



More than 306, 200 pounds of aluminum cans--more than seven million of them--have been turned into Coors distributors in 11 western states in only three months. That amounts to \$30,620 paid out by Coors at its established rate of 10 cents a pound: for aluminum

containers.
Adolph Coors Company of Golden, Colo, feeds the cans into a shredding machine and this is sent to Reynolds Metal Company plant

in Alabama for recycling. Just think, that foil you wrap around Sunday's roast may have at one time been an old beer can laying along side the road. Collecting these cans would be a good project for someone I should think.

The new generation is getting very concerned about the destruction of natural resources, pollution, beautification, etc. It is about time I would say, to become real concerned about this old earth. We take it for granted and more and more of it is wasting away daily, in more ways than one. A major portion of it is being covered over with cement and asphalt . . and become a pile of junk. And it takes a mighty large piece of land just to stack wrecked autos. Too bad these can't be fed into a shredder and made into

something useful.

Hammond noted that traffic accidents would have to be reduced by 140, 000 in Texas to even begin thinking about holding the line on auto insurance rate increases. "It is quite unlikely the Governor's traffic safety program, as it now stands, would accomplish

such a reduction," he said. Gov. Smith was also urged in the letter to begin public information and education programs. One such program would promote improved knowledge of traffic laws and improved driving skills, Another plan calls for driver information and education bro-



Preliminary figures giving the total population of incorporated places of 10,000 or more population, and for counties, will be issued as soon as the District Manager is convinced that a complete count has been made. Final, detailed population figures will be issued from Washington later this year after returns have been tabulated by the Census Bureau's electronic computers.

The importance of a complete count was stressed by the District Manager, He

pointed out that the population figures compiled in the current census must stand as official until the next Federal

census. "Representation in the U.S. Congress and the State Legislature is determined by the population count as ascertained in the census. Federal funds are allotted to States and State funds, in turn, are allotted to counties and municipalities on a per capita basis. So a short count means under representation in the Federal and State law-making bodies and under allotment in government funds. Thus, it is imperative that we have a complete count. The help of every resident of the area is needed to reach this goal," he

Rare Goose Seen In South Texas

ROCKPORT -- An unusual visitor to South Texas, a redbreasted goose, has been seen and his identification verified on the Punta Del Monte Ranch in Kenedy County, eight miles north of Raymondville.

The red-breasted is considered a European goose and normally winters on the grassy steppes. He is found as a vagrant across Europe to Britain, France, Sweden and Iceland. It is believed that this is the first verified observation of the redbreasted goose in South



The wagons roll out again Friday morning at seven and stop at the Colonial Inn in Guymon for coffee time. Later on, they will be es-

corted to a point on Main Street. The escort will consist of the Guymon police and the Texas County Sheriff's Posse. They will meet the Elkhart Trail Riders at that time and put on a 30 or forty minute program.



Panhandle Important Area for Game

AUSTIN -- The rugged and rolling Texas Panhandle is experiencing growth as a major game-producing area

of the State.
Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials point out that nine important game birds and animals in the 33-county Panhandle area have either remained stable in population or have extended their range dramancally in recent years.

Mule deer, white-tailed deer, pronghorn antelope, turkey, aoudad sheep, ringneck pheasant, lesser prairie chicken and bobwhite and blue quail are found in many of the counties and all have a considerable economic impact.

Department project leader Dick DeArment of Wheeler reports that the white-tailed deer herd has done well, with some unusually large animals

harvested recently.

A total of 1,337 pronghom antelope have been killed in six Panhandle counties from 1965 through 1969. Aoudad sheep released in the Palo Duro Canyon have

increased from an original herd of 44 in 1957 to an estimated 600 in seven counties Ringneck pheasants are

reported to be extending their range, and increases in the lesser prairie chicken population have been sufficient to allow limited open seasons in the past three years.
