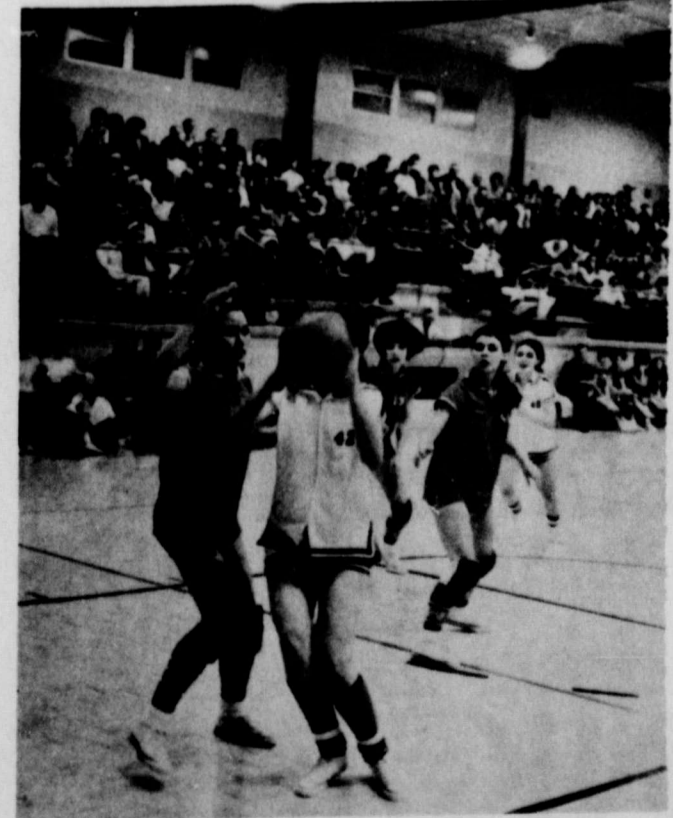

MY STAKE IN THE NATURAL RESOURCES OF TEXAS

Statistics prove that the United States will double its population in thirty-five years. With these frightening figures facing the present generation, each young Texan finds that he has a great stake in the natural resources of Texas. Texas is a leader in food and textile production because of the varied, fertile soils with which she has been blessed. From the deep, rich soil of the Panhandle to the blacklands of Central Texas to the sands of the Coastal Plains, the soil of Texas is one of her major assets, and to this soil, the future generations of the world will look for their very sustenance.

Though Texas possesses productive soil, this resource is thwarted without another of Texas' great resources, water. Modern irrigation methods have increased the productivity of Texas soil. This water is not only invaluable for

recreation are water skiing, fishing, and swimming. Texas, having a very long coastline, has many bodies of water for recreation, as well as natural and man-made lakes and ponds.

The third natural resource of Texas is the forests. Many forests in the state have been turned into state parks or even national parks. These parks serve as recreation areas for millions of people. Also, the parks provide a shelter for the wildlife. Without the shelter provided by forests, Texas larger wildlife would be decreasing in population. In fact, another natural resource would be the abundance of wildlife. The most abundant wildlife in the panhandle are duck, quail, pheasant and coyote. Also the wildlife of Texas may be seen in zoos. Wildlife from Texas is shipped all over the United States to other zoos, Texas itself has some of the best zoos in the nation.

Texas, with its abundance of natural resources including oil, water, forests, and wildlife is one of the best states in the nation to live in. Therefore, I feel like Texas has the most abundant supply of natural resources anywhere in the United States.

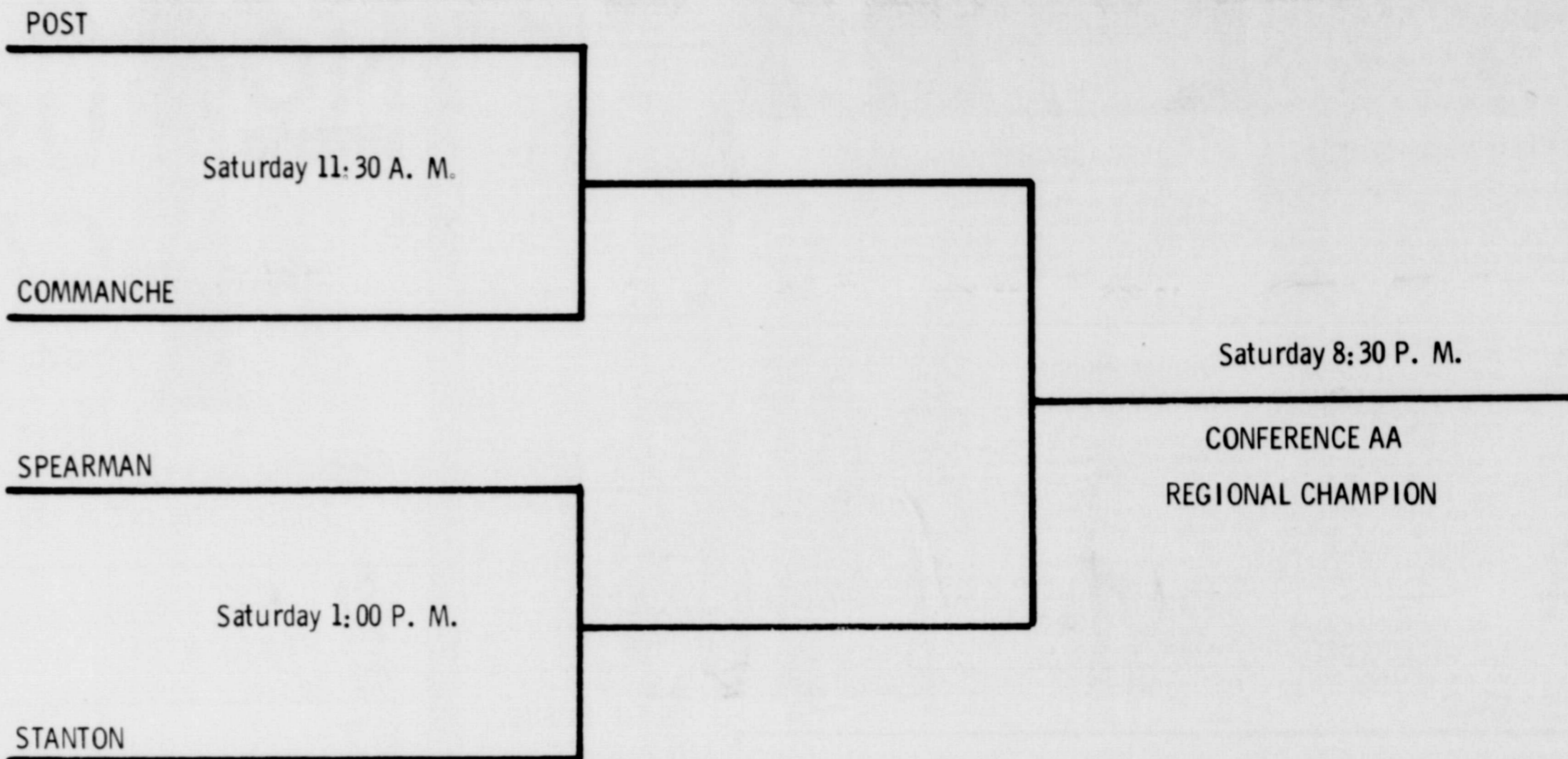

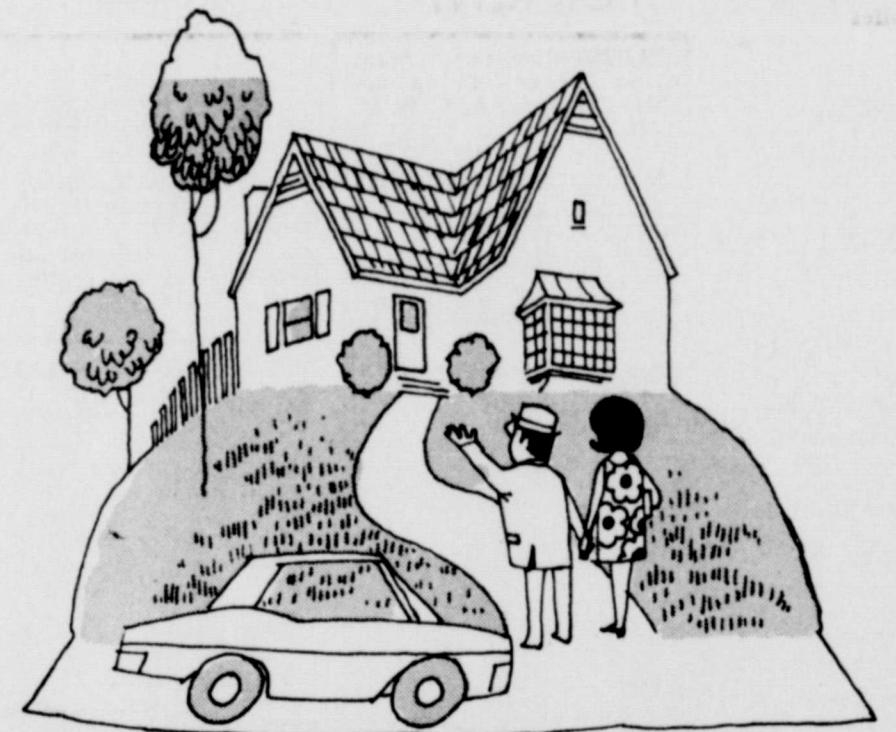

Let Me See

For several weeks members of the Baptist Church have been searching for the old pictures of the original two Baptist churches in Spearman. At one time someone had them for they were published in this paper back in the late 1940s. I just knew Mrs. Oran Kelly would come up with them, but she did not have them. The Baptist church is preparing for its 50th anniversary. It is scheduled for March 15, and everyone near and far is looking forward to it.

It's always good to visit with Mrs. Kelly. All the old timers remember her--and her sister Ethel Deakin too. Miss Deakin taught school here in Spearman for a jillion years it seems. She was a very unique math teacher. She was interested in each and every one of her students and if any one was having difficulty learning, she would invite you to stay after school and let her help! This type of interest and generosity is about to become a thing of the past. Miss Deakin left Spearman in the late 1940s and moved to Guymon. She retired from public school teaching just before she had put in 50 long years tutoring students. But she still teaches, believe it or not. She has a class of 6 or 7 adults who are learning to read. I can't imagine her not teaching math, but she enjoys her adult class very much. She is also Librarian at the Baptist church in Guymon. Last week she celebrated her 80th birthday and I join her hundreds of former students in wishing for her many more happy, and active years. She plans to be among those attending the church's 50th anniversary next month, and we'll all be glad to see her.

Speaking of churches, I read an article this week entitled "Hard Economics of Worship" which scares me to death. It concerns the declining attendance in churches in Canada and reads as follows:

The United Church of Canada hired a professional survey organization to look at church membership losses and finances. What they were told was that the 149 United Church Metropolitan Toronto congregations ought to consolidate into 50 to 75 church structures. Between 1961 and 1969, the combined area membership in United, Anglican, Presbyterian and Baptist churches has fallen more than 30,000. Only 40 percent of the protestant population are active in churches. The survey's projection showed that the United Church could die out in Toronto by 1984, if the present membership decline continues.

The city's newspapers had fun with the sobering figures. The GLOBE and MAIL ran a cartoon showing two mice, with pews, aisle and stained glass windows in the background. The caption read: "I don't mind being poor--it's the QUIET." In an editorial from the British humor magazine PUNCH, which showed a sexton preparing to ring the bell for the morning service, the sexton is saying to the rector, "wouldn't it be simpler just to phone them both?"

I don't know about you, but these kind of statistics bother me and the story is the same the world over. People don't care for church anymore, so they just don't go. The problem is deeper than just "not going to church" however.

If you want another little thought to keep you from sleeping on a restless night, ponder this:

COUNTY AGENT WARNS FARMER ABOUT 'MUSTARD'

Hansford County Agent, Robert Adamson, this week warned farmers that they should begin soon to control infestation of weeds which will be showing up soon in wheat fields.

The most common weed in winter wheat her in Hansford county is tansy mustard. Increasing is the weed treacle mustard which is similar to tansy mustard but shorter.

Tansy Mustard has alternate many lobed leaves, much like a fern. Flowers are bright yellow, indeterminate and seed are borne in capsules. Here in the county the flowering starts about April 15.

Dryland wheat yields as well as irrigated yields can be reduced due to infestation by tansy or treacle mustard. It has been found that one week per square foot can cut yields as much as ten percent on dry land.

Helpful Hints From Me To Thee

KNITS--the contemporary fabric-- Why a knit explosion in fashion? These packable, wearable, and many times washable fabrics give us the maximum in fashion and the minimum in care.

No longer do knits all look the same. The imaginative world of knits gives us a fantastic variety of fibers, textures, colors, weights and patterns. There's a knit for every season and every time of day.

So pick a print, a plaid, a tweed, or a plain. Pick a fabric that's smooth or creped, dull or shiny, but most important pick a knit to sew this season!

Choose your pattern and fabric carefully. There is a knit just right for every garment you sew from sportswear to that special evening dress. When choosing the right fabric for your pattern consider the hand of the fabric--is it soft and fluid such as a tricot or matte jersey or is it crisp and tailored as a double knit?

Double knits tailor beautifully for suits, coats, and dresses while single knits are perfect for softer designs that drape and flow. Single knits do not crease well, thus do not lend themselves to pressed pleats or crisp edges.

Getting Ready to Sew--Sewing on knits does not require special skills or equipment, however a few hints will be helpful in handling them.

Cutting--Jersey and double knits are made in tubular form. Double knits are usually split before they are sold, while jersey is not. Always check to see if the fold lines can be pressed out before you lay your pattern on the fabric. If they cannot, refold your fabric, and place the pattern pieces to avoid having the fold line show on your garment.

The lengthwise rib of the knit is comparable to the lengthwise grain of woven fabrics, therefore use the rib for placing the pattern pieces on the straight of the fabric. If the rib is hard to see, mark

it with a row of hand basting. Pin and cut on a flat surface to avoid stretching the fabric.

To reduce the curling along edges of the single knits, place pins close together and at right angles to the seam line of the pattern pieces.

Use sharp pins and shears to avoid snagging the fabric. Because many knits have a slight nap or texture, it is wise to use the "with nap" cutting layout.

Top-Stitching--To prevent your fabric from stretching when top-stitching place a row of hand basting 1/2" on each side of the top-stitching line. This row of basting also serves as a guide for straight stitching when you sew with the small tow of the presser foot along the right hand row of basting.

Use buttonhole twist in the machine needle and bobbin.

Lengthen stitch to 6-8 stitches per inch. If top-stitching disappears into the rib of the knit, simply add another row of top-stitching directly on top of the first row.

Hems--Because of the elasticity of knit, allow a knitted garment to hang at least 24 hours before hemming. This

will help insure a straight and even hemline. Follow these few tips when sewing with knits and you'll find how easy it is to have a wardrobe of these fashionable easy-to-care for and comfortable-to-wear clothes.

Tips On Rice Cooking

COLLEGE STATION--What is the difference between long grain and short grain rice? It's not a riddle but it is a common puzzle to many food shoppers.

Long grain types of rice, explains Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist, separates into individual grains after cooking.

Short grain varieties are best for puddings, croquettes and rice rings because they stick together.

Whatever type, the specialist advises not to wash or rinse away valuable vitamins and minerals in rice before or after cooking.

Rice keeps best in a tight-

ly closed glass or metal container. Cooked grains may be refrigerated and kept covered for a week.

How long does the fun last? The Texas Safety Association says: Not long--if you drive too soon after drinking alcoholic beverages.

DON'Ts for obtaining 1970 motor vehicle registrations. The Motor Vehicle Registration Division of the Department has initiated a new computerized registration system this year. In the past motorists have had to take their previous year's registration and auto title to the county tax collector's office or substation to obtain new license plates. This year motorists were mailed a three-part computer-oriented registration form about January 1. If a motorist wishes to renew his registration by mail he should mail the three-part form to his county tax collector, with his check for the registration fee plus one extra dollar to cover postage and handling. Some county tax collectors will accept only money orders or cashier's checks. If a motorist wishes to renew his registration in person he should take the three-part registration form to his county tax collector's office or substation with his check or money order. Mail orders will be accepted only until March 1, allowing 30 days for delivery. Registrations will be made in person through midnight April 1, deadline for obtaining new auto license plates. The Highway Department's list of Dos and DON'Ts for all motorists: DON'T throw away your three part registration application; it may be used both for mail and in-person vehicle registration. DON'T write on, mar or otherwise mutilate the three-part form. However, DO show your correct address in accord with instructions on the form if the address on the form is incorrect. DON'T separate the three parts of the form; DO take to your county tax collector or mail it in one piece. DON'T send your application to the Highway Department Motor Vehicle Division in Austin; DO take it to your county tax collector. If you did not receive a three-part registration form in the mail, or if you have lost it, DO take last year's motor vehicle registration and your car title to your county tax collector's office or branch station. Your vehicle registration will be processed as before and you'll receive a time-saving computerized form next year. Remember, you will save time at your county tax collector's office if you use the computerized form. There is no extra charge if you obtain your license plates in person.

Flu Bug Continues To Rage



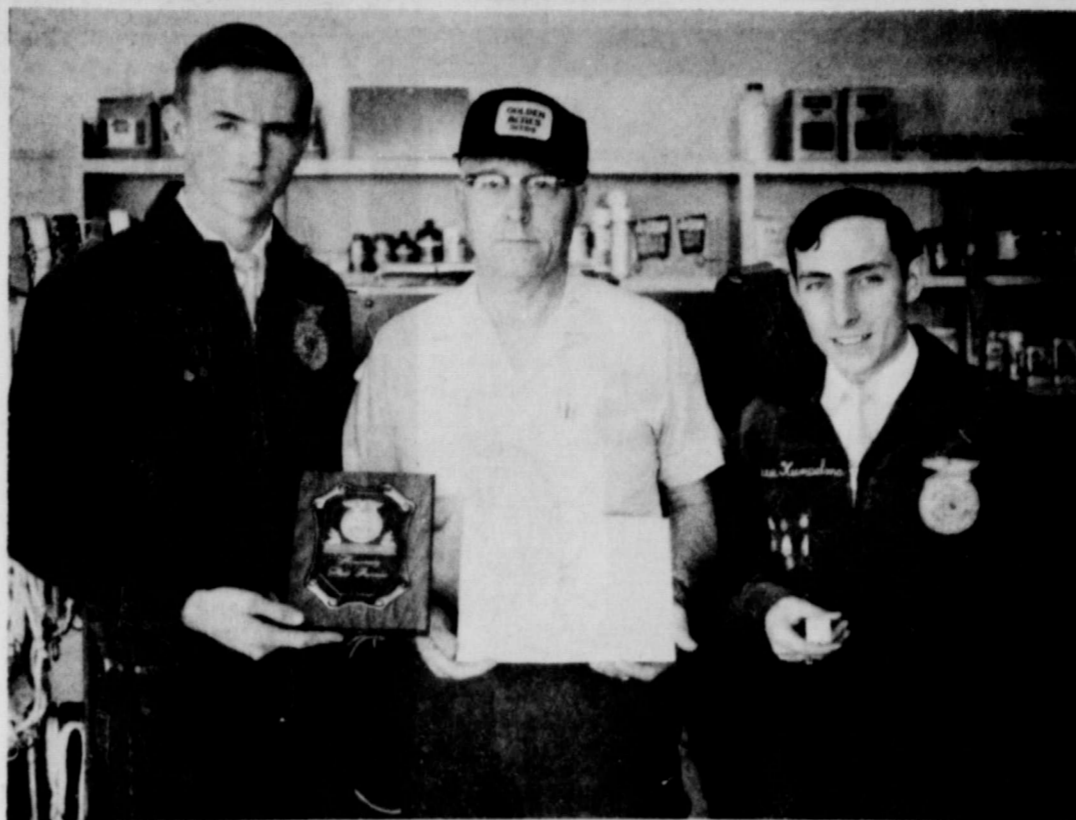

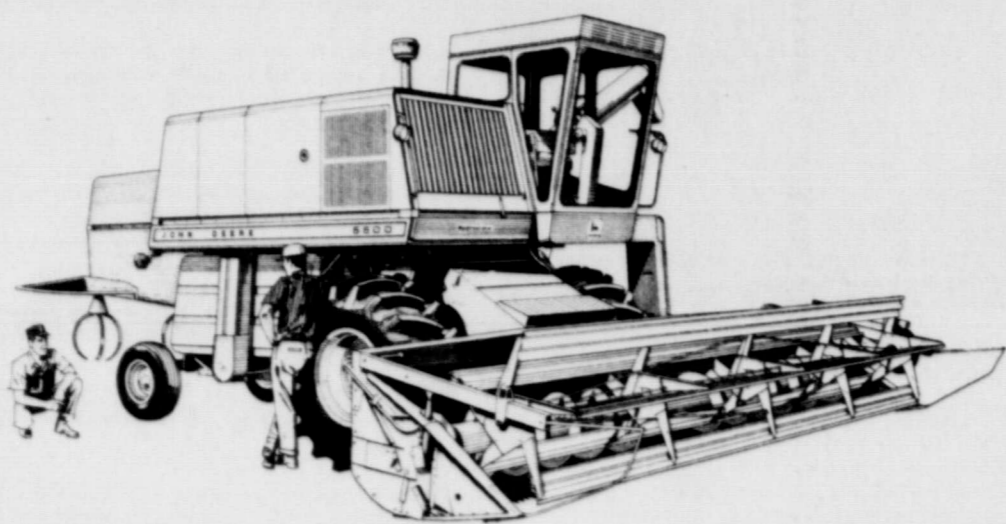

CONG. PRICE GOES TO BAT FOR FARMERS

WACO-In an address to a state-wide meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau, Congressman Bob Price called on the Nixon Administration to come to grips with farm problems and the farm program.

Price declared, "The farm program must not be a casualty of inflation. America draws its strength from its land and its products. Our economy and forty per cent of our labor force depends directly or indirectly on the well-being of the agricultural sector. As a society, we simply can not afford to lose sight of this fundamental fact."

The Texas Republican observed that for the last eight months, the House Agriculture Committee and the Secretary of Agriculture have been meeting in an effort to hammer out a new farm program.

"In these meetings, I have maintained that farmers are entitled to increases in benefits, just as other federal programs are increased to meet rising needs," Price said.

"I have urged Secretary Hardin to take the farmers' case to the Bureau of the Budget and convince the watchdogs of the federal purse strings that Rural America, with its farms, farm families, and rural communities, needs and is entitled to equal treatment with other sectors of society," he added.

Price observed that a proposed "Agricultural Act of 1970" has been developed as the result of many work sessions and discussions between officials of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and members of the House Committee on Agriculture. He said, "The proposal is now being carefully studied, debated, and refined by the House Agriculture Committee."
