Big Green Giant' In Operation At Feedyard

This week Carl M. Archer of Spearman, President of Hansford Feedyards, Inc. announced that the giant new facility is officially open and cattle are being received daily.

Keys to the "Big Green

Giant" Automated Feedmill were delivered to the owners by Stan Collins of Plairs Steel Building Co., Inc., of Amarillo, who was designer and general contractor of the facility.

The feedmill was designed and built to feed up to 60, 000 head of cattle in a normal 10 hour shift, and Hansford Feedyards, Inc. proposes to start with a working load of 32,000 head and pens are being completed for this many cattle now. The firm's site consists of more than 700 acres and orderly expansion will occur as needed.

The automatic feedmill batching system is controlled by a computerized Hardymatic weigh console which eliminates human error and maintains ingredient weight accuracy to within one per-cent. The Hardymatic console reads punched cards which are prepared in advance by the Nutritionist for each feed formula used. Over one and one half million pounds of feed ingredients are in * readiness in giant overhead bins located over the mixer, and this system can batch, weigh, and mix finished feed at a rate of more than a ton per minute or about 600 tons per shift. The mill can also draw from on-site bolted steel storage tanks which will contain a reserve supply of about 26,000 bu, grain, 1,000 bushels roughage, 000 pounds of liquid fats, and 60,000 pounds of molasses. Platform truck scales are located under the finished feed drive to insure "double-check" accuracy of all feed weights

delivered to the cattle. Formation of Hansford Feedyards, Inc. was announced last summer, and is widely supported by a large number of Hansford County investors, Officers are: Carl M. Archer, President, Jack Hart, Vice-President, and Lloyd Buzzard. Secretary. Other stockholders include: Dan Archer, Mrs. John R. Collard, Sr., and Mrs. Ella O'Loughlin Carmody.

Potential cattle feeder investors, as well as just interested people, are invited to visit this new facility anytime during daylight hours, Archer said. The location is 21 miles north-east of Spearman, and a prominent sign on highway 15 just east of Spearman directs the way.

chases to cover at least a 2 months period, because of the likelihood of both RAIL & TRUCK strikes. Everyone who is any kind of an expert is predicting it, as soon as EARLY April. The President and Con-gress have exercised almost all of their options, short of political suicide, and are in a comer in dealing with the rail situation. It is guessed that nothing will be done by either, allowing both labor and management to remain unagreed, with a strike resulting in early April. The truck unions are asking for a 30% increase per year (noninflationary of course) and the trucking management declares that it is not possible to operate on that cost basis (although it would be passed on in the form of higher rates). The President and Congress will again face the same dilemnas and decisions, and possibly react (or fail to act) in the same manner as in the rail dispute. Therefore, there appears to be only the slimmest of chances that transportation stoppages will not occur, possibly both rail and truck at the same time. We bring this information to you so that you can anticipate the purchase of large, bulky and heavy merchandise that cannot be shipped by either bus or parcel post (maybe not Parcel Post.) We hope you can determine your needs and receive delivery on your merchandise before these

pany, Amarillo. If this predicted truck & rail strike does occur, our nation could be paralyzed within a few short days. Makes you wonder "What next?" We will all have to wait and see.





NO NUMBER OVER 115 TO BE CALLED

AUSTIN, Texas, -- The April draft call for Texas is 940, and no man will be selected and ordered for induction with a random sequence number higher than 115, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said

Wednesday.
This April quota is down from 1,064 in March, which is being filled with men having random sequence numbers no higher than 90.

ing random sequence numbers no higher than 90.

The state quota for pre-ininduction physical and mental examinations in April is 8,442, up from 8,253 in March. Men sent for these examinations will be limited to those with random sequence numbers 1 through 215.

numbers 1 through 215.

Deferred or exempt men, such as teachers or students, with random sequence numbers 1 through 215, may be forwarded for these examinations if they are likely to lose their deferred or exempt status during the next six months, Colonel Schwartz said.

No men with random sequence numbers above 215 will be forwarded for examination until further notice. Men born in 1951, who have no random sequence numbers, also will not be called now for this purpose. A drawing probably will be held in July to establish the numbers for the 1951 group.

All volunteers at the draft boards must be inducted ahead of the non-volunteers selected and ordered to report for induction by random sequence number.

The Texas induction quota of 940 for April is the state's share of a national call for 19,000 men, all for the Army.




