Devorah's project entitled "Digitoxin-it's effects upon conduction velocity of electrical impulses within the Cardiac Muscle" won her the Navy Science Gruser Award, the Panhandle District Medical Society Award, and the USAF Medicine and Health Award. She will also receive an all-expense paid trip to the International Science Fair in Baltimore, Md. May 10-

This is the third year for Devorah to win the trip to the International meet. This is the second year for her to win the Medical Award. Last year's entry won her the Rotary award and again, in 1969, she won the Navy Cruiser Award.

was piloting this spray plane Tuesday dispensing 2-4D solution on the James Lair farm when the accident happened.

Aaron said he was flying right on the ground and as he started up at the end of the field "the engine just quit." Without altitude he was help-less to control the plane in its

plunge to the ground. When the plane hit the ground fire erupted from the engine but Aaron said "I was down wind from the flame and didn't get burned.

Pat Underwood, an oil company pumper, was in the next field and saw the plane crash. Cantrell said Underwood kept the plane from burning completely up by using a fire ex-tinguisher he carried with him. The plane was a total loss.

scheduled for the week of Feb. 21-28 but had to be cancelled because of the blizzard. Rev. Tuell said he would be preaching "the First Century



1970 totaled \$14,918.09. Sales tax for the year collected by Spearman merchants which was deposited in the city's till amounted to \$56,696.25.

The city expects to receive the tax collected here for the first three months of this current year sometime in June.

Spearman instigated the

one-cent city sales tax in an election held early in 1969 election held early in 1969 and the charge went into ef-fect beginning with the 2nd quarter that year. In 1969 tax received by the quarter carried these amounts: June, \$12,079.02; Sept. \$14,232. 12; Dec. \$14,615.13; total \$40,926.27.

Comparing these figures to 1970 quarterly taxes collected, business was up the first quarter, off some in the 2nd quarter, and slightly up again for the last three months of the year. 1970 sales tax quarterly payments are listed below: March \$13,036.18; June \$15,671.78; Sept. \$13,070.20; Dec.\$14,918.09. Total \$56,696.25.

The last six months in 1970 saw five new homes built in Spearman, several houses and apartment buildings moved into town for rental purposes, plus one new commer-cial building-the KBMF Ra-

dio station.

One to Cecil Slater for a new car body repair plant going up in the Golden Circle addition plus a new 7-11 grocery store now on Kenneth Ave. Building officials called for a , 000 construction permit for this new building. 


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

Ancient people considered eggs a delicacy, and even a staple food when the supply was abundant. History also associates them with science, sports, and superstition, and exalts eggs as a symbol of pagan and Christian custom.

Many of the ancients thought the egg represented the world and its elements: shell (earth), white (water), Yolk (fire), and under the shell (air).

Our present-day custom of decorating and giving Easter eggs is a symbol of the Resurrection. However, the custom originated in pre-Christian times, according to Dr. Mel-

In China as early as 722 B. C., the practice was already established. Messengers in the State of King-ts-oo were sent to the countryside to proclaim that all fires were to be put out for three days during the great Spring Festival. One provident chieftain accumulated supplies of painted eggs, and set the fashion of dispensing them as gifts.

The early Christians adopted a similar custom. In the British Isles, after eggs were

blessed by a priest, they ke came holy gifts benefiting the giver and receiver.

Our Easter egg customs la become such that thousand eggs are hard-cooked even year. For best results, folia these cooking suggestions in Dr. Mellor.

Place the eggs in a disher lukewarm water to prevent cracked shells. Bring water a pan to a rapid boil, wing enough water to come one inch above the eggs.

Carefully transfer eggs in the warm water to the boilt

water; reduce heat to keep the water at a simmering perature. Leave the egg in the water, covered, for an 18 minutes.

#### Farm Bureau To Be More Effective In Many Areas

WACO--(Spl) -- Action taken at a recent special called meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau voting dele tates will enable the state's largest farm organization to be more effective in a number of areas, TFB President, J.T. Woodson says.

Some 770 voting delegates from 148 counties approved an expanded program for Farm Bureau on both the county and state levels at the special March 22 meeting in Dallas. The one-day convention culminated 11 months of intensive activity, involving hundreds of county leaders, in

developing the program.

As approved by delegates, the program calls for expansion of Farm Bureau activities in the areas of commodity activities, marketing, member-ship and public information,

research and education, farm records and farm management services, insurance services, group purchasing, public policy, and leadership and staff training. It also pro-vides for updating contractual relationships between organizational units.

In the vote on funding the program, the delegates approved a dues increas of \$2 The State Expansion Committee, which developed the recommendations, had asked for a \$4.00 increase.

The recommendations presented to the voting delegates were developed by the 13member state committee, baxed on suggestions coming from county Farm Bureaus. The committee was appointed following a meeting of county FB presidents last August in Brownwood where problem areas surfaced in special meetings of county boards of directors were outlined.

Liveliest debate, aside from that on the proposed by-law amendment to increase membership dues, was on a suggested advertising-public relations program calling for buying prime time on 14 television stations and five radio stations in metropolitan areas to "tell the farmars and ranchers' story" to urban people. After 55 min-utes of inten discussion, the proposal was approved.

The delegates deleted a proposal for the Texas Farm Bureau to develop and make available to county Farm Bureaus an auditing, income tax, and legal counseling service.

The delegates approved a recommendation that Farm Bureau members be classified according to major

commodity divisions be established within the count Farm Bureaus consisting members whose major of modity interests are similar These divisions are to be serviced by the Texas Fam Bureau.

Guidelines were set up establishing marketing producers of various commodities, will be financed by a one.
time membership fee and service charge for service rendered.

The delegates approved recommendations that a minimum of two annual citizenship seminars for high school students be or ducted on a regional basis and that the TFB sponsor adult citizenship seminar each year. They also call for an annual statewide con presidents' conference and an annual statewide orientation conference for newly

elected county president. Also approved were plan for the Texas Farm Bureau to develop and offer an in come tax and financial co puterized record-keeping system to county Farm Bi eaus and in lividual memb to be financially self-sig. taining.
