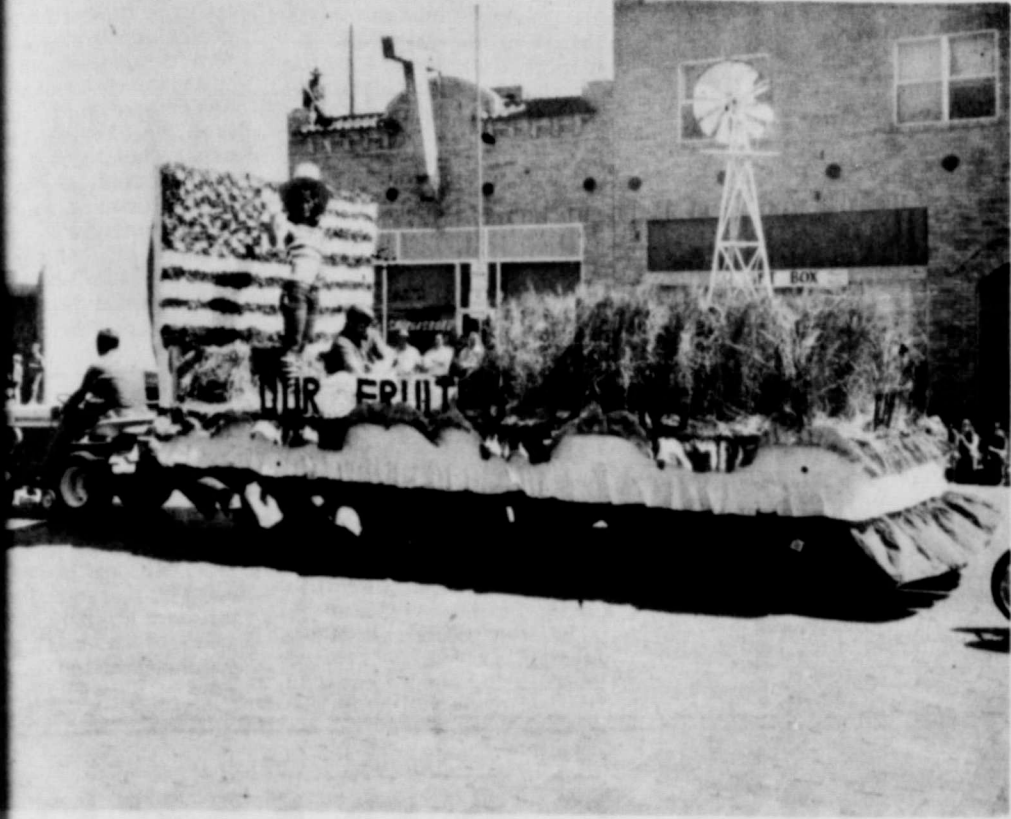
His SHS students gave him a going-away party Monday night. Everyone gathered out at Kirk's Canyon for a picnic.

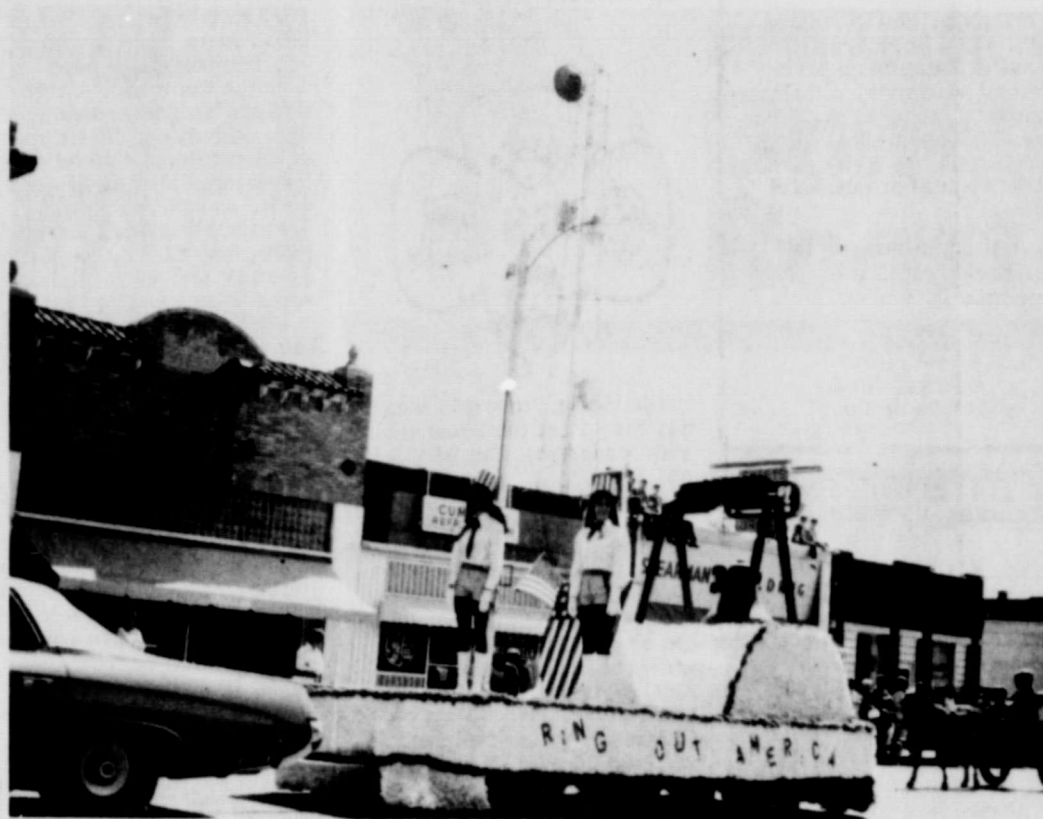
The accident occurred south of Spearman near the Steve Mathews ranch. The car apparently went out of control just as it crossed a cattle guard about 1:30 a.m. The vehicle turned over five times, throwing the passengers out. Investigating officers said the car rolled over Clements' body. Three other passengers were less seriously injured.

They were Terry Childers, 24 of Dumas; Miss Bobbie Henderson, 18, of Kirkland, Texas and Miss Branda Timmons, 19 of Cee Vee, Texas. These are in Hansford Hospital. Childers suffered scalp lacerations. Miss Henderson is in the intensive care ward at the Spearman hospital with possible internal injuries, the extent still undetermined according to a local physician. Miss Timmons suffered a fractured pelvis.

The wreck victims were brought to Hansford Hospital about 2 a.m. Sunday. Clement was then transferred to the Amarillo hospital suffering from severe internal injuries.

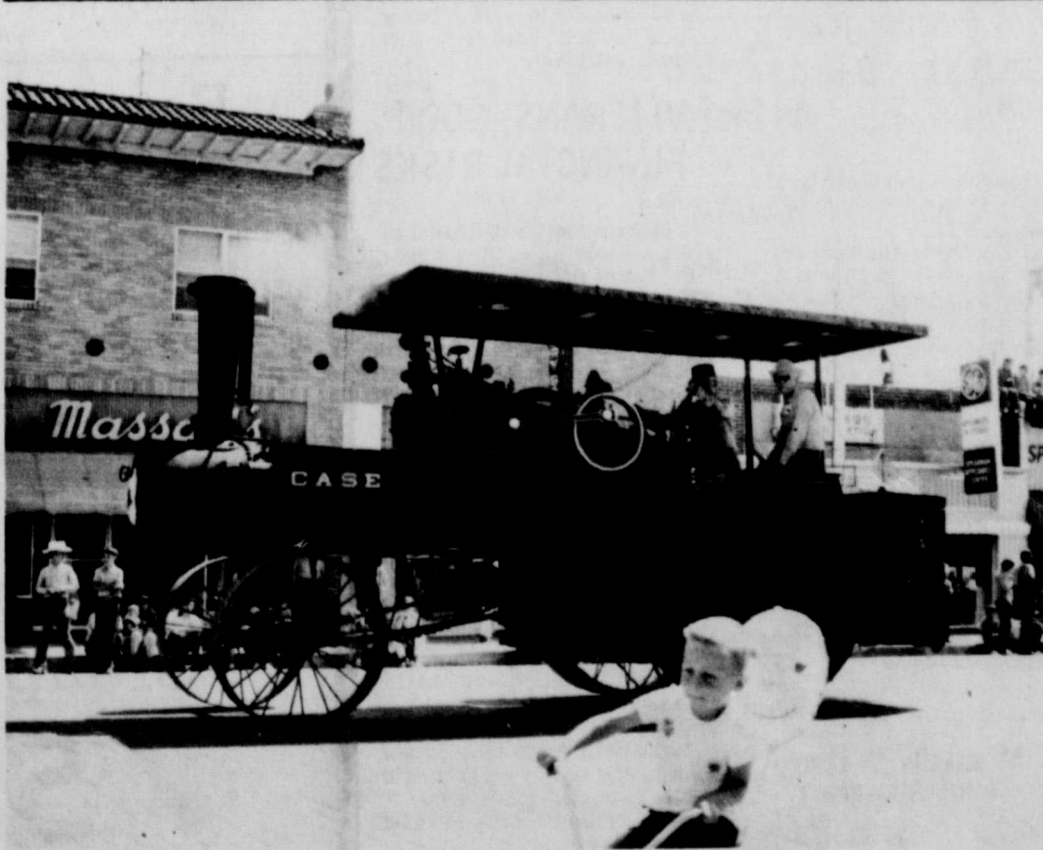

VETERANS, GOOD FINANCIAL RISKS

Veterans are good financial risks, according to Jack Coker, Director of the Waco Veterans Administration Regional Office, in noting the way veterans have repaid their GI Bill home loans.

Coker pointed out that Texas veterans have repaid their GI Bill home loans.

Coker pointed out that Texas veterans have repaid \$1,804,500,000 of the more than \$5,349,000,000 in VA guaranteed home loans granted in the state since the World War II GI Bill was enacted.

According to VA records, total GI Bill home loans in Texas through March 1972, numbered 496,000. Of this figure nearly half have been repaid in full.

Nationally more than 50 percent of the nearly eight million GI loans made, amounting to over \$7 billion dollars in value, have been repaid. Veterans of World War II and Korea who served more than 90 days and Vietnam veterans and servicemen who have served at least 181 days are eligible for GI home loans. Also eligible are widows of veterans who died as a result of service-connected disabilities and wives of men missing in action or held prisoners of war.

HOG CHOLERA STILL ON LOOSE

COLLEGE STATION--Hog cholera is still on the loose in Texas, and unless farmers and others use certain precautions, the situation could get much worse, says Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The most recent case of hog cholera has come up in Nueces County. That county was plac-

ed under a state quarantine May 6. Moore County, Panhandle was also recently when an infection was found. Five other in the state remain in quarantine. They are in South Texas and include Eron, Hidalgo, Starr, and Willacy.

Three counties released from quarantine relates particularly to buying hogs, "points" in Texas A&M University in Iarlan. "This is that bought in a quarantine are confined to the premises for a period of days. The animals must result or moved for that period unless they are directly to slaughter."

Armstrong emphasizes the purpose of the quarantine is to limit the movement of hogs. Then, if sick hogs are detected, animal officials can be notified the animals can be properly disposed of. "This is the way Texas will stay free of cholera," he continues.

LETTERS from READERS

Dear Mrs. Miller: In your column in last Thursday's paper (May 11) you had some comments about Mrs. Frances Farenthold, candidate for Governor of Texas. In the interest of both fairness to Mrs. Farenthold and honesty I would like to take this opportunity to make a few comments about that column and Mrs. Farenthold's campaign.

In regard to your report of your understanding of "Mrs. What's-her-Names" position on marijuana, I have two issues I would like to point up. First, you alleged that she is in favor of the legalization of marijuana. Frankly, that is untrue. Position papers issued by Mrs. Farenthold say she is only in favor of "lowering the penalties for possession of marijuana from a felony to a misdemeanor." I think that you will find that Mr. Briscoe's position is very, very similar, as is the position of almost every informed public official on both the State and national level. Please do not assume, then, that a vote for Mrs. Farenthold is a vote for marijuana; no matter how reliable your hearsay evidence, it just is not true. The second point I would like to mention is that your report was, in fact, hearsay. Mrs. Miller, please!! Have we not had enough half-truths and misrepresentations in Texas politics in recent years to horrify even the dirtiest politician? And yet you insist on reporting something the truth of which you did not even take the time to investigate. Spearman may very well be "Briscoe Country", but that does not release any of us from our obligation to carefully study each candidate's position. Whether your motive was to support your candidate or to incite citizens to get out and vote, I daresay that a thorough-

ly investigated piece of truth would have done the job as well.

In closing, I would like to address the voters of Hansford County. I, too, urge you to vote on June 3, but I urge you to invest a little time in finding out what the candidates have to say. Just because a person is a woman is hardly a mature, responsible reason to vote against her. And just because you heard someone say over a cup of coffee that "their neighbor's relatives down around Dallas somewhere thought they remembered that woman saying so-and-so" is hardly an adult reason to vote against a woman who has pledged herself and her candidacy to bring reform to the government of the State of Texas. If your reasons for voting against Mrs. Farenthold are these or similar to these, then you certainly deserve the stagnation in Texas government and economics that you are voting for. I ask you to remember that no man who rests on his laurels has ever accomplished anything. Mr. Briscoe might have sponsored legislation that paved farm to market roads in the fifties, but he shows no promise of paving the way out of the mess in Austin in the Seventies.
