By using the registration form, clerks at the tax office will need only to receive the fee, affix to the application a sticker showing the registration number and other data, and hand over the 1972 license

Persons who have changed vehicles during the past year should check the registration form mailed by the state, to make sure the renewal notice is for the new vehicle. If it is not for the car currently owned, you are asked to de-stroy the form, as it will do

you no good.

If you do not have the correct renewal notice, vehicle owners are then asked to bring in their title and last year's license receipt when purchas-ing their 1972 tags.
