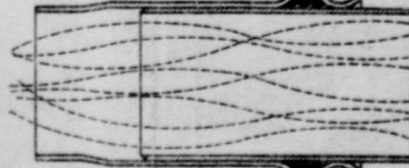

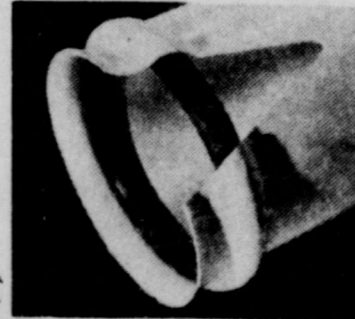

# Pringle, Spearman To Vote On Consolidation

Judge Johnnie C. ... Junior High School when qualified voters in the Spearman School District will vote on

the issue of consolidating the Pringle School District into the Spearman district.

The Pringle School district had petitioned the Spearman district to call such an election. Enough local people signed petitions here last week for the county judge to get the legal wheels in motion.

On the same date, April 22, Pringle school district residents will vote whether or not they wish to consolidate.

The Pringle District is made up of some 200 square miles of territory located in Hutchinson County, on the border of Hansford County. If consolidated into the Spearman School district, taxes would of course be paid into the Spearman district.

Both elections, the one in Spearman and the one in Pringle, must carry in order for the consolidation to come about.

Judge Lee said today concerning the election, "we in the Spearman district hope the election does carry--not especially because it will help Spearman tax-wise, but we simply welcome Pringle school students to attend our schools if this is their wish."

Any qualified voter is eligible to vote in this election which is set for Saturday, April 22 between the hours of 8 a. m. and 7 p. m.

### PLANNING THE EASTER MEAL

COLLEGE STATION--"Easter Sunday is one of the busiest and most joyous days of the year," noted Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "It's a time shared with friends as well as family."

"After the children's early morning Easter egg hunt, Mother must take over. It's her job to make festive meals that run smoothly and are enjoyable."

The Houston consumer marketing specialist suggested that instead of the traditional Easter dinner, you might prefer to surprise the family with a "sunrise brunch." A menu of fresh strawberries, scrambled eggs over asparagus, baked ham, blueberry muffins, coffee and milk should please the oldest family member to the youngest.

"If you prefer a traditional Easter dinner, consider roast leg of lamb," the specialist said. "When roasted to perfection and gaily garnished, you have a roast fit for royalty."

It's a simple matter to roast the leg of lamb. Just place it with the skin side down on a rack in an open roasting pan. Then insert a roast meat thermometer into the center of the thickest part. Be certain that the bulb of the thermometer doesn't rest in fat or bone.

There's no guess work to know when the roast is done. The thermometer will register 175 degrees Fahrenheit for medium done; 180 for well-done lamb.

For that golden-brown appearance always use a low oven temperature in roasting lamb. Set the oven regulator at 300 degrees Fahrenheit. Allow from 30 to 35 minutes per pound roasting time.

"When the roast comes from the oven allow it to 'set' in a warm place for 20 to 30 minutes," Mrs. Clyatt advised. "This makes it easier to carve."

Sunday School Lesson for April 2, 1972

### Supernatural Power

I'm tired of trying to convince people that Jesus came back to life after being dead and buried three days.

He did. The facts are available and rational explanations have been given for all of the objections that people have been raising (thinking they are new discoveries) for the past 19 centuries. Few of the people who say they cannot believe because of intellectual difficulties ever make any real effort to investigate the question.

They wouldn't believe if Jesus came back and told them, Himself.

#### Unbelievable Power

In fact, Jesus told a story about this: A rich man for years neglected a beggar named Lazarus. After they both died, the rich man in hell saw Lazarus with Abraham in paradise. He asked Abraham, "I beg, father, that you send him to my father's house--for I have five brothers--that he may warn them lest they also come to this place of torment. . . . If someone goes to them from the dead they will repent."

But Abraham replied, "If they do not listen to Moses and the prophets neither will they be persuaded if someone rises from the dead."

Is there any evidence that could convince someone against his will? I think not. At least, not until he dies and enters the spiritual world and finds out the truth. That is, not until it is too late.

When Jesus died and returned to life, Matthew recorded that "the tombs were opened; and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised; and having come out of the tombs, his

resurrection, they entered the holy city (Jerusalem) and appeared to many."

People who didn't want to believe probably found ways to explain them away. Just as determined unbelievers today would explain away, if they knew about it, the evidence of Christians who have been raised from the dead in Indonesia in this decade.

#### Believable Power

They might accept astrology ("Oh, I don't believe it, but I read my horoscope just in case"). Or witchcraft, or prophetic powers. But Christian supernaturalism? No.

There are several reasons:

(1) Non-Christians' spiritual powers are better publicized. This is partly because Christians are afraid of offending other believers by acknowledging the evidences of God's supernatural power which they have experienced.

(2) Non-Christians' spiritual powers can be used by people for their own benefit, while God's powers are used by people only for God's purposes. However, people who use demonic powers will have to face, like Dr. Faustus, Jesus' question: "What will a man give in exchange for his life?"

(3) Christian supernatural power needs some explanation and understanding. Satanic power is old, too. There is real power in both. But God's saves lives and Satan's destroys them.

This Sunday we celebrate God's power in Jesus' resurrection. His power is still operational for those who are willing to believe it.

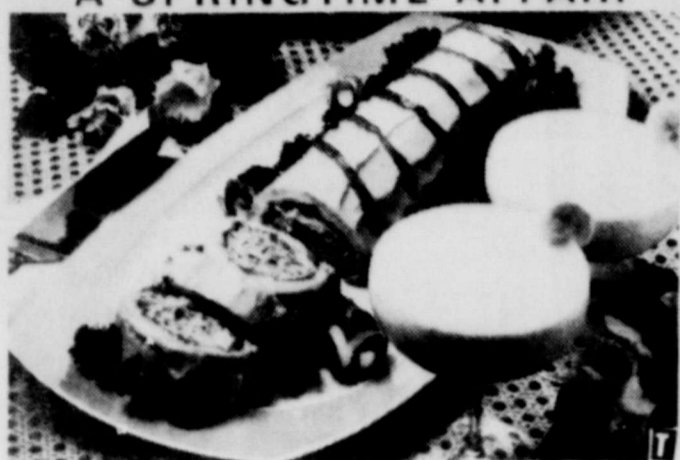

#### SAVORY HORS d'OEUVRE ROLL

- 4 eggs
- 1/2 cup sifted flour
- 1/4 cup butter
- 2 cups milk
- 1 teaspoon salt

Grease a shallow 10 x 15 inch pan and line with waxed paper. Grease and lightly flour. Preheat oven to 325°F. Separate eggs and beat yolks until slightly thickened. Melt butter in a heavy pan and stir in flour and salt. Add milk and cook, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil. Simmer for 1 minute, stirring. Remove from heat. Add a little of the hot mixture to beaten egg yolks and then stir back into pan. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into sauce. Spread mixture in prepared pan and bake about 40 minutes until golden brown. Turn out on waxed paper. Let cool to room temperature. Gently spread with ham filling (below). Roll up lengthwise, like a jelly roll. Spread top of ham roll with sour cream and sprinkle with chopped, toasted almonds.

#### HAM FILLING

- 4 cups ground cooked ham (about 1-1/2 lbs.)
- 1 cup sour cream
- 2 tablespoon Bourbon
- 1 tablespoon grated onion
- 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard

Combine ingredients and mix to blend well.

Participants in Earth Science may be from either junior or senior high. Students taking exams in physics and chemistry may use their own slide rule if they desire.

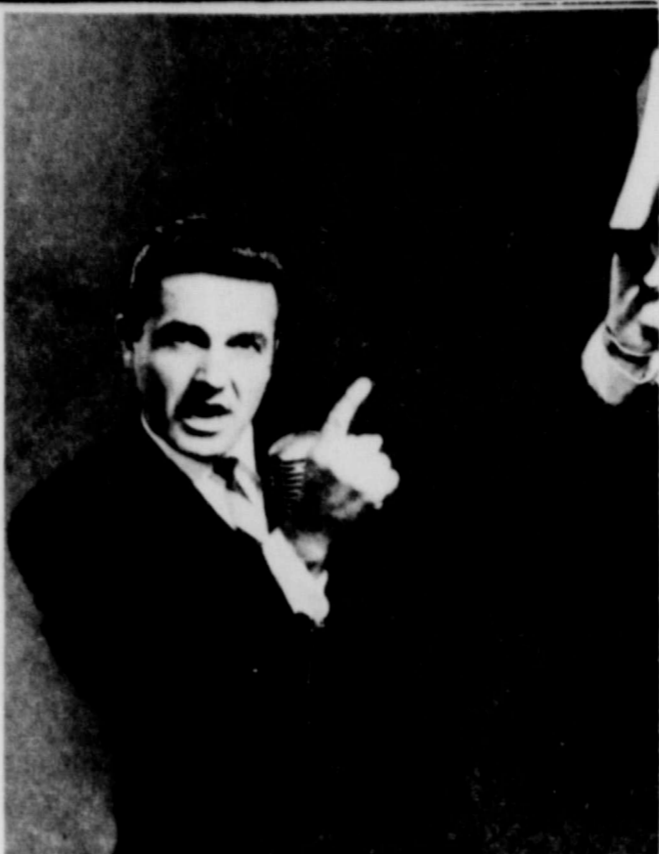

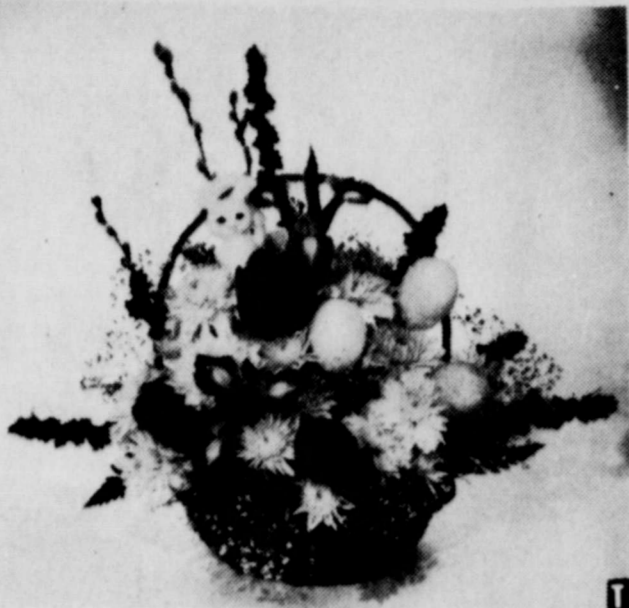

## news from your HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

There are different foods as-  
sociated with holidays that have  
become a tradition. Easter is  
the holiday that often makes us  
think of ham. If you are an East-  
er ham cook you might like to  
try this variation of the tradi-  
tional ham glaze. Mix a 6 oz.  
can of frozen orange juice con-  
centrate, 1 1/4 cup firmly  
packed brown sugar and 1/2  
cup steak sauce. Place your  
ham fat side up on a piece of  
foil in a baking pan. Pour 1/2  
the sauce over the ham, wrap  
loosely and bake at 350 F. for  
10-15 minutes per pound (of  
pre-cooked ham). About 30  
minutes before serving open  
the foil, add remaining sauce  
and bake at 400 F. with foil  
open. Baste frequently with the  
sauce.

We've seen some attractive  
and interesting Easter decora-  
tions in homes we've visited  
lately. These include egg shap-  
ed candles, blown shells decora-  
ted to make a rabbit family  
through the addition of colored  
paper and egg shell baskets.  
Something we are using include  
blown egg shells covered with  
silver cake decorating dragees

time but it sure is fun to do.  
The hardest part of the task for  
me is to blow the shells. Other  
ideas for egg decorations in-

## Fairly Free Private Enterprise

Curbside flower vendors be-  
came so numerous in a certain  
community that the regular  
florists began to complain about  
the competition. Finally, the city  
council passed a tough licensing  
law aimed at knocking the street  
vendors out of business.



But when the new law was  
tested in court, it was held null  
and void. The court said the city  
simply had no power to regulate  
a business as harmless as selling  
flowers.

Private enterprise, while not  
wholly free, still has consider-  
able vitality. A city's "police  
power" does not include blanket  
authority over all kinds of busi-

ness activities, just because they  
happen to be within the city  
limits.

On the other hand, a city may  
indeed impose restraints on a  
business that has a real potential  
for harm.

Consider the case of a man  
who started a telephone answer-  
ing service. According to a city  
ordinance, he and his employees  
were supposed to submit to pho-  
tographing and fingerprinting.  
Challenging the ordinance, the  
man said it was unfair to "single  
us out."

But a court saw two ways in  
which a telephone answering  
service could be harmful:

1) by the misuse of confi-  
dential information about  
subscribers; and

2) by the encouragement of  
immoral activities.

Upholding the city's require-  
ments, the court said:

"There is a reasonable basis  
for distinguishing this type of  
business from others that are not  
regulated."

Another ordinance, covering  
private detectives, went still  
further. Under its terms, they  
had to put up a special bond and  
get a character clearance from  
the police department.

But again, a court decided  
there were enough possibilities  
for mischief in this line of work  
to justify the city in taking pre-  
cautions. As one judge put it:

"A statute to promote the pub-  
lic safety is valid, although it  
may interfere with individual  
freedom. Individual freedom  
must yield to the public good."

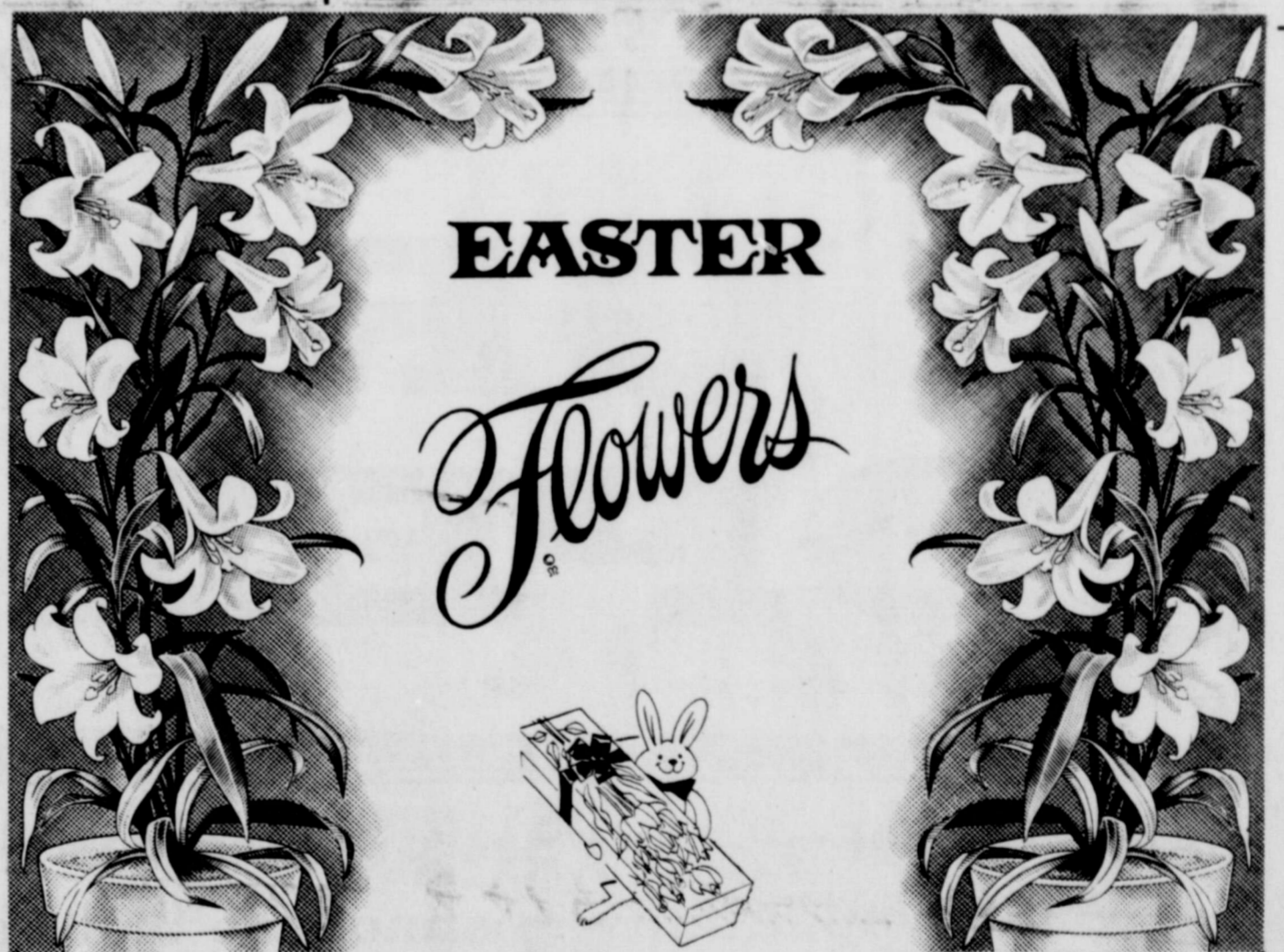
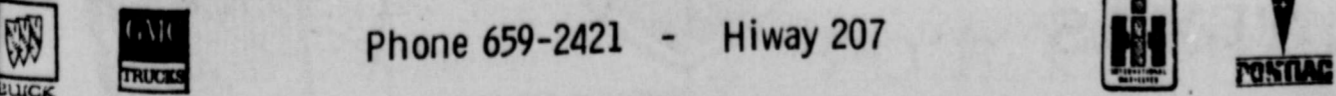

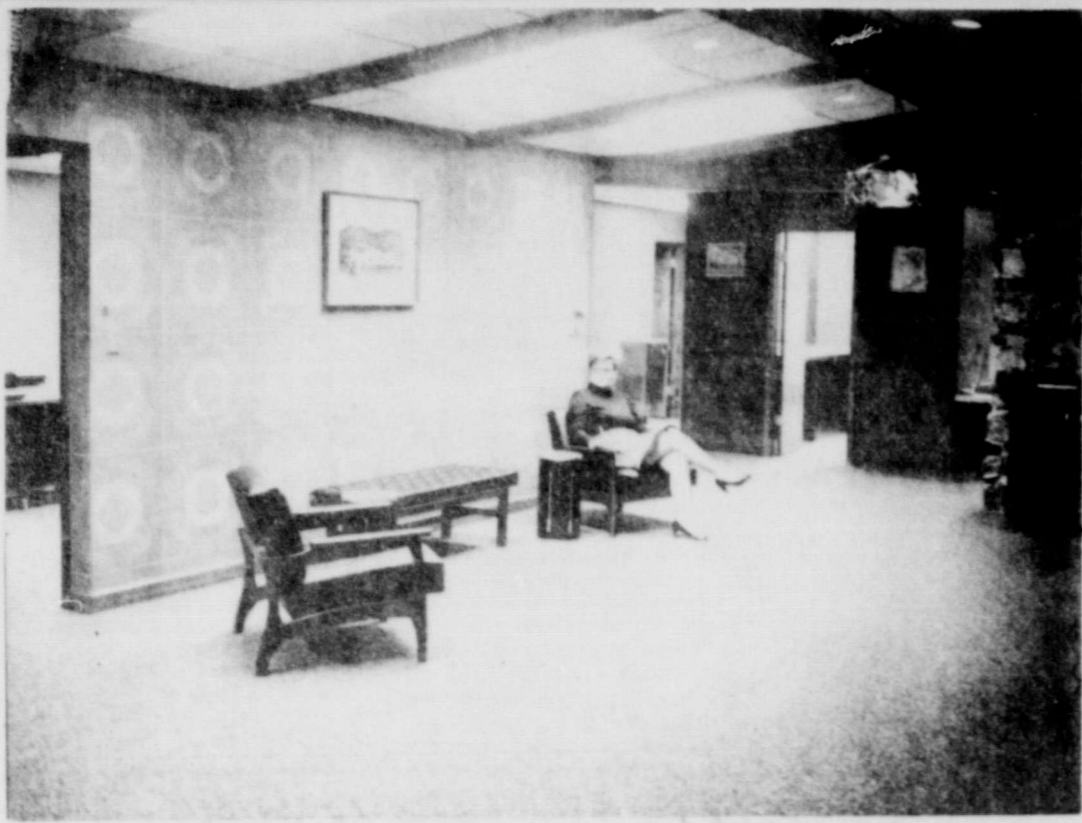

# Cattle Scabies Quarantine Expanded

AMARILLO... The cattle scabies quarantine on 34 Texas Panhandle counties may possibly be expanded to nine more counties with stricter dipping requirements, according to Dr. Bill Clymer, Extension area entomologist at Amarillo.

- 1. are moving directly to slaughter;
- 2. are moving to slaughter through a livestock market;
- 3. are moving to a livestock market for sale and dipping prior to release;
- 4. are released from a livestock market to a dip point with an official permit;
- 5. are moving to an official dip point;
- 6. have been dipped within the past seven days;
- 7. are from a non-control area moving through the con-

- 8. are being moved by the same owner from one place to another within the quarantined area;
- 9. have been dipped within seven days from scabies-infected states with permit or with a permit to be dipped upon arrival;
- 10. are from a non-control area being moved into the control area for grazing.

"These new restrictions are being implemented in an effort to eradicate the scabies mite and prevent its spread to other areas," the entomologist concludes.

# Census Says County's Farms Total 439

Hansford county showed a total of 439 farms in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released by the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census, a part of the Department's Social and Economic Statistics Administration (SESA). In the last previous Census of Agriculture (1964) the number of farms reported in the county was 332. Of the county's total farms in 1969, 404 are reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agricultural products in the year, as compared with 280 in 1964. The report also shows average farm size in the county was 1,498.6 acres, and average value of these farms (lands and buildings) was \$286,896,000. Other figures from the report are: 1. Value of all farm products sold in 1969, \$38,599,127; in 1964, \$16,138,500. 2. Value of all crops sold in 1969, \$12,668,023; in 1964 \$8,163,792. 3. Value of all livestock, poultry and their products sold in 1969, \$25,931,104; in 1964 \$7,971,948. Reported for the first time in an agricultural census is information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of farms from which agricultural products totaling \$1,500 and over were sold. Including family farms using this type of business structure, 10 of the county's 32,500 and over farms are incorporated. Vanilla combined with almond is pistachio flavor.

# Local Taxpayers To Fork Up \$3,156,000

How much will Uncle Sam be collecting from Hansford County residents in income taxes on or before April 17th which is the day of reckoning this year? According to the government's calculations, it will be slightly more than was received from the local area a year ago, when it amounted to \$3,147,000. That is the estimate of what was turned in locally, as determined by a breakdown of the overall returns received throughout the State of Texas. The statewide total was \$4,495,000,000 the Treasury Department reports. Included in the amount is the portion of the tax collected via the withholding process. Despite the sluggishness of the economy during the last year, the budget makers in Washington expect the receipts this year to be slightly higher than last year's. The reasoning is that, despite the unusually high unemployment rate, the great mass of the working population was fully employed in 1971 and, for the most part, had bigger earnings than in 1970. Consequently, they will have larger taxes to pay. For others, who did not have steady employment, the taxes will be lower. On the basis of the figures it is calculated that residents of Hansford County have been contributing approximately 0.7 percent of the personal income taxes collected in the state. Just how much more the administration counts on receiving this year is indicated in the budget submitted to Congress in January. Nationally, it expects \$86.5 billion in such revenues, or only about \$ 00 million more than was collected in the past fiscal year. Taxpayers in the local area will be bearing their portion of this increase. Their payments next month will be close to \$3,156,000, it is estimated. The new budget presented by the Administration, projecting income and expense figures for the fiscal year

ending June 30, 1973, calls for individual income taxes of \$93.7 billion, which is \$7.4 billion more than this year. If Hansford County taxpayers are to produce their share of this rise and maintain their present standard of living, total income in the area will have to go up by about 8.6 percent during this fiscal year.
