ONE FAMILY LEFT DESTITUTE

A two-car collision Monday afternoon in the south city limits of Gruver left three adults hospitalized and six children with minor injuries.

The accident, investigated by Gruver Police Chief Irvin Roper, happened about 1:30 and involved two cars which collided almost head-on.

Brought to Hansford Hospital were Mrs. Barbara Fowler and her three children and Mr. and Mrs. Orville L. Fleshman and their three children. Mrs. Fowler is the wife of a custom cutter. The family is in this area for the harvest. Mrs. Fowler is suffering chest injuries and was retained in Hansford Hospital for observation. One of her children had a broken nose.

Mr. Fleshman is suffering from severe chest and facial injuries. Mrs. Fleshman is not seriously injured but was kept in the hospital for observation. Their children were treated for cuts and bruises.

The Fleshman family, who are Iowa residents, were traveling through the country looking for work. According to information from authorities, the only thing the family owned was the old model car, and it was completely demolished in the wreck.

This family is badly in need of financial assistance. The people of Gruver submitted some help for the family Monday. The three Fleshman children have been placed in homes here in Spearman waiting for their parents to be released from the hospital. This could be "some time yet."

Anyone wishing to contribute to their welfare may do so by bringing a check to the Spearman newspaper office, or to County Judge Johnnie C. Lee. This family has no home, no employment and now are without transportation.

City Gas Meters Tampered With

City authorities are urging the cooperation of parents to be on the lookout for children tampering with the gas meters located in the alley ways in Spearman.

Last weekend persons living in the southeast and southwest part of the city reported something wrong with their gas. On inspection, city men found

that these meters had been tampered with. A screw driver had been used to take out screws and the meter controls had been tampered with.

This is very dangerous, and children do not realize what the consequences could be. City men said Tuesday that this tampering with meters could cause the gas pressure

to increase, and the house itself could catch fire and burn. Too low a pressure could cause fires in the house to go out and might result in asphyxiation or explosion.

Parents are asked to help curb this problem by watching their children. If anyone is seen tampering with gas meters, citizens are urged to call the City Police at once.

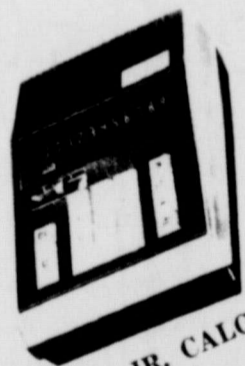

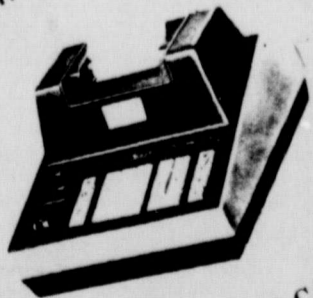

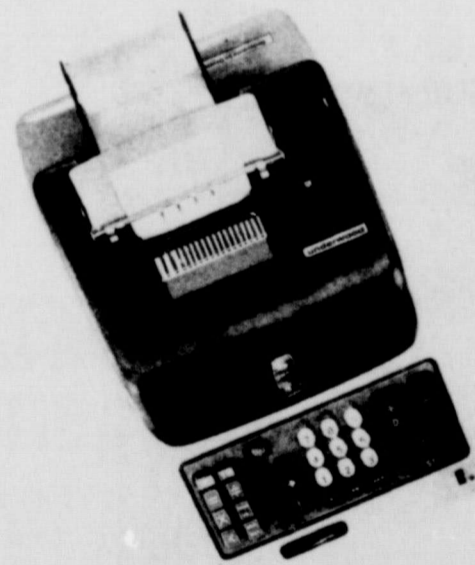

I bet the optometrists are working overtime this week with customers complaining of things being out of focus. All that's wrong with their eyes is too much football over the Thanksgiving holidays. Everyone I saw Monday had colored, square, eyeballs. They were also sorta puffy, shaped something like shoulderpads or face-guards.

Anyway, it's all over. NOW we can think about Christmas, and all the many, many things we have to get done in advance. Like address greeting cards. This job I already have done. Have had for two years, but the trick is to get them in the mail this year. Went through them last week and they have all turned a dirty, brown color (from age.). Also I know several friends and relatives have changed addresses since 1969 and this poses a problem. Ever try to buy an envelope to fit a card you already have? They just don't make envelopes to fit that size. I really think what I'll do is just put these cards all back for several more years and then advertise them on the antique market.

Speaking of antiques, if you would love to GIVE them but can't afford the price, give a reproduction. Reproductions of most anything "old" you can name is available to you. Collectors of the genuine can hardly tell the difference.

For instance Sears is offering antique toy reproductions in their Christmas catalog, but if you collect these, better get on the ball for orders will be filled on a "first come" basis.

The nostalgic toy miniatures are reproductions in limited quantity from a collection now in the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C. Originally owned by Sears, Roebuck & Co., they are cast iron toys dating from about 1870 which were recently presented by Sears to the museum as a gift. Of the original collection, about 300 of these pieces of priceless Americana will tour the country on exhibition while another 500 of the originals will remain on display in Washington.

The toys selected for reproduction from this wonderful storehouse of Americana number eight in all. They have been duplicated with consummate devotion and old fashioned craftsmanship by the Val-leaus, father and son, who maintain a 100 year old foundry in Grand Rapids, Michigan. Only 250 copies in all of each of the eight toys will be reproduced and offered for sale to the public. Each copy will be a cast iron reproduction, handmade from molds cast from the original antique and carefully hand-dipped and hand-decorated.

People purchasing these intriguing replicas by order from the Sears 1971 Christmas catalog will receive a numbered toy in a handsome wood-and-glass case, plus a certificate reading: "This is an authentic reproduction of a toy exhibited in the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of History and Technology. Hand-crafted in a foundry using traditional hand casting and hand finishing methods, the reproduction is a painstakingly detailed copy of the original toy in the Sears Roebuck Collection of Antique Toys, now a part of the National Collection."

After the 250 copies have been struck of each toy, the molds will be broken, insuring the replicas' limited and

valuable status.

Priced from \$100 to \$300 each, these miniatures for sale include a hook and ladder with four-horse team, two horse-drawn carriages (one with Uncle Sam as passenger), a race horse and sulky, a horse-drawn pumper wagon, a touring car, a Model-T coupe and a four-door sedan from the Roaring Twenties. Don't think you would want to give these expensive "new antiques", to your child, but they are collectors items!





**HUNTING LICENSE
SALES HEADING
FOR NEW HIGH**

Hunting license sales rolled along at a record pace this week as the deer and turkey seasons opened over most of Texas.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials reported a total of 290,621 resident hunting licenses were sold in September and October, compared to 288,874 for the first two months of the 1970-71 license year.

If the pace is maintained as expected, license sales will exceed last year's 780,659 resident licenses sold and their value of \$2,341,759.

Sales of exempt licenses for hunters under 16 and over 65 also are running ahead of last year, as are non-resident license sales.

The fiscal year 1970-71 saw more than \$2.6 million in revenue brought into the state's coffers from sales of the four major hunting licenses -- resident, non-resident, exempt and five-day migratory bird license.

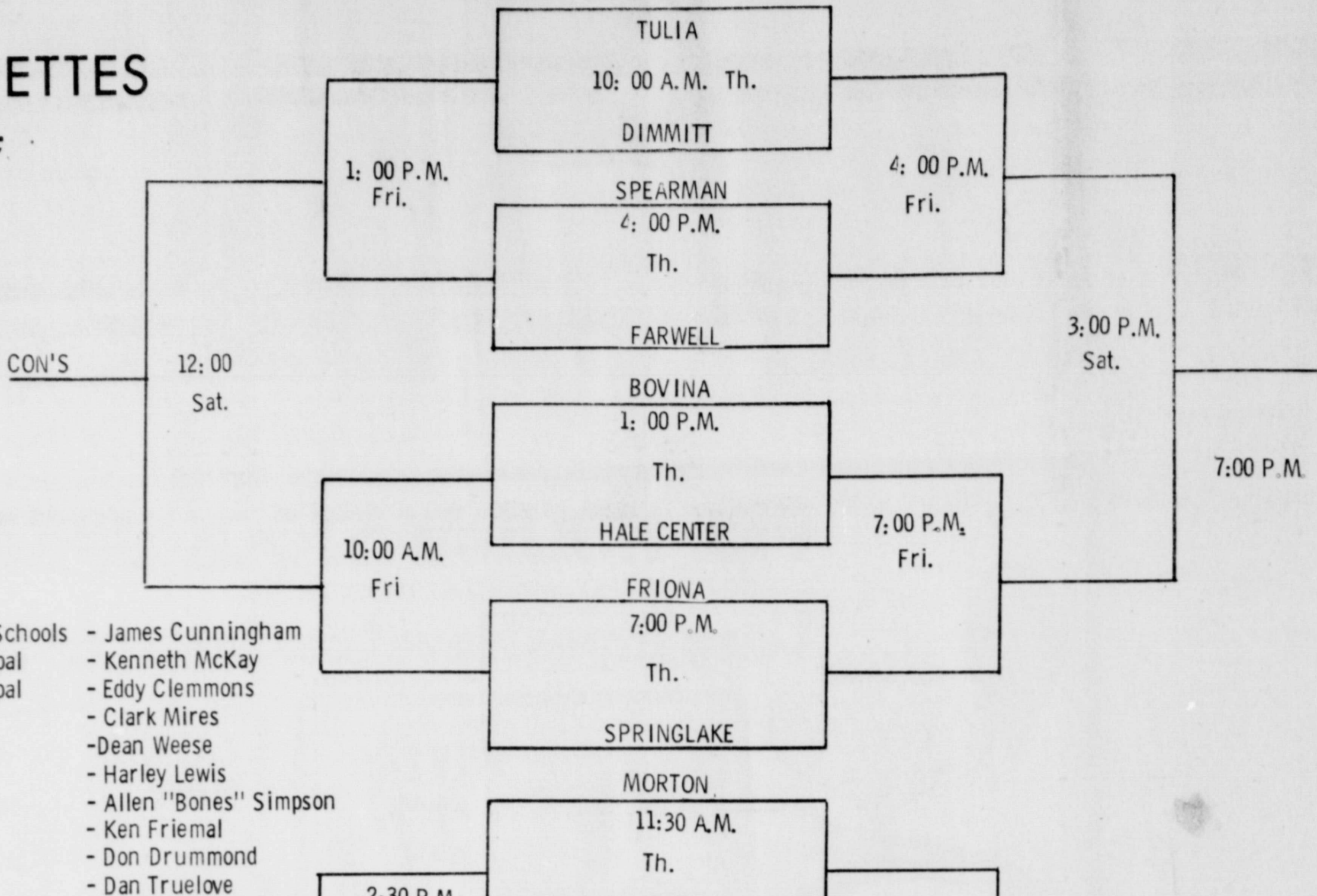

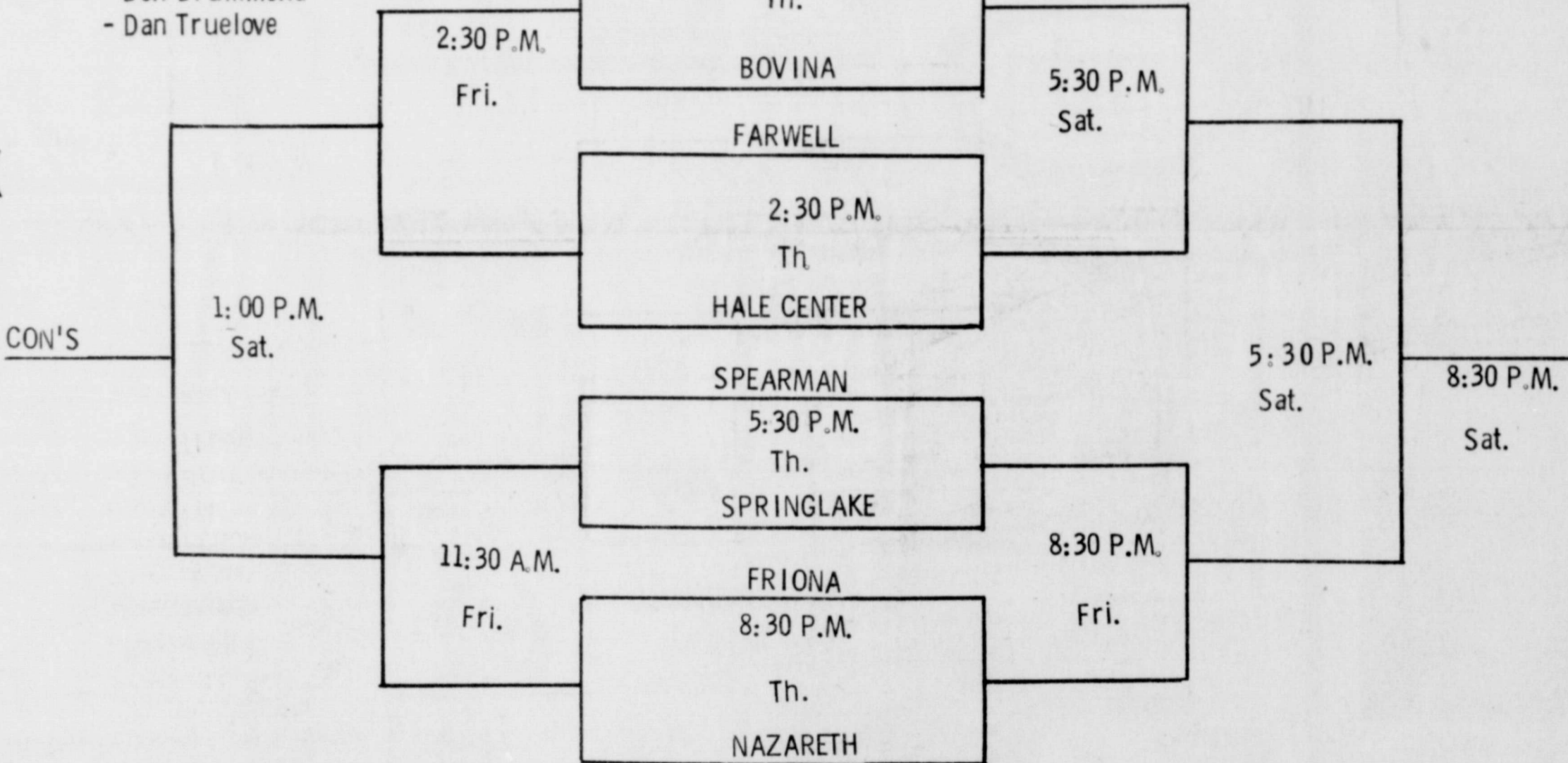
