Grazing and Haying Extended

The county ASCS office has been informed that the date for emergency haying and grazing on set-aside acres has been extended to November 1, 1971.

In Hansford County farmers can plant their set-aside acreage to crops such as sudan, sweet sorghum, and hay, or graze the crops. There will be a charge of \$1.00 per acre per month for grazing and \$3.00 for haying irrigated acreage. There will be no charge on dry land.

Weather

The month of May produced various sorts of weather—high winds, hail storms, hot weather cold snaps. Local residents didn't know whether to pack away the electric blankets, turn off the heater, or install the air conditioner. All these comfort appliances were needed at one time or another last month.

May ended with an official 1.43 inches of moisture, as recorded by U.S. weather observer Bill Haden. Thunder storms moving through the city Friday evening, May 28, produced .43 inches of rainfall. Saturday night the county was under the "weather alert" gun and every law enforcement officer with the City Police and County Sheriff's department were patrolling in their units until 6 o'clock Sunday morning.

Saturday night's rain storm dumped .59 inches of rain making a grand total for the week of 1.12 inches, and a total of 1.43 for the Month. This brings the total year's rainfall to 3.74 inches. At the end of May last year the official gauge had recorded a measly 2.84 inches.

The hottest day last month was May 16 when the mercury soared to 94 degrees. The coldest temperature recorded in May was 34 degrees on the evening of the 13th.

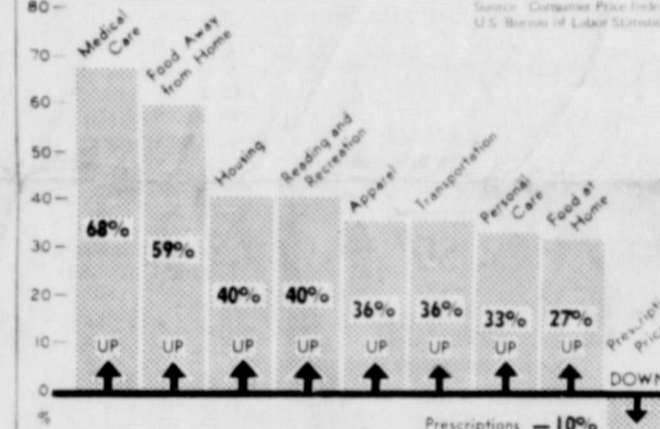

Prescription Prices Down 10% While Cost Of Living Climbs



The cost of most consumer goods and services climbed dramatically during the past decade, according to the Consumer Price Index of the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. The only notable exception was the cost of prescription drugs which declined 10% during the 10 year period.

Hansford Granted Conservation Help

The U.S. Department of Agriculture recently announced emergency conservation assistance in Hansford County to help repair damage caused by severe drought conditions and wind erosion.

The county ASCS committee, estimating that at least 30,000 acres in Hansford County would need this type of wind erosion control, requested \$60,000,000 aid to help county farmers control wind erosion. This is applicable only to dry land acreage.

Farmers needing this assistance on land subject to wind erosion, must meet certain specifications. To qualify, dry land must be chiseled 5 inches deep, not more than 4 feet apart. Anything less than this is called "normal farming operation." Farmers who qualify can receive 80% of the cost of this operation. Hansford County has some 350,000 cultivated acres and approximately 110,000 of this is dry land. However, the ASCS committee estimates that only 30,000 dry land acres will be subject to emergency conservation assistance due to the drought. One committee member said many farmers will not be interested in the assistance because of the required specifications—the required 5 inch depth for chiseling is pretty deep," he said.

Help Wanted

Helpless. Can anything be worse than to be helpless?

I have heard it said that the worst feeling in the world is loneliness. To be without another person when you want companionship is certainly unpleasant; however, to be without another person when you need him for survival is unquestionably worse. And that is helplessness.

Helplessness feels like the time when I overtook myself when swimming and could not resist the current that began to take me down the coast and out toward the sea. I thought I would die.

We all know what it is like to be momentarily helpless — between the trip backward and the thud on the floor.

Some understand helplessness more fully. It is joblessness, no food for a family, terminal illness.

Abstractly stated, helplessness is present failure and fear of the future.

A Solution?

The common precautions taken against helplessness include planning, work, investments, family and friends, and good credit. But in real trouble these careful measures are of no help.

The solution to helplessness must go beyond such limited perspectives. It must go beyond inevitable human error. It must go beyond exceptional circumstances, such as the insurance policies "acts of God." A real solution to helplessness must go beyond a merely human view of reality.

Is there such a solution? Yes.

The Solution

In order to realize the true solution to helplessness, one Sunday School Lesson for June 6, 1971

must understand the problem more accurately. Take, for example, this historical circumstance:

The armies of Sennacherib, king of Assyria, about 700 B.C. were crushing city after city and nation after nation relentlessly and were closing in on Israel. When Israel concluded it was helpless and turned to Egypt for aid, Isaiah warned: "Woe to them that go down to Egypt for help, and rely on horses, and trust in chariots because they are many, and in horsemen, because they are very strong, but they look not unto the Holy One of Israel, neither seek Jehovah!"

"Now the Egyptians are men, and not God; and their horses flesh, and not spirit; and when Jehovah shall stretch out His hand, both he that helps shall stumble and he that is helped shall fall, and they shall all be consumed together." (Isaiah 31: 1-3)

Helplessness is not a physical condition primarily; it is spiritual. Israel's problem was not the ravaging armies of Sennacherib. Their sense of helplessness and aloneness resulted from a reluctance to trust God.

For us, too, our sense of helplessness originates not with the loss of a job, or the anticipation of failure or death. If we trust other people and their best efforts fail, we may become despondent, but the true cause of our despair is a refusal to recognize God's presence and trust Him.

There is no circumstance in which God is not present and in absolute control. Therefore, to trust God is never to be alone, or helpless.

VD Epidemic



An epidemic of major proportions is sweeping the country.

Effects of the diseases involved in this epidemic can be devastating to those who contract them. If treatment is not secured in time, paralysis, insanity, blindness, heart disease, or death may result from one of the two primary kinds of disease involved in the epidemic. Untreated cases of the other major disease in this group may cause blindness, arthritis, or sterility.

It is an epidemic of venereal disease.

National Emergency

Health authorities estimate that there were over two million new cases of gonorrhea in the United States last year. Dr. James S. McKenzie-Pollock, medical director of the American Social Health Association, says that there are about 300,000 now being treated for syphilis, with another 600,000 already infected but not yet aware of their having contracted the disease.

It is estimated that 3,500 more Americans contract venereal disease every day, most of them being in the 15 to 24 age group.

Last year, Time magazine reported, under the heading, "VD: A National Emergency," the alarming fact that "Reported cases of syphilis... have risen by 55 percent in New Jersey, 30 percent in New York City..." Dr. James McKenzie-Pollock... reported that there has been a 'spectacular rise' in syphilis... and called for national emergency action to meet the problem."

To Try Vaccines

Researchers are racing against time to develop vaccines which would immunize against these diseases. Some believe that this can and will be done but not in time to save thousands of people from the pluing consequences of these cases which are generally associated with immoral conduct.

Although prostitutes infect some of their customers, Massachusetts investigators report their findings indicate that about three per cent of the cases start in this way. Homosexuality causes 16 per cent, according to the results of their investigation, and heterosexual "free love" is countable for 81 per cent.

While most diseases to which the human body is subject are caught innocently — with blame on the part of the one who contracts the disease — is not true in the case of VD. Most of those who are suffering from VD would never have been infected if they had committed immoral acts.

Sure Way to Be Safe

The wisdom of obeying God's moral law is apparent.

Mrs Groves To Be TV Guest Friday, June 4

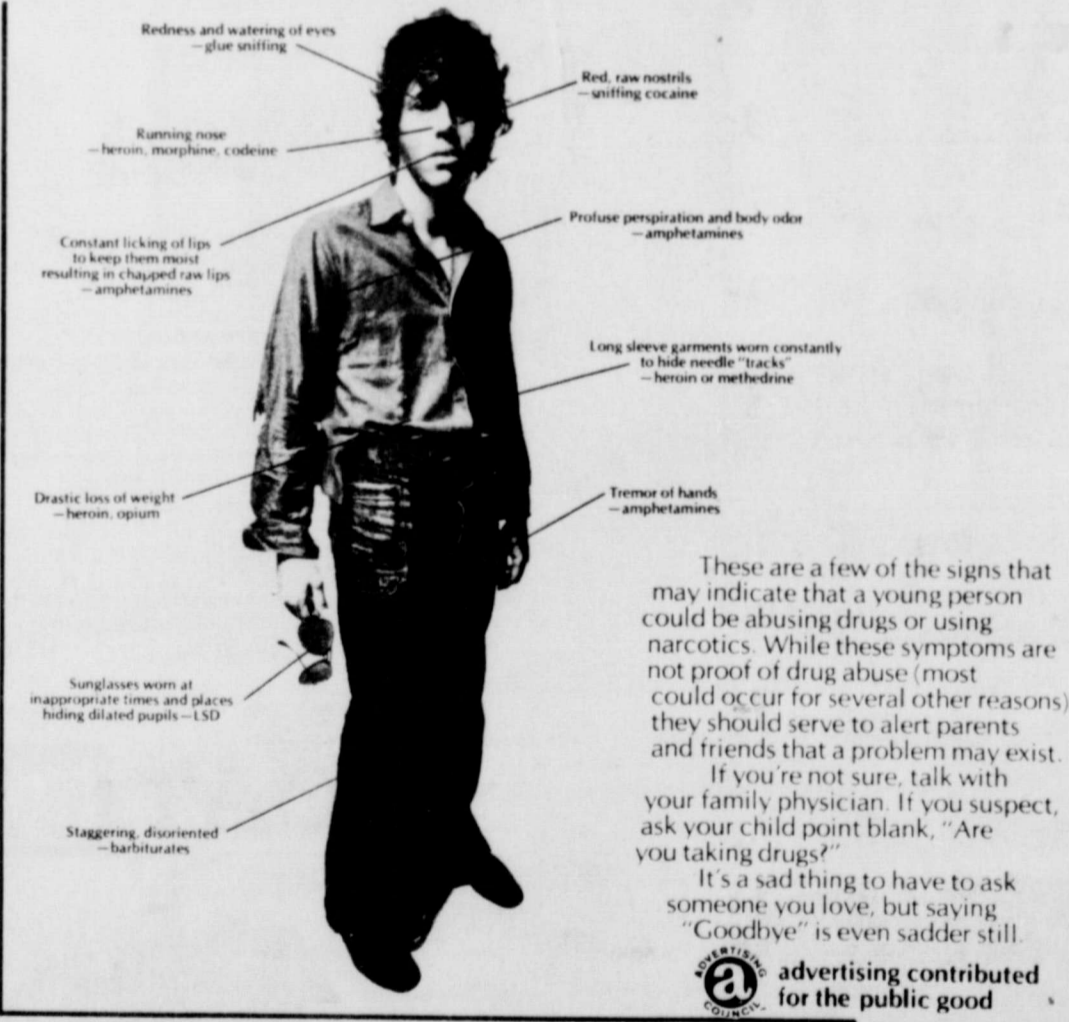

New Budget, Deans Approved At WTSU

CANYON, Tex.--The West Texas State University Board of Regents approved Friday an \$11,549,179 operating budget for fiscal 1971 but provided for no across-the-board faculty salary increases. The budget was adopted although the Texas Legislature has yet to appropriate funds for higher education in the state for the fiscal year beginning Sept. 1. The House version of the appropriations bill calls for no pay increases for faculty members.

Dr. James P. Cornette, university president, told the regents the budget "is within the estimated income of the university."

"Should the final appropriation be less than estimated, we will present budget adjustments to bring budgeted expenditures within the income," he added.

"Our budget is based upon experience and the knowledge of what we can expect the Legislature to give us," Virgil Henson, financial vice president said.

"The board chose to act upon the budget at this time rather than hold a special summer session," Henson said.

The budget as submitted to the board compares to \$10,638,390 approved for the current fiscal year.

More than 50 per cent of the proposed budget, \$6.3 million, is earmarked for salaries. The next largest expenditure is \$4.3 million for maintenance and operations.

The appointment of new deans of the College of Arts and Science and the School of Business also was approved by the board.

Dr. Eldon C. Lewis, 37, associate dean of the College of Business Administration at Wichita State University, was named dean of the School of Business, succeeding Dr. C. C. Callarman, 66, who retired after 15 years as dean.

Dr. Theodore D. Freidell, 44, associate professor of History at University of Missouri-Kansas City, was appointed dean of the College of Arts and Science replacing Dr. Ray A. Mahan, 42, who becomes academic vice president.

The board approved faculty and staff appointments for the 1971-72 year, including 12 new members of the teaching and library faculty.

The retirements of W. Mitchell Jones, 70, a member of the College of Education faculty since 1926 and a former dean of men, and Mrs. Evelyn Frieze, 65, an instructor in English since 1955, were accepted by the regents.

One of two high-rise dormitories under construction has been named in honor of Mitchell Jones.

It also was announced that Dr. Robert C. Busted, 63, asked to step down as head of the department of biology, a position he has held since 1948. He will continue as a professor of biology. No successor has been named.

In another departmental change, Dr. Philip J. Gensler, 32, will become head of the department of computer information systems in the School of Business. He will succeed L. Durwood Henderson, 39, who will continue as associate professor and director of the Computer Center.

The regents authorized the

university to enter into cooperative agreements with Texas A&M University for graduate programs in agriculture.

The agreement with Texas Tech would call for a cooperative Master of Science Degree in Animal Science and that with Texas A&M would be for a Master of Science in Plant Science.

"The purpose of this cooperative plan is to offer a superior program of graduate study in agriculture by bringing together the faculties and facilities of these two universities," Dr. Cornette said.

In other action, the board approved: Remodeling of the journalism department photographic darkrooms at an estimated cost of \$4,000 to double the amount of laboratory space.

Payment of \$3,980 to Vaughn Plumbing Co., \$1,910 to Denman Bldg. Products, \$5,195.78 to Casey Carpet Co. and \$1,473.80 to Nunn Electrical Supply, all of Amarillo, for construction of new offices for the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics in the Student Union Building.

Purchase of \$45,464.88 worth of furniture and equipment from low bidders for the new dining hall.

Payment of \$20,000 to City of Canyon for services to be rendered with the fire department's new snorkel fire truck.

Apparent low bid of \$8,389.50 of Hartco Enterprise of Dumas for construction of an experimental feedlot at the University Nance Ranch.

Agreement with Saga Food Service for meals to be served in the Dining Hall during the next school year.

An easement to Southwestern Public Service Co. can construct an electrical power line on university property.

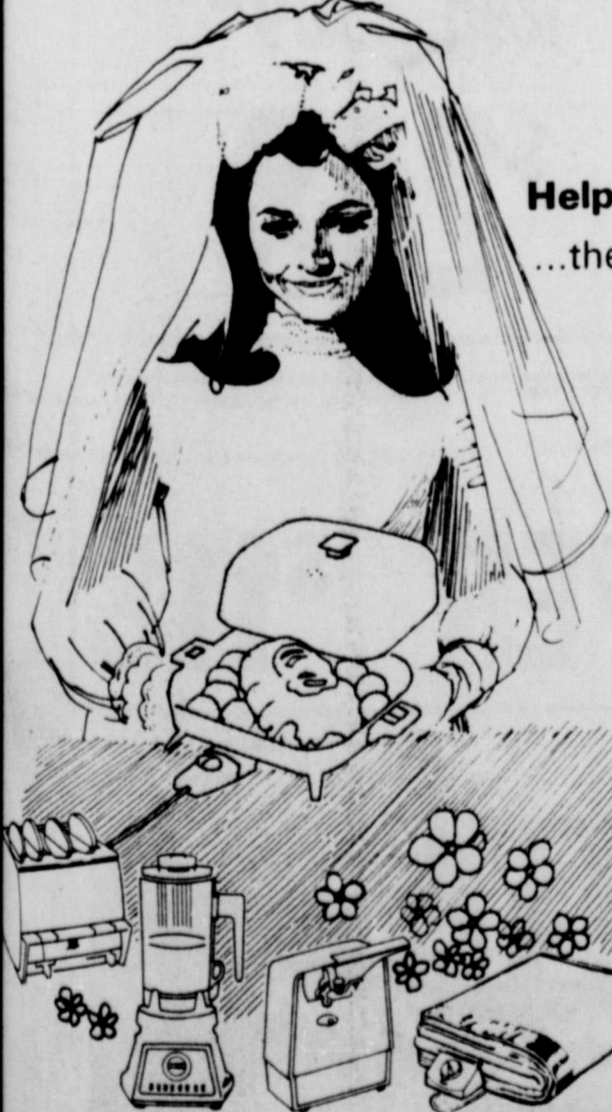

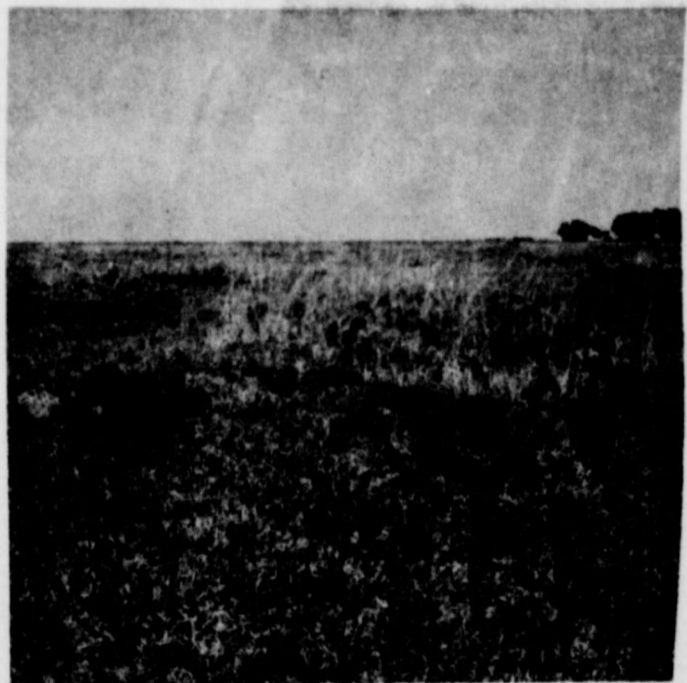

They already have a house full, but John came home last weekend telling Virginia of the auctions he had attended. I can see how they will spend all their spare time...and money!

THE NEXT best thing to working in a zoo or bidding on antiques, is going hunting with a Geiger counter. Nine out of ten "buzzes" on this thing will turn out to be an old rusty tin can or a piece of metal. But there is always that 10th time when you luck out. I've heard people criticize those who never "tend" the grave of their loved ones, but plastic flowers don't always tell the story. Cemetery customs have al-

ways been a mite strange in this country. There was a time, in ages past, when folks thought they had to carve a private history on their tombstones. Some of the epitaphs are amusing. New England cemeteries provide perhaps some of the most amusing and outlandish gravestones to be found anywhere in the world. Take the one in the cemetery at Nantucket, Mass, which reads: "Under the sod, and near these trees--Lies the body of Solomon Pease--Pease is not there, but only his pod. He shelled out his soul and it went up to God."

Or take the case of a Mr. Church who lost four wives and buried them all in one lot. In his old age he had to move them to a new cemetery. He undertook to do it himself and got all the bones hopelessly mixed. His New England conscience would not allow him to use the same headstone, so this is what he did: "Here lies Hannah Church and probably a portion of Emily."

Another said "Sacred to the memory of Emily Church who seems to be mixed with Matilda." Then followed the lines: "Stranger pause and drop a tear--For Emily Church lies buried here--Mixed in some perplexing manner--With Mary, Matilda and probably Hannah." These tombstone tales are real--to say the least Americans of yesteryear had a

strange sense of humor. However strange & humorous the gravestone carving, it was chiseled only for the living to read. Old Solomon Pease doesn't know what is written on his tombstone and even if he did, he would probably think it was perfectly allright for you to stand there & chuckle over his epitaph.

Hansford County Reaches Quota 1971 Bonds Sales

April sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Hansford County were \$5,149 according to County Bond Chairman C. A. Gibner. Sales for the first four months totaled \$69,919 with 100 per cent of the 1971 goal achieved.

Sales in Texas during April totaled \$17,799, 730 white year-to-date sales were \$69,658, 537 with 38 per cent of the 1971 goal of \$181.9 million achieved.

Profit on Your Home

Every five years, assume you are an Average American. You will give up one residence and move to another. If this is a high priced area, you will pay income tax on the gain.

Generally, no—provided you buy another house in one year. The federal government will usually allow a deferral, on the theory that a sale is not an ordinary deal but a matter of necessity.

But in order to qualify for tax deferral, you must meet the conditions that are laid down. For example, second house must be bought but actually occupied within the one-year limit.

In one case, a man from another city bought a house needed remodeling. The family was still living in an apartment by the time the house was up.

Nevertheless, he tried to tax deferral by arguing that his intentions were of the time of the deadline.

But a court turned him down. The judge said the law was not on what a person intended to do but on what he did.

In another case, a man to buy a second house within a year solely because of illness. Was this an "excuse"? Again, a court said no. The court said the law is biguous and leaves no room for interpretation because of the "unfortunate circumstances," added the court.

"We are powerless to the statute."

What if you decide to buy a new house, instead of buying already in existence? In case, the law does give you extra six months' leeway as you have at least started construction within the 12-month period.

One would-be builder bought a lot, arranged a loan, and obtained a building permit within the year. But actual on the house had not yet started. Had he started "construction" time to qualify for the deferral?

Yes. The Treasury Department, that, with so many tangible already taken, it could not turn him down.
