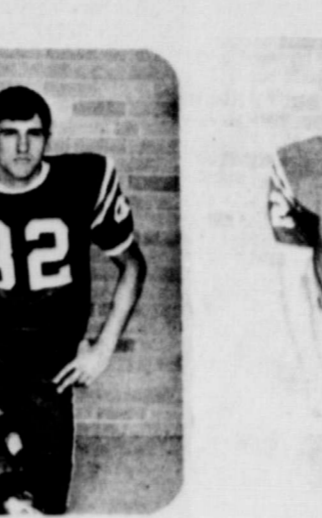

## Theft Of Pipe Reported

Thieves parked a pickup and trailer outside the fence at the Humble pipe yard 5 miles west of Spearman Thursday night, and proceeded to take on a load of used 1" pipe. Glen Day, Maintenance foreman for Humble Oil Co. reported the theft to Sheriff J. B. Cooke Friday morning. Sheriff Cooke said the thieves evidently climbed over the fence and, walking several feet, handed the pipe over the fence to load the truck and trailer. The Sheriff said this kind of pipe is used as framing for steel buildings, and for cattle corrals. Day estimated some 1500 to 2000 foot of the one-inch pipe was stolen, valued at \$250.00. The pipe was in 21-foot joints.

### 4 MEN CALLED

The December draft call for Texas is 489, and local boards will fill the call with men with random sequence numbers 1 through 160, insofar as possible. Local Selective Service Board 99, serving Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb and Hemphill counties, received a call to induct four men into the army and send 14 men to take their pre-induction examinations.

Perry Washington, Gerald Evans, Howard Kloss and Rocky Thomas will report November 30 and be inducted on December 1st. Only 13 men were available to call for physical exams. Those reporting will be Ruel Holt, John Cole Jr., James Ward, Jimmy Kunkel, Benny Rupperecht, Larry Swink, Monte Lusby, Jed Monroe, Richard Booth, Bradford Altmiller, Ricky Riggins, Michael Crum and Dennis Pulpan. Colonel Charles M. Duncan, acting state Selective Service director, stressed that under the new Executive Order signed by the President September 26, 1970, all men in I-A, I-A-O, or I-O on December 31, 1970, with numbers lower than the high number reached this calendar year by their own local boards, will be assigned to the Extended Priority Selection Group to be called during the first quarter of 1971. Those with a higher number than the high number reached will be assigned to the Second Priority Group in 1971. The Texas December draft quota of 489 is the state's share of a national quota for 7,000 men, all for the army. The state quota for pre-induction physical and mental examinations in December is 3,376. Men sent for these examinations will be limited to those with random sequence numbers 1 through 195 from the drawing in December 1969 and numbers 1 through 100 from the July 1970 drawing for those born in 1951.

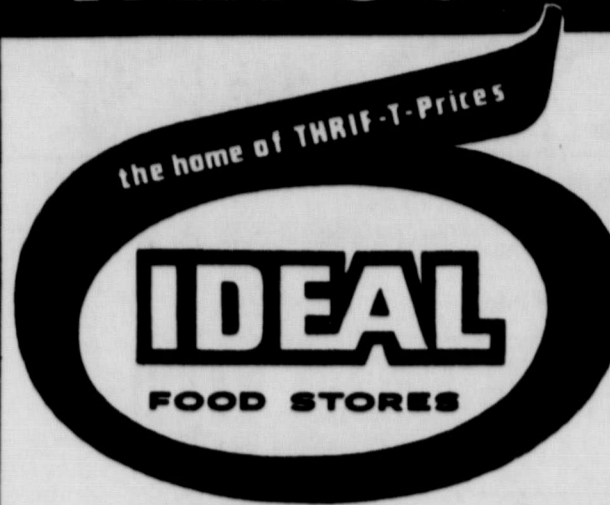
MONDAY B. B. RESULTS

"God, I give thee thanks for the steepness and roughness of the way and staunch virtues gained by climbing over jagged rocks of hardship and stumbling thru dark and pathless sloughs of discouragement; for the acid blight of failure that has burned out of me all thought of easy victory and toughened my sinews for fiercer battles

and greater triumphs; for mistakes I have made and the priceless lessons I have learned from them; for disillusion and disappointment that have cleared my vision and spurred my desire; thanks for my imperfections that give me the keen delight of striving toward perfection; for my own shortcomings, sorrows and loneliness that give me a deeper sympathy for others, for ingratitude and misunderstanding and the gladness of service without other reward than self-expression.

That seemed to say a lot to me, for if God can still accept us and love us "in spite of ourselves" . . . we are bound to give Him thanks.

Another thing I find myself being especially thankful for is the fact that I am just a common, ordinary, mediocre person with plain ordinary abilities, with usual, commonplace ideas and goals. It doesn't take much to make me happy (a new (old) fruit jar once in a while), I have no worries as to what to do with a vast amount of riches, nor problems as to where to store my jewels. I'm no educated fool struggling with ways and means to solve the world's woes. I am thankful for an old-fashioned mother too. One who taught me to find joy in small things and to strive only for "contentment" in this life. . . that this alone makes a man rich.

Although an ancient form of harnessing nature's power, windmills were not used in connection with water wells until the mid-nineteenth century.
