

#### DR. D. E. HACKLEY

Dr. D.E. Hackley informed the newspaper Tuesday of this week that he is filing suit for the right to be "granted equal staff privileges on the basis that I am licensed by the State of Texas for the practice of medicine and surgery in said state." This is the basis for the

Dr. Hackley wants to use the facilities at the local Hansford Hospital.

Dr. Hackley's last application to use the hospital facilities were filed in January of 1972. He said the application was never granted or denied. The letter that he received from the hospital, stated the action of the hospital staff, deferred action, referring to their bylaws-stating eligibility for staff privileges, was only to those "with MD degrees." Hackley stated that this has been held unconstitutional in higher courts.

A docket hearing on the case has been set for Septem-ber 11th, and the legal interpretations and arguments have been set for September 15th. Presumable, the hearings will be held in Hansford County, in 84th district court.
