



Blackburn Announces For County Attorney

J.E. (Chunky) Blackburn has authorized this newspaper to announce his candidacy for the office of County Attorney, subject to the May 6 Democratic Primary election.

Blackburn announced Tuesday that he had filed as a candidate for this office.

Mr. Blackburn, a native of Spearman, graduated from Spearman High School. In 1962 he graduated from West Texas State, where he was a member of the Alpha Tau Omega fraternity. He entered St. Mary's University School of Law in 1965, and received his Juris Doctorate degree in May, 1968. He practiced law in San Antonio, Texas until August, 1969 when he moved back to Spearman. He is a partner in the law firm of Countiss & Blackburn and a member of the State Bar of Texas and the Northeast Panhandle Bar Association. Mr. Blackburn has a general practice and handles both civil and criminal cases.

He and his wife, Zetia, a Minniet, Texas native, have two children, Denise, age 7 and Sara, age 18 months. Mrs. Blackburn received her degree in Elementary Education from

Salary Hike, Adjustments Made by County

A general 5.5 percent salary increase was approved for all employees and elected officials in action Monday by the Hansford County Commissioners court.

Salary adjustments, which are in compliance with the President's "Phase Two" price wage ceiling, will be reflected in checks received at the end of the current month.

Those people on the county's payroll, and their wages will be as follows:

The county has 12 road workers employed (3 in each precinct) and the salary paid each one of these amounts to about \$550 each per month.

In the State Extension service office, Robert Adamson received \$259.09 and Nelle Albrecht \$259.09, which is the county's share in their salary wage. Norma Jean Mackie, secretary in that office receives \$369.25.

In the Sheriff's office, J.B. Cooke—\$772.78, Mr. Cooke also serves as the County Tax Collector and Assessor. Deputy's salaries are as follows: Lee Phillips \$556.57; Tom Messer \$456.57; Rodell Hutchison \$473.40; Evelyn Bailey (Radio) \$204.25; Helen Dry \$448.38; Vickie Warren \$473.40, O.V. Walker \$582.16.

In the Clerks office: Norma Jean Covey, clerk \$719.69; Jessie Faries, assistant, \$473.40. County Judge Johnnie C. Lee \$690.91; Joe Copeland, secretary, \$300.68.

Weldon Greene, auditor, \$719.69.

County Treasurer Selma Renneau \$634.60, County Attorney T.D. Sarsing \$498.98, Justice of the Peace, J.P. Vernon \$579.60, Raymond Gilley, custodian \$524.68.

The four county commissioners receive monthly pay checks totaling \$511.78 each.

In other action before the court Monday, commissioners authorized the final payment for \$26,000, which cleared the debt for the courthouse remodeling and jail annex, etc.

Commissioners agreed to place Hansford County employees in the County Retirement Plan as this county was the only county in the northern part of the State which had not entered this program.

All employees and elected officials are eligible for retirement after 12 years of service and after they reach 60 years of age. Those who have in 20 years service can retire regardless of age. Weldon Greene, auditor, said the average monthly retirement pay would amount to approximately \$120.00 per month. Withholding from employees pay checks monthly, for the retirement benefits, run all the way from \$15 to \$39, monthly.

In entering the retirement program now, no one will be eligible for benefits until January 1973.

Commissioners discussed the county road situation and mapped out 149 miles of current caliche roads in the county, plus 255 miles of paved roads.

Precinct One charts 76 miles of paved road. Precinct two has 61 miles; precinct three 69 and precinct 4 has 49 miles of pavement.

18 YEAR OLDS CAN VOTE IN COMING CITY ELECTION

In the opinion of the local city attorney, 18 year olds can vote in the city election, but they cannot run for office. According to legal opinion, to qualify for a position as a city candidate you must be 21, and a legal resident of the state one year, and a resident of our city 6 months. You do not have to be a property owner to vote in the coming city election, as it is not for any expenditures.

The city election has been called for April 1. Officials who are running this year are Mayor Dr. D.E. Hackley and councilmen Richard Holton and E.J. Copeland. A new law this year requires that city candidates must file their campaign record of expenditures, such as advertising, and printing candidate cards, etc. The Mayor and councilmen in Spearman receive \$15.00 each, for each meeting that they attend.

In other business at the council meeting Monday night, it was learned that the Texas Municipal League will meet January 27th, in the Civic Center. Some representatives from the city will attend this meeting.

The Sewer Plant permit was discussed Monday night, and the city will meet all new requirements of the law, such as chlorination at the discharge plant, etc. This is all a part of the new requirements which are numerous. This also comes under the heading of trash burying. 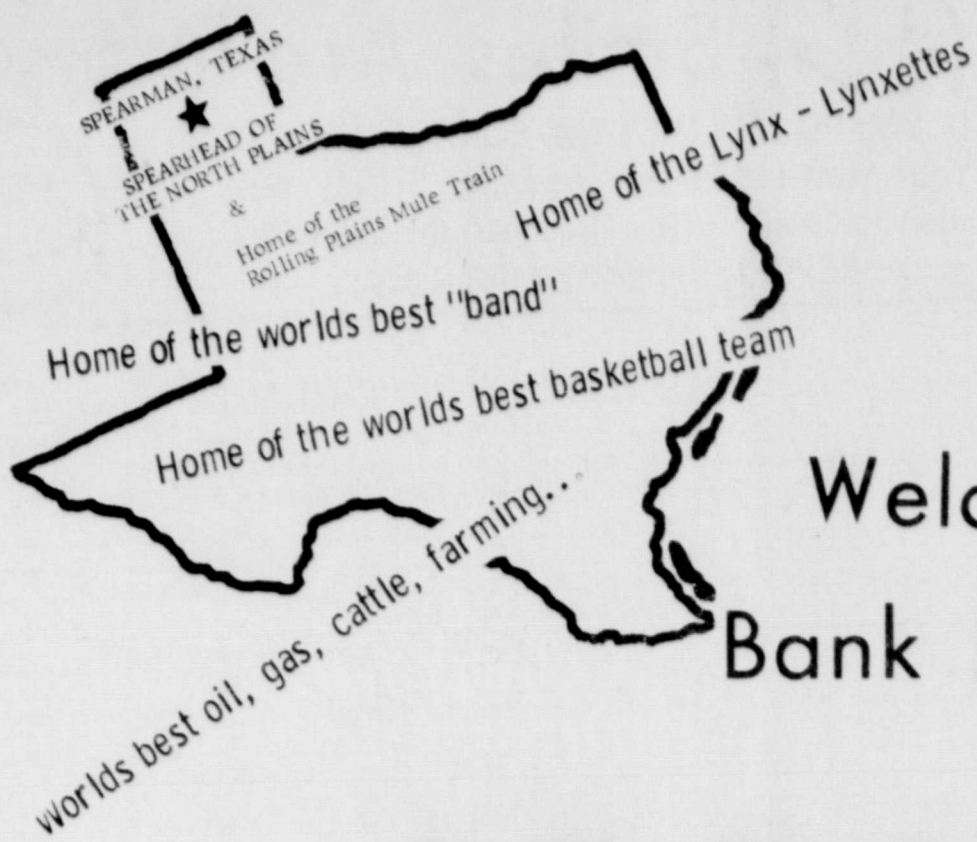
