P.S. the sun is shining in Spearman - and it looks like harvest might get underway. The sun came out afternoon, Tuesday.

At a special meeting of the Library board this past week, members voted to pay off the note on the building and set November 15 as the date for a "public mortgage burning ceremony."

\$1,500.00, plus interest, is all that is owed on the two-story Hansford Library building located on Spearman's main street. When this debt is paid, and it will be within the next few days, the Library bank account will be completely depleted, so the board is making plans for a gigantic "art and handcraft sale" to help raise some money.

"We are not at all concerned about being broke" one library board member said. "We are thrilled to death to be able to pay off this debt in such a short time."

Positive thinking plus a lot of hard work -- this is the magic formula prescribed for the people in this community back in 1967 when the Library board stuck out its neck and purchased this building which is now the home for Hansford County Library. The building cost \$31,000.00. The formula worked-for community effort had built-and paid for the Library.

When several of the board members proposed buying a building and expanding library service, others expressed doubt and reluctance at tackling such a large project.

But the idea grew, and the citizens pitched in. Clubs and organizations contributed, private individuals donated, and members of the Twentieth Century Club staged bazaars, served stew dinners, and came

Tip with all sorts of money-making ideas to help raise money for it's favorite project -- the Library.

The entire community is to be praised for the success of the project. In just three short years, the Library is completely free of debt!

The Spearman Library was originally founded back in 1934 by the Twentieth Century Club, an association of civic-minded women of this city.

The first library was opened that year in a small nook in the City Hall. After the court house was built and county offices were moved from the City Hall into the court house, the library expanded from its "small nook" into two larger rooms.

Anna Lee Morton (Mrs. Raymond Kirk) was the first librarian. She was assisted by Miss Ethel Deakin, school librarian. Later Mrs. Pearl Reed began to help at the library and later took over as full time librarian.

Mrs. Reed resigned as librarian in 1955 and Mrs. Mabel Adams took her place. In 1957 Mrs. Gladys Richardson was named librarian and served in this capacity until 1967.

In 1960 the Library was moved from the City Hall into the basement at the Court House, and was operated from these cramped quarters until the new home was purchased in 1967.

A total of \$8,000 was spent on remodeling the two-story building before it could be occupied. Gold tweed carpeting was installed, new draperies were hung, shelves, furni-

ture, tables and reading centers for different age groups were placed downstairs.

Upstairs is a community room remodeled by the Spearman Jaycees. There is a \$3 charge for use of this room. The local art class refinished a large upstairs room which is used by various art classes. This room can be rented for \$4. A room furnished in memory of the late Robert Ownbey is used for Library board meetings.

A Twentieth Century Club project called the "Thrift Shop" has brought in some \$7,000 which has been applied toward the retirement of the debt on the Library building. This shop, open each Saturday, is located in rooms directly behind the Library. The women have put in thousands of volunteer work hours in the back room of the Library building since 1967.

"What loomed up in front of us as a huge mountain in 1967, has turned into a mere mole hill" a Library board spokesman said. "And it is all due to the generous spirit and hard work of the people in this community."

Operating expenses for the Library are provided by the City and the County. Patrons have helped bring this about, too.

Mrs. Celestine Thompson is the current librarian. Serving on the Library Board are James Cunningham, J.L. Brock, Richard Countiss, Mrs. Dick Kilgore, Mrs. Jack McWhirter, Mrs. R.E. Lee, Mrs. Frank Davis, Mrs. Peyton Gibner and Mrs. Henry Cornelius.

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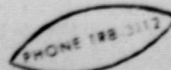

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Let Me See
by Sybil...

I get pretty sick and tired of hearing people run down MY generation and the generation of MY parents. I've always been rather proud of the accomplishments made by this age group, but more and more we are termed as the "establishment", and it's made to sound like a dirty word. For the life of me I have never been able to understand just what the younger generation (or the New Breed) holds against us, and this week I ran across an article which seems to hit the spot with me -- It tells it like it is, so far as I'm concerned.

In September of 1969 Eric A. Walker, president of Pennsylvania State University, addressed a summer graduating class. He reiterated the remarks of another man, in order to reintroduce the students to their parents. This is what he said: "Not long ago an educator from Northwestern University by the name of Bengen Evans, a radio performer known to your parents, got together some facts about these 2 generations -- your parents and grandparents.

These, your parents and grandparents, are the people who within just 5 decades, 1919-1969, have by their work increased your life expectancy by approximately 50 percent -- who while cutting the working day by a third, have more than doubled per capita output. These are the people who have given you a healthier world than they found. And because of this you no longer

have to fear epidemics of typhus, diphtheria, smallpox, scarlet fever, polio nor TB that they knew in their youth.

Let me remind you that these remarkable people lived through history's greatest depression. Many of these people know what it is to be poor, what it is to be hungry and cold. And because of this, they determined that it would not happen to you, that you would have a better life, you would have food to eat, milk to drink, vitamins to nourish you, a warm home, better schools and greater opportunities to succeed than they had. Because they gave you the best, you are the tallest, healthiest, brightest, and probably best looking generation to inhabit the land.

And because they were materialistic, you will work fewer hours, learn more, have more leisure time, travel to more distant places, and have more of a chance to follow your life's ambition.

These also are the people who fought man's gristliest war. They are the people who defeated the tyranny of Hitler, and who when it was all over, had the compassion to spend billions of dollars to help their former enemies rebuild their homelands.

It was the representatives of these 2 generations who through the highest court of the land, fought racial discrimination at every turn to begin a new era in civil rights.

They built thousands of better teachers and at the same time made higher education a very real possibility for millions of youngsters -- where once it was only the dream of the wealthy few.

And they made a start -- although a late one -- in healing the scars of the earth and in fighting pollution and the destruction of our natural environment. They also hold the dubious record for paying taxes -- although you will probably exceed them in this.

While they have done all these things, they have had some failures. They have not yet found an alternative for war, nor for racial hatred.

Perhaps you, the new generation, will perfect the social mechanisms by which all men may follow their ambitions without the threat of force -- so that the earth will no longer need police to enforce the laws, nor armies to prevent some men from trespassing against others. But they -- those generations -- made

more progress by the sweat of their brows than in any previous era, and don't you forget it! And, if your generation can make as much progress in as many areas as these 2 generations, you should be able to solve a good many of the world's remaining ills.

It is the hope of these 2 generations that you find the answers to many of these problems that plague mankind.

But it won't be easy. And you won't do it by negative thoughts, nor by tearing down or belittling. You may and can do it by hard work, humility, hope, and faith in mankind. Try it.

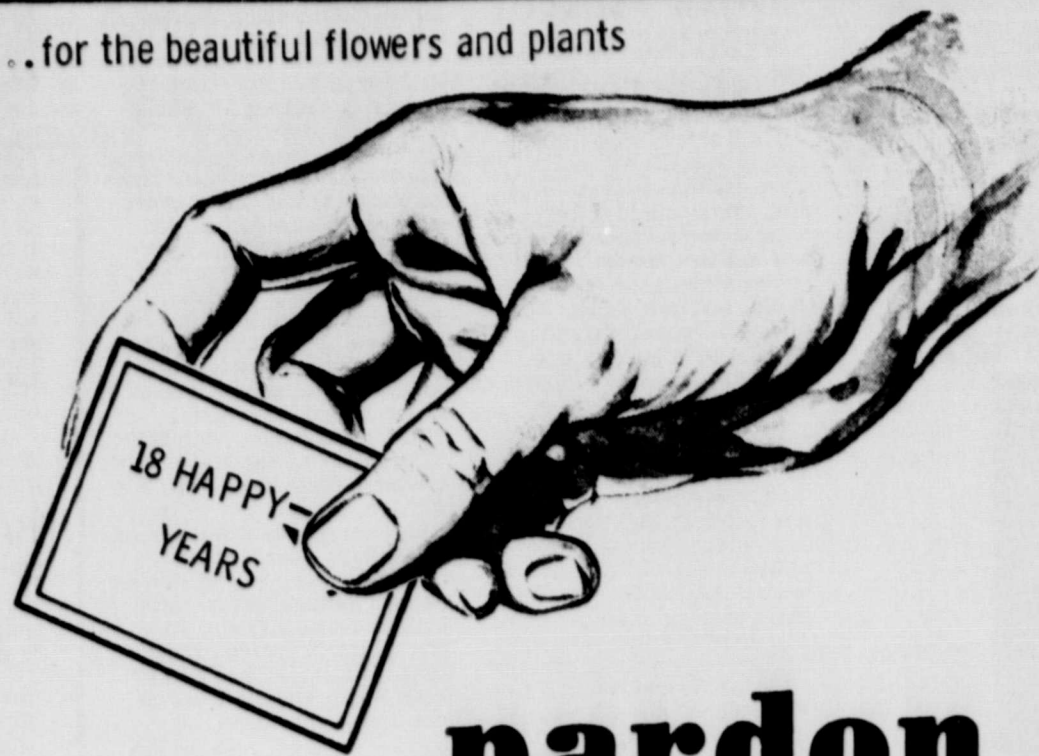
The purpose of the sale is to help raise badly needed funds for the Library. The building note has been paid off and this has completely depleted the Library's bank account.

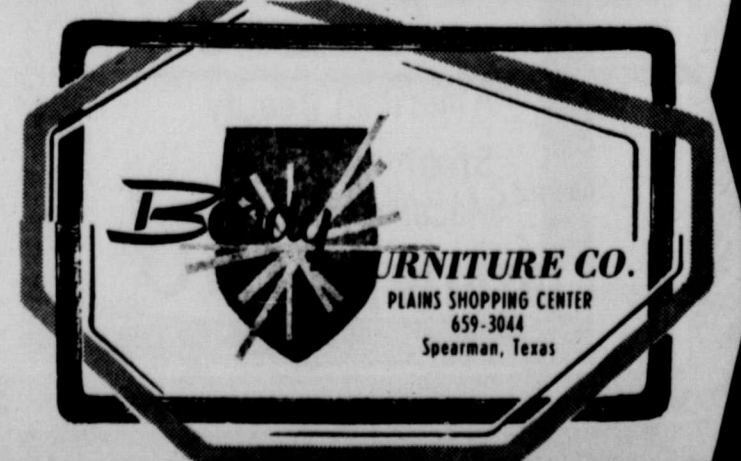

\$259,000 To Hansford County War Veterans

An indication of how much money is being spent annually to aid Hansford County's War Veterans and their families may be gleaned from the latest government figures.

They show that expenditures in the form of cash benefits and services are at an all-time high, locally and elsewhere.

An estimated \$259,000 in financial aid of various kinds went to needy local veterans and to the dependents of deceased veterans during the past fiscal year.

The figure was derived from detailed data for the State of Texas, released by the Veterans Administration in its report for the year.

Among the benefits received, in addition to pensions and compensation, were hospital and health care, education and training, business and housing loans, insurance and various others.

The local expenditure for pensions and compensation,

were hospital and health care, education and training, business and housing loans, insurance and various others.

The local expenditure for pensions and compensation alone, related to the veteran population of Hansford County, was equivalent to \$336 per living veteran.

This was arrived at by dividing the total outlay by the number of local veterans, which the VA places at 770.

Throughout the State of Texas, which has a veteran population of 1,354,000, the amount so-spent was \$455,518,000.

A breakdown of the \$259,000 in benefits going to those in the local area shows that approximately 62 percent of it was for pensions and compensation to living veterans and to the dependents of former veterans. Nationally, the ratio was 57 percent.

According to the annual report, some \$9.16 billion

was spent in the United States in fiscal 1969 to provide benefits and facilities for the 27,300,000 living veterans and for the dependents of deceased veterans.

With the number of them on the rise in all sections of the country, due to the war in Vietnam, Congress has been urged to step up the amount of assistance provided for them.

Special action has been sought to aid newly discharged veterans to improve their career opportunities through vocational or academic training so as to enable them to find satisfactory employment.



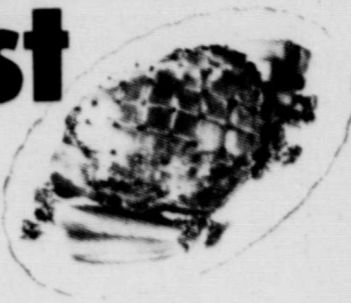
