The maintenance tax election would ask voters in both counties to approve such a tax, said likely not to exceed 6 cents per \$100 valuation o

Thrips Seen In Grain Sorghum

In recent days, thrips have infested many grain sorghum fields in the area. The thrips are very small, slender, agile bugs rarely as long as one-eighth inch. They are rasping, sucking insects that feed on plant sap and cause irregular yellowing areas and possibly drying and shriveling of the leaves. It is hard to differentiate between shriveling caused by wind and that caused by the thrip. Thrips do not secrete any poisons into the leaves where they feed.

In previous years thrips have not caused any economic damage to grain sorghum. However, after inspecting some fields recently, I encourage farmers to inspect each grain sorghum field you have. Each field needs to be evaluated on its individual merits for thrip

Once grain sorghum is up 5 to 8 inches tall and growing good, I believe that the thrips will not be causing any economic damage to sorghum. How-ever, while the sorghum is real small and tender some fields appear to have heavy thrip pop-ulations that need some chemical control measures applied. But here again this is not a blanket recommendation that all fields need spraying. Each field needs to be evaluated ev-ery 2 or 3 days by the farmer. There are no real guidelines to use in knowing when to spray-each farmer will need to evaluate each field on its own stage of growth and level of damage being observed.

Where chemicals, such as parathion, are applied most all insects in the field will be killed. This may lead to additional sprayings later in the season for greenbugs since the beneficial insects are killed off now. No one knows now how this problem may develop later in the summer.

We do not have any real solid information to base chemical control recommendations for thrips on grain sor-ghum. The chemical used must be cleared for use on grain sorghum and this would include a large number of chemicals. However, if I were going to suggest a chemical, parathion, should be one of the most economical chemicals and give good control. I encourage farmers to consult with their aerial applicators on the choice of chemical to use. Other chemicals might be available that would do the job just as good and as cheap.

Federal Aid To County \$933,000

To what extent has Hansford County been sharing in funds distributed by Washington under the Federal grants-in-aid

programs? What portion of the allotments made in the past year to communities across the country, a total of \$35 bil-

lion, went to the local area? On the basis of a state-bystate breakdown made by the Tax Foundation, a non-profit research organization here that keeps watch over government spending and taxation, the allotment to Hansford

County was relatively small. An estimated \$933, 000 was awarded in the fiscal year for local purposes under a number of aid programs.

Throughout the State of Texas, the grants totaled \$1,647,000,000, according to an analysis by the Tax Foundation of figures released by the Treasury Department.

The purposes of the grants is to assist the states and their communities with such needs as chiid welfare, public housing, educational activities, health facilities, urban renewal, job training and the like.

Also considered in the study was the cost of these benefits. The findings are that the overall cost is much greater, in nany localities, than the aid received. In other areas, it is considerably less. In no state do they come out evenly.

It is pointed out that there is no attempt, in awarding them, to achieve a balance and return dollar for dollar but rather to allot them in accordance with each area's

Hansford County's cost in the past fiscal year, via Federal income and excise taxes collected from local residents and allocated to the aid programs, was approximately

\$933,000 received. The state as a whole was also behind on that basis. Its payments for the

\$1,647,000,000 received, came to \$1,728,000,000. Thus, for every \$1 of aid, the cost was \$1.05, exclusive

of matching funds. Just how much money will be forthcoming from Washington in grants-in-aid from now on is uncertain. The new budget proposes eliminating about 70 specific programs and replacing them with "special revenue sharing, " notes The Conference Board.

As I indicated in my last Weekly News Report, I intended to continue with my discussion this week of the provisions of the Senate version of the new farm legislation under study by the House Agriculture Committee. However, in passing their farm legislation June 8, the senate amended their bill to such an extent that the whole complexion of this legislation has been changed. The changes made by the Senate are of such magnitude that they have caused great alarm among members of the agricultural community. Those of us who are on the House Agriculture Committee have continued to meet in out respective sub-committees in order to save this

legislation. After extensive discussion and research, we began to meet in full committee Thursday with the intention of writing up our version of the new farm leg islation and with the hope of reporting a bill to the Con-gress which will meet with the approval of the farmers and ranchers, the Admin' tration and the Congress.

As a member of both the Cotton and Livestock and Grains Sub-committees, I would like to point out the crucial recommendations these sub-committees are bringing to the attention of the full Agriculture Committee. While these recommendations may be altered by the full Committee, they were reached through many hours of debate, study and consideration of the interests of the farmer and rancher,

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news from your HOME DEMONSTRATION

We are constantly hearing about the energy crisis, pollution, etc. There are steps we can take as individuals to help though only in a small way. Many of these are simple steps to take. Walk when you can, or ride a bicycle or form a car pool. Don't leave the motor running when you are in a store. Many people do this to leave the air condition-

er or heater running.
At home turn off lights not in use. Keeping shades drawn or shades pulled reduces entrance of sun and thus requires less air conditioning needs. Set the thermostat a little warmer-75 degrees or so to use less fuel. It will still be cooler than outdoors.

In the garbage disposal line there are also several things you can do. Feed scraps to a dog if you have one or a friend does. (Ise vegetable waste in a compost pile. Cut the tops and bottoms out of cans and mash them flat. Avoid using foil, plastics and other products that

will not decay naturally. There are many other ways that you can help conserve water, clean air, etc. Just use some common sense.

This is the time of year to pinch and dishud flowers for more beauty. This will result in more abundant as well as larger blooms.

To encourage busing growth of annuals such as asters, calendulas, dahlias, larkspurs, marigolds, snapdragons and zinnias, pink back the main stem. Pinch off an inch of the stem's top when young plants are 4 or 5 inches tall. Pinching will make annuals produce a compact plant with many



County Agent Report

by Joe Van Zandt

According to a recent USDA release based on June 1 conditions the U.S. wheat production for this year is estimated at 1, 315, 672, 000 bushels as compared to 1, 185, 890, 000 bushels last year, an increase of 11 percent. Texas wheat production is forecast at 86, 400, 000 bushels this year with the yield per acre estimated at 27 bushels. I certainly hope our weather will cooperate and let us get the wheat harvested without anymore severe weather damage this

Fed Cattle Statistics-I re-cently received the statistics on the fed cattle marketings in Texas by counties from the Statistical Reporting Service. Hansford County ranked as the number 3 county in Texas for fed cattle marketed during 1972 with a total of 251, 000 head. Deaf Smith County was first with 518,000 head, followed by Parmer County with 330,000 head. Following Hansford in fourth place was Castro County with 248,000 head and Randall County was fifth with 216,000 head. They counted our feedlot capacity for Hansford County at 168,000 head in 7 feedlots with 1,000 head or more ca-

The number of cattle and calves on feed June 1 in 7 states -- Texas, Arizona, California, Colorado, Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas--totaled 9,455,000 head. This is a percent increase from the 9, 391, 000 head on feed a month ago and 4 percent more than the 9,075,000 head on feed last year at this time. Placements for these 7 States for May were 1, 754, 000 head, which is 47 percent above the 1, 197, 000 head less than a year ago. Marketings for these 7 States were 1, 690, 000 head

for May compared with 1,443,000 head marketed the preceding month and 1,758,000 head marketed a year ago.

There were 2, 252, 000 head of cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in Texas on June 1. This is 10 percent above a year ago and 4 percent above the 2, 163, 000 on feed a month ago.

Placements into Texas feedlots during May totaled 492,000 head. These placements are 12 percent below May 1972 but 91 percent above the previous month. Marketings of fat cattle during May totaled 403, 000 head, which is 12 percent above a year ago and 14 percent above

marketings for April. Elm Leaf Beetle-I have noticed a lot of elm leaf beetle fer ding on elm trees in the area. Now is the time to start control measures before they defoliate the leaves on elm trees. Also the younger larvae are easier to control. In residential areas where elm trees are located on surrounding areas it will help if everyone in the area will control the beetles at the same time.

Chemicals recommended include Sevin, chlordane, Dieldrin, toxaphene and lead arsenate. Another chemical, Di-Syston is on the market and labeled for Elm Leaf Beetle control by the use of commercial operators only. The Di-Syston can 'give season long control by applying 2.5 oz. of material per 1 inch diameter of tree in holes punched evenly around the edge of the tree drip line. The rate of 2.5 oz. per inch of tree is with the 15% granular form of Di-Syston. It is labeled for use by com-mercial operators only because it is a dangerous chemical and ling the material. The other chemicals listed above will probably require repeated sprayings at approximately monthly intervals as compared to the one-time application of Di-Syston. Di-Syston should be watered in well after appli-

Wheat Harvest Grain Loss-Dr. Frank Petr, Area Extensio Agronomist, sent us the following information. In estimating yield loss if you counted 88 seeds in an area 1 ft. by 4 ft. this would equal an average loss of 1 bushel per acre. If however the combine header swath was 16 feet and the 1 ft. x 4 ft. area was behind the straw rack then you would only have a yield loss of 1/4 bushel per acre. If you counted 22 grains in

a square foot your yield loss wouldalso be estimated at 1 bushel per acre.

Dr. Petr says the average number of grains per bushel is about 16,000 seeds, but the actual count varies from 12,000 to 20,000 seeds per
