Several parents of students at Texas Tech in Lubbock stated that if school had not let out early this week and all of the students or most of them gone several thousand of them would have been killed. The University Arms, stuent living complex, located near the stadium, was completely demolished. Trees on the campus were blown down but the miracle is that many of the students had already gone home.

No Spearman or Gruver students have been reported injured or killed.

An extensive remodeling job is underway at the First Baptist Church. Crews of workmen converged on the building early Monday morning and by Tuesday the interior of the sanctuary and the basement had been

emptied of furniture. The present structure. built in the early 1940's. was badly in need of repair and the congregation voted recently to let a contract to L. L. Sams & Sons, Church designers and architects from Waco, to completely re-do the sanctuary and fellowship

The \$116,000,00 contract calls for new stained glass windows for the sanctuary with the interior re-designed into Romanesque styling featuring walnut paneling and pews, carpeting, and a modern lighting and sound system. When completed, the local church will be one of the most beautiful and up-todate places of worship in

the Panhandle. Construction work in the basement will greatly enlarge the fellowship hall area and the kitchen area.

A parlor and a bride's room will be added downstairs and the entire area will be carpeted and re-decorated adding much to the usefulness of this fellowship de-partment. The kitchen it-self will be enlarged quite a lot and will feature new cabinets and storage compartments.

Beginning next Sunday, May 17, church services will be held in the lower hallway of the educational building. Visitors will enter through the north doorway of that building for the next four Sundays. Workmen have promised that the Sanctuary will be out of use for only 4 Sundays, with work being completed that fifth week.

Four Seasons Stock Taken Off Market

Many persons in this area have speculated about the freeze on transactions in the stock of Four Seasons Nursing Centers of America, Inc., by the American Stock Exchange. A news story appeared Tuesday in the Amarillo Daily News which stated that the exchange's action is a matter involving the company's top management and will not disturb the activities of individual health centers bearing the Four Seasons name.

The release, written by Jerry Searcy, Business Editor of the Amarillo newspaper, said that the American exchange stopped trading in the company's stock on April 30 after the corporation disclosed that it would report a net loss for the three months ended March 31, Company officials also indicated that earnings for the year ending June 30 will be down substantially below earlier estimates.

Subsequently, the Securities and Exchange Commission and the American exchange announce that inquiries would be made into some of the Four Seasons' financial dealings.

Four Seasons also has Amarillo ties through Amarex, Inc. a diversified oil company which owns Four Seasons franchises in Washington, Oregon and California.

The consulting manager of Amarex, Joel Burns, said Monday that the halt in stock sales "will not adversely affect and subsidiaries develop, build and manage nursing homes, hospitals and child care centers in the Southwest and Midwest.

The officers of one Four Seasons subsidiary, according to the Amarillo newspaper release, are former members of a Spearman law firm. James P. "Jimmy " Linn is president of Four Seasons Franchising Corp. His former law partner J. D. Helms is vice president.

It was erroneously reported in that newspaper that Mr. Richard Countiss, a practic-ing Spearman attorney, was also a vice president of Four Seasons, Mr. Countiss said Tuesday that he was not associated in any way with this company, nor had he ever

Mr. Countiss purchased

the Linn and Helm interest in the Spearman law practice when these men moved to Oklahoma City and his only partner is Mr. Chunky Black-burn. The Spearman law firm is owned by Countiss and Blackburn, practicing attorn-

Linn and Helms joined Four Seasons and moved to Oklahoma City in June of 1969, but retained interests in oil and cattle businesses in the Spearman area.

It was reported that Mr. Helms stated Monday that the company would have an audited report on the January-March quarter ready in about two weeks and that they would probably make some statement about the figures at that time.

Four Seasons stock continues to be traded over-the-counter he said, and operations of individual centers should not be affected by the stock sale halt.

The story stated that SEC and American exchange officials indicated they were curious about a loan made to Four Seasons when the company was itself lending money.

Jack L. Clark, president of Four Seasons, described the transactions as being in the normal course of business operations and said the company is working with the American exchange to explain the dealings to company shareholders.

This is the final date.
Early certification by Hansford County farmers in the voluntary farm programs will mean earlier program pay-ments, according to John Trin-dle, chairman of the Hansford County Agricultural Stabiliza-tion and Conservation committee (ASC.)
Certification must be made

by the disposition dates of: Wheat, May 15 and Grain Sorghum August 15. When certification is made earlier, the certification date becomes the final farm disposition date.

Trindle cautioned farmers against gueswork. He advised that they must know their exact acreage of feed grain, wheat, and cotton. They must also know the acreage diverted from wheat and feed grains, and that they have met their farms' conserving base require-

when a farmer certifies his compliance with the farm program provisions, the Hansford County ASCS office begins processing the papers so that he will receive full payment as soon as possible after July 1. Target date for completion of 1970 farm program payments is July and August.

Trindle reminded farmers of the following major points involved in certifying they are in compliance with the farm

programs:
Certification must be exact.
Spot checks may be made at
any time following certification. If an error is found, some or all of the program pay-ments may be lost. After cer-tifiaction, adjustments can-not be made to bring acreage

into compliance.
Finish planting before making certification, Trindle said. Be sure the allotment, base, or permitted acreage has not been exceeded on all farms which the farmer or his immediate

family has an interest,
Remember, Friday May 15
(tomorrow) is the final date
to report wheat acreage!
