

Last-Minute Filings Boost Candidate's Ranks

New Spearman office of Perryton Savings & Loan opened this week.

COMMISSIONERS AND ATTORNEYS ARE CONTESTED

Late hour filing for Democratic and Republican primaries Monday afternoon added four candidates for County Commissioner, Precinct One; another candidate for the Commissioner's race for Precinct Three, and one more for the District Attorney office.

Marcus Larson, J.D., Wilbanks and Mrs. Mark (Frances) Nichols filed for the Democratic nomination for Hansford County Commissioner for Precinct One while A.E. (Junior) Lusby filed for this nomination in the Republican primary.

These four Spearman citizens are opposing Joe Day, who filed earlier for reelection on the Democratic ballot.

County Commissioner's Precinct Three post, now held by B.W. Renner who is seeking re-election, has a new candidate on the Republican ticket. He is Leon Red of Gruver.

Spearman Attorney Mark Nichols filed for the Democratic nomination for District Attorney, opposing another local attorney Richard (Dick) Counts, Robert Gallaway, who has held this post for several years, did not seek re-election.

One other contested race of interest to Hansford County voters is the one between J.E. (Chunky) Blackburn and Billy Britt Jarvis who have both filed for the Democratic nomination for Hansford County Attorney. T.D. Sansing holds this office now, but did not file for re-election.

Persons who wish to vote in the Democratic or Republican primary elections, must have registered to vote at least 30 days prior to the May 6 election date. In other words, if you have not registered at the county tax office in the courthouse before April 5--you will not be eligible.

Nichols Announces For D.A. Office



Mark Nichols, a Spearman attorney, has authorized the Spearman Reporter to announce his candidacy for the office of District Attorney. He filed Friday afternoon for the Democratic nomination and will be running for the office which will be vacated by attorney Robert Gallaway of Borger. Mark stated he will continue to practice in Spearman, if elected.

In announcing his candidacy Mark Nichols said, "I feel we have been on the defensive in the matter of crime and the criminal's attitude long enough. Here in Spearman we have a drug problem which must be faced. I advocate a vigorous prosecution of the pusher of drugs and the hardened criminal. It is time we start demanding our rights against the radical and criminal. A good deterrent would be crime prevention through education. We need to go into our schools and teach our children of the hazards and penalties that result when we violate the laws of the land."

A U.S. Army veteran, Mr. Nichols taught school in San Antonio for four years while attending St. Mary's School of Law at night. A 1962 graduate of WTSU, he is married to Frances Nichols. The couple, who have resided 2 1/2 years in Spearman, have two children.


Mr. Lusby is a Rotarian and is active in the Spearman Chamber of Commerce.

County hospital in 1971 was in excess of \$309,000.00. A commissioner needs to be responsive to the various needs of the County in which he works, this is what I intend to do if elected to represent Spearman on the County Commission.

I feel we need a county barn for our FFA boys and their livestock, a barn that would be suitable for multiple county functions such as a county fair or a fat stock show. Our county employees need to be covered by workman's compensation, not only to cover their own medical expenses but to protect the county from a possible law-suit that could cost thousands of dollars to the local taxpayers. Recent legislation has been passed that states the counties are no longer immune from such lawsuits.

HAPPY LYNX CATS WIN DISTRICT

LYNX WILL MEET CHILDRESS IN BI-DIST.



"Moose" Head hits 2 for the Happy Cats...

Spearman's fantastic Lynx captured the 1972 District Championship Tuesday night as they bombed the Phillips Blackhawks 62-47, before a capacity crowd at Lynx gym. The Lynx trailed 5-4 early in the first period, then added 5 quick points to take 10-4 lead, early in the 1st qtr. In the 2nd period the Lynx were in control most of the quarter and after 4 minutes of play, in the 2nd, they lead 22-13. Then with 2 min. left before halftime, they extended the lead to 28-15. As the second period came to a close, the Lynx went to the dressing room with a 34-19 lead.

In the first quarter, the Lynx scored 10 points, to Phillips 4. In the 2nd quarter, the Lynx hit 21 big points, and allowed Phillips only 15. This defense shut the Hawks completely down the first half.

The third quarter was very evenly matched, with the Lynx only out-scoring the Hawks by 2. The Lynx managed 13 points in the third, as the Hawks garnered 11, and the Lynx had a 44-30

lead as the third quarter ended.

The Blackhawks were determined to rally in the 4th, but the mighty Lynx were just "too hot to handle." The Lynx dominated the whole 4th period as they bucketed 18 big points, to put the game out of reach for the Blackhawks. The big gun for the Lynx was Ronnie "Moose" Head, who hit 19 points. Ronnie has a season point average per game of 15 pts. Ricky Driscoll hit 15 big pts, as Randy Schell dunked in 9 points. Mike Floyd and Jerry Fat Davis made 7 big points each, while Scott Beedy and Dee Vanderburg hit 2, and Gary Upchurch rounded out the scoring with 1 point for the Lynx. The Lynx now stand 21-10 for the season, and 8-1 in district play, with one game left at Boys Ranch, this Friday night. The Lynx will play Childress in bi-district.

The local fans would like to express their congratulations to the Lynx and Coach Allan Simpson. "BI-DISTRICT OR BUST."






Let Me See by Sybil

For a long time now, we citizens here in Spearman have demanded the best for our school kids. We want them to have the best education available; to have the best school facilities; the best proms & banquets; we want them to have the opportunity to go places, like Mexico City, Duncamville, Dallas, etc. And if the school board cannot find enough funds available to budget all these extras, we simply have pie suppers, bake sales, car washes, and what-not to raise the needed dollars.

All these extra curricular activities so prevalent in our school system might (one of these days) come to a screeching halt. Recent court decisions declaring it unconstitutional for one school district to raise and disburse money above the amount raised by other Texas districts could make for a giant leveling of all these opportunities now offered our youth. We have what is called a wealthy school district, and we could see the time when the State takes part of our money and sends it to other schools which cannot offer their children such luxuries. This "adjustment" will then be taken on the national level educationally. In the long run what they are up to is to see that every child in America be given equal opportunity to secure an education. If it ever gets down to brass tacks this is exactly

what will happen. When this time comes, you can bet that all our schools will be used for reading, writing & arithmetic. No games & fun—simply serious studying, 12 months per year. We won't be able to offer our kids anything outside of classroom studies...no trips to Enid for the band, no trips to Austin, nothing extra. Just an education.

All this has opened "Pandora's" box of troubles with the distribution of school funds on the state basis. It will be even worse when the attempt is made to provide equal opportunities for all children nationally!

Our school system hasn't always been able to provide so lavishly for students. In 1944 this school didn't have the money to hire a coach... can you imagine? The Spearman Lions Club talked Paul Robertson in to coaching that year and paid his salary for doing it. We had a whale of a good band and George Buzzard put benches in the back of his cattle truck and drove it to Enid so the band students could participate in the festival. I think the late Marion Glover helped George out with this project.

So...times change. Sometimes from bad to good, sometimes from bad to worse. I guess whatever the future holds, we can roll with the punches as well as the rest of the world.
