

City Meeting

Darce Foshee resigned his position as City Manager this week in favor of another city job.

Foshee, who has been City Mgr. here since 1965, said "There are no underlying causes for the change, other than I just wanted to get away from a desk job."

The position he will now take over is that of Director of Public Works. Foshee will take care of all outside operations for the City, such as streets, parks, water, gas & sewer systems, etc.

The City has been in need of a man to fill this position for some time, and when the council made a move to hire a man for it, Foshee asked for the job. In an executive meeting Monday night, the City Council hired him.

Applications for the City Manager's job are now being taken.

Terry Pittman, assistant city manager will continue in this capacity. Pittman serves as the Municipal Court Judge, City Secretary, in charge of all record work, assists with the tax work, monthly billing, etc.

Mr. and Mrs. Foshee moved here in 1965 from Boise City, Okla., where he had been city manager for several years.

Mayor Hackley and City Councilmen L.F. Hand, Roscoe Nelson, Jimmy Hicks, Dan Desi, one and E.J. Callaway, Jr., along with Darce Foshee, Terry Pittman, Leland Wood and Chunky Blackburn, city attorney, met Monday night for the first June session.

In an executive session, the Board accepted the resignation of City Manager Darce Foshee, and hired him to fill the position of Director of Public Works. The board announced that applications are now being accepted to fill the office of City Mgr.

The summer street repair program is soon to get underway in Spearman and the council decided to consult an engineer as to what streets need repaving, intersections to be repaired, cost estimates, and etc. before this project is launched. This report will be heard at the next council meeting.

To settle a question before the Council, the City Electrical Board recommended to the Council what procedure is necessary for an electrician to get his license renewed in order to operate in Spearman. Board members C.D. Riggins, L.L. Anthony, Louis Schnell, Earl Goodheart and R.L. Uptergrove recommended that if the electrician's license has expired, he must take the required test, pay the fees and go through regular procedures to renew such a license.

Other business before the council included the departmental reports for the month of May. These were heard as follows:

Ambulance--11 runs in May, 2 in the County, 3 in the city and 3 to Amarillo.

Court--51 cases were filed and a total of \$607.00 in fines assessed. \$62.00 was suspended, \$35.00 of this was laid out in jail time, for a total of \$510.00 paid.

Police--issued 54 traffic citations, arrested one DWI, and two drunks, and investigated 10 traffic accidents.

Animal Control--reported 2 animals held over from April; 48 picked up in May, 29 destroyed, 15 paid out, 4 escaped and 2 held to June.

Fire--two regular drills in May with no fires reported.

The council announced that City Police Chief Leland Wood would attend a meeting in Lubbock June 14-16. This is the Governor's Traffic Safety Council meeting for all area policemen and will concern "traffic problems" for cities the size of Spearman.

The attending physician said both boys were now doing fine and might be released from Hansford Hospital before this newspaper article went to press.

The boys, visiting in Spearman with their grandfather Clyde Owens who is ill in Hansford Hospital, were driving a car belonging to an uncle, L.C. Owens.

The accident happened at the east approach to Horse Creek bridge, on the Gruver Highway. Fields, driver of the car, evidently lost control of the vehicle and swerved in front of a cattle truck belonging to Albert Mackie.

The truck, driven by Fred Vanbuskirk, stuck the car in its side, right behind the front seat, cutting the vehicle in half and ripping off both front doors. The truck ended up out in the field. Damage reports

to the truck listed it as "rotated." The car of course was completely demolished, with pieces strewn all over the road, and the back half of the 1966 Chevrolet wedged in under the truck's front wheels.

The truck driver was not hurt.

The Spearman ambulance took both boys to the Hansford Hospital. Fields suffered various structures, contusions, cuts and bruises. Geary received superficial injuries and a broken nose.

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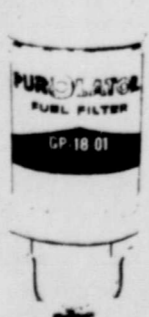

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Let Me See

Some newspaper editors will try anything... once. Down in Jensen Beach, Fla. editor Richard Campbell was going flat out of his mind trying to come up with some great, unusual promotional campaign for his circulation drive he had going. He came up with the idea of running a nude centerfold... borrowing the idea from Cosmopolitan magazine which recently sold out on the newsstands when it ran the picture of a nude male in its centerfold. His newspaper ran a four-week promotion announcing when the nude centerfold would appear. Then his search began for a subject with enough nerve to pose for such a picture! A prominent physician, known for his sense of humor, agreed to do it. Dr. Richard Penick approached the nude centerfold idea with a medical attitude. He pointed out that nudity was not the issue, but rather what people are taught to believe in. "If people were taught that if was taboo to show the nose, then showing it would be outrageous," he commented. Editor Campbell said his readers knew the doctor well enough to know he would be nutty enough to do it and were going crazy wondering whether in this liberal age of permissiveness, the newspaper would indeed join the ranks of Playboy and Cosmo. Even the staff was kept in the dark and all the work was done at a central printing plant 70 miles away. The publisher there demanded a written release from the doctor before printing the picture. On the eve of publication the production manager at the plant got cold feet and called Campbell and told him that when the picture had been blown up to centerfold size, it was just too life like. In the meantime, subscribers were threatening to cancel. The local medical association, of which Dr. Penick is a past president, expressed concern over his being the subject of the centerfold. The doctor was bombarded with callers. These callers had various ideas: "I don't have a dirty mind, but I don't see anything beautiful about the human body". "I'm waiting to see it with giddy anticipation"... "It's only fair that we see all of you since

you see all of us'... and other statements. Then came the publication date and debut of the centerfold. There on the front page was a head and shoulders shot of a reclining, nude Dr. Penick quoting the doctor as saying "I think the inside centerfold reflects the beauty of the human body."

An editorial from the publisher Campbell told the readers "no expense was spared to bring this precedent-establishing "first" to the People," adding that the people could judge in their minds if the newspaper had violated the trust of a family newspaper by bringing this art form to them.

When eager hands turned to the centerfold, they found Dr. Penick in the altogether... as he appeared 50 years ago when the good doctor was still a bouncy, cuddly baby. Publisher Campbell said it was the best promotion he had ever had. All the articles concerning the centerfold had been vague. They just mentioned a nude male with no indication of age. "We just let imaginations of our readers run wild," he said.

Dr. Penick just laughed and laughed, for a long time. The results for the circulation department of the newspaper were 151 new subscribers and 250 renewals.

Lots of funny things happen to newspaper people. Roy Bilberry, a Graham, Texas publisher, tells about the experience of moving a printing press. "We bought the press in a neighboring town and after loading it onto a flat bed truck we headed for home. As we passed through a small town, somehow, due to circumstances beyond our control, we accidentally found ourselves right in the middle of a high school homecoming parade. We were awarded first place in the float division."

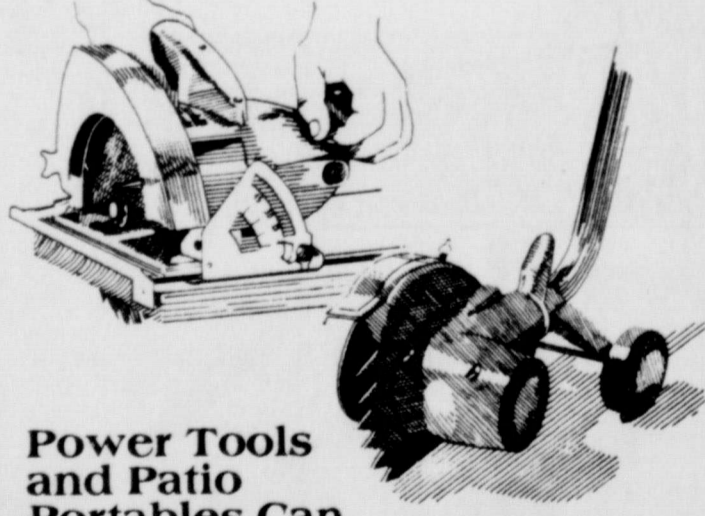

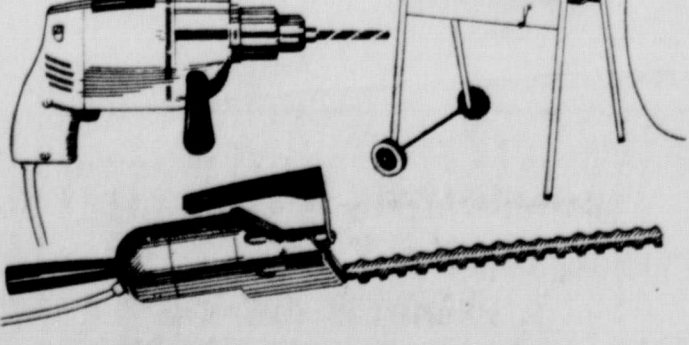

The film will be shown on all three Amarillo television stations. It will be aired on KFDA and KGNC on Friday, June 23, at 9:30 p.m. KVII will show the program on Sunday, June 25 at 4 p.m. County Farm Bureaus in the viewing area are purchasing the time for the showing.

The film, produced by the American Farm Bureau Federation, is built around interviews with some grape vineyard workers in the Delano, California, area who were forced to join the farm workers union led by Cesar Chavez without the privilege of secret ballot elections to determine which union, if any, they wanted to represent them.

The tactic used by the Chavez forces was the secondary boycott which effectively closed markets for grapes. Unable to sell their produce, the

city brought over 5,000 young people to make a personal commitment to Christ and the entire city has felt the impact.

While 60% of the audience are often teenagers, the SPIRENO team goes to great lengths to make their crusades a family affair.

growers had no alternative but to sign their workers over to the Chavez organization. The secondary boycott is outlawed for industrial unions, McCloy pointed out. Farm Bureau is backing legislation to guarantee workers secret ballot elections and to outlaw the secondary boycott, prevent strikes at harvest time, and create an Agriculture Labor Relations Board.

This action led to the Chavez forces launching an all-out campaign recently to discredit Farm Bureau, McCloy said. He added that Farm Bureau would not be intimidated and is continuing to support legislation that would benefit the grower and worker alike.

Coulter stated a good graduate farrier can make about \$10,000 per year, varying slightly in different areas of the country. He will get about \$10.00 to \$15.00 for shoeing a horse, up to \$25.00 per foot for special shoeing. A master farrier with a good showhorse or racehorse clientele can make up to \$40,000 per year.
The employment trend for farriers, according to Coulter, looks bright. "As an example, for every vacancy occurring in this country requiring a person with a Ph.D., there are 360 qualified prospects." On the other hand, the number of farriers in this country has declined while the number of horses has increased rapidly in recent years. There are 10 million horses in this country and the number is rising. The figure is larger than the number to be found back in the days when horses were the chief mode of transportation and farm labor.
Dick Williams, graduate farrier, will again instruct the course. Williams has been in the public school field as an administrator for twenty years. The school is fortunate to secure an instructor who has a working knowledge of the

trade and a teaching background.

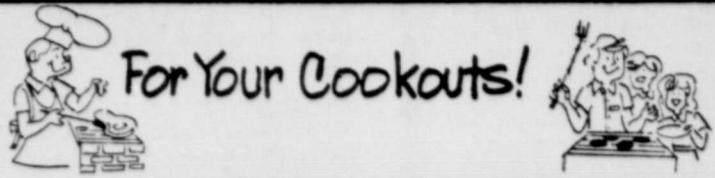

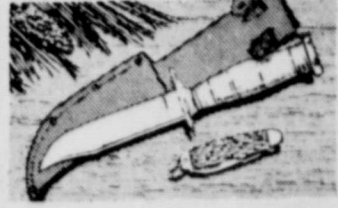

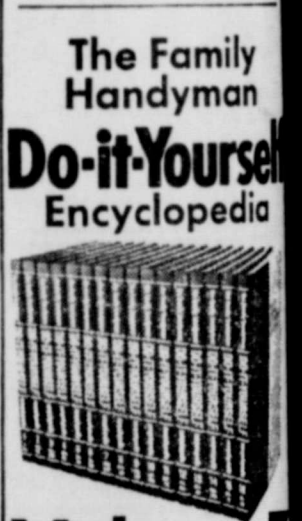
