

Missionary To Congo Speaks Here Sunday

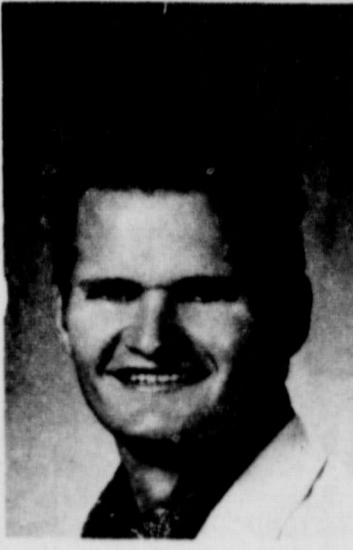
Rev. Don Wirsdorfer, pastor of Spearman's First Christian Church, announced this week that a pair of missionaries to the Congo will be guests of the church Sunday March 12.

Mr. and Mrs. Donald R. Angle will speak at the church school hour. He will bring the message at the regular worship hour, following which a covered dish luncheon will be served. Slides will be shown following the meal.

Mr. and Mrs. Donald R. Angle, graduates of Phillips University at Enid, Okla., studied French at the Institute of Languages of Yale University and spent a year in orientation studies at Kennedy school of Missions in Hartford, Conn. They received the required courses in the Colonial School in Brussels, Belgium, and language study and a period of organization at Mondombe in the Congo. In 1959 they went to Mondombe where Mr. Angle helped train lay evangelists for village churches. Later in London he served as an adviser to the schools. Mrs. Angle was a teacher in the primary schools during this time.

During a furlough to the United States, both Mr. and Mrs. Angle studied again at Phillips University where he received his B. D. degree and she her M. E. degree.

In 1967 the family returned to the Congo and were assigned to Mbandaka. Mrs. Angle



is giving full time to the school there. Mr. Angle is involved in agricultural experimental farming, using the only tractor in the area. He plants and takes to market vegetables of different varieties, trying to encourage better diets for the Congolese people.

Mr. and Mrs. Angle have two sons, Donald Jr. and Robert.

Pastor Wirsdorfer said "we invite everyone to come and share with us the exciting work of our Lord being done in the Congo by the Angles, and many more missionaries who are so dedicated."

DAVID P. TICE DIES AT AGE OF 101 YEARS

David Perry Tice died in a hospital in Corpus Christi, Texas Sunday, February 27 at the age of 101.

A native of Howell County, Mo., Tice moved to Hollis, Okla. in the 1890's and established a homestead in what was then the Oklahoma Territory. He worked as a rancher and farmer for many years and was responsible for shipping the first load of cattle from Hollis to Kansas City aboard the Wichita & Northwestern Railroad.

Tice and his wife moved to Spearman, Texas in 1926 and built a hotel which they owned and managed for 18 years. He retired in 1944 and moved to Corpus Christi, Mrs. Tice died in 1947.

Funeral services were held Feb. 29 in a funeral chapel in Corpus.

Survivors include three daughters: Mrs. Joe P. Combs of Siloam Springs, Ark., M. S. Jay Gould of Cayucos, Calif., and Mrs. Robert Sewell of Huntsville, Ark.; 28 grandchildren, 38 great-grandchildren and 8 great-great-grandchildren.

Kite Flying Safety

"No Metal" is the key for safety in kite flying--meaning "no metal in the kite, no metal in the kite string, and no metal in the air (in the form of electric wires) near where the kite is being flown."

This is the advice offered to kite-flyers--young and old--by C. D. Riggins, Spearman manager for Community Public Service Company.

Other safety tips: keep the kite string dry and don't fly your kite on rainy days, avoid busy streets and highways, and stay away from TV antennae.

"If your kite does get snagged on a power line," Riggins stressed, "don't try to climb up and get it down. Call the CPS officer for help."

The kite-flying safety rules are being publicized in posters for school bulleting boards, and in newspaper ads, both sponsored by the power company.

Runaway Found Here

Police Chief Leland Wood reported this week that his office had cleared up a "runaway" case for the Dimmitt police in the arrest of Danny Darden of Spearman and Hans Walter Engelhardt of Stinnett.

Darden was stopped in Spearman on a traffic violation and in a routine check with other passengers in the vehicle driven by the 17-year old Spearman youth, found the girl, 14 years of age, was listed as a "runaway" being sought by Dimmitt authorities.

Spearman police officials held all three teenagers in custody. The girl's mother picked her up and later authorities picked up the lads and transported them to Dimmitt where charges will be filed against them.

Aid To Small Communities Outlined Here Monday

Solid waste disposal, emergency medical services and recreation programs for small towns were reviewed by state and federal officials by the City of Spearman.

The officials spoke to about 50 area city and county representatives at the all day meeting held in the First Methodist Church. Over 100 business men of Spearman met for the noon luncheon when Fritz Lanham, executive director of the Texas Department of Community Affairs spoke. Lanham explained this state agency and said its purpose was to "assist local governments in providing essential public services for their citizens and to overcome financial, social and environmental problems."

"One of the major problems of the small town is the loss of population--migration to the large metropolitan centers," Lanham said. He went on to say that the main reason for people moving from one area to another was "economic"---there's a need for jobs, decent housing, educational opportunities, leisure time activities adequate health care--and so on.

This state spokesman said a lot of these problems must be solved by responsive local governments, with the help of organizations such as Rotary and Lions Clubs and individual citizens, and that the state and federal governments can supplement local efforts to meet the needs of people.

David L. Houston, chief of the Environmental development Program with the State Health department spoke during the all-day session on solid waste disposal. In a waste management survey made by his department, Houston said he can commend most of the cities in the state for their collection, but not for their disposal.

Darce Foshee, city manager, showed slides of Spearman's success at going from can container to the current trash collection system, and revealed how the city was able to cut labor costs 61 percent by converting to this type of container system.

William E. Lawson, chief of the community program's Farmers Home Administration outlined sources the cities and counties could go for assistance. Bert Crowson, program supervisor for the Civil Defense and Traffic Safety Segment of the



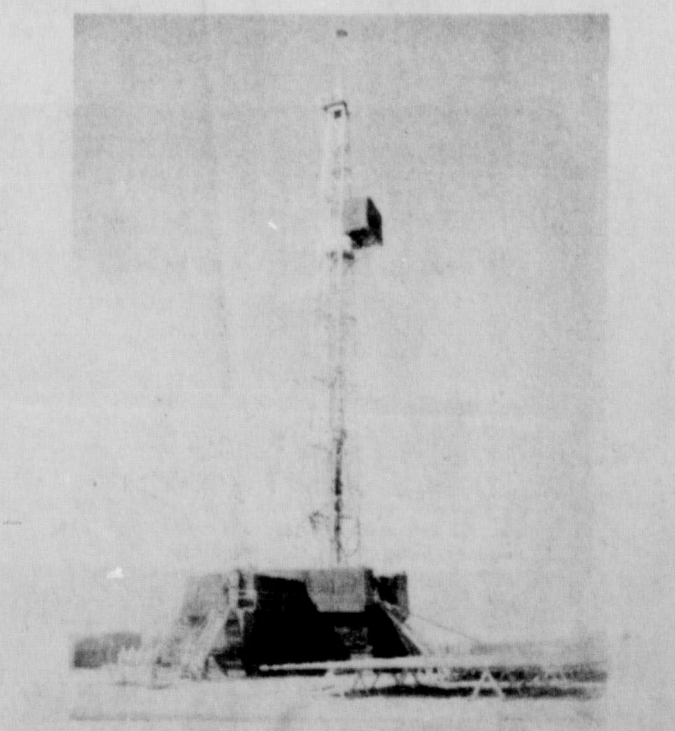

State Health Department, outlined emergency medical services particularly applicable to the Panhandle area.

He said the health department is suggesting all hospitals in the state install two-way radio communication systems

to be used in case phones go out as well as on a day to day basis for transferrals.

The Community Development seminar concluded at 2:20 with a panel discussion, moderated by B. R. Fuller, Texas department of Community affairs.

At the conclusion of the ceremony a reception was held in Fellowship Hall of the First Baptist Church.

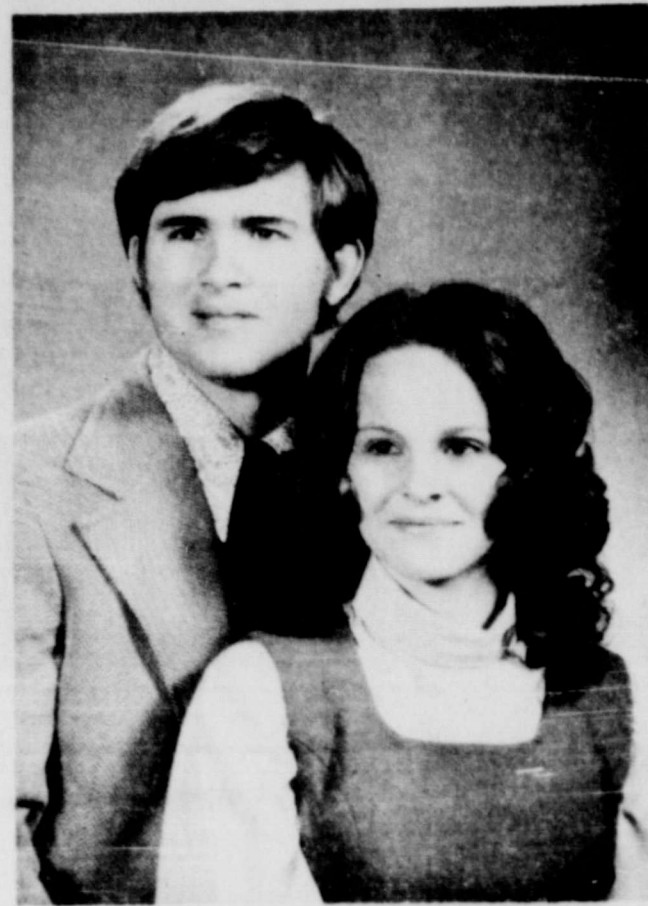
The serving table was laid with a white cloth. A large yellow bow trimmed the table. Centering the table was an arrangement of yellow and white daisies.

The doctors have a way of checking your arteries and can tell how badly that the arteries are stopped up. After they check on your arteries they will then operate on the patient according to how badly the arteries are stopped up. That is, they are getting so accurate with their check-ups, that they can just about predict how many days you have to live, if the stopped up arteries are not replaced. Then, after they get you on the operating table, about 15 to 18 inches of artery is taken out of your leg (about the thigh), and then transplanted to the heart region. Several local people have had this operation and it is very successful. Now, this is different from open heart surgery. Open heart surgery, and transplant is another deal. Did you hear about the local man that was getting ready for a heart transplant, and they gave him a choice of a heart from a minister, a working man, or a banker. Of course, the patient took the heart of the banker, as it was as good as new, having "never been used".

Let Me See
by Sybil...

It is a fact easily ascertained by observation that people who live to be 70, 80 or 90 years of age have not been of the weal-

thier classes. People who live what is called high life, eat late and highly seasoned suppers, champagne and midnight banquets seldom reach that era of life known as old age. The persons who live to old age have never sown many wild oats in youth, they have lived a steady and regular life, eating plain food and retired without allowing the cares of the day to interrupt their rest or sleep. Highly seasoned food and luxuries of any kind always tend to excesses which produce premature decay.

So states the "Household Guide" printed in 1897. The old book, containing all sorts of "practical rules and receipts", also says this about a new diagnosis called heart failure: "for some years past, reported deaths from "Heart failure" have become frequent and fashionable among practicing physicians. These reports, in nine out of ten cases, probably have not been heart failure at all, but death has been brought on by an ineffectual effort of the stomach or eliminatory tract to cast off indigestible matter clogging the

way, caused by excesses of over eating."

It gives many more causes of premature deaths, and suggests the methodical use of cold water as a beverage between meals to be very conducive to health and increase the chances of long life!

But the main remedy to everything which ails you... seems to be hard work, cleanliness, good eating habits which help "keep the bowels open."

Practical rules for bathing are as follows: Bathe at least once a week. Never bathe within 2 hours after eating. It injures digestion. Never bathe when the body or mind is much exhausted. It checks healthful circulation. There are different kinds of baths: sulphur bath, salt bath, vapor bath, hot-air bath, sponge bath, foot bath, sitz bath and acid bath. The latter is done with vinegar water, an excellent remedy for disorders of the liver.

Home remedies for the back are numerous (and hilarious). Onion cures the earache quicker than any other remedy. Lay thick slices of onion on a cloth and heat until hot. Bind this to the head, letting it extend beyond each ear all the way around. When the digestive system is apt to become overloaded with rich, greasy or sweet foods, eat plenty of onions as a counterbalance. They are good for the stomach, complexion and nerves. And to overcome the unpleasant onion-breath odor, eat a small sprig of parsley. There will be nothing in the breath or about the person at all suggestive of the odoriferous bulb five minutes after parsley is eaten.

A teaspoon of red pepper mixed with molasses and taken in one dose is considered one of the best remedies for delirium tremens.

How to cure nightmare: Nightmares are probably the result of indigestion, late suppers, too much excitement or hard thinking. Avoid the causes, eat light suppers, and sleep with another person.

Home remedies for sleeplessness: lie with the head to the North, for there is no doubt something in the electrical effects of the earth upon the body when in this position.

A cure for headaches: mix a tablespoonful of cayenne pepper & vinegar to a thick paste--eat a pinch of this mixture and spread the rest of it on your forehead. The plaster will burn. (and, I guess, make you forget where you hurt.)

Another cure for a nervous headache is the simple act of walking backward, according to the MEDICAL RECORD. Get in a long, narrow room, where the windows are high, and walk very slowly backward. The best preventive for headache is "keep the bowels open."

The BEST REMEDY for the common cold is, not to take cold at all! Colds, so-called are all poisonings, when the nerves of the skin are shocked and its excretory functions are arrested. "Keep the bowels open and take doses of oil, cod-liver oil, skunk's oil, goose grease and many other sorts. These have been found to help certain persons when suffering from colds; but not all. It is probably a question of digesting them. The BEST cure for the common cold is the juice of a ripe lemon. This is squeezed into the hand and sniffed well up the nose, two or three times a day.

The dandelion is recommended for biliousness, chronic inflammation of the liver, constipation and coughs. Collect the roots, make a strong infusion and drink the extract freely 2 or three times a day. This may cause diarrhea. But if it does, this can be cured by taking some oil of cinnamon...

And there are many more interesting and note-worthy suggestions throughout this book, whose title page bears this verse:

Health and the simplest fare. If thou hast these, Accompanied with one single steadfast friend--A conscience which thou dost not fear to bear--Go thou thy way; thou art an emperor.

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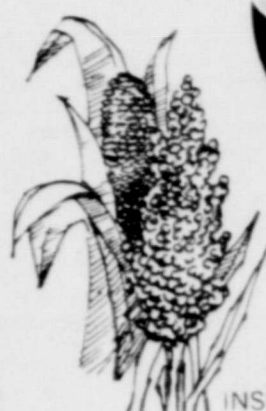


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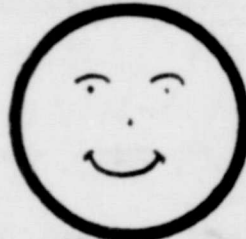
