

County ASCS Office Information Center On Economic Actions

Residents of Hansford County may obtain answers to questions on operation and information of the Presidential Aug. 15 on prices, wages and salaries from the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Office, located at 223 Main Street, in the County ASCS Office.

The Hansford County ASCS office is receiving official answers to questions concerning the President's action, and any person in Hansford County who wants or needs precise information should get in touch with the County Office, Trindle said.

The Hansford County ASCS Office is located at 223 Main. The mailing address is Box 98. The telephone number is 659-3036. In charge of the office is Elzey D. Vanderburg, County Executive Director. The office has a staff of 4 persons.

"Ours and all ASCS offices throughout the nation, will function as information centers in all locations outside of highly urbanized areas," Trindle said.

County ASCS offices are not to handle complaints or appeals, he said. They will serve only to provide official information. Persons with complaints will register them with the most convenient district or sub-district office of the Internal Revenue Service.

"Neither will interpretations or guesses be made by ASCS county office people. They will answer only those questions for which they have been supplied answers. If they don't know the answer to a specific question, they will say so. If a member of the

public wants the county office to obtain an answer, the question will go by phone or mail to the nearest IRS district office," Trindle said.

Normal function of ASCS county offices is to administer farm action programs of the U.S. Department of Agriculture on the local level. County committee Chairman Trindle said ASCS service to farmers will continue without interruption.

"Our county office people welcome the opportunity to serve their country and are happy to make the extra effort in this crucial period," he said.

Hansford County Now Part Of Nation-Wide Teletype Hookup

WILL SPEED UP APPREHENSION OF CRIMINALS

New teletype terminals are being installed this week in 14 area cities, connecting the entire Northern Panhandle loop with the automatic teletype switching system which has been installed at Austin by the Department of Public Safety.

One of these teletype networks was installed in the office of Hansford County Sheriff J. B. Cooke to upgrade communications and information systems as a means of speeding up apprehension of criminals.

These regional law enforcement teletype networks are a giant step in enhancing law enforcement capabilities for coping with the state's burgeoning crime rate.

With these new facilities, messages can be transmitted to any part of the State or Nation instantaneously, and eventually information can be obtained from state computer-stored crime files in a matter of minutes through the projected Texas Crime Information Center.

Sheriff Cooke said all "general broadcast messages come through the local machine almost constantly, reporting or seeking information on stolen property, wanted persons, runaways, etc. The teletype is most helpful in auto thefts because the new type license receipts, which began to be issued 2 years ago, are all in the computer which connects the state network with the National Information Crime center in Washington, D. C. Reports on any stolen automobile can be sent through

the teletype and information is immediately received via this automatic computer.

Cooke said any piece of stolen property, identifiable by serial numbers can be easily traced by contacting the Washington office. "If the property has ever been reported stolen, Washington has a record of it," the Sheriff said.

The machine will relieve the Sheriff's office of a lot of radio traffic, and is designed to produce faster and more effective information and communication service.

Mrs. Bailey will operate the machine.

The machine is operated by a keyboard which punches a tape. The tape is then fed through the machine and the message is transmitted direct to any one station, or as a general broadcast to all stations. There is no fear of error, for the message is not correct, the tape is rejected by the machine.

The entire Regional teletype network will be operational by September 1, when the Panhandle loop's equipment has been installed.

Sheriff Cooke said the new system of replacing manual equipment with automatic equipment will aid law enforcement officers in their efforts

to improve the criminal justice system.

"The communication system teletype will be great for our department," the Sheriff said. "Not only will it help our office be more efficient, but it is faster, more accurate, and it covers the entire nation."

New teletype terminals are being installed or old ones upgraded in the police departments of Amarillo, Dalhart, Friona, Borger, Pampa, Shamrock, Tulia and Hereford, and in sheriff's offices of Potter, Randall, Deaf Smith, Castro, Collingsworth, Dewar, Moore, Ochiltree, and Hansford counties. These counties comprise the "Northern Panhandle Loop" of the State network.

New Brand Law Goes Into Effect

Hansford County cattlemen decided that all brands on Texas livestock now be recorded with the County Clerk under a new law passed during the last legislative session.

The new law is a result of a bill passed by the state legislature which requires all state county clerks to record brands and marks on livestock. The law also states that all brands and marks must be recorded every 10 years.

County Clerk records for the county only, so many men may need to record brands in additional counties if they keep cattle.

Owner of a brand shall file the right during this six-month period to file the mark and now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the record who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, the person who has been recorded shall have the right to have it recorded in his name.

It will be illegal to brand livestock without first proper recording of the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held. When the brand is recorded, the brand on the animal on the brand is to be approved and designated. If a brand is to be applied to an animal on one location on the animal, it must be recorded in each additional county for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the number of brands and marks which may be recorded in a county by a single person as long as the requirements of this law are met. Brands may be recorded on separate from that of another or guardian, which may be recorded or re-recorded as provided by the new law.

The county clerk must assure that no more than one brand is recorded and that no two persons in a county may record the same brand on the animal on

The county clerk for Hansford County has the legal notice ready for publication and stated that it will appear in the Spearman Reporter for four consecutive weeks beginning Thursday, September 2. Cattlemen are urged to watch for this legal notice which will set forth these new requirements for recording brands and marks.

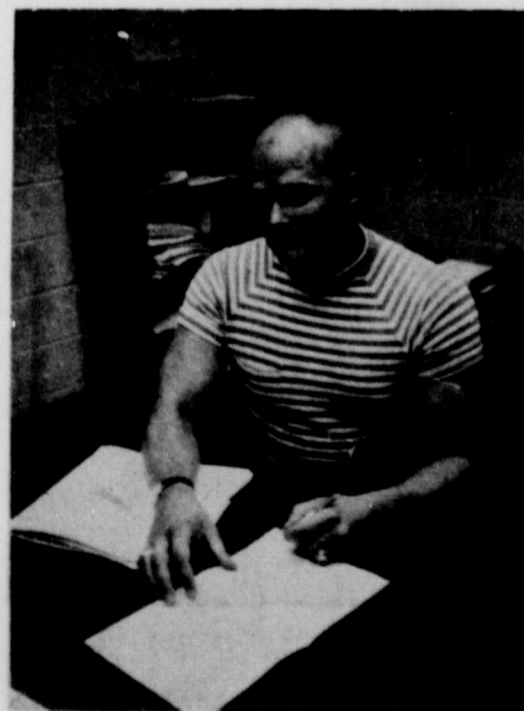

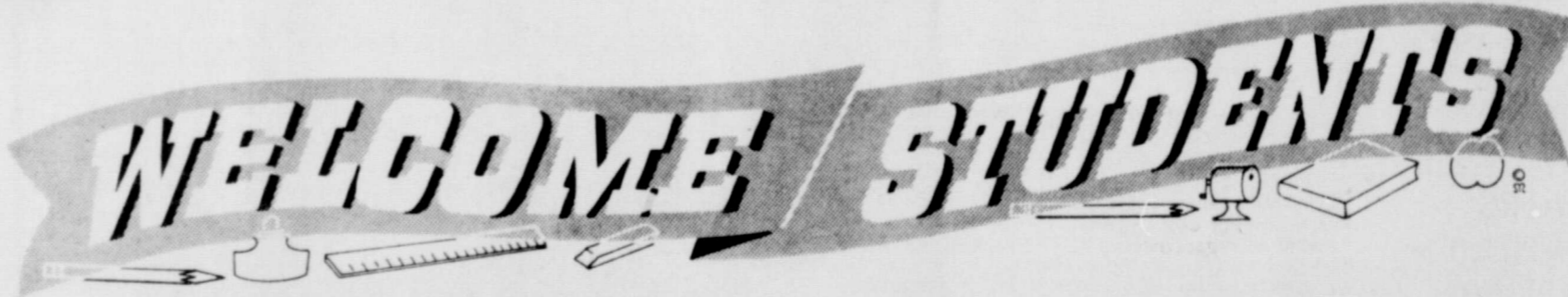

Angela Francis was flower girl. Steven Francis served as ring bearer. Wendell and Van Christensen lighted the candles.

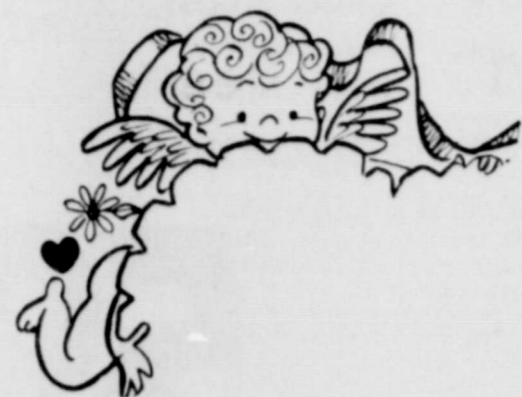

Eyestrain can be reduced if the student has a good study lamp this fall, so investing in one soon if you don't already have one is a good idea.

A well-chosen lamp can combat glare, extreme contrast, shadows and inadequate lighting. Glare can be eliminated by having a shade with white lining that covers the light bulb from any viewing angle.

A good shade should also throw some light upward as well as down over the study area. Placing the light source about 15 inches above the desk top can soften shadows.

The Better Light Better Sight Bureau says increased wattage merely multiplies the problems of glare, shadows and contrast; so the most efficient lamp isn't necessarily one with high wattage.

A reflecting cone or a prismatic bowl inside the lamp shade helps to gather light wasted around the base of the lamp and redirect it to the work surface. All Better Light Better Sight Bureau lamps will carry a certification tag which means the lamp has passed rigid tests and then been rechecked locally.

Suggestions for better lighting on the study desk include:

- 1. Have a flat work surface about 24 inches deep and 36 inches wide. 2. Put the desk against a light wall--never face a window. 3. Use a straight-back armless chair.

4. Choose a light-hue, non-glossy desk top--it reduces glare and contrast. A large ink blotter can do this if the desk top is dark.

Be sure to leave on the room light. This balances the lighting in the room and reduces contrasts.

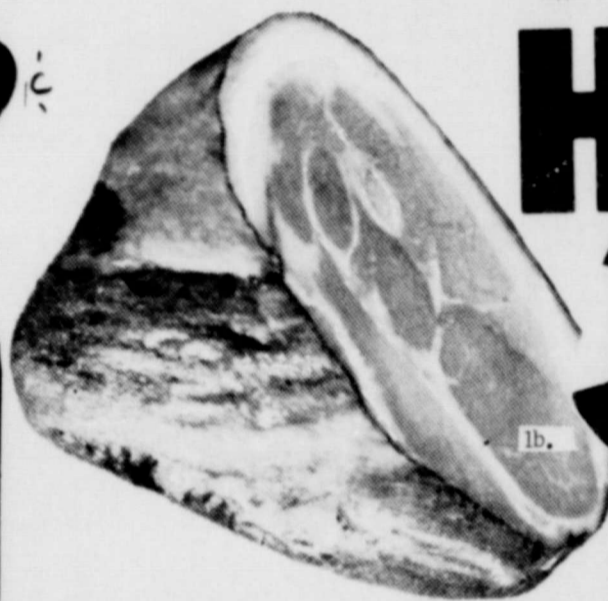

I had a neighbor a few years back who had 7 children, and no father. These things are hard to explain to kids when teacher tells them to show up with a particular kind of this or that.

Plumbers, pipefitters, welders, motor mechanics, etc. make as much or more money per year than the straight liberal arts with a Masters degree can hope to make. And these salaries come after only 2 years of training. Any degree takes 4 years.

Young people are under so much pressure these days. I am glad my school days have ended. DON'T FORGET to call the newspaper and list the name of your son or daughter who is going away to college soon. We will publish this list in the near future.

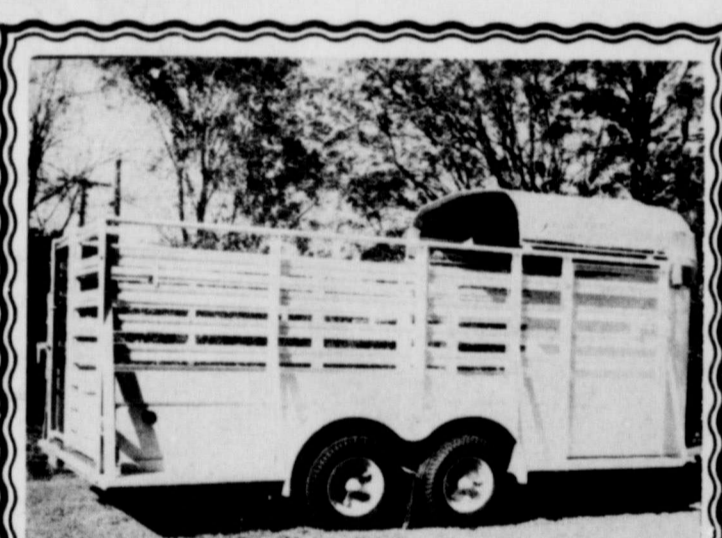

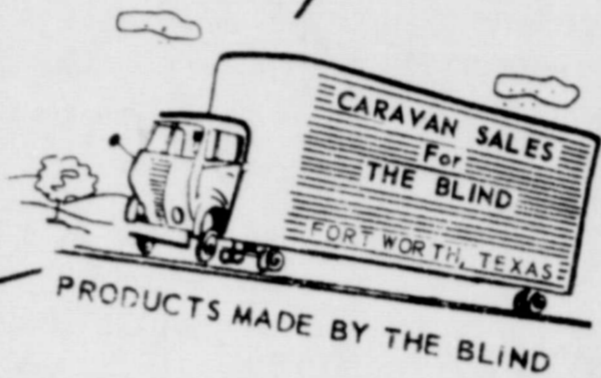

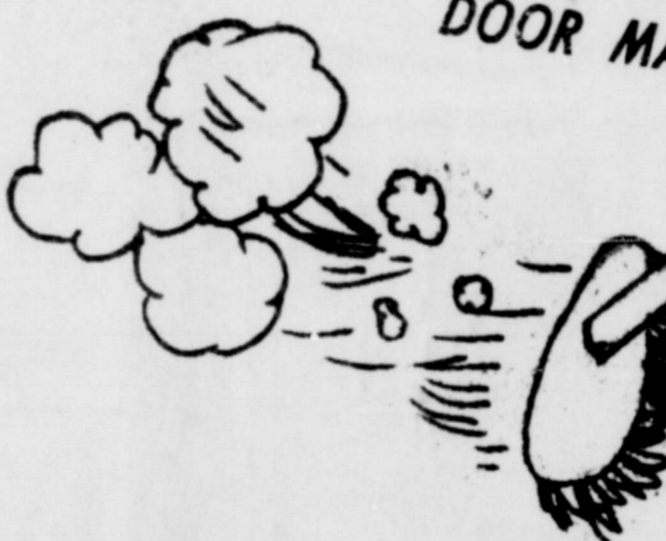

Local Business Activity Above National Average

A nationwide survey of business activity, just released, shows that Hansford County turned in a better performance in the past year than most communities did.

It was accorded an above-average market rating on the basis of the findings, which indicate that local residents earned more and spent more, per person, than was general across the country.

Its relative standing is brought out in a new "Survey of Buying Power," produced and copyrighted by Sales Management, the marketing publication. It contains comparable income and spending figures for each area.

Although 1970 was far from a record-breaking year throughout the United States generally, it was a better one for retail merchants in the local area than for those in most

other localities.

The figures show that Hansford County stores ended up with a sales volume of more than \$23,598,000.

It was more than might have been predicted from the standpoint of population alone. With 69.90 percent of the national population living in the local area, that proportion of the nation's business would have been its quota on that basis.

It went above that mark, however, and produced .0065 percent of the national total.

The results point to the sturdiness of the local economy. During a period of national recession, in which unemployment was high and the cost of living rising rapidly, business in the local area held up better than in many sections of the country.

Making it possible was the strong earnings picture. The survey shows that net income locally, after payment of personal taxes, reached a total of \$23,507,000, a gain over the previous year's \$23,373,000.

It was equivalent to \$11,754 per household, an average arrived at by dividing the overall income by the

number of local households.

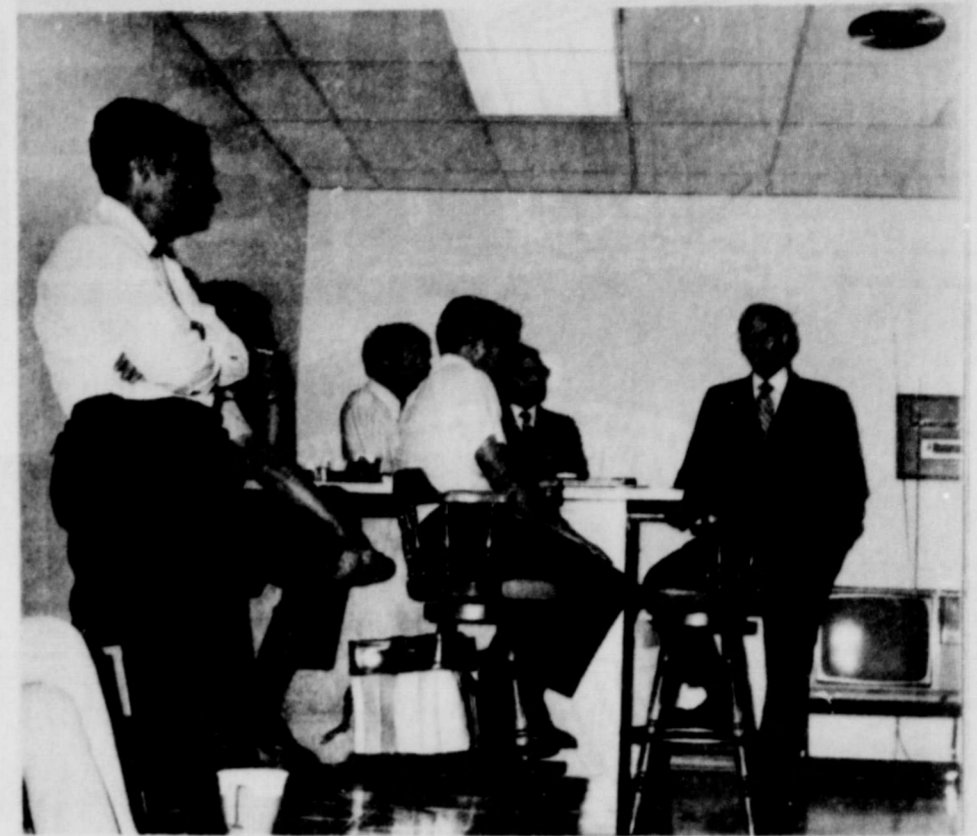
Since retail sales exceeded earnings, it is evident that some of the buying was done by shoppers from other areas.

The relative standing of one community to another, in terms of purchasing power and business vitality is shown in the survey through an "index of sales activity."

Hansford County's index is given as 117, or 117 percent above the national average.

than half of whom are elected by delegates of local chapters. The chapter chairmen and members of the chapter boards of directors are also all volunteers.

For its financial support, the Red Cross relies upon the voluntary contributions of the American people. Each chapter board of directors establishes its own budget, which is approved by the national organization. The national financial requirement is set by the Board of Governors. Since chapters are the fund raising units, a fair share of the national need is added to each chapter's requirement.

Annually, each chapter participates in a campaign for funds. About fifty percent of these campaigns are conducted in partnership with united way drives, while the remainder are independent campaigns for members and funds. Together, these efforts make possible the national Red Cross services and the community programs of local chapters.

Because the Red Cross, under its Congressional charter, may become involved at any time by giving its services in a national emergency such as war, or in large-scale natural disasters, the financial requirements of the organization are subject to change and must remain flexible. Red Cross accounts are audited annually by the Department of Defense.
