

Voters Speak

Hansford County voters in today's primary elections, along with the rest of the state, are expected to vote in Austin.

At the time most voters tabulated all over the state, returns indicated an almost complete turnover in state's top officials. Unofficial returns showed congressional would have a slight edge if they carry run-offs and general election.

Three in Hansford County, of interest included the District Attorney, the County Clerk and the county commissioners of Precincts one through three.

Attorney Richard "Dick" Lusk, over-whelmingly defeated Mark Nichols for the District Attorney race. Hansford County voters gave Countess 1,053 votes and Nichols 1,037. Hutchinson county voted for Countess, 1760 for Nichols. Ochiltree county tabulated 1311 for Countess and 998 for Nichols.

Both Countess and Nichols practicing law in Spearman. Governor Preston Smith, two weeks ago, appointed Countess to fill the unexpired term left vacant by the death of District Attorney Ilob Haway. This term expires November 31 and Mr. Countess will then officially take the district office.

County Attorney J. E. Wilbanks, a partner in the law firm with Richard Lusk, defeated another Spearman lawyer Billy Britt 838 to 507 votes.

The only other contested race in this county was that of County Commissioner, Precinct One. J. D. Wilbanks received 122 votes; Joe Day and Marcus Larson 417. Day and Larson will be on the ballot for the June 3 run-off election and the winner will be the Republican candidate for Precinct One.

W. Renner, incumbent District Attorney, received 87 votes in the general election he is running against Republican candidate Leon Red of Spearman.

Straw vote on the bus-hieve racial balance somewhat misunderstood area by the way it was worded on the ballot. It was a straw vote to begin with and if voters were not busing, they had to vote FOR it. Votes on the issue were simply a statement of opinion anyway, and had no legal effect. Hansford County voters voted on this issue 597 FOR, 554 AGAINST. Republicans voted 79 FOR and 54 AGAINST.

Hansford county, 2,734 had registered to vote. 1,470 did. Of this number, 362 voted democrat ballot and 108 people voted in the Republican primary. Run-off elections will be held in the county and state.

The Republican ballot,

John G. Tower ran unopposed for US Senator and voters here gave him 101 votes. Bob Price received 102.

County republicans looked over 6 candidates for State Governor and marked their ballots thus: John Hall 22, Henry Grover 21, Albert Bell Fay 31, Joseph A. Jenkins 1, B. Thomas McElroy 16 and David Reagan 9.

69 Republicans expressed their opinion AGAINST daylight saving time while 34 voted for it. This referendum, like the busing vote, has no binding effect as law.

A. E. (Junior) Lusby, a Spearman man operating a heavy machinery business under the name of Junior Lusby Cats, received 43 votes for County Commissioner, Precinct One on the republican ballot. 48 republicans cast ballots in Precinct one.

Leon Red, candidate for county commissioner, precinct 3, received 14 out of 20 votes. Hansford County Sheriff & Tax Assessor and Collector, J. B. Cooke ran unopposed. He received 1228 votes. District Judge Max Boyer was also re-elected with 1185 votes.

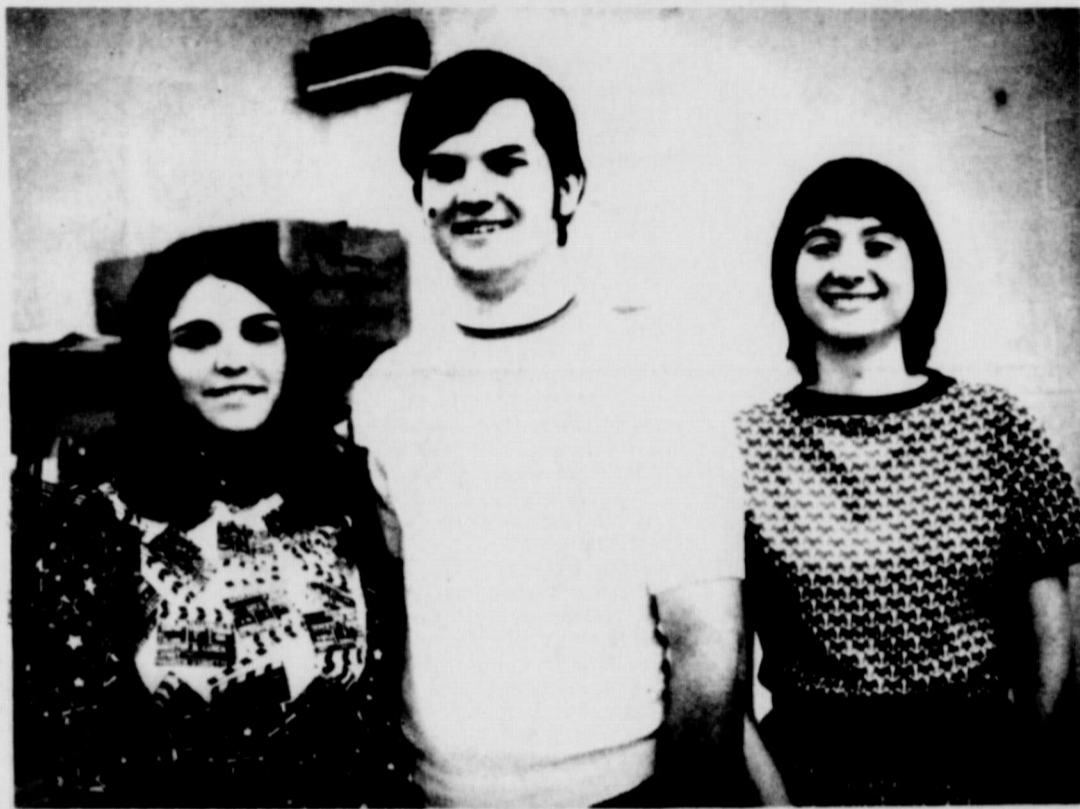

FUNERAL RITES TUESDAY FOR OTTO HOLLAND

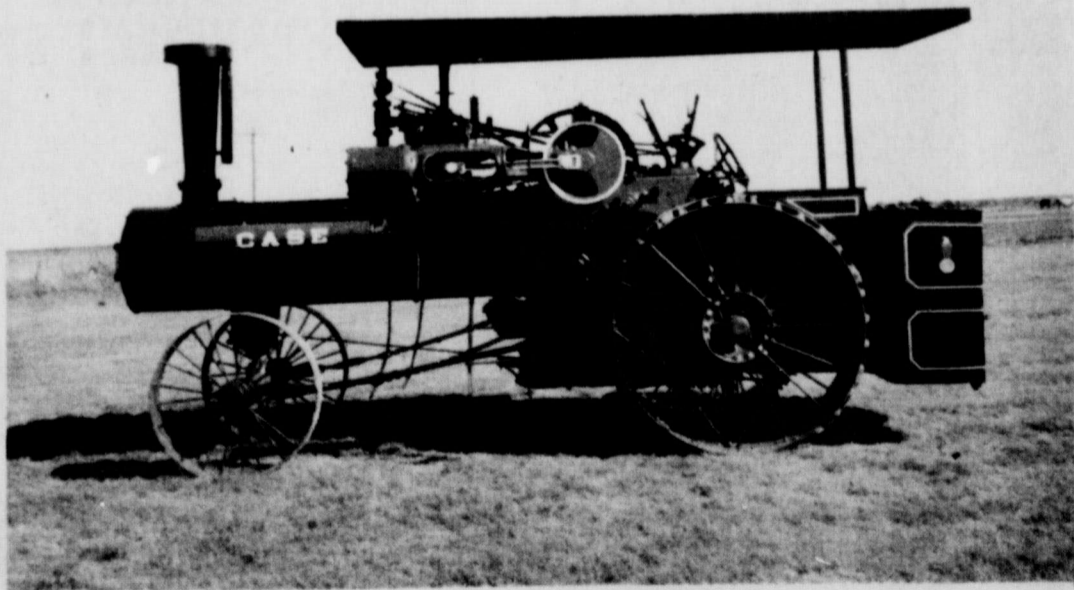

Mrs. Boyer will visit in San Antonio with their son, Don Boyer and family while Judge Boyer is attending the meeting in Huntsville.

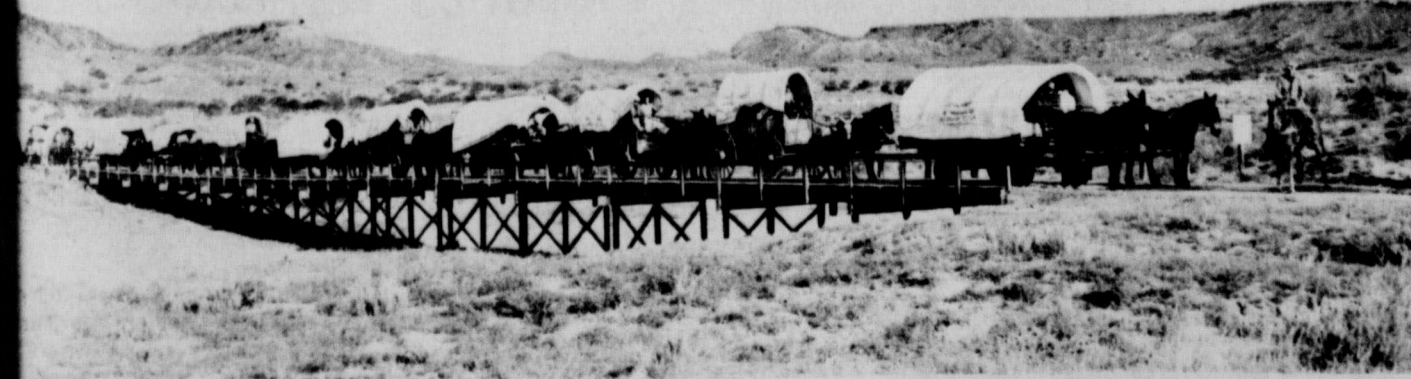
Don Boyer is the official court reporter for the 37th Judicial District Court in San Antonio.

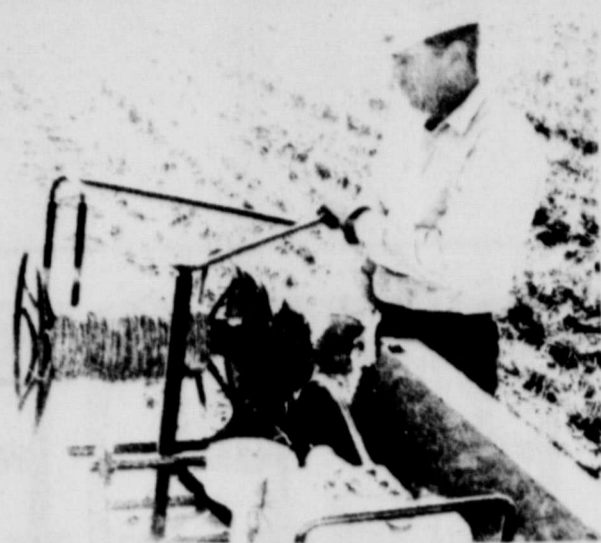
Cattle fencing is often a seasonal matter with the fences being erected and taken down as required. Both plain and barbed wire are used extensively for fencing to temporarily keep livestock in a given area or out of cultivated fields. In many instances this requires miles of wire to be coiled and stored for future use. It therefore is desirable to provide a machine which will efficiently and satisfactorily wind the fence wire on a reel and then unwind it for reuse whenever desired.

Mr. Sheets has devised a novel and improved wire reeling machine which may be used equally well for barbed wire and smooth wire, the latter being used extensively for electric fences. The machine of his invention is secured to the bed of a pick-up truck and is readily movable from place to place in a field. For most operations, it may be used without removal from the truck.

The wire reeling machine of Mr. Sheets' invention includes a frame upon which an internal combustion engine is mounted and also upon which a shaft is journaled. The shaft is driven from the engine by suitable belt and chain drives and rotates at a speed which is considerably less than that of the engine. A reel is secured removably to the shaft.

In other words, the machine is moved to the place in the field where the wire is to be coiled, and one end of the wire is attached to the reel. Thereupon, the reel is rotated to cause the wire to be wound on it, and after the reel is filled, it may be removed and replaced with another reel. In another form of the invention, the reel consists of a pair of halves which may be disassembled to permit the wound coil of wire to be removed therefrom, thus enabling the same reel to be employed again to produce another coil of wire. The machine may be used also for unreeling wire from a reel simply by adjusting some parts and then driving the truck at a slow steady speed, such as about ten miles per hour, so that the wire will be unreeling and deposited on the ground as the truck moves. Thus it is claimed that the machine is readily portable and capable of quickly and efficiently winding and unwinding extremely long lengths of wire in the field.

The application for this patent, which consists of seven claims of originality, was filed on November 19, 1970.

WHEAT BOARD NAMES NEW CONSULTANT

Carl Schwensen, 26, Executive Assistant to the National Association of Wheat Growers in Washington, D.C., since 1970 had been named Staff Consultant in Transportation to the TEXAS WHEAT Producers Board, according to a joint announcement by Jerry Rees, Executive Vice President of NAWG and Bill Nelson, Administrator of TEXAS WHEAT.

Schwensen, holds degrees from the University of Missouri and the American Institute of Foreign Trade. His duties with NAWG is to work directly with the association's Transportation Committee in the development of facts relative to the movement of agricultural products and present them to legislative and administrative bodies which may be considering legislative or regulatory action which

might affect wheat production or marketing.

Mr. Ken Kendrick, Chairman of TEXAS WHEAT, in announcing the BOARDS decision to create the transportation consultant position and the NAWG contract to obtain such services, said: "Eighty per cent of Texas' wheat is moved from the farm to the Gulf ports for export. The freight rates for wheat in this movement has risen 25% the past five years alone, just since 1967 and new higher rates are being proposed and services down-graded almost daily, especially from rural areas where wheat is located. These added freight charges and reduced services are direct costs to the wheat producer, in that price support loan rates and market prices reflect prices at export points minus freight charges."

Nelson said that the NAWG consulting contract call for Schwensen to serve TEXAS WHEAT by monitoring transportation developments, establishing liaison with regulatory agencies, carriers and transportation groups and to maintain a regular flow of information on transportation matters to the BOARD as well as assistance in preparation of position papers, petitions, etc. to the Interstate Commerce Commission and other freight bodies.

The filling of this consulting position is part of a stepped-up effort by TEXAS WHEAT in an attempt to raise the income of wheat producers through domestic and foreign market expansion activities. Such work is supported by individual wheat producers in Texas by a five-mill per bushel self assessment on their wheat production.

Tornado Season Is Here

College Station--Spring in Texas brings warm breezes, greenning fields and trees and -- too often -- tornadoes.

In an average year 96 tornadoes hit Texas. They occur most often in the north-eastern portion of the Low Rolling Plains and in the northern half of North Central Texas.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration in Austin reported that tornadoes occur at any month and during all hours of the day. However, they occur most often during late spring and early summer.

In a 20-year period, 1950-70, three-fifths of all Texas tornadoes occurred in May. More tornadoes hit in Texas than any other state, partly because of its size. However, Texas ranks ninth in the number of tornadoes per square mile, with Oklahoma and Kansas topping the list.

The Environmental Data Service reports that 1,907 tornadoes struck Texas from 1950-70.

The greatest tornado outbreak came in September, 1967, when Hurricane Beulah spawned 115. The worst outbreak of spring tornadoes was in 1957 when 69 were reported. The costliest tornado in Texas occurred May 11, 1970, when Lubbock suffered 26 deaths, 500 injuries and \$135 million in damage.

What can you do when a tornado approaches? Immediate action can save lives, says Wayne Keese, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

A tornado watch is given when the storms are likely to develop in a given area. Stay tuned to newscasts and advisories even if the sky is clear.

A tornado warning means tornadoes have been sighted. Seek shelter in a storm cellar or reinforced building. Stay away from windows. Curl up so that your head and eyes are protected.

When tornadoes are likely to leave mobile homes, they are particularly vulnerable.

"If you're in a car, get out and lie in a depression," says the Texas A&M University engineer. "If there are no low spots or depressions, turn the car at a right angle and proceed away from the tornado as quickly as possible."

Farm animals are vulnerable to tornadoes whether in a barn or on open range. However, if they are scattered, the chances are much greater that only a few animals will be lost.

TIE DOWN YOUR MOBILE HOMES

Dallas--"Mobile homes are like popcorn in a whirlwind when a major storm such as a tornado, severe windstorm or hurricane strikes unless they are properly tied down," Tom B. Lee, general manager of the Texas Insurance Advisory Association (TIAA) said today in advising the owners of mobile homes to anchor their dwellings securely and take proper precautions prior to the storms.

Mr. Lee pointed to the 1970 census which showed a great and growing expansion in the purchase of mobile homes. He also stressed that when a storm such as occurred in both Hurricane Celia and the Lubbock tornado hits a trailer court or park where the tie-down procedures have been less than adequate the effect is one of utter destruction.

"In Hurricane Celia, which swept through Corpus Christi in 1970," Mr. Lee said, "85 per cent of the estimated 7,000 to 8,000 mobile homes were damaged; half were total losses. The dollar value was estimated at nearly \$16 million."

Mr. Lee urged that all trailers be securely anchored by means of high strength cable which can be attached at a nominal cost without detriment to the appearance of the mobile home. He also indicated that, in addition to the cables, mobile homes can be anchored by a clamp on the I-beam under the unit which can be sunk into trailer court foundations. "This kind of protection could be ideally provided by the trailer court owners and builders," Mr. Lee said. "If it is done while the concrete is being poured the cost is negligible."

While stressing the need for such undertakings on a major scale, Mr. Lee acknowledged that some areas of Texas have ordinances pertaining to mobile home tie-downs. "Ideally, the most effective way of ensuring proper safety measures would be to have some form of state law," he said, "however, until that time, we would like to again urge all mobile home owners and trailer park managers to install some sort of tie-downs for the safety of their residences."
