### Spearman Woman Is New U.S. Citizen



MYONG CHUN NOBLE of Spearman is a new American Citizen. She received her papers, September 26, 1972 in District Court, Amarillo, Texas.

Mrs. James L. Noble of Spearman received her citizenship papers last week in U.S. District Court in Amarillo. Myong Chun was one of 33 petitioners to pass the requirements for U.S. citizenship.

Mrs. Noble, 30, has been a resident of the United States for the past 11 years, but did not seek to become a naturalized citizen until she and her husband moved to Spearman last November. Then, she was urged to begin her studies which are required for citizenship. "Mickey," as the petite native of Korea is called, said she owed so much thanks to Mr. and Mrs. G.M. Nichols and Mr. and Mrs. Coy Kelly of Spearman for helping her with her studies. Immigrants are required to have a thorough knowledge of U.S. History, the Constitution, Government, and etc. Since her command of English was not so good, Mrs. Noble said these Spearman friends helped her in many ways and she was able to complete her studies in five months.

Myong Chun attended school in Korea, and completed the 6th grade. Since her school then taught no English, she only began to learn this language when she came to America 11 years ago. In Korea, her father owned a grocery store. He is deceased, but her mother, who is 51 years old, still lives. She resides with her family, four daughters and three sons. Mrs. Noble said she will "sponsor" her brother, 25 year old Wam Sang Lee, to come to America. She has

Two different vehicle accidents this week have left two Spearman men in Hansford Hospital.

Late Sunday evening, 2 miles south of Spearman on highway 760 Mr. Glen Leslie, 53, lost control of his grain truck. The loaded truck flipped over, pinning Mr. Leslie inside for some 30 minutes. # County Agent Report

We were real proud of the Hansford County 4-H members at the County 4-H Achievement Banquet held Saturday night. The banquet honored the 4-H members and adult leaders for the project work they completed last year. This week is National 4-H Club Week and we want to encourage parents and adults to assist and help the many 4-H youngsters here in Hansford County. One of the main purposes of 4-H Club work is to help boys and girls develop their leadership and citizenship qualities. We adults often get too busy and tied up with our own affairs. Sometimes we forget that our kids are the most important crop we are producing and they are our hope for the future.

**HIGH PLAINS FED BEEF AND CARCASS SHOW**—The Amarillo Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the Fourth Annual Beef Carcass Show October 16-19. The entry deadline is October 9, and the entry fee is \$25 per each pen of 5 steers. A total of \$1,000 in premiums will be paid to the owners of the top five pens of steers in the show. The objective of the show is to identify steers which are efficient converters of grain to beef and produce carcasses which are closely attuned to all segments of the beef industry. If you have some real top fat cattle this would give you an opportunity to see how they rank among the best selected by cattle feeders around the Panhandle area. For more information call me or most feedyard managers have the information also.

**BEEF COW NUMBERS UP**—Beef cow numbers have increased substantially in Texas since the first of the year, according to figures compiled by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The biggest increase in cow herds has occurred in South Texas and in parts of East Texas and along the Red River.

**AUGUST LIVESTOCK SLAUGHTER UP**—Commercial production of red meat in the 48 states totaled 3,144 million pounds in August, 3 percent above a year earlier and 19 percent above July 1971. Commercial meat production includes slaughter in Federally inspected and other slaughter plants, but excludes animals slaughtered on farms.

Beef production was 1,985 million pounds, 8 percent more than August 1971. Cattle kill totaled 3,211,500 head, compared with 3,071,000 head slaughtered a year earlier. Live weight per head was 1,936 pounds, 17 pounds more than 1971, and 2 pounds above July 1972.

**SWINE PRODUCTION STATISTICS**—Hogs and pigs on farms September 1, 1972 in the 10 Corn Belt States are estimated at 46.5 million head, 1 percent below a year earlier and 8 percent below September 1, 1970. Breeding hogs totaled 6.6 million head, 5 percent more than a year earlier while market hogs, at 39.9 million, were down 2 percent. The 10 States included in this report are Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, South Dakota, Nebraska and Kansas.

The June-August 1972 pig crop is estimated at 17.1 million head, 1 percent above the same period in 1971 but 7 percent below 1970.

Let Me See

If you are under 18 years of age--a pauper supported by the county--are not a citizen of the U.S.--have been convicted of a felony and have not had your citizenship restored--are a lunatic or idiot--you cannot vote. So says the Texas Election Code.

If you do not fall in one of the above categories, and you have not registered to vote, Saturday October 7 is the last day you may do so if you wish to cast a vote for the President of the United States come November 7th. There is a 30-day limitation on registering prior to an election, and this Saturday is THAT Day.

Several days on the October calendar are printed in red ink. In case you haven't noticed, they are: October 9--this is Columbus Day, which for the past full century has been October 12th. October 23 is Veteran's Day. This used to be known as November 11, Armistice Day. Fighting in WW One ended at 11 a.m. on November 11, 1918. France and England and the U.S.A. chose this day to be set aside for honoring their war veterans. But, since world war one America had several more wars, and more veterans to honor, so Congress passed legislation in 1966 to change the observance of Veterans day to the fourth Monday in October.

Then, there is the last Sunday in October when daylight savings time ends, and we get to sleep that extra hour we lost last April. Also--many important people have birthdays in October, but we won't go into that!

HANSFORD COUNTY history buffs will be glad to know that we do have a "Paul Revere". Mr. G. W. Robinson, who teaches 7th grade Texas History and Geography let me in on this bit of history. G. W., who has taught in Spearman public schools for some 15 years, has a very unique way of teaching. He poses his pupils questions concerning both State and local history, and he lets them find it out for themselves, any way they can. Down through the years, he has accumulated some very interesting items on Hansford County history. None of this "recorded" matter, but has come from the people who lived it, and related facts to him orally. Like G. W. pointed out, whether you want to admit it or not--history is often times "opinions". The Paul Revere story goes like this--and was related to me, Robinson by old timers who were born and reared in Hansford. Back in the day before there was a

County Seat in Hansford County, there was a small town up on the hill called Farwell. Then there was the community down in the valley called Old Hansford. Both petitioned for the county seat and the first written petition which reached the district court at Old Mobeetie would be granted this request. A Mr. Mel Wright jumped astride the fastest horse this side of the Red River and rode hell-bent-for-Mobeetie. He got there first, and was dubbed the "Paul Revere" of Hansford County. Lots of people around here must have known this old-time story, for G. W.'s history pupils all came up with the name of Mel Wright (who is the grandfather of Wright Hale.) As to opinions--those people who had settled in Farwell probably never did consider Mr. Wright a Paul Revere. Anyway, it is all very interesting. Mr. Robinson has offered me access any time to his private collection of Historical memorabilia all gleaned from the mouths of old timers, who ought to know. I intend to take him up on this.

**news from your HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT**

This is National 4-H week. We hope you will look at the exhibit the Penny Pinchers 4-H Club has placed in Gordon Drug's window. The week was begun a day early with the annual achievement banquet held on Sept. 30th. Ninety 4-Hers and 30 leaders were recognized for work done this past year. Each month the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture releases a list of foods plentiful for the month. These are food in good supply and usually at reduced prices during their feature time. For October look for wheat products (October 3 was the international day of bread.), turkeys, rice, broiler-fryers, fresh apples, canned applesauce and apple juice and eggs.

One of the most often complained about items is the amount we spend in the grocery store. The fact, that is so often overlooked, is that we buy many non-edible items in the supermarket. The next time you shop separate items when you get home. It's quite a shock to see how much is spent for cleaning aids, paper products, personal care and even linens and clothing. These items must be deducted to get the true picture of food costs for your family.

As you shop watch your basket and those of shoppers around you. It's quite interesting to see what we purchase at the "grocery" store.

The fact is that each year we are spending a smaller percentage of our pay checks for food. In 1950 we spent 22.2% and in 1971 this dropped to 16.3%. Of each dollar spent in the grocery store 72¢ goes for

food and 28¢ for non-food items. Remember that pet foods are not a part of our food costs.

As fall progresses we will be seeing nuts in the shell. Many times these are mixed nuts. These include almonds, Brazils, filberts, pecans, and walnuts. When buying these check the quality. They should have clean, unbroken shells. Avoid nuts with oil-stained or moldy shells. These are signs that the kernels may be rancid or decayed. Also look for the U.S. grade name as several companies package nuts under USDA inspection. This is your assurance of quality and size. The extra fancy and fancy grades will carry the grade shield, U.S. Select or U.S. Commercial are lower grades and do not carry the grade shield.
