Only two more weeks of vacation time remain before school bells all over the area ring out for students to return to classes.

Students who are NEW to the Spearman school system this year are to PRE REGISTER at the various campuses from 9 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. during the week of August 14 through 18th.

The only other students who will pre-enroll will be those in grades 1-4 on August 24, from 9 to 11 a. m.

The first day of school will be August 28 and buses will make their first run on this date.

STUDENTS in grades 5 through 8 are to report to the Junior High Auditorium at 8:25 a. m. August 28 for orientation and registration. Following registration these students will follow a short period schedule.

HIGH SCHOOL students are to report to the High School Auditorium at 8:20 a. m. on August 28. Schedules will be handed out along with Handbooks and locker assignments. Additional instructions as to school procedure for the day will be given at the general assembly.

School officials encourage boys and girls in grades 4 through 8 to purchase their PE suits before August 28. Girls suits are on sale at

Douglas Dry Goods. Boys suits can be purchased at any of the local clothing stores.

The seventh and eighth grade football boys and girl basketball players will be given physicals after school begins. An announcement concerning this will be made at the time of registration. These students are urged NOT TO go to a doctor's office for a physical before school begins.

Enrollment in Spearman schools is expected to be under that of last year. Elementary Principal Allen Alford said he had cut his second grade down from 4 classrooms to three classrooms. He still has four 1st grade rooms; four 3rd graderooms and 4 fourth grade classrooms however, the same as last year.

## PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 3 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 41)

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a paper is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to require the commissioners court in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis."

## PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 6 ON THE BALLOT (ISJR 7)

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Section 1-b, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1-b. (a) Three thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now provided by law shall be exempt from taxation for all State taxes. From and after January 1, 1973, the governing body of county, city, town, school district, or other political subdivision of the State may elect to exercise its own action not to exceed Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from all ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by political subdivision. As an alternative, upon receipt of a petition signed by twenty percent (20%) of the voters who color, creed, or national origin, the governing body of the subdivision shall call an election to determine by majority vote whether an amount not less than Three thousand Dollars (\$3,000) shall be exempt in the petition, of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or over shall be exempt from ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. Where any ad valorem tax has theretofore been pledged for the payment of any debt, the taxing officers of the political subdivision shall have authority to continue to levy and collect the tax against the homestead property at the same rate as the tax so pledged until the debt is discharged, if the cessation of the levy would impair the obligation of the contract by which the debt was created." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the serious political subdivisions of the State may exempt not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the value of residence homesteads of all persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from ad valorem taxes under certain conditions."

## PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (ISJR 1)

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 4. The Governor shall hold office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly inducted. He shall be at least 30 years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall reside in this State at the time of his election. His term shall begin on the first day of January following his election." Section 2. That Article IV, Section 22, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 22. The Attorney General elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall hold office for four years, or until his successor is qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and in the Supreme Court of the State, and shall execute all private corporate charters from time to time, and take all necessary action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation exercising any power or authority or collecting any taxes, tolls, freight charges, or other duties, which shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial decree of such charter, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice to the Governor and executive officers, when requested by them, and perform other duties as may be required by law. He shall retain the seat of government in his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature." Section 3. That Article IV, Section 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified. The four-year term applies to these officers who are elected at the general election in 1974 or thereafter. Each shall receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and may be required by law, or by the Secretary of State, shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or officer specified in this section or officer specified in this section, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury." Section 4. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and certain statutory State officers."

## PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 61)

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows: "Section 2. (a) When the legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission. (b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973. (c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened as a constitutional convention at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside until a chairman of the convention is elected. The convention shall elect other officers it deems necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of the legislature. (d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, mileage, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Warrants shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them. Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may submit revisions of the existing constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publicizing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The conduct of the election, the canvassing of the votes, and the reporting of the returns shall be as provided for elections under Section 1 of this article. (f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members; but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p.m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members. (g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."

## PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 7 ON THE BALLOT (ISJR 16)

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article I of the Texas Constitution be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 3a, to read as follows: "Section 3a. Equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin. This amendment is self-operative." Section 2. The foregoing amendment to the constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin."

## PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (ISJR 29)

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40." Section 2. That Article XVI, Section 40, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and directors of soil and water conservation districts, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man of the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and officers of the State soil and water conservation districts, from holding at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any election, general, special or primary in this State when otherwise qualified. State employees or other individuals who receive all or part of their compensation either directly or indirectly from funds of the State of Texas and who are not State officers, shall not be barred from serving as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts; provided, however, that such State employees or other individuals shall receive no salary for serving as members of such governing bodies. It is further provided that a non-elective State officer may hold other non-elective offices under the State or the United States, if the other office is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by the State or Federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State or the United States, except as a notary public if qualified by law." Section 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State funds for compensation to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

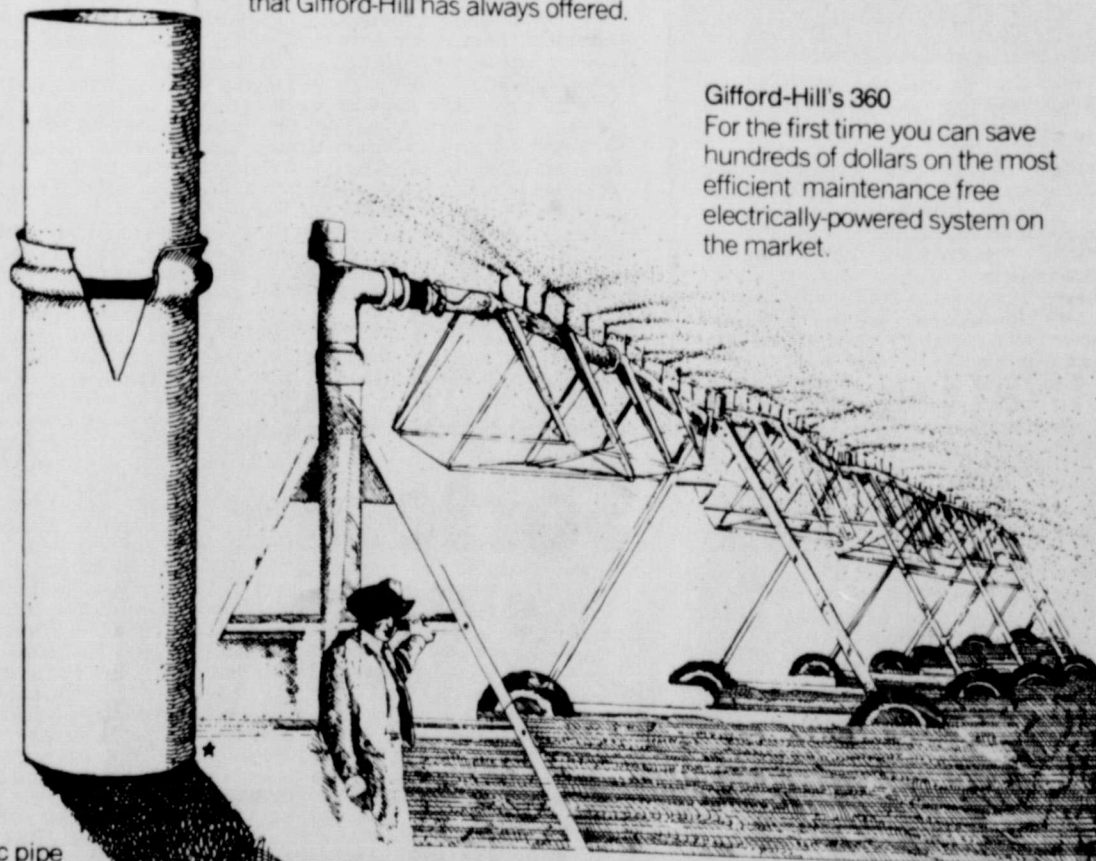

Let Me See by Sybil...

We took one whole week off! I believe this is the third time in something like 26 years. Once in 1948 we went to see Billy's old Marine Corps buddy in Idaho, and in 1956 went to California for a week. We have had numerous weekends but not an entire week in a long time. Really enjoyed ourselves. Went down to Wise county to visit our country cousins and they wined and dined us royally. Took us to Six Flags, and on various antique excursions. Picked up several antiques, as well as several pounds. Why is it when you go away from home food tastes exceptionally good? Down in Wise county the vegetables and fruit were in abundance. Picked (and ate) about a bushel fresh figs right off the bush. But only gardens which are kept watered are still producing. They are in the midst of a 2-month drought and as hot as it gets down there, it takes only a few days for everything to bake. Fields of tomatoes and melons just cooked on the vines. But with an average yearly rainfall of about 36 inches, the country always looks pretty to me. Especially the trees... which is what we are not going to have around here very long. Elm trees in Spearman are dying like flies, and will continue to do so from the looks of the abundance of Elm leaf beetles and scale bugs. If you have elms you wish to save, better get to spraying and keep it up. One spray job a year won't do it. It might if everybody would spray. County Agent Robert Adamson said aerial spraying would not work, for the tree had to be wet from spray and planes simply cannot do this. It has taken 25 years for elm trees to reach the size they are in Spearman now and it will be a shame to see them all wiped out in a few years, but it IS happening. Last year Tom Etter had Di-Syston put in the ground around the root system of some elm trees and these trees made the summer in fine shape. This year he did not have this applied, and the trees suffered from insects. Maybe this is the answer, but it MUST be done by a professional for this stuff is extremely poisonous. However, for future tree insurance better plant right now a different species of tree. Two named to me which will do well here -- fast growing, long life, insect resistant, etc. are the thornless locust and the fruitless mulberry. The green ash is another, but it takes forever to grow. REPORTS CONCERNING the flood damage from the season's first Hurricane back east are just now being estimated, and the damage in Pennsylvania and southern New York is unbelievable.

The damage is irreparable to the Antique market for the entire Nation. The destruction of irreplaceable remnants of other ages--antiques displayed in museums and historical societies, stored in private collections and antique shops that dot the trail of the murderous flood... makes you sick! Hardest hit were the shops in Lancaster and Wilkes-Barre in Pennsylvania and in Elmira and Corning, New York. These shops are most likely gone forever. Harrisburg, the capital of Pennsylvania, housed the records of 300 years of state history. These historical documents, over a million dollars worth were destroyed. Old documents are most difficult to save, but the historical society is trying the freeze-dried method. Freezing paper memorabilia halts the process of fermentation induced by water. Restoration, if any is possible, can then proceed. At Corning Glass Museum, an exhibit of ancient Persian glass on the museum's first floor was a total loss. 15% of the museum's collection was destroyed. Anyone who has visited the Museum remembers the floor to ceiling display cases on the second floor. The surging waters broke the glass fronts and

tipped over the cabinets and many of the fragile glass pieces were buried in tons of water and mud. The Museum also housed a "priceless" collection of books on the history of glass. No date has been set for the reopening of the popular year-round tourist attraction which draws millions of visitors each year. This great flood has great historical implications. Some of our Nation's earliest documents and many old antiques with deep presidential and Union heritage, were destroyed. When this kind of history is lost--it's lost forever. It is sad.

That part of the Natib ships antiques to all parts of the U. S. A. --so you can expect that we won't see many more of the early, primitive relics. But, as a collector, you can also expect that what you now have, will certainly be worth much more now that Agnes did her part in making the rare--even more so. I would say that "antiquing" in the future is likely to be very slim pickings! Everywhere.

King Lawton, with just a little help from us Baptists, is going to win a game this year!

Had coffee with Wes Garnett, Sam Patterson, and Ray Phelps this morning and learned that wheat had jumped from

1.42 to 1.60 this week, with rumors of it hitting 1.65. The wheat market is finally improving, after being sick for many, many years. It is about time.

The city is topping many of the streets in Spearman and they are looking great. Keep up the good work.

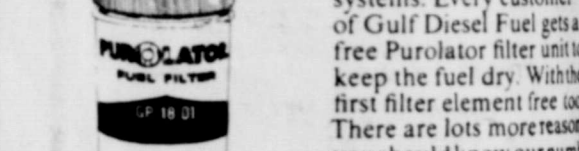

**HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT**

A few weeks ago we printed the recipe for deluxe lemon bars. We are glad to hear several of you have tried the recipe. Unfortunately however a mistake was made in the recipe. It should read 2 1/4 cups of flour. Two cups is used in the pastry and 1/4 cup is used in the lemon mixture.

Several people have called to ask why canned foods did not seal. I hope this list of possible causes will be of help to you.

1. Using off-standard jars.

3. Not screwing band tight against sealing edge before processing.
4. Using jars with nicks, cracks, or sharp sealing edge.
5. Failure to wipe sealing edge clean.
6. Filling several jars before lids are placed on them and bands screwed firmly tight. Fill and cap only one jar at a time.

Let me remind you again that we have canning, freezing, pickling, preserving, etc. bulletins in our office and will be glad for you to have what you need. These are free of charge. Call or come by for your copy.

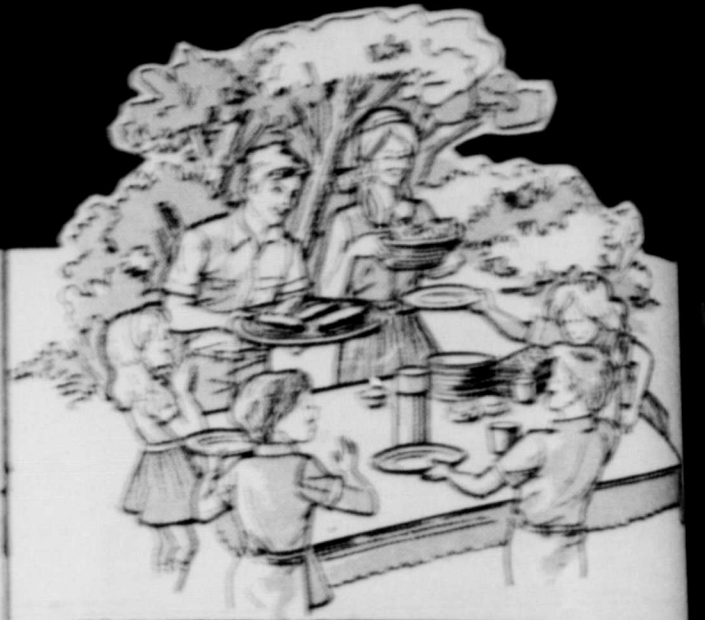
