Voters stayed away from the polls in droves Saturday. Well under half of the qualified voters in Hansford County did not attend the primary elections. This was true all over the area and Saturday's primary election was the smallest in the history as per number of votes cast. Most of the balloting was

done in Democratic races with 749 voting this ballot in Hansford County. 152 voted in the Republican primary. A total of 901 votes were cast here, out of a possible 2, 517.

The only contested races in Hansford County were for the office of County and District Clerk. Norma Jean Stowe gained the victory over Faye Womble Lynch by a small margin 384 to 342.

Opponents in the race for County Commissioner, Precinct No. 4 were Leon Hobbs and George C. Lowe, both of Gruver. Lowe won the race 171 to 67.

In other contested races, Hansford County democrats picked Bentson over Yarborough 515 to 180 for US Senator; Martin over Brown 504 to 170 for Attorney General; Sadler over Ariastrong and Wiiliams for Com. Ceneral Land office. Sadler polled 306, o.296 and Fred Wil-

For Railroad Commissioner, Ben Ramsey 562, Connie Lawson 117. For Supreme Court of Texas, Place 3: James G. Denton 339, Matt Davis 185 and Hawthorne Phillips 82. For Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Truman Roberts 327, Earl W. Smith 269. Voters chose Jack Hazelwood for State Senator, 31st District with 299 votes with Max Sherman running a close second with 205. These two men will have an area wide run-off and the winner will meet Malouf "Oofie" Abraham, Republican opponent, in the general election. Walter Knapp polled 138 votes in this race and Mrs. Nancy Moyer barely scratched with 68. For State Representative 79th district, Gruver resident W.H. Willoughby won here with 329 to Ray Trosper 198, Jim Craves 114 and Phil Cates 52. Trsoper and Cates were area winners and will have a run-off election . County Judge Johnnie Lee polled 661 votes. County Treasurer Selma Reneau 674; County Surveyor, Charles L. Cox, 655. Justice of the Peace, Johny P. Vernon, 375. J.E. Vernon, with no opponent, Commissioner of Precinct 2, polled 24 votes. County Democratic chairman is Carl Archer with 618 votes. Named chairman of Precinct 10 was J.L. Brock with 240; Emmett Sanders, precinct 1 with 145; W.L. Johnson, for precinct 4 with 14 votes and Willard McCloy for precinct no. 9 with 4 votes. 152 persons voted in the Republican primaries and marked their ballots as follows: For U.S. Senator: George Bush 124, Robert Morris 17. For U.S. Represenative, 18th District, Bob Price 143. For Governor: Paul Eggers 134, Roger Marin 9.



TRACTOR ACCIDENTS

COLLEGE STATION -- Seventenths of a second isn't very long.



But, seven-tenths of a secon is all the time available to a farm tractor operator whose unit has started to rear backwa under full throttle, says Henry O'Neal, Extension agricultural engineer.

Within that time, he can still de-throttle the engine to stop the rearing, he explains. Beyond that fraction of time, there is no stopping the rearing and ultimate upset. And unless the operator is thrown clear, or can possibly jump cle he is pinned or crushed to suffe

serious injury or death. Or maybe he was one of the lucky ones whose tractor was equipped with a roll bar, "Of a national annual toll of about 1000 lives due to tractor accidents, some 600 are credited to tractor overturns, " says the engineer.

"Many could be prevented through the exercise of sensible driving practices, " he adds,

Sidewise upsets occur when tractors are driven too close to ditches, holes or embankment Backward flips occur when tractor-implement hitches are set at a point higher than the center of the rear axle, or whe the load exceeds the tractor's power to move it. At such tim the tractor employs its own pow to create the rearing and back-

ward flipping motion. A roll-over bar, sometimes called a protective frame, can be designed to serve as a crushresistant cab to provide operato comfort. But its primary purpo is to protect the operator from serious injury in the event the tractor tips.

"Many a capsized tractor was prevented from tipping more than 90 degrees because a roll bar was there to stop it and man a tractor operator was spared serious injury because he was strapped into the tractor seat when a roll bar bore the weight and bulk of a tractor that reared and fell over backwards," explains the engineer.

Safety specialists estimate the yearly toll of 600 lives lost to tractor overturns could be reduced by some 450 just through
