James Salinas, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Servando Salinas of Spearman, underwent openheart surgery in St. Anthony Hospital, Amarillo, last Thursday when physicious repaired the pulmonic valve.

Physicians report his condition so good that the lad probably will not have to spend the projected 10 days in the hospital. He is expected home some time this week.

The Spearman lad's condition was discovered last fall when Dr. Damon Gregg was examining him for a routine football check. James was an 8th grader this year. In December, James

underwent catheterization and other texts which revealed that heart surgery was necessary if he was to live a normal, active life.
The Salinas family moved

to Spearman nearly 3 years ago when he was hired as greens keeper for Hansford Golf Club association. Mr. and Mrs. Salinas have six children. Learning that James'

condition was a birth defect, local physicians arranged through the March of Dimes Foundation for funds to help alleviate the tremendous expense for such surgery. These funds, however, were depleted when James had catheterization tests done in

December.
Dr. Hentry E. Martinez


Pool Open The Spearman swimming pool opened this week and Allen Simpson, manager, said the pool is in better

#### Wheat Harvest Due June 10

According to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Texas wheat production if forcast at 67,886,000 bushels. This is six million bushels below the April 1 estimate, and about one million bushels less than 1969 production. Acres for harvest are estimated at 300, 000 below last years total.

Combining has begun on a basis down around Dallas and got underway the past week end in the Vernon, Texas area.

Irrigated wheat in the upper Panhandle region (Borger, Dumas, Spearman, Perryton) is in good condition. Dry-land wheat is in need of moisture and is maturing rapidly. If present conditions continue, harvest of dry-land wheat should begin approximately June 10, with harvest of irrigated wheat to start about a week later.

#### IS THIS WHAT WE WANT?

Proposals for "Sweeping innovations" in the structure of evisions" to the United Nations Charter were discussed by State Senatorial Candidate Max Sherman recently in a paper submitted to the American Bar Association. Proposed were the following specific changes in the United Nations:

1 Universal membership of every independent state including

- Red China. 2. Worldwide disarmament.
- 3. An international police force.
- 4. Abolition of the veto power of the Security Council.
- 5. Popular election of General Assembly representatives,
- 6. A United Nations nuclear authority. 7. An outer space agency.
- 8. Compulsory jurisdiction of all disputes vested in the International Court of Justice.
- 9. A world development program to toster economic and social advancement of nations in need of it.
- 10. Power to tax world citizens.
- 11. A charter provision that all powers not granted to the United Nations be reserved to the member nations.
- 12. A clause in the Charter recognizing that the authority c the United Nations would extend to all nations

Though he characterized the list of innovations as desirable and praiseworthy, he questioned whether the political reality of immediate international politics would permit them to be adopted. If the political reality of the time precludes the adoption of these innovations, Shermon questioned whether the United Nations could bring "peace in our time?"

The twenty-two page dissertation, generously interlaced with footnotes, develops Mr. Sherman's view of the United Nations in its role as a keeper of the peace.

"It is my position in this essay rnat the best hope for world peace is through an international common law developed within the present structure of the United Nations. The life-forces of peace exist within the Charter, and it is from these forces that the growth of peace must be nurtured," HE SAID.

Referring to publications of the NATIONAL COUNCIL OF CHURCHES, NELSON ROCKEFELLER, and Senator WILLIAM FUL-**BRIGHT** as "impressive support," Sherman also discussed an alternative plan for a federal union for a "concert of free nations" which would be separate from the United Nations but co-existing with it.

If we, the voters of this nation, do not want to live under a world government, in which we would be out-voted twenty to one, WHEN are we going to quit electing to public office candidates who are dedicated to the establishment of a one-world government (which would be a socialistic dictatorship OF THE "ELITE" synonymous to a WORLD MONARCHY?

## Accent on Health Health

Drugs! How many times have you heard the word? Abuse! Just what does it

mean?
Taken together "drug abuse" is probably one of the most talked-about topics in Texas and the nation today. The topic is attacked from various sides--law enforcement, morality, punishment. It is also attacked from another side--education.

It's this attack which has been launched by the Texas State Department of Health's Division of Public Health Education. The Department has long felt a very real concern about this growing menace to the total population because of its direct implications to public health.

About two years ago the Department became aware that a serious deficiency existed in the area of public health education concerning drug abuse. As the deficiency became increasingly apparent, and because of the Department's existing activity in registering wholesale drug outlets, the Division of Public Health Education began to accept requests for its participation in drug abuse programs in schools, teacher training programs, civic organizations, etc.

During this two year period, the Division has had instructors traveling to various parts of the state presenting an educational concept of drug abuse control. To date, more than 500 such

To date, more than 500 such classes have been held with an audience of some 50,000 students.

The actual course consists of showing one of several films-ordinarily the film entitled "Marihuana", a "no preaching, tell-it-like-it-is" film. The film depicts a "pot party" being raided by the police. As each person is taken from the party to awaiting patrol cars, each expresses his or her thoughts about smoking marihuana and defends the use of it.

As the film progresses, however, each of these defenses is refuted with sound, proven

evidence.
After the film has been shown, the program is opened to student participation through a question-and-answer period, and drug literature is distribut-

Although the course covers all drugs, marihuana and LSD seem uppermost in the minds of the students.

The whole idea of the edu-

cation approach is to make the students think about the dangers of drugs.

ers of drugs.

The State Legislature has now charged the Texas Education Agency with the responsibility of establishing a comprehensive drug abuse program for students in grades 5 through 12, assuring student exposure to the subject. The State Health Department now is shifting its emphasis to adult groups.




