She had her fourth foul called on her in the third quarter, but managed to stay in the game despite having four fouls. Spearman fouled 22 times, with Shamrock only fouling 11

## times.

And the Spear man guards did a fine job allowing Shamrock only 9 points per quarter, which is real good against a district championship team.
Scoring for Spearman were Smith 16 , Patterson 19, Shieldknight 15, Schnell 5, Brummett 2 with guards Daniel, Schnell, Hohertz, Ricketts, Jones, Beck and Evans. Spearman had 25 fieldi goals and 7 free throws for their 57 points. Shamrock had 13 field goas and 11 free throws for their 37 points. Spearman led at one time by 23 points, 53-30, when Anita Smith laid up a 2 pointer for a 53-30 difference.
