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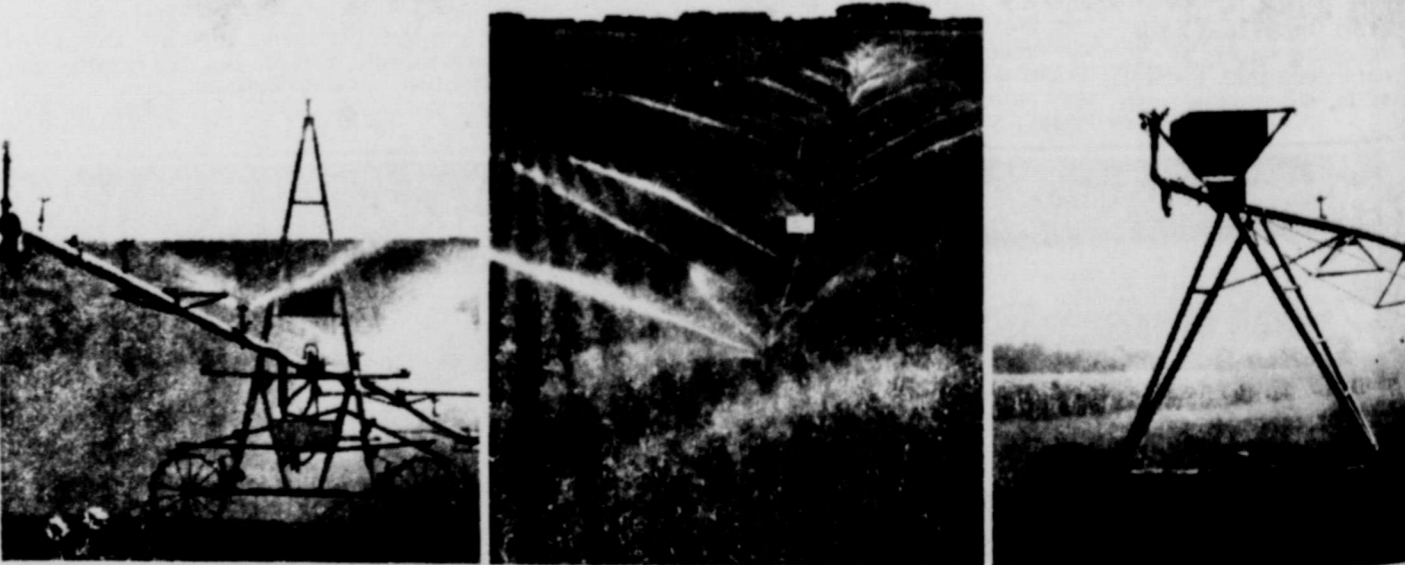
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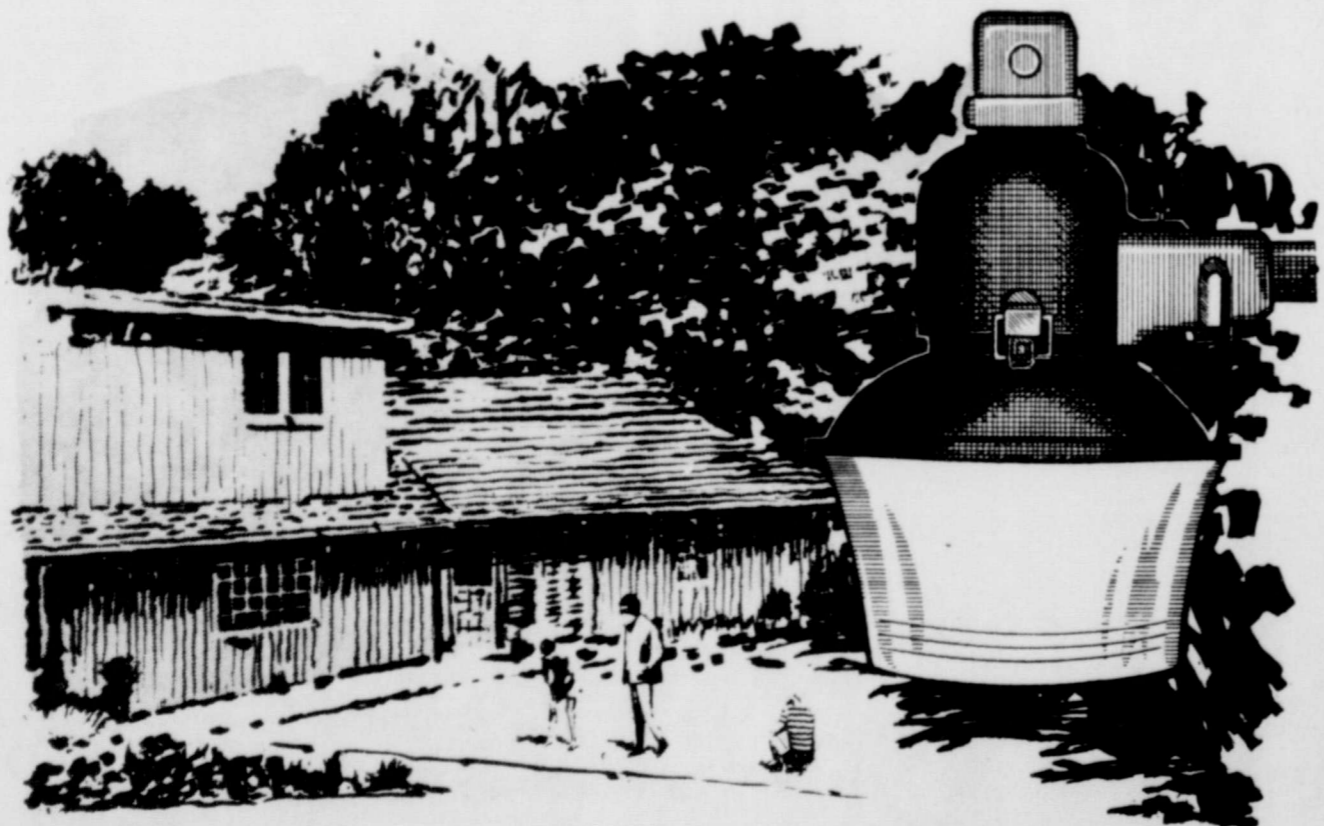

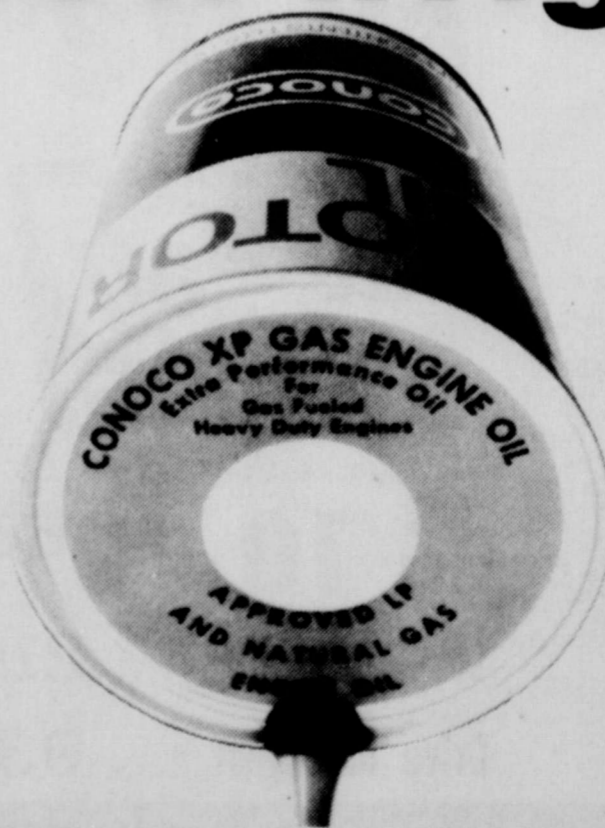

WHEREAS, this City Council deems it advisable to call a bond election for the purpose hereinafter mentioned; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SPEARMAN, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 7th day of April, 1973, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption hereof, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"SHALL THE City Council of the City of Spearman, Texas, be authorized to issue ONE HUNDRED THIRTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$135,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of acquiring or improving, either or both, land for park purposes; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, to be issued and sold at any price or prices and to bear interest at any rate or rates as shall be determined within the discretion of the City Council at the time of issuance; and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

SECTION 2: That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with the V.A.T.C.S. Election Code so as to permit the elector to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition which shall be set forth in substantially the following form: "THE ISSUANCE OF \$135,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION PARK BONDS"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST", and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 3: That said election shall be held at the Spearman Junior High School Building in said City, and the entire City shall constitute an election precinct for said election.

SECTION 4: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election:

CLYDE LONGLEY Presiding Judge  
G.K. RUPPRECHT Alternate Presiding Judge

The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) nor more than ten (10) qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks.

On election day the polls shall be open from 8:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

Absentee voting shall be conducted at the City Secretary's office in the City Hall, in accordance with the provisions of V.A.T.C.S. Election Code, Chapter 5.

SECTION 5: All resident qualified electors of the City, including those who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at said election. That at said election two separate ballot boxes shall be provided at the polling place. In one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. In another box all resident qualified electors (who are otherwise qualified but do not own taxable property which has been duly rendered for taxation) shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each of said boxes shall be recorded, returned, and canvassed in such manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation from the votes cast by all qualified electors (including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation).

## WEEKLY MARKET REPORT

COLLEGE STATION---Live-stock feed costs have risen substantially, so a drop in meat prices isn't likely in the near future.

Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing specialist, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, made this prediction--adding that meat supplies don't equal the demand.

"Roasts are popular this time of year, so there's greater demand for forequarter beef cuts--and better values on hindquarter cuts."

"Scattered specials may be found on round steak, sirloin and rib steaks, ground beef and liver."

"Pork continues in short supply with prices reflecting the shortage. Features are scattered."

"Look for a few specials on fresh pork loin cuts and liver, and on bacon, sausage and semi-bone less smoked hams."

"Although all poultry products have increased in price during recent weeks, they remain relatively good buys," Mrs. Clyatt noted.

"Found for pound, dairy products are excellent food choices. Cottage cheese is a good choice price-wise and calorie-wise."

Grocery produce sections are showing signs of spring--with a variety of fruits and vegetables being offered.

Grapefruit, oranges, apples, bananas, pineapples, potatoes, carrots, turnips, cabbage, broccoli, and hard shell squash are in good supply at the most economical prices.

"Although fresh asparagus is available, price and quality vary," the specialist added.

## TEXAS SCS OFFICER CITED FOR ECONOMY

TEMPLE, TEXAS--A long dedication to economy, efficiency, and cost reduction paid off big this week for Harold R. Baker and the U.S. Soil Conservation Service.

The prize was the coveted 1972 Presidential Management Improvement Award which President Richard M. Nixon gave Baker at the White House March 13.

Baker, state administrative officer for SCS in Texas, was cited for the manner in which he helped his agency achieve increased efficiency and productivity in spite of reduced operating levels and personnel cut-backs.

President Nixon gave Baker a plaque inscribed "For achievement of outstanding improvement in Government operations. Your innovative skills and dedication exemplifies the qualities which have made this country strong."

A quiet, intense career conservationist, Baker is chairman of the Cost Reduction and

Operations Improvement Committee for SCS in Texas. His committee carries out a continuing campaign to keep operating costs down while searching for ways to increase accomplishments and services to the public.

As an example of the impact of Baker's cost cutting campaigns, a recent survey revealed that SCS vehicles in Texas are operated at one of the lowest costs of any federal agency in the nation.

In the citation accompanying Baker's award, SCS was lauded for its modern management techniques, its outstanding accident prevention record, and the manner in which selected SCS activities have been handled through contracts with small business firms.

During the last 20 years, Baker has been given seven citations for outstanding work; two of these were presented by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Baker started his conservation career in 1935 when he went to work as a clerk for the Soil Erosion Service at Temple. After working at Dalhart, Amarillo, and Portland, Oregon, Baker returned to Temple in 1948 where he assumed his present position.

A native of Temple, Baker is a graduate of Temple High School and Temple Junior College. He also studied at Texas Christian University and the University of Texas.

## GRAY WOLF REPORTED BACK IN TEXAS

AUSTIN--The Texas gray wolf has followed the buffalo into near-extinction.

Once common in West Texas in the late 19th century, gray wolves, Canis lupus, fell to traps and poison much more easily than did their smaller relatives the coyotes.

Until recently, the last gray wolf collected in Texas was reported in 1944.

Now, three wolves have been found in the Trans-Pecos in as many years.

In December, 1970, a two-year-old male was killed south of Alpine. The carcass weighed 68 pounds after considerable dehydration.

The same month, another male of the same age was trapped 60 miles away in Longfellow.

Dr. Paul Wyrts of the Sul Ross Range Animal Science Department in Alpine speculates that the two males were litter-mates because of their ages and circumstances of time and place of capture.

A deer hunter killed a 70-pound female wolf south of Valentine, Texas. A smaller animal was reported running with her but it is believed that it was a dog and that the female was part-dog.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department non-game biologist John Smith of Austin speculates that the wolves are coming into Texas from Mexico.

"To my knowledge," said Smith, "there is no breeding population of wolves in Texas."

"Since the cruising range of wolf packs in northern Minnesota is 45 miles a day, it is not unlikely that the animals crossed the border as part of their daily rounds in search of food."

The largest remaining population of wolves outside Alaska is in northern Minnesota.

The Texas wolves were probably roaming in small groups or alone.

"Like the young of many species," said Smith, "the males killed in late 1970 probably had dispersed to some range."
