Phillips Blackhawks Win District 1-AA Championship 49-43

The Phillips Blackhawks defeated the Spearman Lynx 49-43 in a District 1-AA championship game at Phillips Tuesday night, but fans were treated to one of the finest displays of sportsmanship and basketball that this writer has ever witnessed.

The Blackhawks jumped into an early 11-1 lead and maintained this lead until half-time, when it was cut to 2 points, 13-21. Their big boy, Jarnigan, had three fouls the first half, and with 14 minutes and 17 seconds left in the ball game (early in the third quarter) he received his fourth foul. As soon as Jarnigan left the game, the Hawks jumped into a quick 12 point lead. However, they cut this lead to four points, at the end of the third quarter. In the fourth quarter, Jarnigan was put back into the game, and lasted only one play when he received his 5th foul. With four minutes and 12 seconds left on the clock, and Jarnigan fouled out, the Lynx pulled within one point, 40-39 of the Blackhawks. The Lynx fans could smell victory, but the Hawks simply carried the game to the Lynx, and jumped into a quick 8 point lead with 2 field goals, and 4 three throws. Both teams were superb, their coaches displayed the very finest poise, and basketball fans left the game with nothing but praise for these teams.

Although the Lynx game plan went exactly as expected, most fans thought that the Lynx could handle Phillips if they could control the big boy Jarnigan. But, Spearman played the game perfectly, they just couldn't defeat the Blackhawks. This newspaper has nothing but praise for Coach Simpson and the Phillips coach for such a game. It is so seldom in this day and time, that young men can receive praise from any source. But, the boys on the Spearman team, and the Phillips team, along with their coaches and school officials, most certainly are to be congratulated for this fantastic evening of "sportsmanship and determination."

Chalmers Porter filed for re-election, to the Spearman School Board Tuesday of this week. Marvin Jones stated that he will not be a candidate.

SPORTS BULLETIN: The winner of the girls district 2-AA race has not been determined. Electra will meet Shamrock Friday night at Shamrock, to determine the bi-district foe for the Lynxettes. The 2-AA champion must be certified by Saturday night. The bi-district play-off game must be over by next Tuesday night. If Electra and Shamrock should tie, they must play-off before mid-nite Saturday night. If Shamrock wins the game, they will be the bi-district foe for the Lynxettes. In any event, the bi-district game, and site, will be decided as soon as possible. Probably, the game will be played at Pampa or Miami, Tuesday night, but nothing is definite.

6 Men Sent To Army

February's draft call for Texas is for 1,185 men, and all will be called from the Extended Priority Selection Group and the first Priority Selection Group for 1971. This extended priority group includes all registrants who were classified in Class I-A, I-AO or I-O whose lottery number was reached by their local boards in 1970, but who, for one reason or another were not ordered to report for induction. Local boards called men from the 1971 First Priority Selection Group only if the call could not be filled with men from the Extended Priority Selection

Group. The Draft board which serves Hansford County filled its February quota by calling J.K. Norris, Jack Barnes, Walter LaMaster, Daniel Alexander, Richard Jones, David Hoover and Perry Washington. Barnes received a postponement. The rest of these men were inducted into the Army on Wednesday, February 10th. Joel Olivarez, Noel Olivarez, Dary Perkins and Paul Harden were sent this week to take their pre-induction physical exams. Harden was recently transferred into this Draft Board from another area.

City Trash System Due for Change

At the regular city council meeting Monday night, Rev. Don Wirsdorfer, Christian Church pastor, was present and asked the council to consider a competitive swimming program for youngsters aged 5 to 17 years. Rev. Wirsdorfer has experience in this type of summer recreation for youth and recommends it for this city. The council agreed that this would be a good program and will work toward this goal with the lessee for the upcoming summer. City manager Darce Foshee and Robert Ragsdale will work out arrangements with the pool operator for daily use of the pool for competitive swimming sports.

The council approved the purchase of a 6 meter amateur radio base station to be placed at KBNF radio station. This was done at the request of John Wilde, Civil Defense Communications coordinator for Hansford County. This will afford Hams a base to report to during the tornado reporting periods in this county. At least four Ham spotters will be watching for storms in addition to Sheriff's officer and City Policemen. Someone will be on duty at all times at the radio station.

The council discussed the proposed containerized trash disposal system which has been under consideration for some time. Aldermen instructed manager Darce Foshee to study the various kinds of containerized systems, find the one most suitable to the needs of Spearman and present these specifications to the council at the next meeting. Aldermen discussed the storm alert system which has been used in the city for many years and agreed that there was a definite need for a different type of storm warning alert.

When a fire is reported during a storm, the alarm creates a panic... thus the need for a storm device which is completely different from the sound of a fire siren.

The council filed an application with the Office of Civil Defense for the purchase of 3 sirens which will provide an altogether different storm warning siren from the one which is now being used. These will be purchased on a 50-50 basis. The City will pay half and the CD will pay half of the cost. It will take several months to get the sirens, so the present storm warning signal will be in use for this spring and summer.

There will be a Civil Defense conference held in Austin February 22 & 23 and the council authorized that someone be sent to this meeting. Monthly departmental reports were heard at the meeting Monday evening.

The Ambulance report for the month of January showed 9 runs made, 7 local and 2 to Amarillo. 51 cases were filed in City court. The \$426.50 worth of fines assessed were paid for in this manner: suspended \$70.50, laid out in jail \$20.00; not paid \$17.50 for a total of \$318.50 paid.

City policemen issued 49 tickets in January, investigated 10 accidents and arrested 3 men on drunk charges. The animal control reported 5 animals held from December, 47 picked up in January, 25 destroyed, 12 paid out and 15 held to Feb.

City Firemen held 2 regular drills in January and answered 5 city fires--2 car fires, one grease pit fire at the Chevron station and two smoke scares; one at the George Rook residence and one at the Darrell McCoy residence. Both were in the heating systems.

And he has informed his boss, Leon White, district manager of C.P.S., that he plans to win the president's trophy again this year.

The local Community Public Service Company, has the following employees: Charles

Gilliam, Manager, Vernon Thompson, Serviceman, Dorothy Chevalier and Veda Collins, Clerks, and the only lady meter reader in the country, Mrs. Sue Bowling. She was recently featured in the Communicator, the C.P. monthly magazine, as the only lady meter-reader in the Panhandle District. Sue is doing a fine job, despite the cold weather we have had since she began reading meters for C.P.

The Spearman office now served 1633 electrical hook-ups in the Spearman area. Spearman C.P. is a member of the Panhandle District. Community Public has districts in the following areas: South East District, Texas City; Central Division, Clifton; North East Division, Whitewright; North West Division, Brecken-

ridge; Western Division, Pecos; New Mexico Division, Silver City; Panhandle Division, Perryton. Leon White, Perryton, is Division manager. The Community Public General Office, is in Fort Worth, Texas.

Charles Gilliam has become a part of Spearman, in a rather big way. Always ready to help with the progress of the community, Mr. Gilliam has been active in the Chamber of Commerce, and other civic affairs. When the hard work of putting the Christmas lights up comes around, Vernon Thompson and Charles are always ready with their fine equipment, and know-how to "get the job done." This year the Community Public Service installed the Christmas lights, which were built

by the local FFA organization. This proved to be a rather successful combination, working with Bill Walker and his Chamber crew, plus the FFA boys, and Community Public Service. The hard job of taking the lights down and storing them for future use had to be done, mainly with help from Community Public Service.

Retired manager Bill Bratton and clerk Mildred Chamberlain are still a part of our Community Public Family. These two dedicated people have also been a big asset to the town, and both have their homes and are permanent residents of Spearman. The entire town is proud of the fine record these two made in our community, and join in congratulating the entire personnel of the Panhandle District.

Terms are expiring for aldermen J.K. Hicks, Bob Skinner and E.J. Callaway Jr. These men have not indicated whether they will file for re-election.

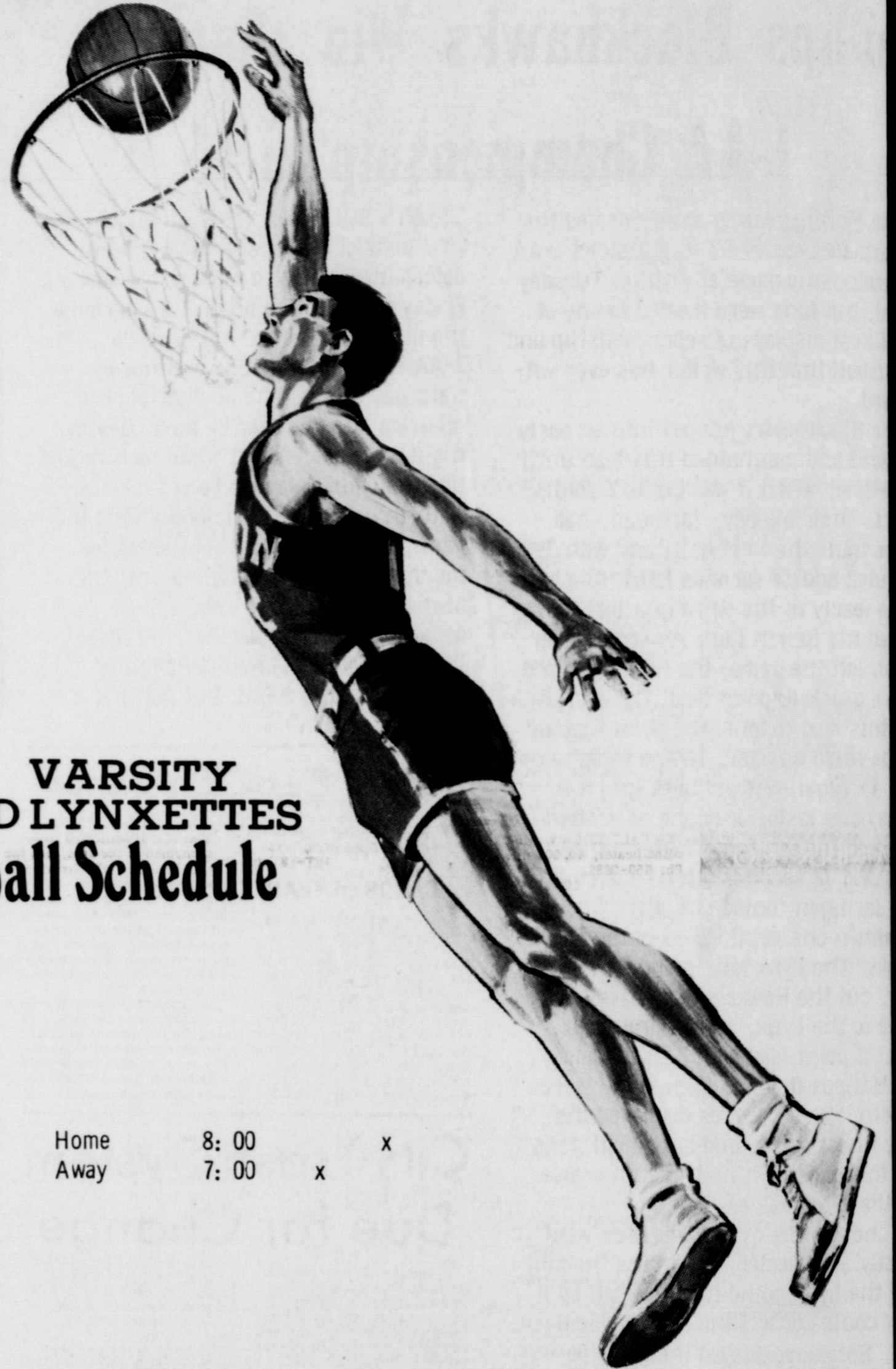
Filing deadline for a place on the ballot is March 5. Persons may file at the City Hall.

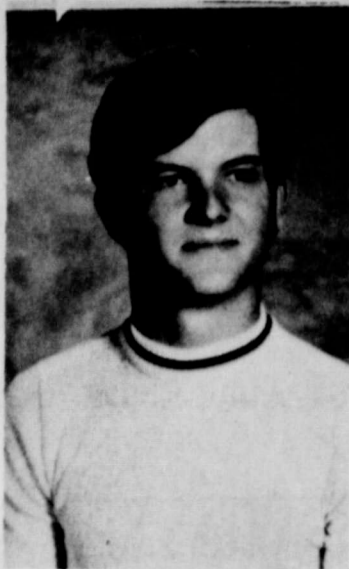

Local Attorneys Attend Meeting

Hon. James A. Joy, Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals for the Seventh Supreme Judicial District of Texas at Amarillo was speaker for the regular monthly meeting of the Northeast Panhandle Bar Association held at the Perryton Club on February 3, 1971. Topic of Judge Joy's speech was the judicial reforms proposed by the Judicial Conference for enactment by the Texas Legislature.

One of the proposed revisions with regard to trial judges would include their running for public office on the non-partisan basis. Other important recommendations were the inclusion of criminal jurisdiction over appeal throughout the State of Texas concurrent with their jurisdiction in Civil Appeals with the exception of those cases involving the death penalty.

Special guests were Hon. Max W. Bover, District Judge of the 34th Judicial District from Perryton and Hon. Warren C. Jenkins, County Judge of Lipscomb County, Texas, and Larry Warner, Perryton High School teacher and a prospective law school student was also among the guests.

Presiding during the meeting was Ronnie Gaines, Perryton attorney who is president of the Northeast Panhandle Bar Association. Members present included Otis C. Shearer,

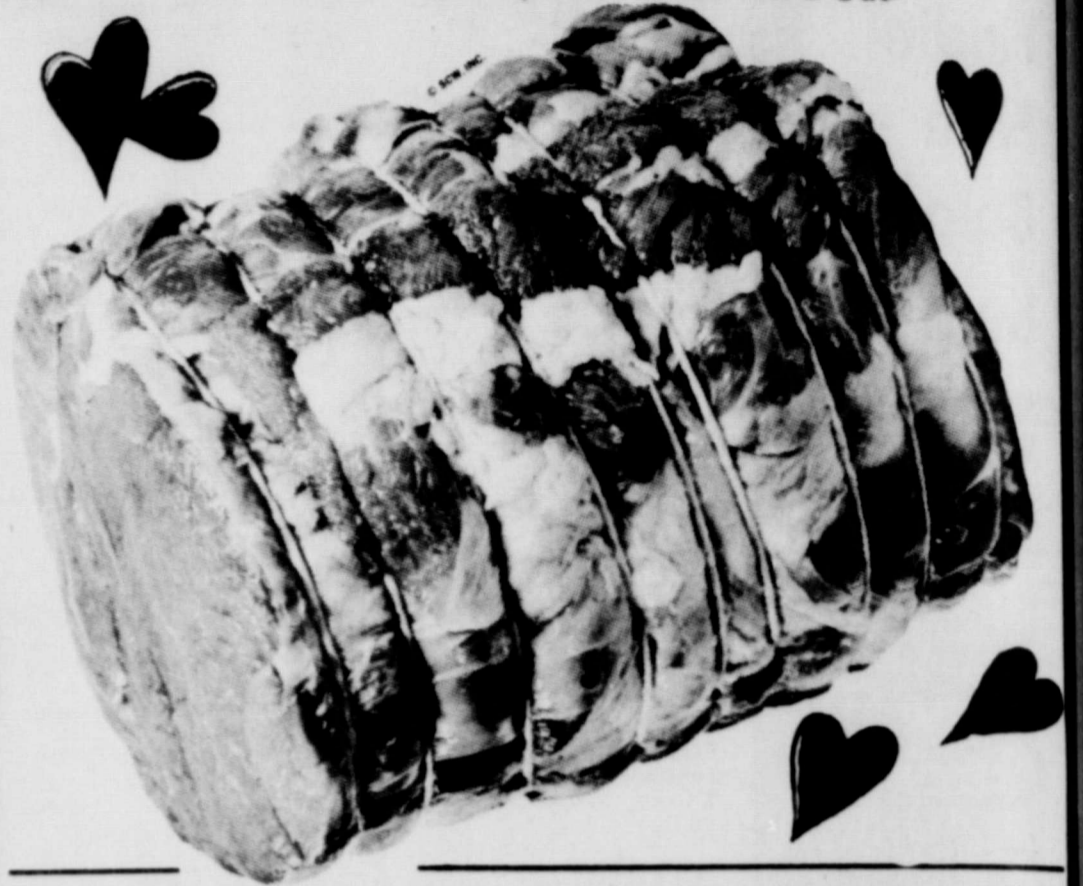

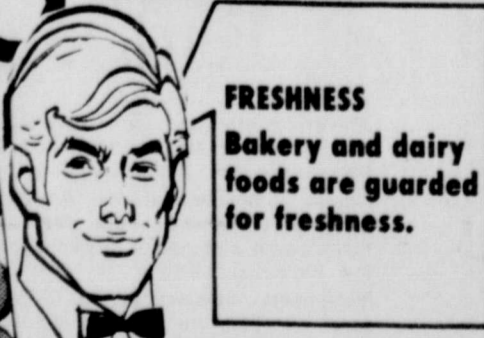

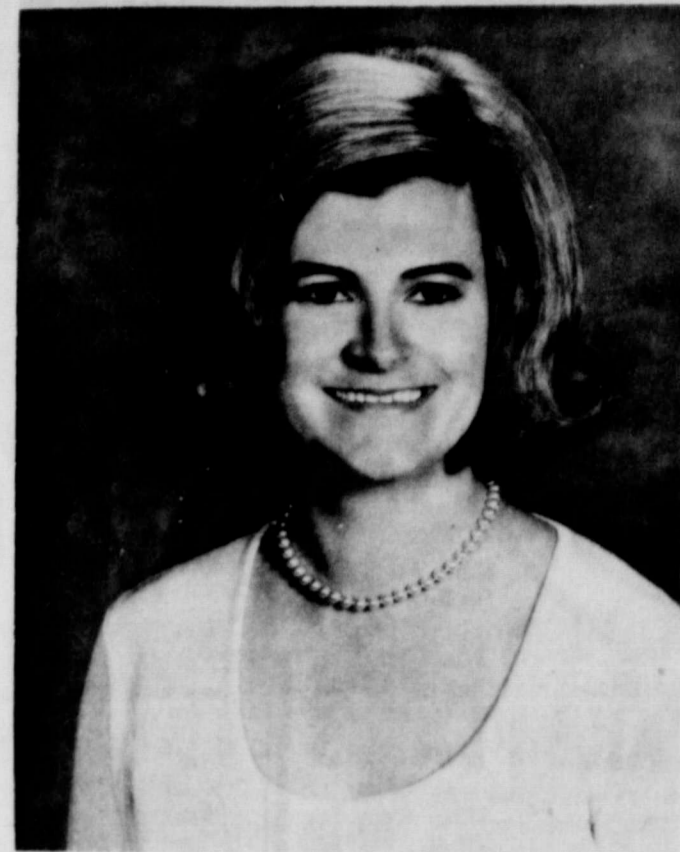

One of the greatest problems once the production of automobiles got underway was that of replacing parts. 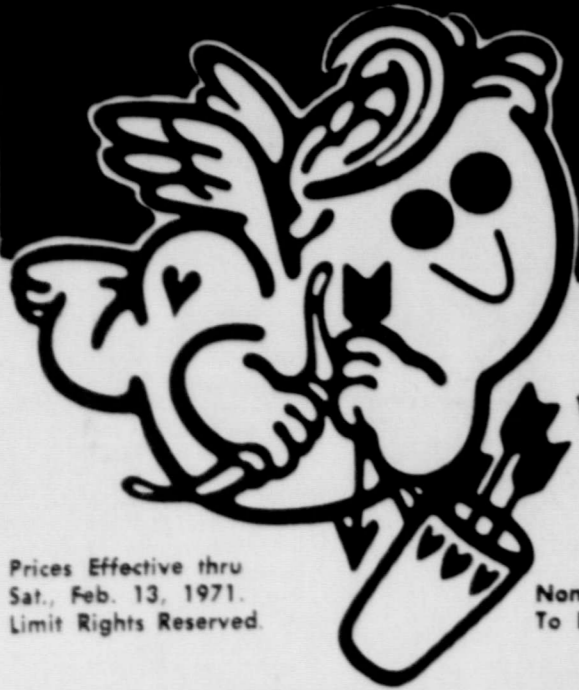

On March 1, commissioners will be receiving bids and the contract will be let for the building of the bridge. A legal bid notice is being carried in the issue of this newspaper.

about 30 miles north of the plant complex in southeastern Georgia, joined other Navy medical corpsmen and a Navy doctor who raced to the scene when calls for aid reached the Naval Air Station.

He aided at the scene by administering first aid, searching for personal items and helping in victim identification.

Welcome Snow Arrives

Old Man Winter invaded the Panhandle area again the past weekend, dumping some three inches of snow in the Spearman area. Snow began falling Thursday, Feb. 4 and by nightfall a white blanket covered the ground. Official weather observer Billy Haden measured 0.27 inches melt from the snowfall.

The sun broke through heavy clouds Friday and during the daytime hours much of the snow melted. Saturday again saw the bright sun switch to cloudiness and by late that evening the weather picture changed and snow began once again to fall. By mid-morning Sunday the ground was again blanketed, and 0.09 of melt was measured from this snow, giving the Spearman area a total of 0.36 moisture.

The snowfall was not enough to really break the moisture drought being felt here, but it was certainly appreciated and will be of some help until additional precipitation is received.

3 County 4-Hers Enter Houston Show

Three members of the Hansford County 4-H Club, Spearman, Texas, have entered livestock in the 1971 Houston Livestock Show, February 24 through March 7, to be held in the 16-acre Livestock Show Exposition Building, adjacent to the domed stadium.

These members are as follows: Kim Boone-1 Hereford Heifer, 1 Hereford Steer and 1 Charolais steer; Sam Boone-1 Hereford Steer; Cindy Patterson-1 Hereford Heifer.

The Houston show is the largest livestock show in the world and this year entry figures and premium money are expected to exceed all previous years. Last year's 17,756 livestock entries set a record. Classes are provided for 9 beef breeds, 4 dairy breeds, 5 swine breeds, 11 sheep breeds, 5 horse breeds, 5 rabbit breeds, 22 poultry breeds and Angora goats.

Among other programs benefiting youth on a statewide basis are the scholarship and research programs. The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo annually presents scholarships to outstanding FFA and 4-H Club members in the amount of \$4,000 each. More than 40 students are currently attending college on scholarships provided by this non-profit civic event.

The research program was established in 1970 by the show to be conducted in nine Texas agricultural colleges. Much of the work is done by students, thus providing jobs for those college students who need to work.

The knowledge shared through this \$100,000 research program directly benefits Texas agribusiness.

Dates for the 1971 Houston Show are February 24 through March 7, with the first two days set aside solely for livestock judging and sales.

The rodeo will open on Feb. 26 with Johnny Cash headlining matinee and evening performances on February 26, 27 and 28; B. J. Thomas will appear at evening performances on March 1, 2, 3, and 4 and Glen Campbell stars at the evening performances on March 5 and the matinee and

evening performances March 6 and 7.
