news from your **HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT**

If you are planning that first summer trip on the Memorial Day weekend be sure to keep in mind that safety on the highway can save your life. If you will drive defensively you can recognize and adjust to various driving conditions and learn the basic collision situations and how to avoid them.

The accident-prevention formula consists of three steps:

- (1) See the hazard. Think about what you are going to encounter as far ahead of a situation as possible.
- (2) Prepare a defense. Know the way to handle specific situations and apply this knowledge when needed.
- (3) Act in time. After seeing a hazard and recognizing the defense against it, take the proper action. Never wait and see what will happen.

Factors that affect driving, such as the weather, the amount of light available, the condition of the car, the amount of traffic and a driver's physical condition should be considered.

To avoid a collision with the vehicle ahead: (1) Watch for signs from the driver ahead as to what he intends to do. (2) Look beyond the driver ahead to see situations that may force him to act and become a threat to you. (3) Stay back one car length-use your car's length as a measure for every ten miles of speed.

To avoid being hit by a car from behind: (1) Signal your intention. Use your directional signals, brake lights and arm signals. (2) Stop smoothly. Avoid jamming on your brakes. (3) Keep clear of tailgaters by encouraging them to pass.

To avoid intersection accidents: (1) Keep in the proper lane and clearly signal your intention if turning. (2) Slow to the point where you can avoid any unexpected car from either side road.

And remember let pedestrians have the right of way. Especially with tourists in a strange town they present a hazard.

Like to vary the way fresh vegetables are served at home? Try them cooked and chilled for a change. A Fresh Green Bean and Vegetable Salad is full of zip and vitamins. 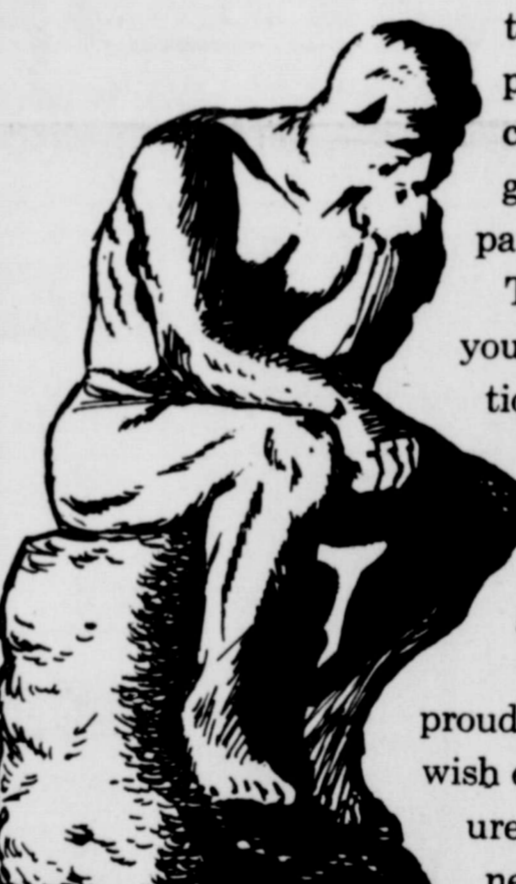
Combine all ingredients except lettuce and tomato in bowl. Mix lightly. Serve on lettuce. Garnish with tomato wedges. To make a tomato rose as shown in photograph, cut peel from tomato thinly and carefully in a single strip, then wind peel in spiral to make a rose. Fasten with wooden picks and refrigerate for a few hours until tomato rose holds this shape without picks. Makes: 6 servings.

Miss Cindy Hutchison, bride-elect of Tommy Sullivan, was feted Saturday with a gift shower.

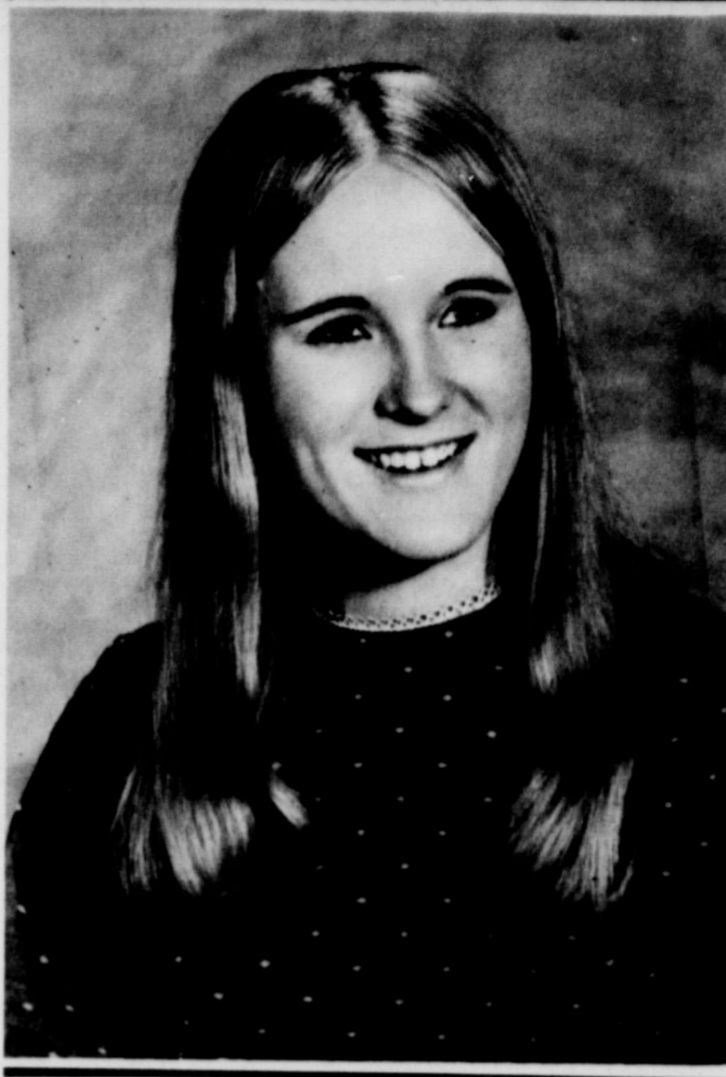

Federal Aid Runs High Locally

According to a recent study, taxpayers in Hansford County are paying a high price for the benefits their area receives in the form of Federal aid.

The figures show that for every dollar in grants that comes to them from Washington—for welfare, education, health, housing, highways, urban renewal and other purposes—the cost of them is \$1.03.

That is the estimate of the amount they have been contributing, via their income taxes and excise taxes, for allocation to the aid programs. It is exclusive of what had to be provided locally in the form of matching funds.

The study was made by the Tax Foundation, a non-profit research organization that keeps tabs on Federal spending. It represents a state by state breakdown of Treasury Department figures covering the past fiscal year.

The findings are that, in 21 of the states, more money was collected in taxes that were earmarked for the aid programs than came back to them in grants. In the other 29 states, the benefits exceeded the cost.

Of the taxes collected in the State of Texas as a whole, \$1,431,000,000 went into the aid program and \$1,387,000,000 came back in grants.

Hansford County's contribution amounted to approximately \$822,000 of the total and its share of the grants, to nearly \$798,000.

As for the unequal distribution of grants-in-aid, it is explained that there is no attempt to return dollar for dollar. The purpose is to provide aid in accordance with need.

The report shows that a total of \$29 billion in such aid was distributed among the 50 states during the past year. This compares with \$23,5 billion in 1970.

Much more than this is available to states and localities, it is noted. Various funds that are obtainable go begging because no application is made for them.

The reason is, according to Senator William V. Roth of Delaware, who made a study of the situation, that there are no less than 1,350 aid programs on the books, administered by 57 departments and agencies of government. No comprehensive listing of them has ever been made.

2) the release of all American prisoners of war held as a result of the present conflict in Southeast Asia.

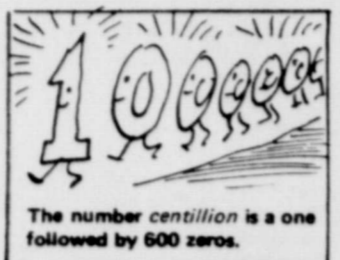
The President's proposal lets the Communists know a couple of things in crystal-clear terms--first, that we are willing to withdraw our forces but second, that we will do so on our terms and not as a result of military defeat at their hands.

The proposal is reasonable and one that I believe the Communists would do well to accept since, in my judgement, it is as generous an offer as we are going to make.

COTTON GROWERS ASSISTANCE BILL-1 introduced legislation last week that would permit cotton growers who are victims of crop losses due to causes beyond the control of the producer to use the average county yield for that crop year in figuring participation levels in the USDA's cotton program during the next three years.

Producers are already protected from losses to their cotton crops if the loss is due to natural causes. My amendment to the Agricultural Adjustment Act would extend assistance to producers whose cotton loss is due to man-made causes that are accidental.

In view of the high costs and risks and low profit margins associated with agricultural operations these days, I believe this bill would serve the interest of cotton growers by protecting their established yields, and I hope it will receive prompt, favorable attention by Congress.

MAYBE WE OUGHT TO CONTROVE

Memorial Day, also known as Decoration Day, is one of this country's most solemn holidays. Custom has come to recognize it also as a day for enjoying the first long weekend of summer.

But perhaps no national holiday has been the subject of disagreement approaching that surrounding the day we celebrate on May 29.

ORIGIN

The actual origin of the holiday lies in the custom of decorating graves during ancient festivals in Europe and Asia. Most nearly parallel to the U. S. observance is Germany's *Heidengedenktag* (Heroes' Memorial Day) which is celebrated on March 12.

In 1866, a group of women from Columbus, Miss., a small town near the site of the Battle of Shiloh, made a pilgrimage to Friendship Cemetery, an 18-acre tract on the edge of the village. The ladies went despite urging to the contrary from their husbands. The memories are too bitter, they said. Emotions are still inflamed.

Their act of kindness became a symbol of the attempt to bring about amity after the bitterness of the Civil War. An article in the New York Tribune described the activities of the Southern ladies.

"The women of Columbus, Miss. have shown themselves impartial in their offerings made to the memory of the dead. They strewed flowers alike on graves of the Confederate and the National soldiers.

In a way, the men of Columbus were right. The bitterness resulting from the Civil War has through the years interfered with the universal observance of Memorial Day.

CONTROVERSY

Subsequent to the Columbus graveside ceremony, similar observances were held throughout the South and in a few scattered locales in the North. Then, in 1868, the Grand Army of the Republic, a group of Union veterans, designated May 30 for the purpose of strewing flowers or otherwise decorating graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion.

Official designation by Union veterans caused Southerners, embittered anew by the excesses of Reconstruction, to consider the holiday a day to honor only Union dead. Southern states first ignored the holiday and then set aside a different day as Confederate Memorial Day, a practice that still persists.

Controversy over the holiday continues even as to its very name. Intended to be known as Memorial Day, reference to the day as Decoration Day began early. So popular was the name Decoration Day that its use prompted the Grand Army to urge that the proper designation of May 30 is Memorial Day—not Decoration Day. Yet, the official name of the holiday in three states is Memorial Day or Decoration Day. Tennessee is it officially Decoration Day.

OFFICIAL RECOGNITION

Recognition of Memorial Day as a holiday came in 1873 when New York designated it a legal holiday. Rhode Island followed in 1874 and Vermont in 1876. The U. S. Congress made it an official holiday for federal employees in 1887. By 1910 it was a legal holiday in all states except nine Southern states, including Texas.

The state of Texas never officially adopted a statewide day of recognition until the day was re-legislated by the U. S. Congress in 1971. Individual communities had their own decoration days, a practice that still exists in many rural areas.

In 1971 Congress changed the date of the nationwide observance of Memorial Day from May 31, to the last Monday in May, which this year falls on May 29. All states except

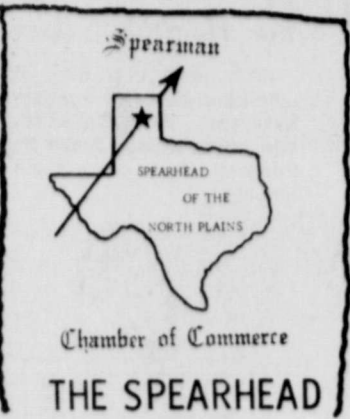

Cemetery Group Appeals For Information

The Hereford Cemetery Association has been making an all out effort to complete records of burials in the cemetery. There has never been a written record or file on it.

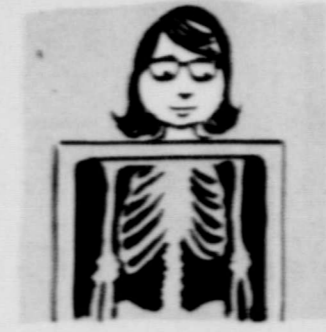

For Health's Sake

At a state university, all incoming students were required to have chest X-rays. But at least one young woman found this intolerable. In a court challenge, she argued:



"Having a chest X-ray is contrary to the principles of my religion. To require it is to violate my religious freedom, which is guaranteed by the First Amendment."

However, the court overruled her objection. Noting that X-rays can reveal tuberculosis and that tuberculosis is infectious, the court said:

"The regulation is purely for the purpose of discovery. It does not say you must be treated if you are ill; it only says if you are ill and (don't) know it, you cannot spread your infection to others."

Religious freedom, of course, ranks high in our constitutional system. But it does not outrank the necessities of public health. Said one judge:

"The health of the people is the first law."

Other freedoms, too, may be limited by considerations of health. In another case, a restaurant owner invoked freedom of enterprise to oppose the rules of sanitation laid down by city hall. But a court ruled that freedom of enterprise likewise must yield to the public weal.

"The danger to health," said the court, "renders the (restaurant) business a proper one for regulation."

Still, even health regulations must meet the test of reasonableness. One squeamish city council, worried about germs, passed a law flatly forbidding the sale of any second-hand clothes within

the boundaries of the city. But when this law was challenged in court, it was held unconstitutional. The court total ban simply could not be justified, since some could protect the public weal.

Putting the "health" of an unreasonable law in court, did not make it any better.
