S/Sgt. Roy Devers Awarded AF Medal



Sergeant Roy L. Devers has been honored by the U. S. Air Force with the Commendation medal because of meritorious service as a Refueling Supervisor, Fuels Distribution Section, while serving with the 401st Supply Squadron Tactical Fighter Wing at Torrejon Air Base, Madrid, Spain.

During this period, June 15, 1967 to March, 1970, Sgt. Devers' outstanding skill, knowledge and leadership enabled the Base Fuels Branch to realize tremendous improvements in efficiency and effectiveness of the base fuels mis-

son. The distinctive accomplishments of Sergeant Devers reflect credit upon himself and the United States Air Force.

The career AF soldier is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Devers of Spearman. He joined the USAF in 1959. Besides Madrid, Spain, he has also been stationed in England, California, Seville, Spain and is now serving in Thailand.

CATTLE FEEDING IN PANHANDLE CONTINUES GROWTH

COLLEGE STATION--Texas cattle feeders on last October 1 reported 1.4 million head on feed, 6 percent more than on October 1, 1969. The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in the same report said that nationally the increase was only 3 percent.

Ed Uvacek, Extension livestock marketing specialist, said the report showed that feeding continues to show the most growth in the northern part of the Panhandle with declines now developing in the northeast and Gulf Coast areas of the state. More than one million head were on feed October in High Plains feedlots, he said.

Uvacek noted that Texas reported 264 feedlots with capacities of 1,000 head or more on October 1 and that they held 1.4 million head of cattle. These large feedlots have a total capacity of 2.4 million head at one time; thus, only 59 percent of their available capacity was in use on October 1.

The October 1 report, pointed out the specialist, showed that 80 lots were empty. Utilization of the 184 active feedlots was at 66 percent of capacity, Uvacek said.

Texas feedlots placed 789,000 head on feed during the July-September quarter, down 3 percent from the same period a year ago. Operators reported intentions to market 796,000 cattle during the last quarter of 1970, about 10 percent more than a year ago. Uvacek said that short-fed were excluded in both marketing figures.

Nationally, on October 1, 1970 there were 10,382,000 head of cattle and calves on feed in the 22 major feeding states, 3 percent above a year ago. Placements during the July-Sept. quarter were just over 6 million head or 7 percent more than for the same period in 1969.

Library Art Sale Set For Sunday

Three years ago this month, the Hansford County Library board purchased the two-story building located at Main & Hancock so that the public facility could have room to expand. They paid \$31,000 for the building and two weeks ago the note was paid in full.

This has been a community project. Private citizens have been generous with donations, clubs and organizations contributed both money and hours of labor with dinners, bazaars and art sales to raise funds.

The library building fund has received almost \$7,000.00 from a Twentieth Century Club project called the "Thrift Shop" which is operated from the back room at the library building every Saturday. This club organized the original Spearman Library back in 1932 and members have contributed countless hours of volunteer service to this project since that time. The library was first housed in the city hall, later moved to the basement of the courthouse, and in 1968 moved into the present building.

The library board spent some \$8,000 remodeling the building before it could be used. Mrs. Jenna V. Ownbey furnished the room used for board meetings. The Spear-

man Jaycees furnished a community meeting room. The Spearman art class spent several thousand dollars remodeling the large room upstairs.

All these rooms serve the community and can be rented for nominal charges. Many people have donated furniture and equipment.

The end result is a building to be envied by libraries throughout the entire Panhandle area. It is spacious, it is beautiful. The total investment, not counting the books, is currently appraised at \$75,000.00. And it is paid for.

To celebrate this fete, the Library Board is staging a mortgage burning ceremony Sunday afternoon, November 15, at 2:30 and the public is invited to attend.

To help replenish the Library bank fund, the board has arranged also for an art and hand-craft sale to be staged Sunday. The show will feature paintings and art work by Hansford County area artists. Paintings will be priced for sale. Paintings will be displayed in the large room upstairs and the public can view the art work starting at 12 noon this coming Sunday.

All artists are urged to bring articles for sale to the Library

building, or to the home of Mrs. Peyton Gibner by noon Friday, Nov. 13.

Artists are asked to price their pictures, handcraft items, china, tote ware, etc. All art forms will be accepted, but those bringing handcraft items which will need to be displayed, are asked to furnish their own tables or stands.

Art work sold will be on a "first come" basis. The library will charge the customary 20% commission on all items sold so work should be

priced accordingly.

It is hoped that artists will take this opportunity to offer many of their works for sale to the public at this time.

The art show and sale will be open to the public Sunday from 12 noon until 6 p.m. The mortgage burning ceremony and reception is scheduled for 2:30.

The public at large is invited to attend the affair Sunday, and take this opportunity to tour the beautiful, debt-free, Hansford County Library.

Girl Scout Fund Drive Set For Mon.

Skill in arts and crafts, in nature lore and in human relations are a few of the many enriching gains that come to the approximately 112 girls in Spearman through belonging to the Girl Scouts of America.

The Council Fund Drive assists the Yucca Girl Scout Council in financing the county's share, population wise, in carrying out a well balanced Scouting program. Yucca Girl Scout Council includes counties in adjacent areas of Kansas, Colorado, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas. Each neighborhood administers its own program through local adult personnel serving as troop leaders, program consultants and members of the board of directors and board committees. In Spearman about 20 of these people are constantly on the job.

In Spearman troops work in a council co-ordinated program through neighborhood associations headed by Mrs. George Rook, neighborhood chairman.

Scouting offers programs to girls from 7 to 17 years of age on levels from brownies through Senior Scouting. The entire allocation from Spearman is spent within

the council and goes to pay salaries of professional staff members, provides program and resource materials, assists in providing a well rounded camping program and provided training for local adult leaders. The \$1.00 registration fee, required to become a member of the national Girl Scout organization, is the only funds that do not stay in the council.

Professional staff services include training for some 15-20 adults each year, and a staff member attends the neighborhood meeting held each month where she is available to help with proposed program and for consultation with troop leaders. They also include training leaders for the camping program made available at the day camps held in the community each year.

Scouting provides ethical training, including ideals of patriotism, of good citizenship and service to others. Girl Scouting teaches something of how to grow into fine womanhood by supplementing character building programs of the home, church and school.

tion of Dr. H.B. Rinker, Mr. Roy L. McClellan, Mr. Allen Alford and Mrs. George Rook.

A kick-off breakfast, Tuesday morning November 17th at 7:30 at the Cattleman's Cafe will signal the beginning of the first organized Girl Scout Council Fund Drive in Spearman since 1967. Volunteers will conduct a door-to-door campaign on this date.

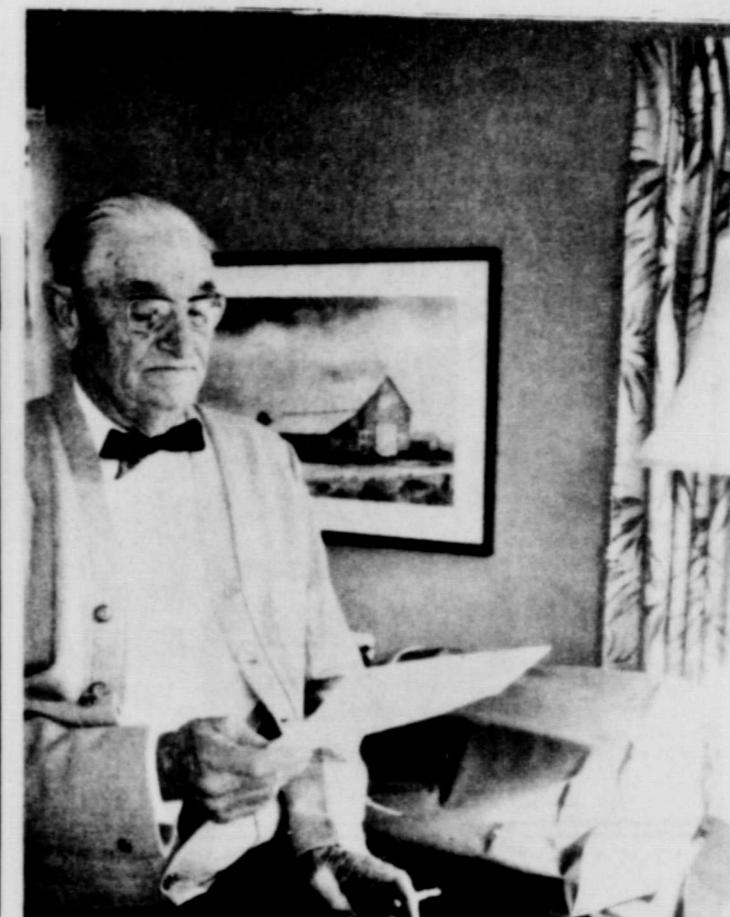
BASKETBALL PROSPECT OUT FOR YEAR

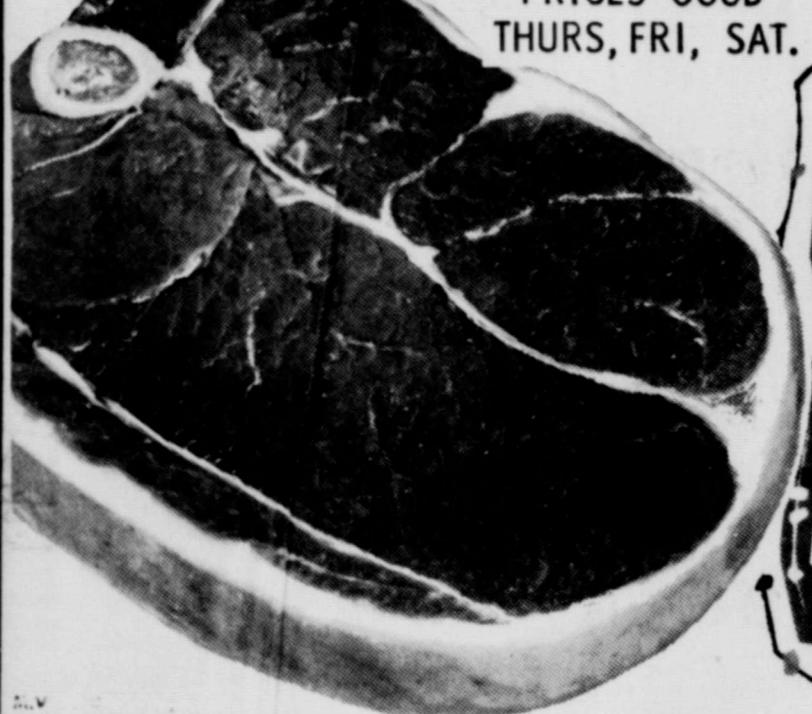

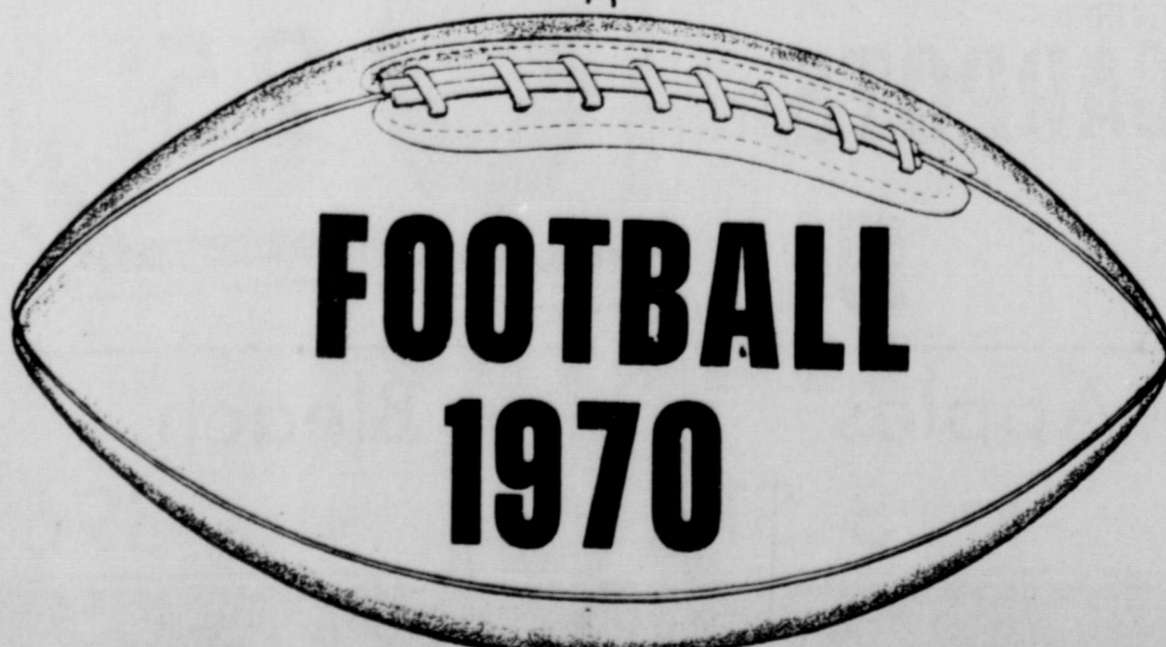

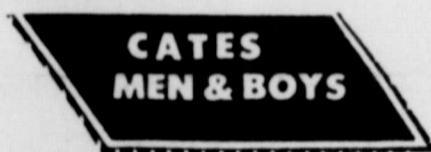
