

Buna erased a six point Lynxettes lead in the fourth period and was given an added boost when Spearman guard Liz Hohertz drew her fourth foul late in the third period. However, Miss Patterson, who tallied 31 points from the charity stripe in two games, sank four straight free throws and Miss Smith canned a 12 footer to put the game away. Miss Smith actually broke the backs of Buna, when she hit 6 straight points from the floor. The fine Spearman Senior, who is also basketball queen hit better than 80 percent from the floor in the game. She only shot 7 times, and hit 6 of them, with hapless Buna, unable to stop her.

Miss Shieldknight shot ± times from the floor and hit 3, for a fantastic shooting percentage also.


EDITORS NOTE: Out of more than 100 pictures made of the Spearman team at Austin, these two are rated as the most illustrative of the many good pictures. The skill and determination of both the forwards and guards is shown in these two pictures and tells the entire story of why Spearman is the new state basketball champion.

The Spearman Lynxettes won their second state championship at Austin over the week-end, and they had been waiting a long time for this one. The Lynxettes won the state first place trophy in 1966, but they have been nothing but :"Bride's-maids" since that one victory. But, Poppa Dean Weese took his grils to Austin this year, hoping that they wouldn't be left at the altar, and when the smoke cleared from Gregory gym Friday afternoon, the people of Spearman were already preparing for the wedding feast. And, it all came true.

The record for a final game (championship game in AA) is 41 points, but this was a semi-final game.

Miss Patterson sparked the Lynxettes in the middle of the third quarter when the fantastic Lynxette guards limited Roninson to only nine points.

nine points. In the early going the game was knotted three times, and the lead changed hands on 11 occasions, until Spearman gained the upperhand midway in the second quarter at 27-26.

Of course pandemonium broke out at Gregory gym, after the Robinson game, as the Lynxette fars, still in a state of shock over their fabulous team, just couldn't believe what had taken place. This was perfect team effort. The Spearman guards stopped Robinson, and the Spearman forwards "hit everything"that they shot at. Of course She lia Patterson was the outstanding forward in the tournament, as far as the Lynxette fars are concerned. The petite Junior forward, an all-stater when she was a sophomore, played her greatest game. She cried a long time after the game was over because her parents were home "hunting cattle" after the derasting blizzard that ravaged the county the week of the state tournament. But, Shelia had all kinds of help. The entire Lynxette team was much, much tougher than Robinson. As we said before, they had been bridesmaids to Pobinson "long enough and if Robinson was to win this game, it would be after the toughest battle of their career.

Once again, however, we must comment on those super guards, that Spearman has. Everyone from Speartr.an knew that we had the best three forwards in the state tournament. But, what about these guards, who had to be re-trained this year? What about them? They just stopped the No. 1 team in the state, dead in their tracks as the Lynxette forwards struck with the fury of a Panhandle Blizzard,

The Lynxettes turned in the best performance of any team in the tournament in beating this fine Robinson team. Of course, as usual, they had defeated every state champion in Texas, including Follett, Canyon, and Claude, and it was nothing but "right" that they be named the best girls basketball team in TEXAS.



City Church Women

A giant step to improve the "trashy appearance" of this city was taken last week when the City Council authorized the taking of bids for a con-tainerized trash system.

Bids will be opened and ac-cepted at 7:30 p.m. March 15 for the huge truck and packer body, plus some 430 containers.

Aldermen authorized the issuance of \$65,000 worth of time payment warrants to cover the cost of the new trash collecting system.

These containers will be a big improvement in reducing the amount of trash blown by the winds and scattered by dogs.

Plans call for one trash receptacle, 3 cubic yards in size, to serve four families in residential areas. Some blocks will need only two of these in the alley ways, while more populated blocks will have as many as seven per block. Some residents will find the container directly behind their house and others . will have to walk only a short distance -- but the walk to the trash container will not be any further from their property line than half the distance of

their neighbor's lot. Most trash containers in the business area will be the 4 cubic yard size.

City Manager Darce Foshee said the new trash system will reduce the trash pick-up in this city to a one man operation. The driver of the truck will never leave his vehicle, but simply drive up to each receptacle, release a giant lever arm which picks up the container, lifts it over the truck, dumps the trash and sets the container back on its

base. The city manager said he estimated the new trash system for Spearman would be in operation some six months after the bids are let. This would be sometime in September.

Other business on the agenda at the Feb. 24 meeting was the platting of some land owned by Tom Etter.

Mr. Etter, who resides at 4th & Endicott had never had the land just to the south of him platted. At this meeting


L-League Meeting Tonight



sainds and thousands of catfish skeletons around the lake shore where the birds have been feeding. The bald eagle doesn't get his white head and tail feathers until he reaches the age of 3 years and Taylor estimates about one in three birds bear this distinguis'ed marking so the flock is made up of many young ones. Junior discovered one dead bird, a young one, and its wing span measured around 5 feet. He thought the bird had been shot but couldn't be sure. I would advise anxious hunters to think a long time before killing one of these National Emblems. or even shotting into the flock. You would need to be pretty well heeled with do-re-me in oreder to pay the fine for this offense. These birds are protected by Uncle Sam himself, and he certainly frowns on killing one. Eveidently the birds are migrating, and probably will be on their merry way to somewhere, within the next few weeks. FOR AS LONG as I can rem-
