

She heard this roar like a train or a jet, and pret-ty soon she could hear a thump. thumping sound in the roar, and she rushed back inside and told my sister-in-law to get to the cellar, there's a tornado coming, do you hear it and I sure did hear

the roar.

We didn't waste any time rushing to that basement. No sooner did we get down there til it hit. Leaves and wind were hitting the windows My sister-in-law was down on her knees praying, Moma and I were pretty calm, not knowing what was going on outside. We didn't realize it was so devastating or we would have been scared too. The tornado struck at 9:55 a.m. It took walnut trees three to four feet in diameter and pulled them up like weeds. All my brothers out buildings were gone, a bam, trees, the back porch we had walked through to get to the basement, all the glasses in the windows was blown out. A bedroom door was pulled off and all the porches gone. Ouite a few shingles on the roof were blown off and it leaked very badly after that.

Don and my brother were gone for cigarettes at a little store, one was closed and they went to another, otherwise they could have been in the path of it on their way home. Michele was about 3 miles

Tornado away and for 2 hours we had

no word of the rest. They had to walk in as big trees were laying across the roads from both ways. A house was completely destroyed about a mile on down the road. The woman who lived there was at work in Harrison Hospital where she is a nurse. Lucky for her,

So after we all saw each other and everyone was safe we shed a few tears. So don't take a tornado lightly and find a hole or a ditch to bay flat in. Any way seek cover and fast.

TEXAS BALD EAGLE NEST IDENTIFIED

AUSTIN -- Amid declines in the nation's symbolic bird, Texas' population of bald eagles appears to be holding its own in the seclusion of Southeast Texas.

Parks and Wildlife Department nongame biologist John Smith has located five active bald eagle nests in Texas. The eagle population is con-sidered to be a continuation of birds which nest in Flordia and Louisiana.

An additional 10 eagle nests were discovered in a survey conducted last spring but they appear to be unused. Smith says the birds perfer

You're over the hill, pal, when it takes longer to rest than it does to get tired. I read that some place,

and it worries me more than some, for I understand perfectly what it means. We made a quick jaunt to

Okla. City over the weekend. Was really in the City only 4 hours, but we did run into little Jim Bo Linn while there. Only he isn't "little" any more by any means. He's the biggest, best looking guy you ever saw and tho he has been away now for several years, he recognized us old folks. This always pleases the past-30 age groupers, for a youngster to remember who you are

wet, and so green. One thing we noticed through Oklahoma was that every little hamlet, every farm home and city dwelling had neat, weed-free, mowed surroundings. Everybody nows there and it certainly makes for country-side beauty. We never saw one

single lion's tooth in Oklahoma. For those of you who might wonder what a lion's is, that's the literal meaning of

the "herb" dandelion. Did you ever in all your life see as many dandelions? If you are a newcomer to Hansford County and perhaps among the few who never saw one of these yellow-flowered plants, drive by the Blodgett-Linn park on east 11th street. That city park grows enough dandelions to plant the whole earth with an abundant crop. And it has. Dandelions are like elmleaf beetles. It doesn't do any good for YOU to rid your yard of these, unless your neighbors do the same. Twice the City has borrowed equipment from the school to spray that park, but you can

see what good this did. With the abundance of moisture this winter and spring has provided, we may as well give up on ridding our yards or these weeds. I've decided on a new angle.. I'm going to begin cultivating my dandelion crop and seeing if I can come up with some sort of a hybrid. Then, just watch them all die.

Some people do this you know. Cultivate dandelions, After all, this plant is one of the potherbs -- as is lamb's quarter. A potherbs is an herb whose leaves or stems are cooked for use as greens for food! Most of us know

what a good pot of early, tender lamb's quarter greens tastes like. Cooked slowly with a hunk of sowbelly, eaten with a slice of corn bread, this is soul food. Many people can lamb's quarter by the quart, for tasty outof season meals. Why not

dandelions I did a little research on dandelions, and I find that this plant is good for almost everything -- the whole plant, roots, flowers & leaves. The dandelion? "Cood?"

How could this be? And, yet, we read in Genesis 1:29 And God said, behold I have given you every herb upon the face of the earth, to you it shall be for meat. " And a few verses later it says that God saw everything He had made and thought it was "very good". Now I ask you, did God deliberately MAKE THE DANDELION, or is this herb a result of the curse? I

have my own ideas.

Nevertheless, in my search to exalt the lowly dandelion, I find in my old book of home remedies that the dandelion is recommend for biliousness, chronic inflammation of the liver, constipation and coughs. Behold, who would of thought it? You whould collect the root in July, August or September, make a strong infusion by boiling roots in water and drink this freely two or three times a day. I can think of at least a dozen other ills this would cure -- all of which are brought on by constipation, so I suppose the medicinal value of dandelion root juice is beyond imagination. If taken only for con-

stipation, consider the peace

of mind the drink would af-

ford just knowing you would

never be bothered with coughing, biliousness or an inflam-

med liver. Now for the leaves and stems. Pick these early in the morning when the dew is still covering the tender plant. Wash well to remove the ants, leaf beetles, and other unsavory bugs. Cover with water and cook until the fluid becomes green. Pour off. Cover again with water, add a hunk of bacon and stew gently until

tender. Eat and enjoy. Now, here is a great way to utilize the yellow flowers (and at the same time guarantee no re-seeding).

This recipe comes from an old cook book belonging to Mrs. John Wilde. Now, Mrs. Wilde is a Baptist, and a teetotaler, but she told me she intends to try this Dandelion

Pour one gallon of boiling water over 3 quarts of dandelion flowers. Let stand 24 hours. Strain and add 5 pounds of light brown sugar, juice and rind of 2 lemons, jucie and rind of 2 oranges. Let boil 10 minutes and strain. When cold, add half a cake of yeast. Put in crock and let stand until it commences to work. Then bottle and put corks in loose and let it work. In each bottle put one raisin, after it stops working. Cork

So you see, every part of the dandelion can be utilized. You can't whip 'em, so eat 'em, drink 'em and be merry
