BANKING FIRM PROMOTES PITTMAN TO ASS'T VICE-P



At the annual director's meeting of the First State Bank held this week, Bill Pittman was promoted from Assistant Cashier to Assistant Vice President.

Mr. Pittman became associated with the First State Bank just last April, 1972, after completing his military service. Bill is an "honors" graduate of Texas Tech. In May 1969, he received his degree in Business Administration, majoring in Finance.

His wife is the former Mary Lou Cluck. They have two daughters, Jana and Paige. The family has become very active in church and civic work since moving to Spearman. Just recently Mr. Pittman was named a director of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce. The family resides at 1010 Blodgett Drive.

A native of Hansford County, Bill is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ellis Pittman of Morse.

Deposits in the two banks in Hansford County reached a new year end record in 1972 and a healthy growth of over five million dollars over a year ago.

Bank deposits were at a year end record of \$15,000,414.85 at the First State Bank in Spearman according to reports made last week to regulatory agencies.

The figure compared with \$12,871,169.16 a year ago as of Dec. 31, 1971. The gain reflected was \$2,129,245.69.

At First State Bank a climb was also reflected in savings deposits that were up some \$581,618.00 over last year.

In the same comparison, Gruver State Bank of Gruver, Texas showed deposits totaled \$11,176,769.76 at the close of business Dec. 31, 1972. This new record reflects an increase of \$3,103,350.99 over last year. At the close of the December business, 1971, deposits in that banking firm totaled \$8,073,418.77.

Climb of savings accounts and all categories continued at Interstate Savings and Loan Association here (formerly Perryton Savings & Loan). The firm had savings accounts of \$15,778,685 by the close of 1972, up 2 1/2 million from the previous year's total of \$13,283,414.

Bank loans for the latest call report at First State Bank totaled \$9,947,134.71 over a million dollars from the previous October's report call.

Bankers contribute the healthy growth in Hansford County to agriculture and livestock feeding. In the early part of 1972 this county had more livestock on wheat pastures and in feedlots than ever before. Cattlemen caught a good open winter, the cattle experienced good weight gains and stockmen sold on a good market. Farmers also reaped a better market price. Custom cattle feeding facilities added greatly to the hike and merchants did a good business in 1972.

A Spearman banking official attributed the million dollar increase in loans over last quarter's figures to the fact that Hansford county's maize harvest has virtually never been reaped and that the majority of this figure represents "farm loans." "If our farmers could have gotten their maize in, their loans could have been paid off--instead, this money is still outstanding until the grain can be gathered."

In short, the increase in both deposits and loans can be attributed to the county's giant agriculture cornerstone.

Mr. Anderson said work would begin very soon on the Gruver Clinic with long range plans in mind. Anderson said the Clinic would receive a newer, larger X-Ray unit, various pieces of medical equipment, office supplies, etc.

Plans now are that Dr. James Thomas, a Spearman physician, and Dr. Ahmed would be present at the Gruver Clinic on alternating afternoons and mornings--perhaps two days a week. Then as time goes by and business at the Gruver Clinic warrants one, "an attempt would be made to get a full time Doctor for the Gruver Clinic," Anderson said.

Gruver residents "want--and need a physician there and certainly we want to give the people this service if at all possible," he stated. Anderson went on to explain that the Gruver Clinic is strictly under the charge of the County Commissioners and that the Hansford Hospital Board has nothing whatsoever to do with it, other than being willing to help and aid in any way possible.

"At least we can give the people in Gruver the best we have to offer right now in staffing their clinic with a physician on duty part time," the hospital administrator concluded.

SORGHUM TESTS EXPERIENCED ADVERSE CLIMATE

According to J. Joe Wright, associate agronomist at the High Plains Research Foundation the entries in the 1972 Grain Sorghum Variety Tests experienced the most unusual as well as some of the most adverse climatic conditions that he could remember.

Temperature and precipitation records taken at the Foundation show that 1972 was a year of climatic abnormalities. The two most significant ones were the very cool, wet summer and the cold, wet winter that began on October 31 with an ice storm.

The 56 entries in the Double-Row Grain Sorghum Variety Test (optimum irrigation) were combine harvested on December 7. Yields in this test ranged from 5000 to 7800 pounds per acre and averaged 6720 pounds per acre.

The 36 entries in the Single-Row Grain Sorghum Variety Test were somewhat less affected by the adverse weather

BIRD FEEDING CAN BRING MUCH PLEASURE

COLLEGE STATION--Winter feeding of birds can create a natural laboratory just outside your window.

Charles Ramsey, wildlife specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, suggests feeding birds especially during the winter months when ice storms or heavy snows seal up the food supply on the ground for days or even weeks.

Birds can stand frigid subzero weather if they can eat enough food to keep up their body temperatures.

With the inquisitive chickadees usually the first to discover the whereabouts of generous handouts, birds readily accept any hospitality they can find during cold weather.

Once suet and seed are put out, Ramsey advises against discontinuing feeding later in the winter because the birds will come to depend on this regular supply of food.

Winter feeding is sometimes complicated by problem guests such as English sparrows, starlings and squirrels.

Since trapping may not be feasible, the specialist suggests scattering scraps of bread on the ground in the open for sparrows and starlings while feeding grain to the more timid birds in a sheltered spot among trees or bushes.

Squirrels are sometimes troublesome, but they are also interesting to observe. Bird feeders suspended by small wires several feet from anything which squirrels might climb usually solves the problem.

Although some people object to the bullying ways of jays, these birds are beautiful creatures, which, like squirrels, are part of the native wildlife population.

Birds that would ordinarily eat insects must be fed animal food entirely; in other words, seed, beef fat or chopped meat.

As far as feeding devices are concerned, many are available commercially. But a small shelf tacked to a tree to hold seeds and a small piece of hardware cloth to hold suet will be sufficient, adds Ramsey.

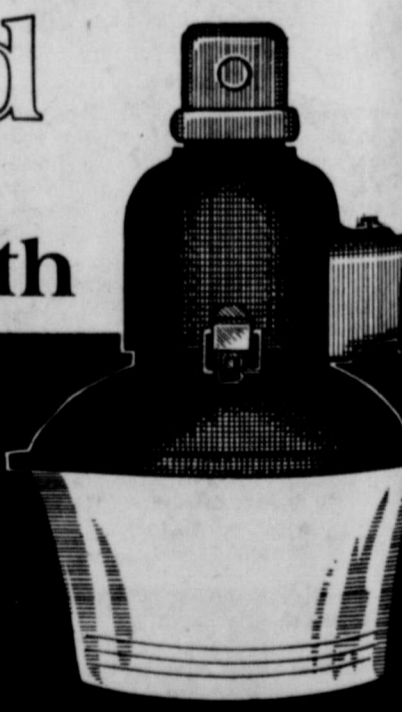

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Let Me See by Sybil...

My frightfully fearsome fobia for flying has increased somewhat the past two years simple because I have no handier for one of those enforced detours to Cuba! Every time I find myself aboard one of those flying machines I suffer one of ole Pop Sanford's famous heart attacks... except mine is more prolonged! People say where's your faith--you know you won't die until your time! That's easy to say, but I also read in the Bible where Job said "the thing I feared has come upon me!"

However, I feel a little safer since the air terminals have begun to search passenger's luggage and make each person submit to a metal detector test. This really works, we were in the Amarillo Air Terminal Saturday evening and watched passengers board a flight for Dallas. This fancy metal detector picks up everything... you got no secrets when you pass through that line! Security officers look through your luggage, and your overcoat they while they shake you down with this thing which resembles an elongated heat coil inside a steak broiler. It is sensitive enough to pick up cigarette packages (foh), buttons, hair pins and even the metal clip on your billfold. It really buzzes when it crosses larger metal pieces... such as a silver plate in a man's head, the pin in a broken hip bone (the lady said it had been there for years) and some shrapnel still embedded in the hip of a soldier-boy. All this was very interesting and passengers gladly submit to the inspection. There is no way a gun (or bomb) could be carried aboard by a passenger, unless you can bribe a stewardess.

The Amarillo Air Terminal is a huge, beautiful, spacious, lay-out. You could get lost in the vast emptiness of the hallways. If you do I guarantee you'll be there for a while because there'll be no one to discover you. The absence of

people is very noticeable. But then, it was built with future growth in mind... and this is good.

The Dallas/Fort Worth Airport is being built "for the future" too. If we could get off to attend the Texas Press Association convention in Dallas the last of this month, we could get a first-hand look-see at the DFW airport.

Scheduled for opening in early fall 1973, DFW airport will become the nation's largest and most sophisticated airport. The jetport measures 17,600 acres or more than 26 square miles, and covers an area larger than Manhattan Island, and cost 700 million bucks! The 66 passenger gates which will open next year will be capable of serving the 10,000,000 passengers expected to enplane during the first year of operation.

Ultimately, more than 250 gates will be employed in 13 terminal half-loops to care for an estimated 200,000 passengers EACH DAY by the year 2001. The planner for this huge airport is Thomas M. Sullivan--he designed New York's Kennedy International and LaGuardia airports. The planners opted to build a new airport which would take care of not only relatively short-range needs, but expected demands into the next century. They determined probably population, market growth, land need and engineering requirements for an aviation era still largely on the drawing boards. A 450-room hotel, electrically powered "people movers", parking areas, lots of room for the big planes... it's all there. Several carriers, not now serving the area, have asked the Civil Aeronautics Board for permission to fly into and out of DFW. These requests include foreign routes as well as domestic... even the big jumbo jets!

news from your HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

From time to time clubs and organizations request information for programs from the extension service. Currently we have materials on mental health prepared for the February home demonstration club program. If any of you desire a copy of this please let us know. Included are symptoms of mental illness and what can be done about it. We also have other materials available. Do check with us when you need some program materials.

Quite a few ladies are busy piecing quilts this winter. Several have asked about where to get scraps, both knit and cotton. If you have scraps that you wish to dispose of we will be glad to pass them on to these ladies if you will

bring them to our office in the courthouse basement. One of the biggest complaints of homemakers about their laundry is graying and yellowing of fabrics. They grayness is caused by not using enough detergent over a period of time. This allows soil to settle back on clothes. Yellowing is caused from a built up of body oils.

To prevent this from happening to your laundry use the amount of soap or detergent the package recommends. Actually measure the amount. Be sure you are washing the clothes for the time recommended by the washer manufacturer. Use a chlorine bleach when color and fabric type permit. Extremely dirty clothes should

be soaked. If laundry is already yellow or gray an overnight or 12 hour soak may help. Fill the washer half full of hot water. (Do not add clothes yet.) Add 3 to 4 cups detergent, water conditioner and 1 cup oxygen bleach. Agitate until dissolved. Then add clothes. As the water cools the solution almost forms a gel. The next day, drain and spin out the soak solution. Wash on full cycle with hot water, adding more water conditioner and bleach, but no detergent.

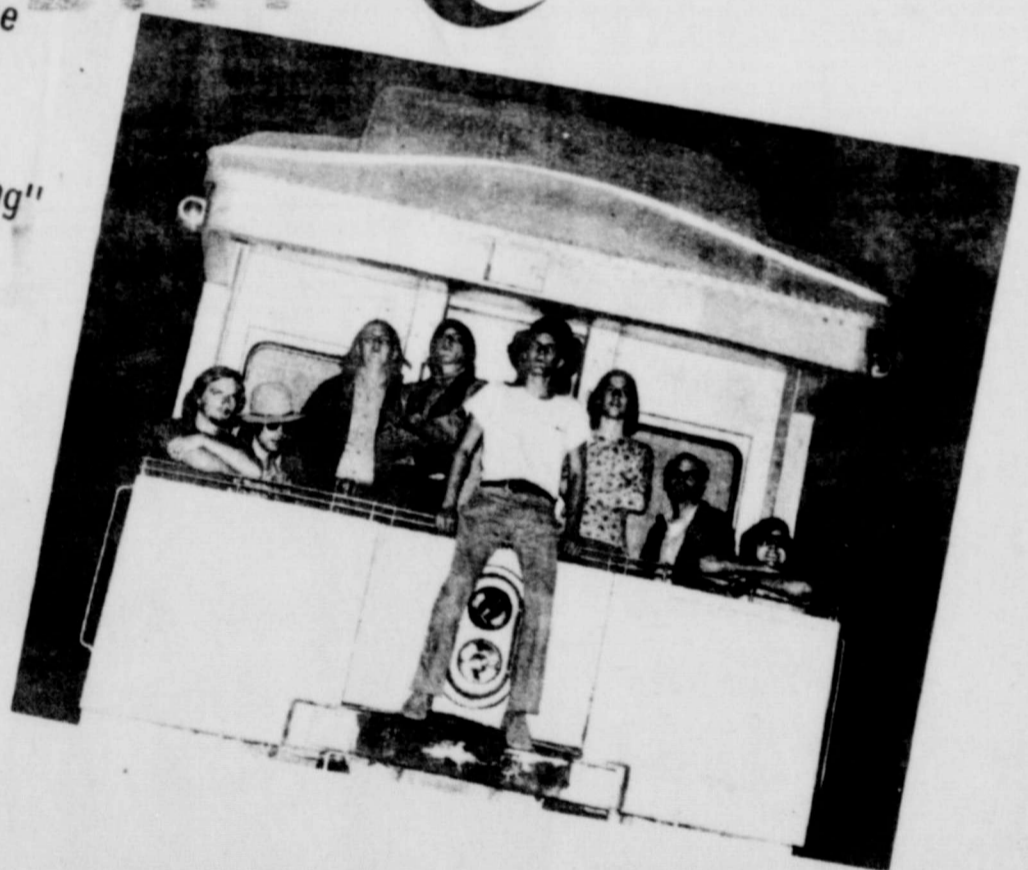

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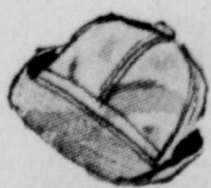

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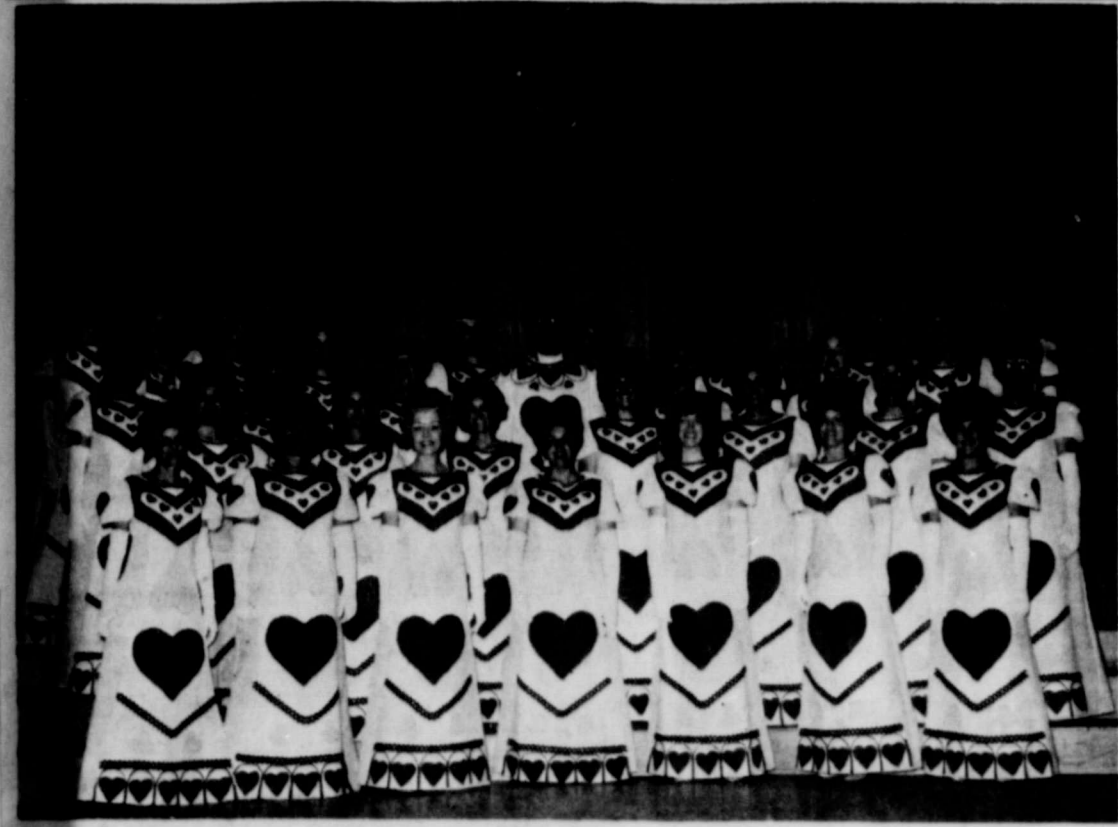

Healthiest People Live In Hansford County

How healthy are Hansford County residents? How do they compare, in that regard, with people in other parts of the country? What progress has been made, if any, in recent years?

Some answers to these questions may be gleaned from the reports of the National Center for Health Statistics, the analytic arm of the U.S. Public Health Service.

Through weekly samplings of families across the land, it keeps constant watch on the physical condition of the population.

It gauges the general health of a community by the extent to which its people are able to pursue their normal daily activities without interruptions necessitated by illness or injury.

This is measured by what is called a "disability days index" which takes account of the number of days of restricted activity, when a person is unable to go to work or to school, and those in which he is kept in bed or in a hospital, called bed days.

In the regional area embracing Hansford County, on that basis, the health of the population was somewhat better in 1970 than it was five years earlier, according to the government's latest figures.

They show that the average number of disability days in the area in 1970 was 15.9 per person, of which 7.2 were bed days. In 1965 local people had an average of 16.9 disability days, including 6.7 bed days.

By way of comparison, the national average in 1970 was 14.6 days of restricted activity, 6.1 of them in bed.

Improvement was noted in this regard in all sections of the country except the northeastern states.

Also, it appears from the figures, women are more likely to be incapacitated than

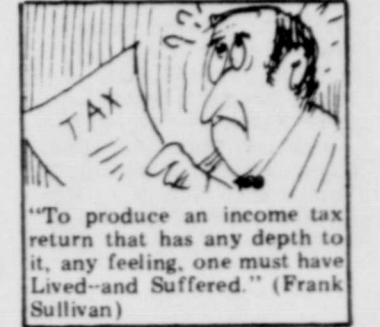
men. They have 15.8 days of disability per year as against 13.2 for men.

The loss in Hansford County, based upon the disability rate reported for its sectional area, 15.9 days per person, adds up to a total of 103,000 days for the year.

The American Medical Association, commenting on these health statistics in its publication "Update," notes that the healthiest people in the country today are those who live on farms in the midwest and have incomes of over \$10,000 a year.

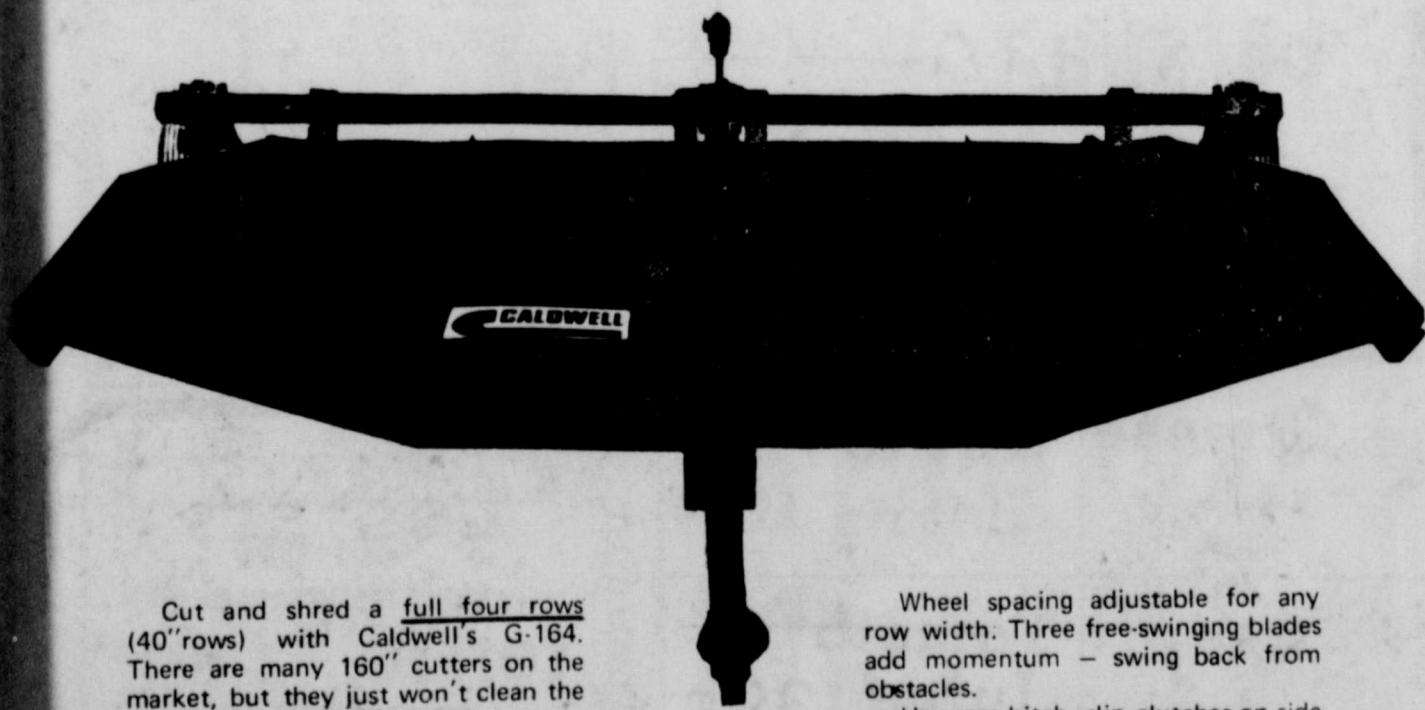
