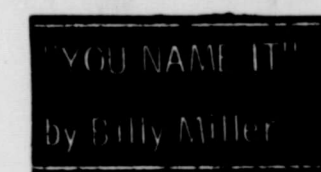
The School Board voted Monday night to call a referendum election to determine the community's wishes in a proposal to build track facilities at the high school.

Should this referendum pass the board will issue time warrants in the amount of \$50,000. This money will be used to build all weather track facilities south of the high school. The warrants would be repaid over a five year period beginning with the 1973-74 school year.

This procedure was selected by the board in preference to a bond election. Issuance of time warrants will cost about \$1,000 less than issuance of bonds. Interest rates will be approximately the same. Several board members have indicated a willingness to purchase some of the warrants without collecting the interest as it falls due. It is thought that others in the community might wish to do the same.

Although the board can issue time warrants without an expression from the community, the board feels the public should have this opportunity to express its wishes in this manner.

Voting will be at the high school in the business office on September 20th, 21st, and 22nd. Voting time will be 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. daily. All registered voters residing within the Spearman Independent School District will be eligible to vote.



Boy, this has been some week. I met with the commissioners court all morning Monday, and learned that that particular group of men is doing a lot of work and a lot of times we fail to give them credit for all they do. I do want to credit them with securing a place for us to get our driver's license. And, I must add, in all seriousness, that the city wanted to keep the license here too. In any event, thanks to everyone concerned, that problem has been solved.

The school board had a very busy session also Monday night. All members were present. The minutes of the August meetings were approved. Bills paid. The school board made a motion and approved that a referendum election be held for the issuance of \$50,000 time warrants for the construction of track facilities at the school. You will vote at the tax collectors office at the high school. I might remind everyone that it is most important that you vote in this election.

You will be voting for the new facility to be constructed adjacent to the physical ed building, which houses our weightlifting equipment, and is making it possible for our high school kids to have dressing rooms, etc. Included will be an all weather track, a steel fence with the dirtwork for an oval shaped football field in the middle. This is working out real well for future expansion for the school. After this project is paid off, this could be the location of a new stadium for the school. And, believe me, it will be great for the band and the kids to have this facility at the school.

The last time this issue came before the public, it was narrowly defeated. This newspaper joined in presenting both sides of the problem. At the time, the voters felt that it wasn't the right thing to do. At this time, we have also looked at both sides of the issue. If we ever are going to build any kind of track facility for our school, we sincerely think it is the time to get behind the school board and all of the kids at school and vote FOR this program. In fact, we can't

find ANYONE who is opposed to the building of a new track. This will be a straw vote, literally. The school board wants to know the attitude of the voters, concerning this issue. Track facilities are becoming one of the biggest and most important parts of all of our schools. Gruver just finished their track this season and it is a DANDY! It is time for Spearman to let our kids know how we feel about a track! Be sure and vote on this important issue!

The election will be held on Sept. 20, 21, and 22 at the high school business office.
