WT Homecoming To Honor Governor Smith Saturday

CANYON — Gov. Preston Smith will be the guest of honor Saturday as West Texas State University enters its final day of Homecoming week.

The governor will attend a private luncheon at noon Saturday in the East Dining Hall as the guest of President James P. Cornette.

Also present at the luncheon will be Tenkoi Tachibana of Japan who will present six of his wall screen paintings to the "people of the United States" with the Panhandle Plains Historical Museum as repository. That ceremony is scheduled for 4:30 p.m. Saturday in the north art gallery of the museum.

The governor will also serve as honorary grand master of the Homecoming Parade at 3 p.m. Saturday and will ride with the president's nine-car party at the head of the parade.

Ranfall County Sheriff L. S. "Sim" Johnston will serve as parade marshal, riding at the head of the parade as it goes down 4th Avenue and north on 28th Street through the University.

The pledge class of Sigma Nu fraternity has been letting everyone know it is homecoming since Sunday with their constant ringing of a large bell. The ringing will cease again at kickoff of the WTSU-Idaho University football game at 8 p.m. Saturday.

The festivities will open Thursday afternoon with a hamburger eating contest at the Activities Center. The track team is sponsoring the event from 3:30 p.m. to 5:30 p.m.

A bonfire and pep rally will be held Thursday night on the east side of campus. "They have more wood stacked up than I've ever seen," Dean Weldon Trice said. Trice, dean of men, is directing the homecoming project. He said one group had hauled eight tons of wood in two loads. Some of it is railroad ties.

"We have enough there to burn for three or four days and they are still hauling," Trice said. Teams contributing the heaviest weight of wood will win trophies and choice reserved seats at the Homecoming game. Friday's activities will include a pep rally at 10 a.m. which will be heralded by the arrival of sky-divers on the area behind the University Complex South.

The pep rally will feature Mrs. Paul H. Johansen of Belingham, Wash., a 1912 graduate of the school, and the Miss WTSU contestants. Two alumni, B. Raymond Evans of Tulia and Raymond L. Thompson of Vega, will be honored at 6:30 p.m. at the second annual Distinguished Alumni banquet of the WTSU Ex-Students' Association.

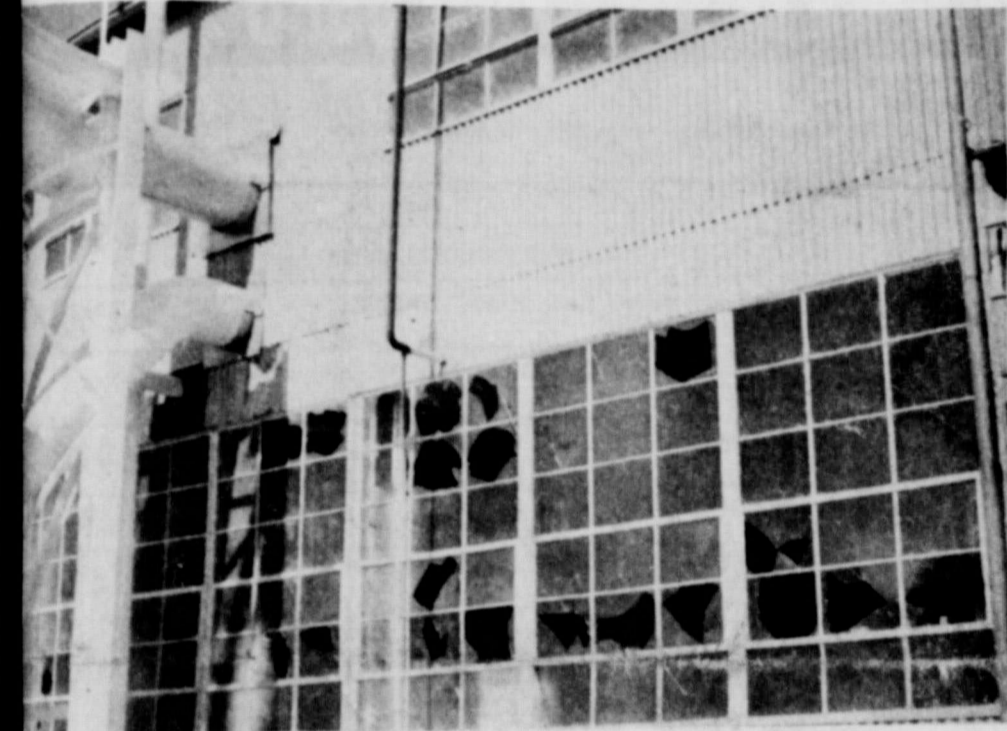

WEATHER REPORT

The storm front which passed through the area Sunday evening left varying amounts of rain across the county as well as minor-to-heavy storm damage from tornadoes & high winds.

At the Deacon Clement farm, 12 miles east of town, rain gauges recorded 1.30 inches of rain. At the James Sparks farm home 9 miles south, less than half an inch fell. Out to Old Hansford, Bill Hutton recorded three-quarters of an inch. Other areas had more, and less than these readings. Some report scattered hail, but not enough to damage maize crops.

The moisture was received with mixed emotions--its good for the young wheat crop, but not needed in the maize fields. However, very little milo has been harvested in the county so far. Farmers have cut a few loads, but all was too wet and combines were halted awaiting a good frost which will help to mature the grain for cutting and storage.

Bill Haden, U.S. official weather observer in Spearman reported .41 of an inch of moisture from Sunday evening's rain shower. The week's weather chart follows:

Wreck Victims Placed On "Fair" List Tues.

Pickup Hits Calf

Sheriff J. B. Cooke and his deputies investigated another wreck where livestock was involved Monday night.

D. E. Bradford, a Spearman man, accidentally hit a calf which was on the highway about 8 miles south of town.

Bradford, who was not injured, sustained damage to his pickup. The calf, belonging to C. W. Smith, was killed.

Remember, the game will start at 7:30, all fans are urged to get there on time.

The prize-winning Spearman band will march.

Four persons remain hospitalized in area hospitals with serious injuries resulting from a grinding two-car collision just west of the Fritch city limits about 10 a.m. Saturday.

Injured in the accident were Donald Tanner, 40, and his 14 year old daughter Belinda of Spearman, and Isaac Milton Simpson, 87, and his wife Lillian, 77 of Canadian.

Investigating the accident was highway patrolman Gary Ratliff of Borger.

The accident occurred at the first intersection past the Fritch school. The Tanner vehicle, on their way back to Spearman, was traveling east on Eagle Road. Mrs. Simpson, driver of the other auto, was travelling north on Fritch Fortness road. Authorities said Mrs. Simpson failed to stop at a stop sign and rammed the Tanner auto about midway, broadside. The impact caused Mr. Tanner to lose control of his car, and the vehicle turned over twice. Both Don and his daughter were thrown from the car.

The Simpsons were taken to Highland General Hospital in Pampa where both are in improved condition at this time.

Mr. Tanner and Belinda were rushed to North Plains Hospital in Borger where he was checked and immediately sent on to High Plains Hospital in Amarillo for surgery. Belinda was held in the Borger hospital, but Sunday afternoon was moved on to Amarillo so she could be hospitalized with her father.

Tanner suffered a broken right leg which required surgery, lacerations and abrasions, 4 broken right ribs and 3 broken left ribs. Once each hour he is placed on the breathing machine.

Belinda had no broken bones, but suffered a laceration on her knee and multiple abrasions.

As of Tuesday, both Mr. Tanner and Belinda were placed on the "fair" condition list at the Amarillo hospital. He is in room 582 while Belinda occupies room 564.

Mr. Tanner is the local manager of People's Natural Gas Co.

MAN INJURED IN ACCIDENT AT FEEDYARD

A Spearman man was admitted to Hansford Hospital Monday afternoon suffering from injuries received in a truck accident at Hansford Feedyards.

David M. Layton, an employee at the feedyard, was injured when he lost control of his truck and turned it over. He sustained bruises, contusions and multiple pelvic fractures.

He was brought to the hospital via H & S Ambulance.

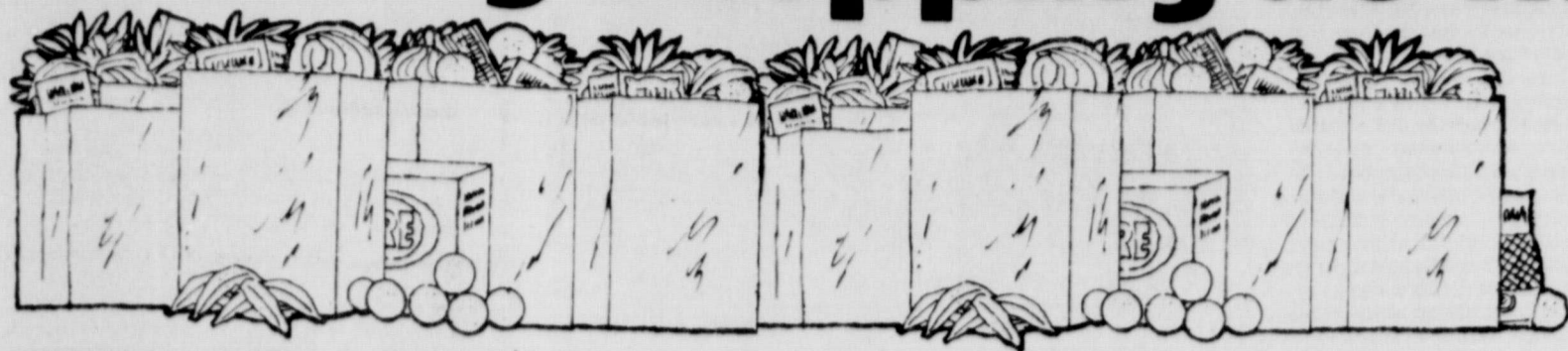

Let Me See

Well gals, we are about to be guaranteed full equality, whether you want it or not. The House adopted last week, after much debate, a proposed Constitutional Amendment which will guarantee women "full equality." The resolution must now be approved by two-thirds of the Senate and three-fifths of the State Legislatures. All the female members of Congress and most women's groups favor the amendment which will invalidate any Federal or State laws which provide for different treatment of men and women.

Theoretically, this will make women eligible to FIGHT IN WARS. If this passes, women will not be required to take the husband's name at the time of marriage, and will void laws which protect a woman against complete disinheritance by her husband.

I went on record months ago that I AM AGAINST IT, and I imagine nine-tenths of American women are. This is a perfect example of the "squeaky wheel getting oiled." A few modern gals, all hipped on liberation-from-everything-including-underwear, got together and began yelling, and the poor ignorant members of Congress listened to their howls and decided they represented the entire female race. You've heard about, (and known a few) calamity Howlers, well you can reverse this and say these Howlers have forced a calamity upon us females.

I thought about writing a letter to my Congressman and asking for a "majority vote" on this women's lib thing. However, when I read that 51% of the American population were in the 30 years and

under age group, I changed my mind. For 'tis these unlearned, unexperienced young-uns who are for all this bunk, would be like asking for a majority vote on the best music--jazz would win over Chopin. Or on the best novel--the cheap scribbler would win over Tolstoy. In fact, I imagine on any fine issue, the majority is sure to be wrong. We settle things by a majority vote, and the psychological effect of doing that is to create the impression that the majority is probably right. This is not always true.

SPEAKING ABOUT voting--you better remember to get your voter registration certificate in order. There are lots of important elections coming up next year. U.S. President, to name one.

Also, about a year from now (November 1972) Texans will be voting on a constitutional amendment that will set forth procedure to rewrite the state's 95-year old constitution. We should all be studying this document and deciding if and how we want it changed.

Remember, if only 100 Texans go to the Polls in Nov., and the majority of this few say change it, change it they will!

For over 25 years high officials of the state have been complaining that our constitution is so rigid, detailed, and out of date that it hinders the state government at almost every turn. It is said that the ink on the original document was hardly dry before Richard Coke, who was Governor at the time, began calling for a revision. Since then, Governors Hobby, Neff, Moody, Jester, Daniel, Shivers and Connally all have claimed that it is an archaic charter of government that is completely out of step with modern society.

It is true that the Texas constitution was drafted for the expressed purpose of holding a tight rein on state officials. It was ratified in 1876 at the close of Reconstruction days when embittered Texans were disgusted with carpetbagger and scalawag capers and were determined that any change in governmental policies must be sanctioned by the people. It is loaded down with restrictive details that are usually left to statutory law. As a result, it has been amended over 200 times, and has swelled from its original 23,000 to about 50,000 words, as compared with the U.S. Constitution's 5,000.

Texas is not alone in having an ancient constitution that needs revision. Many states have them, and apparently they want to keep them. Most

efforts at revision have been defeated when put to a vote. The reason for this is that Texans basically are conservative, and they fear that constitutional changes will be dictated by people who do not have their best interests at heart.

Texas' constitution is not all bad. In many respects it has served the state well. This is not to say that we don't need a carefully revised constitution. The very fact that it goes into great detail to spell out what can and can't be done is in itself a protection.

Anyway, right now is the time to apply at the County Tax office for a voter certificate, whether you are 18 years old or 95, you must have this before you can have a say in ANY election--local, state, or national.

Who knows, maybe they'll call for a majority vote on Women's Liberation.

Seems like folks who know the least, know it mighty fluently.

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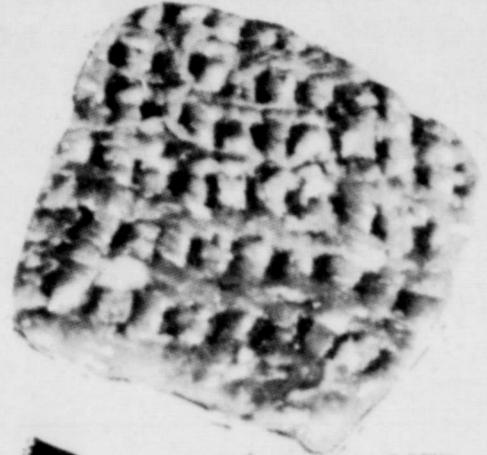
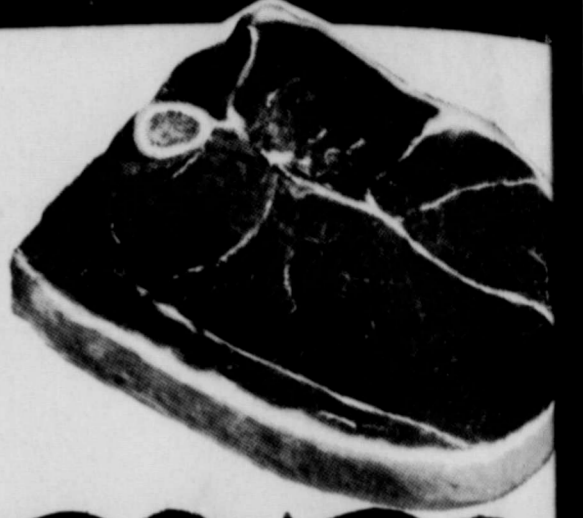
