Bicycle Riders Warned

Spearman citizens are reminded of a City ordinance which prohibits the riding of bicycles after dark. If bicycle riders wish to ride after sundown or before sunrise, they must have a front headlight that lights the road ahead for 20 feet, a rear red tail light in working order that can be seen from a distance of 100 feet, plus a red reflector at least 2 inches in diameter on the rear of the bicycle.

There have been some near accidents recently with motorists and bicycle riders. Persons caught riding without these devices are subject to a fine, according to city officials.

Harvest Nears, Rains Begin

A torrential rain, accompanied by high winds and lots of hail harvested the wheat crops in the Morse area Tuesday night. All the feed crops will have to be replanted after the nine inches of hard rain.

Morse residents said their 5 inch rain gauges filled up in a hurry. Some estimate the first 3 inches of rain fell in less than 10 minutes. After the gauges filled, it continued to rain. Morse citizens estimate "at least 9 inches, maybe more."

"The wheat crops here are just shredded," Morse farmers said. A lot of the crop damage was due to such hard wind and driving rain. Rainfall at Pringle was lighter—there they received only 5 inches.

Clouds which gathered in this area Tuesday evening dumped varied amounts of rain over the county. In the Holt community the gauges all had 2 inches in them. Some residents report hail, others do not.

Herbert Kirk said the clouds would disperse, then come back from another direction. Rain began about 6 p.m. and lasted until nearly midnight in most areas.

In Spearman, only .55 of inches fell. There was no hail nor wind in the city at all.

Palo Duro Creek catches all the run-off from rains in the western part of the county. Wednesday morning it was running bank full.

62nd Legislature Passed Bills Affecting Our District

And from a more liberal viewpoint, the 62nd Leg. was a scandal-ridden flop which failed miserably to move ahead with progressive programs for welfare, enrichment of the environment, and improvement of conditions for working class people and the minorities.

As the 62nd Regular Session came to a close at midnight on Monday May 31, a message was received from the Governor proclaiming an immediate special session for the purpose of completing work on Congressional redistricting, and to pass legislation to levy additional taxes on the sale of mixed alcoholic drinks. The first called session of the 62nd Legislature was convened at 12:00 noon

June 1. Bills on redistricting and liquor taxes which had been considered during the regular session were immediately re-introduced, and the House & Senate went back to work in Committee hearings on these bills.

Legislators Phil Cates, Max Sherman and Lane Denton have been very cooperative in getting weekly news releases to newspapers in their districts during the 140-day session.

Lane Denton was not at all pleased with the way the 62nd Legislature contributed to a "haphazard manner of exacting laws." He stated in a news release this week that the final appropriations bill was written by 10 members in secret meetings, a clear violation of the rules which

Speaker Gus Mutscher chose to ignore. The bill was presented to the House on an accept-all or reject-all basis and contained additional \$24 million expenditures not in the original version of the bill.

Two-thirds of the House members felt the bill was not even important enough to question and voted to end debate on the measure after only 30 minutes. Denton said "you might like to know how some of your tax money will be used." As follows:

1. The governor's salary will increase from \$65,000 per year to \$63,000 by 1973.
2. \$150,000 of your tax money will go for a state park in Rep. Heatly's district. Heatly is chairman of the appropriations committee.

3. The 18J Park near the Johnson ranch will be equipped with guests cabins and a pitch and putt golf course. This will take one million of your tax dollars.
4. \$200,000 of your taxes will be used to defend a heinous redistricting plan, Denton said.

Senator Max Sherman's latest news release to this district said he was relieved that a number of bills were passed before the log jam of the final days. These include hospital districts for Deaf Smith, Hansford and Randall counties. Sherman is concerned over the Redistricting Plan. A shift in the population has occurred, with our area losing and the large metropolitan centers having large gains. The Pan-

handle will lose one seat in the House and the senatorial district will grow by 6 to 8 counties.

The 62nd Session of the Texas Legislature was highly responsive to the needs and wishes of Texas farmers and ranchers. Some bills passed in their favor were:

- Retaining sales tax exemptions for farm machinery, equipment and for seed, feed, fertilizer and insecticides.
- Giving county commissioners courts authority to revoke exemptions of counties from provisions of the herbicide law.
- Requiring livestock owners to re-register their livestock brands with county clerk, and do so every 10 years.
- Providing a fine up to \$200

for persons who trespass on private property. Texas' first general trespass law.

Providing that trucks operating under temporary permits can haul any farm products.

Requiring labeling of treated seed.

Providing specifications for truck beds to prevent spillage of rocks, gravel, dirt and other loose materials on highways. Agricultural products are exempt.

Prohibiting dumping of cans, bottles, junk, garbage, etc. on public or private property and providing a fine of \$5 to \$200 for each violation.

The Texas Farm Bureau favored all these house bills.

If you want to know what kind of representative you have elected and sent to Aus-

tin, find out how he voted on the tax bill, the appropriations bill, and the redistricting bill. And if you do not like his record, voice your opinion at the polls when re-election time rolls around.

People are funny. They come up for these "great, needful programs" that would benefit the nation, school, town, etc., but to get John O. Public to pitch in and help with the idea is something else again.
 Senator Lloyd Bentsen says his mail is running 69-1 against the two year continuation of the draft. Everybody (especially youth) want a volunteer army. Trying to recruit a volunteer army however, is another problem. Bentsen has been traveling to all campuses on speaking engagements. He asks the question as to how many favor the V.A. and up all hands. When he asks how many would volunteer--no hands are raised.
 It is sorta like the idea of a good football program in SHS. All of us want one... especially the adults. We thought we had it made when Coley Huffman said he would be our coach. But Huffman called a meeting of all the boys who intended to play football next year and asked the boys how many would really like to see us win the State Championship in football next year. Less than 5 boys raised their hands. He then inquired as to how many boys were really interested in a good football program in SHS... about the same number of hands responded.
 Coley decided not to come to Spearman. I don't say this is the reason, but it could have had a bearing. Coach Huffman blamed his wife for his not coming to our fair city. Seems he had to decide between his wife... or moving to Spearman. I heard one man remark that this just goes to show that all husbands are hen-pecked... and those who deny it are liars!
 Everybody in Spearman (especially parents) agree that the best program we have ever had for the youth in our city is the Little League Baseball program. We need it. Everyone agrees. But recently the League secretary mailed out letters to 900 persons asking for financial help to keep the program from falling on its face for lack of funds. Less than 80 people responded.
 It takes cooperation for any program to succeed. But wanting one, and being willing to support one---are two different subjects altogether. "Actions speak louder than words."
 One program I feel sure the general public is going to shun completely is the soap-box, band-wagon, breast-beating cry of POLLUTION. I am so sick and tired of hearing the words "ecology", "environment" and "pollution" I could die.
 Designed to clean up our dirty planet, which is doomed otherwise, the program can work ONLY if you and I, the consumer, cooperate. After reading what I have to do in order to be "protected" I candidly confess that I don't intend to help much. The latest info is that our planet is contaminated by air pollution, water pollution, solid waste pollution, noise pollution and last but not least--population pollution. All sorts of ways are given in which to curb these pollutions, but to make a long story short you should NOT:
 Burn trash, smoke, drive a car, use your toilet, buy anything in plastic, glass or tin containers. Do not have children, adopt them.

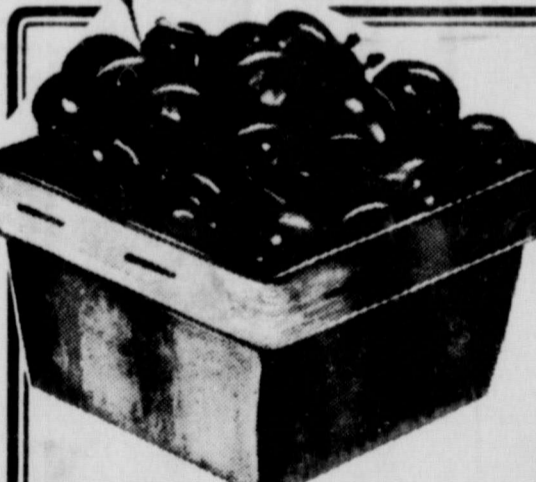

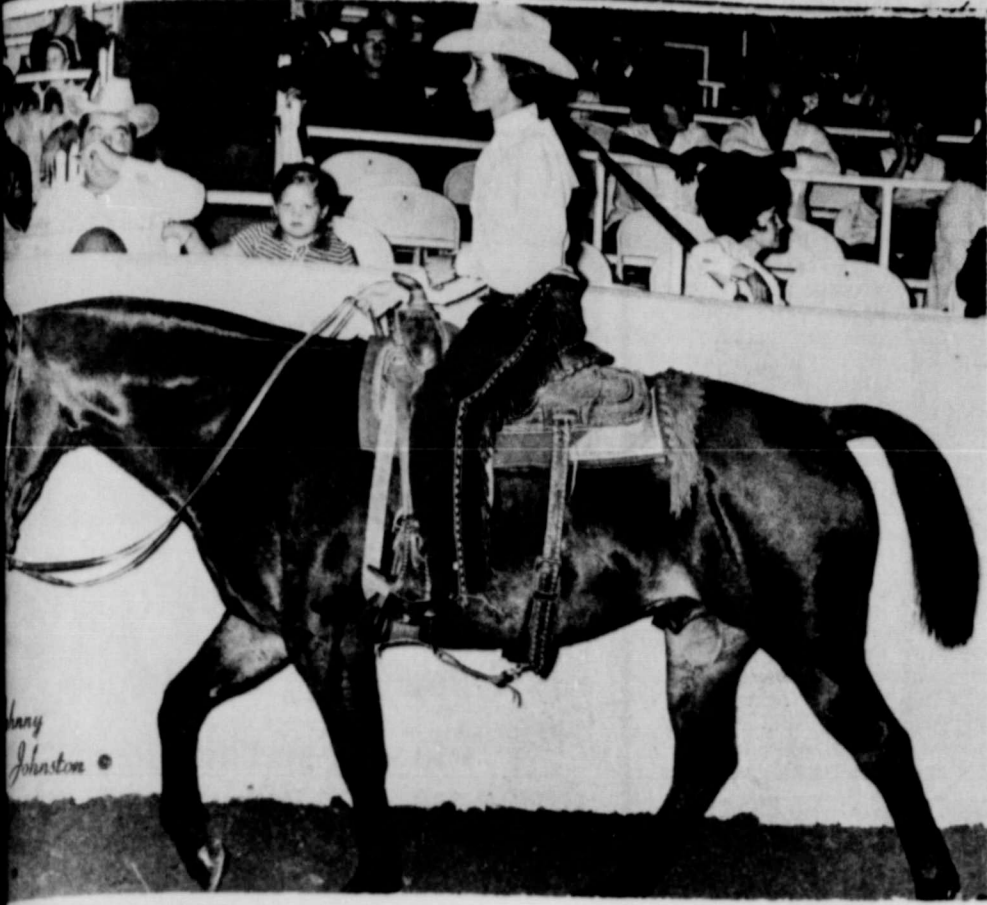

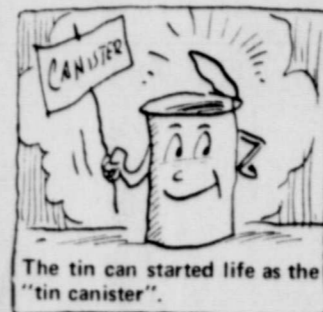
