Most of the day Monday was taken up by the Commissioners in discussing this pressing matter, and the Court is studying the situation, according to Judge Johnnie Lee.

Lee said the Court definitely decided that in view of the fact there are private citizens in the county who wish to build pens and dipping vats for economic enterprise purposes, the County would not plan to build such facilities.

County Commissioners want to see the cattle scabies situation in the county conquered. but the Court coesn't especially want to see the "county go into

Lee said the Court came up with some rough figures Monday as to what this project might cost the County. "We would have to build facilities in Spearman and in Gruver. We would have to buy land, build pens and vats, hire full time employees to service both places, and keep up maintenance of such facilities for years to come. All this would amount to at least \$40,000." Judge Lee

The County would have to charge cattlemen for use of these facilities, the service would not be free just because it was county owned, the spokes man said, so "why should the County build these facilities when there are individuals here who want to build dipping vats and maintain them as a public

Commissioners said they certainly did want to help the cattlemen in this county, because there is no question that these men are the backbone of our economy in this county. They do not feel, however, that the scables situation is bad enough here but what it can be handled

by private enterprise.

Joel Lee Lackey, Federal Inspector, and Jerry Floyd, State Inspector, have been checking

county. Lackey said Tuesday that they have found scabies in two feedlots in this county and both are now under quarantine. Lackey said these feedlot cattle found with scabies came from various places -- some came

from right here in Hansford County--some came from out of state, and some from other areas in the State of Texas. Lackey went on to say that

they had found no scabies "in the country" -- that is cattle on the ranches or on wheat pasture. Floyd is busy helping with dipping procedures, and Lackey has not had time to do any inspection of herds. His time is taken up in inspection of cattle movements--either from the cattle dipping business", ac- one field to another, or cattle cording to Judge Lee. being shipped out of state. These men expect to inspect more cattle in the next 30 days, "and then we will know more about current situation

of scabies, " Lackey said.

In searching for a word to describe the current scabies situation in Hansford County, Lack-ey finally said it could be termed "serious". "If they come up with a set date for dipping requirements, and we don't have dipping vats available, I would say our situation here is serious, Lackey explained. He said he felt there were more cattle in Hansford County at this time than there ever had been in its

There is no question that cattle play a major role in the economy of Hansford County-and the scabies mite can certainly make a big dent in that

The State office asked to be advised as soon as dipping facilities are available for cattle-

"New Option" Farm Program Explained

18th District Congressman Bob Price this week issued the following statement concerning the recent decision to allow farmers a new option under the 1972 feed grain

grain program. "I am pleased that Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz this week has made the decision to allow farmers a new option under the 1972 feed Grain program which will mean larger payments to them for set aside of feed grain acreage. Under the new option, grain producers after setting aside the 25 percent of their feed grain base to qualify them will be able to earn an increased payment of 76 cents per bushel on grain sorghum (80 cents per bushe! for corn) on an additional 10 percent set aside of their base. To qualify for the higher payment rate under this new

provision, the producer will

agree that for each acre of ad-

ditional set aside, his 1972 plantings of corn-grain sorghum will be reduced by two acres below his 1971 corn-grain sorghum acreage. Thus, one acre would be set aside and held out of all production and the second acre would be held out of corn-grain sorghum pro-duction but could be planted to any crop not subject to other program restrictions. In addition, producers may offer an additional 5 percent of their corn-grain sorghum base at the same rate which may be accepted at the option of the Secretary, However, there is no extra option for barley

producers. In another announcement, the Agriculture Department will permit winter wheat producers to revise their Federal Crop Insurance Corporation coverage and reduce premiums to paid by producers who parti-cipate in the additional set LYNXETTES ARE REGIONAL BOUND.....

Sansing Not Running

T.D. (Touchdown) Sansing. who has served as county attorney in Hansford County off and on for about 18 years, is not going to be a candidate for

public office this year. He stated that he was appointed county attorney by the commissioners court in 1938, and began duties in October. continuously by election until December 31, 1951. He was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of James P. Linn in 1966, and entered upon duties in July. He was elected to the term that he is now serving. He will have been County Attorney for 18 years, at the end of

the present tenure of office. T.D. recalls how times and conditions have changed over the many years in the county. He was the only lawyer in the county from 1938 until 1950; now there are five. One year during the forties, only 11 complaints were processed through his office, including traffic violations. Now, his office may file one half this many complaints in a day, and even more in two days. Many court sessions during the forties. Judge Allen would impanel the grand jury and dismiss them immediately, as there were no criminal matters to be considered. Now, Judge Boyer may take several days during a regular term of court to try criminal cases, and often reconvenes the grand jury during term re-cess to consider violations. He also quite often tries criminal Contrary to what many have heard, or read, drugs are not the big problem in this county. Liquor law violations are at least 10 times the drug viola-

tions. Most cases filed in county court have to do with liquor violations, "hot checks" and domestic matters.

T.D. reminds the public. that he appreciated the confidence and trust placed in him, and of having had the opportunity to serve the people of this county. He did not seek re-election, as he deemed 18 years were enough for him to serve, and that a young lawyer should have the opportunity to serve and acquire the experience afforded by the office. He stated that his association with the district and county officials, and county employees has been most pleasant.

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

United Parcel Service Now Covers All Texas

Service, a national delivery company, has announced that it will expand its interstate service throughout Texas on February 7, linking the entire state with a major portion of the country. The extension of service

will link Texas shippers and receivers to a package delivery network covering 34 other states, plus the District of Columbia. This package service area encompasses all states east of the Mississippi River, the entire states of Minnesota. Iowa, Louisiana, North Dakota and South Dakota, and parts of three states: Arkansas, with the exception of a narrow strip along the northwestern and western borders of the state, northern Nebraska and eastern Missouri.

DALLAS, TEX. -- United Parcel United Parcel Service has been providing its service within the commercial zones of Dallas-Ft. Worth since September, 1970; in the Houston commercial zone since April, 1971, and on an inter-state basis for eastern Texas shippers since last October. The company handles packages that weigh up to 50 pounds and have a maximum combined

length and girth of 108 inches. The new delivery service is being instituted as a result of a grant of authority from the Interstate Commerce Commission.. United Parcel Service has applications pending for additional operating authority which, if granted and fully implemented, would permit Texas shippers to reach states to the west as well.

United Parcel Service has

been in the package delivery business since 1907 and presently offers its service in 40 entire states and parts of six others. The company provides pickup, transportation and delivery of packages at rates comparable to those for unin-

sured parcel post.
In order to provide this expanded service to any address in Texas, United Parcel Ser-vice will have approximately 900 employees and 400 vehicles operating from its facilities located in Abilene, Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Bryan, Corous Christi, Dallas, Del Rio, El Paso, Ft. Worth, Harlingen, Houston, Lardio, Lubbock, Lufkin, Odessa, San Angelo, San Antonio, Sulphur Springs, Texas City, Tyler, Victoria, Waco and Wichita Falls.

United Parcel Service provides shippers and their receivers with a number of unique service features. including:

A driver calls at a shipper's place of business each day to pick up packages. For a small

weekly service charge he appears automatically without regard to the size of the shipper's business or the volume of packages that can be expected

from the account. Deliveries are made directly to the premises of the consignee whether he is located on the upper floor of an office building or at street level, or whether he is within a city or in a rural area away from any city

or community.

If for any reason a delivery cannot be completed on the first call, the driver will make a second, and if necessary, a third attempt at delivery without extra charge. All packages sent via Unit-ed Parcel Service are protected automatically for up to \$100 against loss or damage without extra charge. Additional protection can be purchased at a nominal cost.

Signatures are obtained for each package delivered and specially designed records will per-

mit prompt answering of queries about delivery of a package. United Parcel Service provides an address search service to minimize delivery delays for

incorrectly addressed parcels, and also offers a C.O.D. service. All drivers are neatly uniformed and delivery vehicles are maintained at high levels of appearance. It is company policy to wash or clean each vehicle daily and to repaint vehicles at regular intervals. It also means the shelf life, or keeping time for spices is increased. you are in doubt about the potency of spices on your shelf makes a simple test. Rub a small amount between your fingers to crush the spice. If it is still good it will have the appropriate smell. Unless you ise herbs and spices frequently
