BIG GAME IS THURSDAY NIGHT HERE

The Baker & Taylor Drilling Company will start soon to drill an Ellenburger wildcat for northern Hansford County. The test is scheduled by Sidwell Oil & Gas, Inc. of Pampa. This will be a re-entry and deepening of the former Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1 Gatlin. The old hole reached total depth of 6,830 feet in the Mississippian and was plugged as dry in 1964. Nearest deeper production is some 20 miles away and is in the St. Louis formation. Proposed depth for the re-entry is 9,100 feet. Location is spotted some 17 miles north of Spearman.

First place in the major league is up for grabs tonight (Thursday) as both the Dodgers and Indians, unbeaten this season, will battle at 7:30 p.m. The Dodgers, coached by Ronnie Burke and assisted by James Jackson, have a 2 win no loss record going into the game. The Dodgers season opener against the Jets was rained out. Last Thursday the Dodgers defeated the Yankees 13-6 and Monday night they clobbered the Astros 15-1. The Dodgers are a small but quick team and have a good chance to win the game tonight. Meanwhile the Indians, coached by Calvin Bodey, assisted by Bob Crawford, they are looking for the victory too. They now have a 3 win no loss record as they took their season opener against the Astros 10-3, also dropped the Jets Friday night 10-5 and the Yankees last Tuesday 18-5. The Indians are well experienced and have a good balanced club. While the Dodgers and Indians battle for first place, the Jets, coached by Bill Douglas and assisted by James Umphress, are in second and a close contender for the lead. They now stand with 1 win and 1 loss defeating the Astros but losing to the Indians. The Jets are an aggressive team and work hard. The Yankees, coached by Bobby Hohertz and Kenneth McKay, are in third this week with 1 win and 2 losses. They have lost to the Dodgers and the Indians, and defeated the Astros in the season opener 9-8 in a very well played game. The Yankees are stable in hitting and fielding. The Astros, coached by James Kenney and Daniel Smith are finding it hard going in the opening days. The Astros have yet to win a game as they now stand 0 win 4 losses. They will be looking for their first win next week when they meet the Yankees and the Dodgers. Complete standings will be in Sunday paper.

Sheriff Looking For Insurance Swindler

Springtime causes all sorts of things. The change of weather brings on changes in "fancies", new plans & ideas, etc. Atmospheric changes seem also to work on the minds of crooks, and swindlers who travel through the country this time of year with all sorts of schemes, hoping to beat the system and get something for nothing. These phones offer the unsuspecting public a big money saving deal on anything from tree trimming, house repairing jobs, roof paint, sets of books, etc. Practically for nothing! A typical swindle, but one with a new twist, happened last week to an elderly Gruver gentleman by a man posing as an insurance salesman. Mr. Karl Nielson, a longtime Gruver resident, opened his door to a man who said he

was Ed Byrd. His phony gimmick was to look over Karl's home and inspect it. Upon doing this he informed Mr. Nielson that he had kept his home in such good repair and so free of fire and lightning hazards that his insurance company wished to pay him \$10,000.00 as a dividend commission on his insurance. The phony insurance salesman then proceeded to write Nielson a check on Westbrook Enterprises, drawn on the First State Bank of Abilene, Tex., for this amount. He made this notation on the check: "dividend on insurance, lightning protection." The man then sat and visited awhile with Karl and informed him that for \$1,250.00 his company would write him a lifetime policy which would cover his property--for ever!

This sounded like a good deal to Nielson, so he wrote the imposter Ed Byrd a check for this amount. Byrd stopped by the First State Bank of Spearman to cash his check and was asked for some identification. He presented for identity a temporary permit for an Oklahoma driver's license (also probably phony). When the cashier stepped to the phone to call Mr. Nielson to make sure the check was legal, the suspect left the bank, check and driving permit with the cashier--and vanished. The check made to Mr. Nielson for \$10,000.00 of course was no good. Authorities in Abilene said blank checks had been stolen from Westbrook Enterprises. No money was lost in the deal, but Sheriff J. B. Cooke is investigating the would-be swindler.

Primary Election Saturday

Tuesday at 5 p.m. was the line to vote absentee ballot for the May 6 (Saturday) Democratic and Republican primary elections. If the number of absentee voters is any barometer for election day, turnout will probably be light. Only 704 voters voted absentee, 704 voters have registered in Hansford County. The number of persons eligible to vote in Tuesday's election in each precinct will be: Prec. 1, House 623; Prec. 2, Renland, 87; Prec. 3, Gruver Ranch, 149; Prec. 4, Gruver, 639; Prec. 7, Oslo, 76; Prec. 9, Morse, 10; Prec. 10, Spearman Junior School, 1065. Ballots will open promptly at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Saturday. Democrats will vote in the above named precincts. Republicans in Spearman will vote in the County auditor's office at the courthouse. Republicans who reside within precincts 2, 3 or 6 may cast their ballots at the Gruver Elevator. Those living in precincts 4 and 10 will vote at the Gruver school. Public ballots list the following candidates: John G. Baker for US Senator; Bob Baker for US Representative; James Angly Jr. for State Auditor; Jim Segrest for Rail Commissioner; Jack Hart for State Representative; Janet A. Hill for Member board of Education; A. E. (Junior) Lusby county commissioner, Precinct One and Leon Red for county commissioner, Precinct Two. Governor, Republicans will decide from a list of six candidates (one more than the Democrats list). These are John Hall, Henry C. (Hank) Crockett, Albert Bell Fay, Joseph Jenkins, B. Thomas McDaniel and David Reagan. The republican ballot also gives voters a chance to express their opinion FOR or AGAINST Daylight Saving Time (democrats do not have a choice.) The vote has no effect as law. 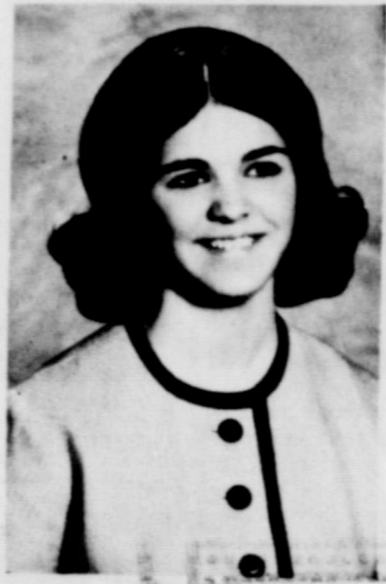

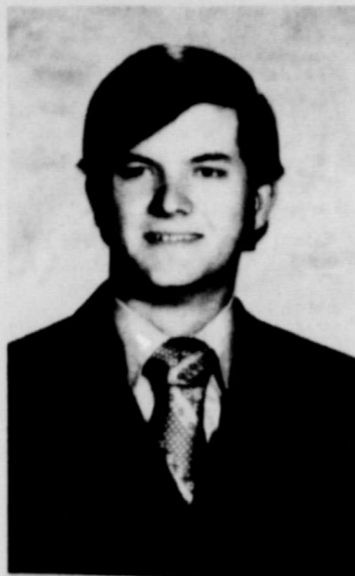
Rebekah Lodge Has Meeting

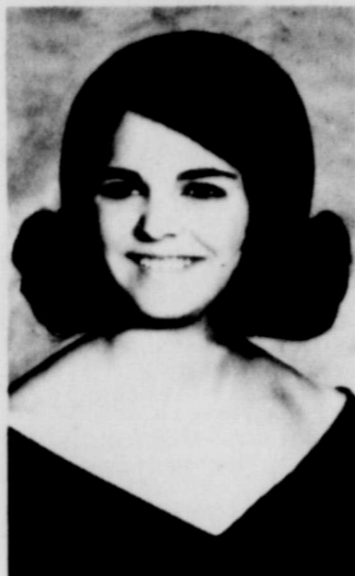

Let Me See by Sybil...

Did you know this nation had an official time keeper? It is a fact, I suppose there is an international timekeeper too. Anyway, this year will be a longer year than usual. One second longer. On June 30, an extra leap second will be

added to the world's master clocks to correct a discrepancy due to changes in the earth's rotation discovered in 1958 with the development of atomic clocks so accurate that it would take 50,000 years for one of them to gain or lose a single second. Since then, scientists say, the world's conventional clocks would have been off by at least 11 seconds except for relatively frequent corrections made by adding thousandths of a second to the time recorded on conventional master clocks. But with all the trouble I have remembering what month it is I keep forgetting to remember the little ditty of springing forward. Time is passing too fast to please me, so I'd really rather fall back. I take a dark view of DST no matter WHAT time it is. May it is already. Now THAT'S a pushy month for you. Local Schools Get Refunds

Austin--Attorney General Crawford Martin today announced recovery of almost \$700,000 from book publishers and distributors that allegedly conspired to fix the price of children's books sold to Texas schools and libraries.

General Martin said the most recent refund in Hansford County totals \$522,95 and goes to Morse, Spearman and Gruver Independent School Districts. Total recovery to date for these entities now amounts to \$956,34.

Martin said the most recent refund boosts Texas' total recovery to more than \$1.1 million in the past

year, and that more would be coming.

"In April, 1971, Texas recovered \$494,929 and we have now received an additional \$,76,216," Martin. "There will be one final refund coming next year."

The refund to Texas schools and libraries stems from settlement with the last of more than 30 Book Publishing and Distributing firms sued by Martin in antitrust litigation in 1968.

"As this alleged conspiracy was aimed right at the taxpayers," Martin said, "I'm delighted with

the chance to return the taxpayers their money."

Martin said his office is mailing out checks to 757 school districts and 189 public libraries on whose behalf the Attorney General originally filed the price-fixing suit.

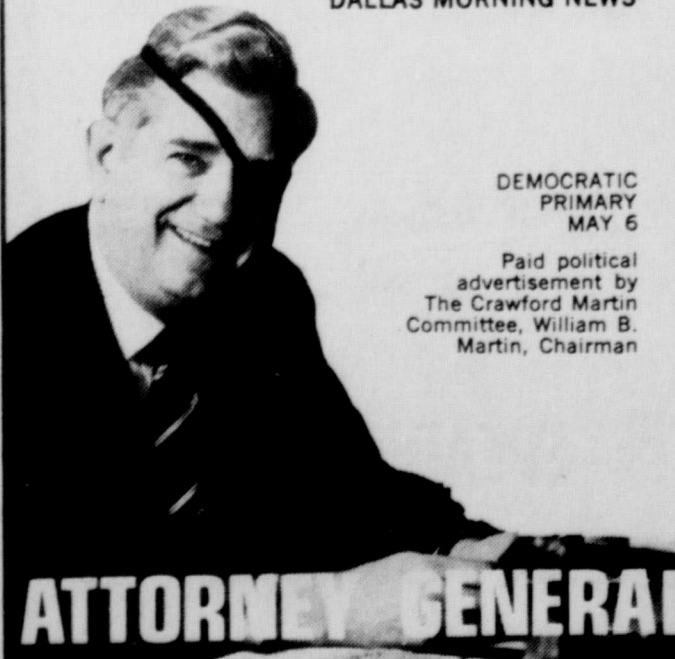
