July 4 bestowed heavy. drippy clouds and the lowest temperature reading since the vear 1924. On July 4 that year the thermometer read 55 de-, grees. That was the reading in Spearman until about noon and with a mist falling, those who did venture out had on their coats.

The month of June produc ed 2.12 inches of rainfall. This amount, plus the rain which fell here July 1st and 2nd, brings the year's total to 6.90 inches

The highest temperature reading for June was 100 degrees on the 25th. Low for the month was 54 degrees on June

The storm system which moved across the county Sunday evening, produced at least one good-sized tornado which swept through open country southwest of Gruver. The storm was plainly visible from Spearman for a period of time According to Joel Lackey, the storm was in the vicinity of the Rafferty Feedyards. Joel said several of the big high line poles were torn down by the twister

Rainfall from the Sunday night storm measured 1, 39 inches in the official rain gauge, -. 28 of an inch fell here Saturday.

WORKING CONDITIONS IN 1852

Although working conditions have changed drastically in the last 100 years, it is hard to conceive of some of the regulations of past years. The following office staff notice, dated 1852, was found recently in the ruins of a London office building:

1. Godliness, cleanliness, and punctuality are the necessities of a good business.

2. This firm has reduced the hours of work, and the clerical staff will now only be present between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. weekdays.

3. Daily prayers will be held each morning in the main offices. The clerical staff will be present.

4. Clothing must be of a sober nature. The clerical staff will not disport themselves in raiment of bright colors, nor will they wear hose unless in good

5. Overshoes and topcoats may not be worn in the office, but neck scarves and headwear may be worn in the office in inclement weather.

6. A stove is provided for the benefit of the clerical staff. Coal and wood must be kept in the locker. It is recommended that each member of the clerical staff bring four pounds of coal each day during the cold weather.

7. No member of the clerical staff may leave the room without permission from the supervisor.

8. No talking is allowed during business hours. 9. The craving for tobacco, wine, or spirits is a

human weakness, and as such is forbidden to all members of the clerical staff. 10. Now that the hours of business have been drastically reduced the partaking of food is allowed

between 11:30 and noon, but work will not on any account cease. 11. Members of the clerical staff will provide their own pens. A new sharpener is available on

application to the supervisor. 12. The supervisor will nominate a senior clerk to be responsible for the cleanliness of the main office and private office. All boys and juniors will report and will remain after closing hours for similar work. Brushes, brooms, scrubbers, and soap are provided by the owners.

13. The owners recognize the generosity of the new labor laws, but will expect a great rise in output of work to compensate for these near-Utopian conditions.


