# County's Financial Report Paints Rosy Future

Hansford County is in excellent shape, financially. If nothing unforeseen comes up within the next two years, the county will be completely out of debt.

These facts were discussed at the Commissioner's Court meeting Monday morning following the treasurer's report submitted by Mrs. Selma Reneau.

Hansford County's current indebtedness includes: Hospital & clinic \$107,000,00; Courthouse & Jail \$38,000; Road Dist. 2, \$50,000 for the new bridge & road repairs just completed: Road Dist. 4 \$22,000.00 (for road bond issues). Precinct 3 \$10,000. Precinct No. 3 will be out

of debt this year and Road Dist. 4 has on hand \$22,000 in in-

vestments, the exact amount it needs to become debt free. Other investments in the General Fund includes \$10,000 for Courthouse & Jail and another \$25,000. in the Permanent Improvement Sinking funds.

The report also revealed that the current balance in the General fund totals \$30, 488. 57 as of September

Commissioners agreed that the county will probably be able to pay off all indebtedness in the next 24 months, and looking back to 1950 and the huge amount owed at that time, the court has a lot to be proud of.

It was in 1950 when the county road program began which incurred a debt close to a million dollars. In 1956 the



# Juvenile Conference

Hansford County Judge Johnwho said he was going to resign nie C. Lee attended the Governor's Juvenile Justice Conference held last week in Brownwood, Texas. Out of 130 Juvenile Judges in Texas, 90 were present for the important meet-

Texas Juvenile Judges met there to receive instruction new ruling on the handling of juvenile cases. In the past such cases have been tried strictly as civil cases, with the juvenile's parents named as "guardians." The Supre ne Court has ruled that henceforth, outside guardians and an Attorney must be appointed to the case at the arraignment of juveniles. Also, the case, according to Judge Lee, must be tried on a level between "criminal& civil."

Juveniles are classified in the age groups of 10 to 18 for girls and 10 to 17 years old for boys.

Judge Lee said this was "an eye-opener conference" for Juvenile Judges of Texas, and many of these men said they would go back home and resign from their position. Lee said 'more and more we are learning that the law is leaning to-

his position this week. This man had one of his cases sent before the Federal Court and the action which transpired went entirely in favor of the "criminal" ... who had filed suit against this county judge.

Appron ately 15 juvenile cases are tried in Judge Lee's concerning the Supreme Court's court each year here in Hansford County and most of these are "first offenders." Lee said nine out of ten of these juveniles "we never see again." Lee has always tried these cases as "unofficial", where the dock-et nevers reveals the case-just as if it never happened. "We protect our youngsters in this way," he said. The Judge indicated that he would not change the procedure of his juvenile court in the future so long as he continues to receive the cooperation from parents. "Here in our county the parents have always cooperated with this court to the fullest extent of our wishes, " he said. As long as this policy prevails, we will be able to get along as usual here in Hansford Coun-

ty, he concluded. Judges present at the conference spent one whole day in classroom work under Max P. Fluscher, Assistant Attorney General who represents all Juvenile Judges in Federal Courts.

"A pedestrian is entitled to assume there is no danger from traffic as long as he remains on the sidewalk

Would it matter if the pedestrian had actually seen the bus coming toward him? That should make a difference, claimed the bus company in another injury case, because it would have been so easy for him to take one step backward-to be safe.

But again the court ruled in the pedestrian's favor. The court said he simply had no reason to expect that the bus would intrude where it had no business intruding. Still, there is always the pos-


sibility that at the very moment of impact, the pedestrian may have been leaning over the curb into the street.

One woman was struck by a bus while she was standing on the sidewalk between a fire hydrant and an electric light pole. Yet, even though both the hydrant and the pole were at the very edge of the curb, neither of these objects was even scratched.

Applying common sense, the court concluded that the woman herself must have been at fault. The judge said that, at least for a brief instant and a brief distance, she must have leaned out of her safety zone on the sidewalk, into the danger zone on the street.





WASHINGTON-Tax relief for purchasers of farm trucks has been won by U.S. Representa-tive Graham Purcell (D-Tex)

At Congressman Purcell's request, the Committee has written into its proposed measure a provision to exempt all vehicles of a gross weight up to 7500 pounds from the 10% federal excise tax now affecting all trucks. The bill will also follow the Administration recommendation to remove the 7% excise tax from passen-

ger cars. "This is the culmination of a long fight to see that farmers and other purchasers of light trucks are not burdened with this tax, " the veteran member of the House Agriculture Com-mittee reported.

The Administration was unfavorable to removal of the excise tax from any motor vehicle other than passenger cars. However, " Purcell continued, "working closely with Chairman Mills, I have succeeded in getting the Ways and Means Committee to include light trucks in the exemption.

The Texas Democrat said that he had hoped to convince the Committee to cover all farm trucks. "In view of the Administration's resistance, he stated, "I am pleased we were able to get this much. Under the circumstances, this is the best I think we can do." The House Committee is

presently meeting in executive session on the final draft of the tax bill and is expected to introduce its proposals to the House of Representatives early next week. The Purcell provision will be retroactive to midnight, September 22 of this year.



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



# New Consumer research Center Now In Operation

COLLEGE STATION -- Texas A&M University's new Consumer Research Center now in operation probably comes as close to any agency on campus in having something for everybody.

Everyone is a consumer, says Dr. Alice Stubbs, who heads the center, and everyone has consumer probelms to some degree.

Areas for investigation include food, clothing, housing, textiles, household equipment and furnishings, and specialty items, such as toys or equipment for certain age groups.

Dr. Stubbs said studies also will strive for improved communications between consumers and manufacturers.

The center is an outgrowth of consumerism and consumerist movements which .have been around for a long time. Vague consumer protection laws existed even in colonial times in this country.

Early in this century, the movement stirred in carnest

with passage of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act, the Food and Drug Act and many others. However, the modern consumerist trend began in 1962 when President Kennedy proclaimed what has become known as the Consumer Magna Charta. The Magna Charta stated that the consumer has certain rights in the business community: the right to safety, to be

heard. Dr. Stubbs said A&M's Consumer Research Center will expand work done previously by the Home Economics Research Department and the Division of Rural Home Research, both of which began in the College of Agriculture in 1920. The name was changed to Home Economics Research Department in 1955.

During those many years, research projects were aimed at foods, housing, food and clothing marketing, nutrition and textiles. Efforts will now be directed toward the complex problems of today in marketing, nutritional health, family life and residential housing. It will operate as a free

## Children Suffer Lack Of Vitamin A

THE SPEARMAN REPORTER, Hansford County, Texas 79081

College Station -- Recent U.S. surveys show a substantial number of children suffer from some vitamin A deficiency, reports Sally Springer, Extension foods and nutrition specialist.

Although the situation is more wilespread in poverty areas, middle class adults have also been found to have so little vitamin A in their bodies that night blindness. the first major sign of a deficiency, is becoming increasingly common, she continues.

A deficiency, including skin infections, respiratory tract infections and eye disorders, have been found in many American children and adults. America's changing food and dietary habits may be responsible for the apparent

per-capita consumption of whole milk is on the decline. low-fat skim milk and skim

milk are replacing it. Wen fat is removed from whole milk to make skim milk, so it the fat-stored vitamin A, In order for skim milk to compare with whole milk in vitamin A content, it must be fortified with the vitamin A cortent, it must be fortified with the vitamin. And, she adds, Americans are eating fewer vegetables. Carrots, squash and dark leafy green vegetables are the major vegetable sources of vitamin A.

One researcher has even found many persons without vitamin A in their livers at death, and even greater numbers with very little. This is significant as fatsoluble vitamin A is stored in the liver, she says.

# LEGAL NOTICE TO LIVESTOCK OWNERS

In accordance with Chapter I, Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, all owners of any livestock shall within six months after August 30, 1971, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county in which the livestock are located. The mark or brand shall be recorded whether the mark or brand has been previously recorded or not.

After the expiration of six months from August 30, 1971, all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer be in force or effect, and after the expiration of six months, only the records made after August 30, 1971, shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county. All marks and brands regis-

tered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years.
