

# Show Champions Picked

Champion animals in the beef cattle, sheep and swine divisions were picked Monday by L. M. Hargroves and Nathan Allen, judges for the annual Hansford County Junior Livestock Show.

Nathan Allen, former professor of Animal Husbandry at Texas Tech, tapped a 1,203 lb. Hereford steer shown by Chris Johnson, a Gruver 4-H Club boy, for the Grand Champion of the steer division. L. M. Hargroves, head of the Agriculture Education department at Texas Tech, named a heavyweight Hampshire barrow shown by James Kunselman, Spearman FFA as Grand Champion of the Swine division.

The Grand champion lamb was shown by John Hardesty, another Gruver 4-H student. His lamb was a Suffolk.

In the steer division Daniel Desimone of Spearman showed an Angus steer for the Reserve grand champion barrow was shown by Milton Walker, Gruver FFA and the reserve grand champion lamb was shown by Brad Hardesty, Gruver 4-H.

A large crowd filled the community building Monday night when animals were sold at auction.

The grand champion calf was purchased by Palo Duro Feeders of Gruver for 1.10 per pound, bringing a total of \$1,323. The reserve champion calf was purchased by Cut Rate Grocery of Spearman for a total of \$664.00, 60¢ per pound.

The champion barrow was purchased by Hansford Implement of Spearman for \$1,60 per lb, \$361.60. North Plain Truch & Impl, of Spearman purchased the grand champion lamb at 1.35 per lb, for a total of \$145.80.

Hansford County Farm Bureau presented Animal Husbandry awards to students, selected by their leaders, who had put forth the best effort toward their livestock project this year. The Hansford county 4-H youth selected for this award was John Hardesty Jr. of Gruver, Frank Griffen won the Gruver FFA award in this division. This is his first year in the county, moving here from New York. Jim Kunselman won the award for the Spearman FFA.

## 'Big Green Giant' In Operation At Feedyard

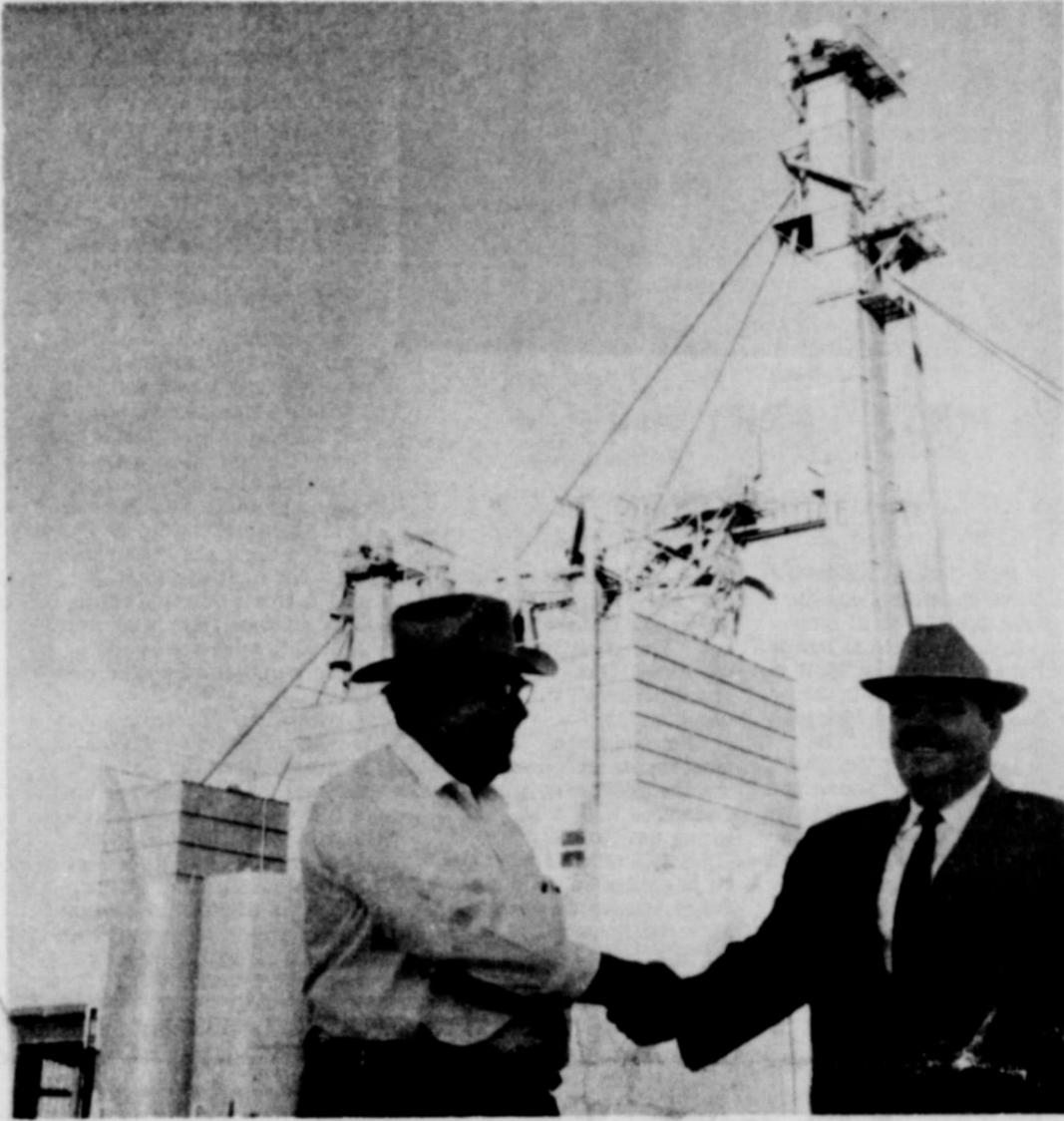
This week Carl M. Archer of Spearman, President of Hansford Feedyards, Inc. announced that the giant new facility is officially open and cattle are being received daily.

Keys to the "Big Green Giant" Automated Feedmill were delivered to the owners by Stan Collins of Plains Steel Building Co., Inc., of Amarillo, who was designer and general contractor of the facility.

The feedmill was designed and built to feed up to 60,000 head of cattle in a normal 10 hour shift, and Hansford Feedyards, Inc. proposes to start with a working load of 32,000 head and pens are being completed for this many cattle now. The firm's site consists of more than 700 acres and orderly expansion will occur as needed.

The automatic feedmill batching system is controlled by a computerized Hardymatic weigh console which eliminates human error and maintains ingredient weight accuracy to within one percent. The Hardymatic console reads punched cards which are prepared in advance by the Nutritionist for each feed formula used. Over one and one half million pounds of feed ingredients are in constant readiness in giant overhead bins located over the mixer, and this system can batch, weigh, and mix finished feed at a rate of more than a ton per minute or about 600 tons per shift. The mill can also draw from on-site bolted steel storage tanks which will contain a reserve supply of about 20,000 bu. grain, 10,000 bushels roughage, 60,000 pounds of liquid fats, and 60,000 pounds of molasses. Platform track scales are located under the finished feed drive to insure "double-check" accuracy of all feed weights delivered to the cattle.

Formation of Hansford Feedyards, Inc. was announced last summer, and is widely supported by a large number of Hansford County investors. Officers are: Carl M. Archer, President, Jack Hart, Vice-President, and Lloyd Buzzard, Secretary. Other stockholders include: Dan Archer, Mrs. John R. Gollard, Sr., and Mrs. Ella O'Loughlin Carmody. Potential cattle feeder investors, as well as just interested people, are invited to visit this new facility anytime during daylight hours, Archer said. The location is 2 1/2 miles north-east of Spearman, and a prominent sign on highway 15 just east of Spearman directs the way.

The catwalk service platform and equipment shown on top of the giant storage bins are at the 7th floor level. All working levels are accessible to workmen by an electric operated elevator cage which is located between the two large product elevator legs. Cattle for custom feeding are now being received at the feedyard, which is located 2 1/2 miles northeast of Spearman. Visitors are welcome anytime during daylight hours.

A wedding reception was held in the Fellowship Hall at the church following the ceremony. The serving table was covered with white lace and was centered with an arrangement of daisies.

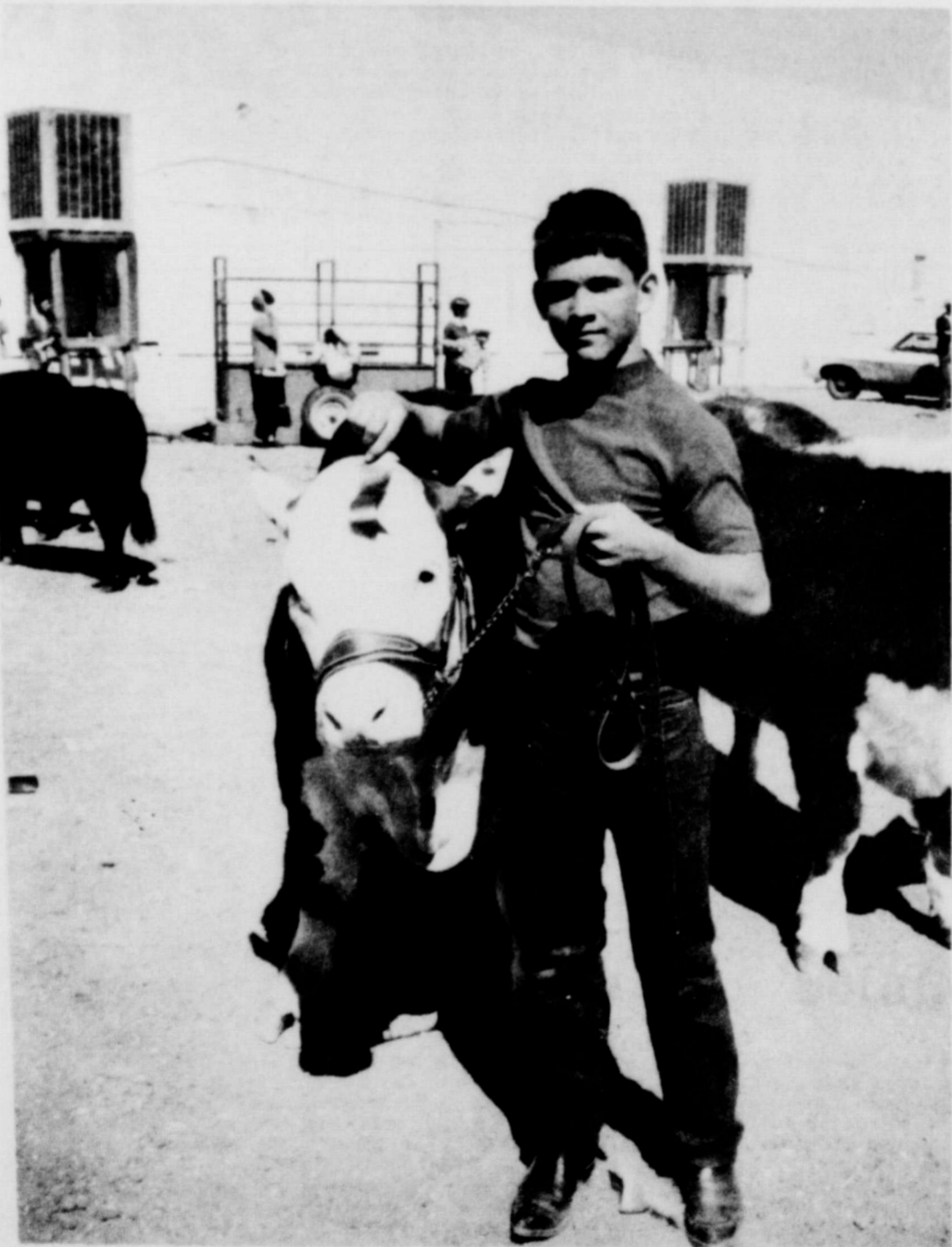

to join him there. Now Mr. and Mrs. Ruy are expecting their little daughter, who remained in Korea, to join the family soon. She has never seen her father.

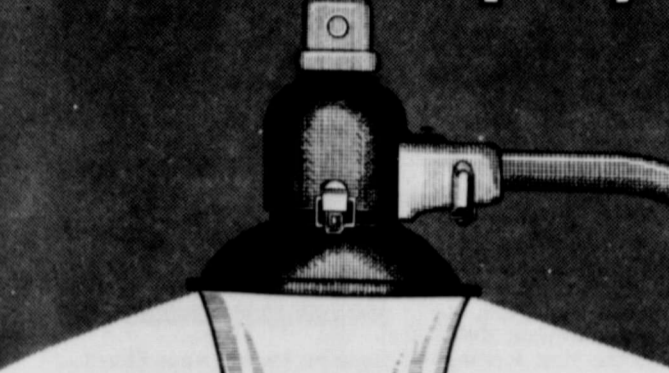

As soon as they get it settled I intend to write a letter to Congressman and inform him just how the post offices can quickly get out from under all those mountains of mail. Just throw away all the junk mail, and there would be prac-

tically none left to sort!  
 We had a special notice from our wholesaler this week, and if you think the mail strike has handicapped the nation, give a few thoughts to the following letter:  
 Dear Customer: You are urged to try and increase your purchases to cover at least a 2 months period, because of the likelihood of both RAIL & TRUCK strikes. Everyone who is any kind of an expert is predicting it, as soon as EARLY April. The President and Congress have exercised almost all of their options, short of political suicide, and are in a corner in dealing with the rail situation. It is guessed that nothing will be done by either, allowing both labor and management to remain unagreed, with a strike resulting in early April. The truck unions are asking for a 30% increase per year (non-inflationary of course) and the trucking management declares that it is not possible to operate on that cost basis (although it would be passed on in the form of higher rates). The President and Congress will again face the same dilemmas and decisions, and possibly react (or fail to act) in the same manner as in the rail dispute. Therefore, there appears to be only the slim-chance of chances that transportation stoppages will not occur, possibly both rail and truck at the same time. We bring this information to you so that you can anticipate the purchase of large, bulky and heavy merchandise that cannot be shipped by either bus or parcel post (maybe not Parcel Post.) We hope you can determine your needs and receive delivery on your merchandise before these transportation stoppages occur!

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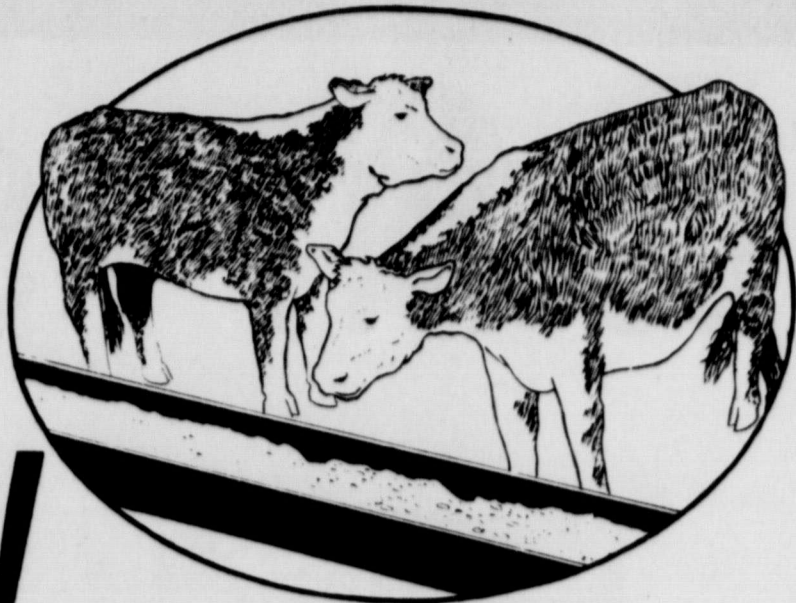

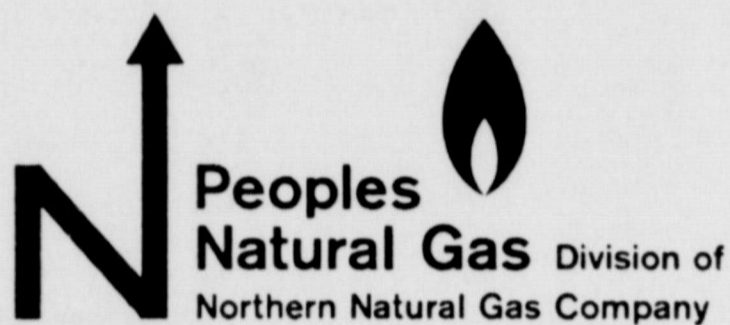

## NO NUMBER OVER 115 TO BE CALLED

AUSTIN, Texas, --The April draft call for Texas is 940, and no man will be selected and ordered for induction with a random sequence number higher than 115, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Wednesday.

This April quota is down from 1,064 in March, which is being filled with men having random sequence numbers no higher than 90.

The state quota for pre-induction physical and mental examinations in April is 8,442, up from 8,253 in March. Men sent for these examinations will be limited to those with random sequence numbers 1 through 215.

Deferred or exempt men, such as teachers or students, with random sequence numbers 1 through 215, may be forwarded for these examinations if they are likely to lose their deferred or exempt status during the next six months, Colonel Schwartz said.

No men with random sequence numbers above 215 will be forwarded for examination until further notice. Men born in 1951, who have no random sequence numbers, also will not be called now for this purpose. A drawing probably will be held in July to establish the numbers for the 1951 group.

All volunteers at the draft boards must be inducted ahead of the non-volunteers selected and ordered to report for induction by random sequence number.

The Texas induction quota of 940 for April is the state's share of a national call for 19,000 men, all for the Army.

## Dick Countiss To Chair All Activity For Judge Denton

AUSTIN, TEXAS--Judge James G. Denton, candidate for associate justice of the Texas Supreme Court, has named Richard N. Countiss of Spearman to coordinate his campaign in Hansford County.

In an announcement from his state campaign headquarters, Denton said Countiss will chair all activities on his behalf in his May 2 Democratic Primary race for the Supreme

Court post being vacated by the retirement of Associate Justice Robert Hamilton. Denton, presently Chief Justice of the 7th Court of Civil Appeals, has served in that position on the Amarillo-based court for the past decade. He has served on the bench for the past 20 years and is seeking the high court seat on the theme of experience and integrity.
