COLD GRIPS AREA

City Streets Hazardous



No reports of stalled motorists were received by the Sheriff's department during the weekend blizzard. Passengers from this car, 1 mile west on the Gruber highway, evidently caught a ride to town with someone.

As much as four inches of snow whipped by strong northerly winds blocked highways throughout the Panhandle by early Sunday morning as the first howling blizzard of the winter gripped the area.

A slow drizzle mixed with sleet began falling here Saturday afternoon and continued until around 11 o'clock when it turned to driving snow.

Temperatures fell to 24 degrees during the night-time hours and the roads, covered with frozen rain topped by inches of snow made driving extremely hazardous. By morning east-west roads were banked in snowdrifts and closed to traffic.

Snow continued to fall, swept by 40-mile per hour winds throughout the day Sunday. Temperatures hovered at the 20-degree mark throughout the day. With the stiff northerly wind and the freezing temperatures, the chill factor stood at 40 degrees below zero.

Cattle on wheat fields along the highways drifted through the fences, causing at least four vehicle accidents according to Sheriff J. B. Cooke. These accidents were minor however. Motorists were traveling at such a slow rate of speed due to icy highways, Sheriff Cooke said no injuries were reported to persons or cattle involved in these accidents.

Spearman schools opened Monday morning although school buses were not able to make their rounds.

Official U.S. weather observer, Billy Haden, reported 0.46 inches of melt from the sleet, drizzle and snow. The month of December passed without a trace of moisture.

Spearman's total moisture for the year totaled 16.08 inches, 5.45 inches below the yearly average rainfall. This has been the driest year since 1964 when only 14 inches was recorded. In 1963 only 13.71 was measured for the year.

In 1965 however, a whopping 26.52 inches fell. 1966-18.74; 1967-19.63; 1968-21.89; 1969-18.61.

The average for the year since 1880 has been 21.53 inches. Monday was an ice day in Spearman. The temperature never reached above 17 degrees for a high and during the night, the mercury plunged to a frigid 6 below zero.

Old Timers Remember When It Snowed 3 Feet



Customers were scarce at Hays Barber Shop Tuesday. Streets were icy and the weather was too cold to be out. John Bishop, right, made it to town and stopped in to talk over the weather with Floyd Hays.

We live in a country which gets its minimum share of rainfall and when and if moisture falls in any form, it's news. Let a snow storm come along and old timers can always recall a "I remember when" story.

John Bishop, to some people, may be considered an old timer. He came here in 1929. He can tell you some "snow stories."

But Floyd Hays has been a resident of this city longer than anyone can remember, and his stories are considered the real facts!

Floyd and John got their heads together Tuesday about the early January blizzard of the past weekend and Floyd recalled the big storm of 1903. This was in February though. On the 23rd day of February, Floyd remembered, it began snowing here and snowed for several days without stopping. "Big, wet snowflakes which drifted to the ground with no wind at all."

When it finally stopped snowing, there was an even three feet of snow stacked yard-stick deep on the level. It left 2.93 inches of moisture. Floyd recalls some old cowboy riding into town after the snow and his horse fell out from under him into an open

cellar. Hays said it took half the men in town to pull the horse and rider out of that hole.

Snow in the month of January is exciting. It's also unusual for January is known as a dry month in this arid country. Only 20 Januarys since the year 1880 record over an inch of moisture. It is interesting to note that when January is wet, the year ends with plentiful moisture.

John & Floyd think it snowed at least 5 inches Sunday. The weather man measured .44 inch of liquid melt from it. 0.40 is considered good moisture for January, and the month has just begun

First '71 Baby Hasn't Arrived

A check with the Hansford Hospital late Tuesday revealed no new arrivals for 1971. Hospital officials indicated they did not know of any "prospects" in anticipating the first arrival in Spearman for the new year.

In a check with the City Police Dept. concerning motorists and icy roads, Chief Leland Wood said he was "knocking on wood."

As of Tuesday noon, Wood said his department had not had so much as a fender bender since the snow storm Sunday.

During the storm Sunday afternoon and early Monday morning, City Policemen gave assistance to at least 25 motorists who were stalled in snowdrifts or were having car trouble, but no accidents due to ice-covered streets had been reported.

Motorists and pedestrians alike are using extreme caution for sidewalks and streets are covered with a frozen cover of snow. No melting at all occurred Monday and very little Tuesday due to frigid cold temperatures.

ALL-DAY SYMPOSIUM SET FOR JANUARY 11

School Prepares To Instruct Students On "Crime & Drugs"

School systems all over the state of Texas are busy preparing to introduce a new course for students in grades 5 thru 12 for the 1971-72 school year.

The new school program will concern "Crime & Drug Abuse".

As to who will teach these classes, what method of instruction will be used, curriculum guides for each grade, etc., this is not known just yet. For the past several months Spearman and area schools have been sending teams to the Educational Service Center in Amarillo to help with these and many other problems which may arise in implementing such an educational course. Those attending these PESO

clinics in Amarillo have been Eddie Clemmons, Administrator; Mrs. June Porter, teacher and Patricia Schnell, student.

Texas House Bill 467 provides that all students in grades 5-12 shall receive instruction in crime and drug abuse each year. This will begin in Spearman schools with the Sept. 1971 term.

In preparation for implementing this bill in the 1971-72 school year, the Spearman Public Schools will have an ALL DAY drug symposium at the high school Monday, January 11.

The symposium will feature a film and guest speakers on various areas of the drug scene. A question and answer period will follow the presentation. Special speakers include Father Tash, Chaplain at St.

Anthony Hospital and head of "Operation Drug Alert" in Amarillo; Rev. Don Wirsdorfer, pastor of the First Christian Church in Spearman; Dave Griffin, a special investigator for the Amarillo Police Dept.; Dr. D.F. Blackley, Dr. Damon Gregg and Dr. R.L. Kleebenger, Spearman physicians. Dick Countiss, Spearman Attorney at Law will conclude the all-day program.

Students and teachers in grades 5-12 will attend. For any drug education program to be successful, the school must have the support of the entire community. This support must first start with "awareness", therefore, citizens of this community are invited and encouraged to attend this symposium. The schedule is as follows:

Sheriff J. B. Cooke and his deputy Mrs. Bodil Hutchison went to Woodward, Okla., December 29 and returned a woman prisoner who had been indicted on forgery charges.

Sheriff's officers in Woodward arrested Wilma Jean Wait and held her for Sheriff Cooke. The 20-year-old is confined in Hansford County jail in lieu of \$1,000 bond waiting action of the court. Sheriff Cooke said there are presently two women in jail here being held on forgery charges.

The Wait woman allegedly passed forged checks in December of 1969 to Spearman merchants in the amount of \$125.00 using the names of Tony Long, Dorothy Taylor and Betty Kite. Checks were passed at Cates Men's Store, TG&Y, Ideal and Cut Rate Grocery Store.

Linda Lindquest, an accomplice of Wilma Jean Wait in the forged check spree, has already been tried and was placed on probation.

The United States Supreme Court has ruled that 18, 19 and 20 year olds may vote in "federal elections only."

Although there are no scheduled elections coming up in 1971, ten Hansford County young people have already called at the county tax office for voter registration.

Some of the youth applied for voter forms before Tax Assessor-Collector J. B. Cooke had any official ruling from the Secretary of State.

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Young people aged 18, 19 and 20 must call at the county tax office and fill out the voter form before January 31, 1971.

This is the deadline for every person to register to vote in elections set for 1971.

As of January 5, Tuesday of this week, 1,959 Hansford County residents had registered to vote this year. Anyone who has not registered must do so by 5 p.m., January 31.

The first 10 Hansford County young people between the ages of 18-20 to register for voting privileges in Federal elections included four Spearman youth: Steve Spoonemore, Cindy Hutchison, P. A. Lyon III and David Holland. Those from Gruber to register included Judy Hudson, Nancy Hudson, Georgie Walker, Connie Etter and Janet L. Jackson, Wade Parks from Morse was the 10th one.

LEWIS LLEWELLYN How Dangerous Is Marijuana?



Many are beginning to realize that marijuana, LSD, speed, mescaline, heroin, and other narcotics are destroying thousands of America's young people.

While the full record on the effects of marijuana is not yet in, and research is still continuing, Dr. Davis Wade, Texas state commissioner for mental health, has stated, "We are getting substantial research evidence to indicate that marijuana is causing brain damage. This is organic cellular damage. . . . Persons who suffer such brain damage do not ever recover from it."

Started in High School
Steve Clements, 21, tells about his experience with marijuana in this way, "I started smoking grass in high school. It was very simple. All my friends were smoking it and one of them asked me if I had and I told him, 'No.' He asked me if I wanted to try it and I guess I must have said, 'Why not?' Everybody else is doing it."

"I smoked that first joint as sort of a gesture, looking for something in my life that seemed to be missing. . . . And then it seemed so easy to go on to the others--LSD, barbiturates, mescaline, and other hallucinogenic drugs but, thank God, no heroin."

Steve was arrested for a narcotics law violation while he was a student at St. Petersburg, Fla. Now off drugs completely and looking forward to parole and going back to college, he is one of the lucky ones.

His experience with drugs, starting with marijuana, points out the utter folly of the argument that marijuana should be legalized.

Another who has found the way back from drug addiction and the miseries which accompany it is Gary R., now serving a three-to-six year prison term in Pennsylvania for crimes committed while he was an addict.

Here is Gary's story: "I had been taking drugs steadily for two years and I had gotten to the point where drugs were all that meant anything. . . . It was as if something evil had attacked my head so that I was sure I was going insane. . . . My thinking was twisted. No my own. I would go into spells of deep depression."

While addicted to drugs, Gary met a girl named Wendy. They started to live together, though they were unmarried.

"Finally," he continues, "I got so bad I couldn't care for her any more. . . . so I took her home. Her Mom is a born-again Christian and I'll never forget the night I brought Wendy home. Her Mom just took us both in her arms and held us, and cried, and gave thanks to the Lord. Her prayer had been answered. . . . The night I accepted the Lord, Wendy and I are now married. . . . How I thank God for the new life we now have in Jesus."

Freedom from Bondage
Though he is in prison, Gary now has a freedom -- and an inner peace -- that he did not have while he was free to walk where he wished -- but in bondage to drugs.
He has proved true the Biblical statement, "He whom the Son makes free shall be free indeed."
There is hope for the drug addict who will take advantage of this offer held out to him by the hand of God.
