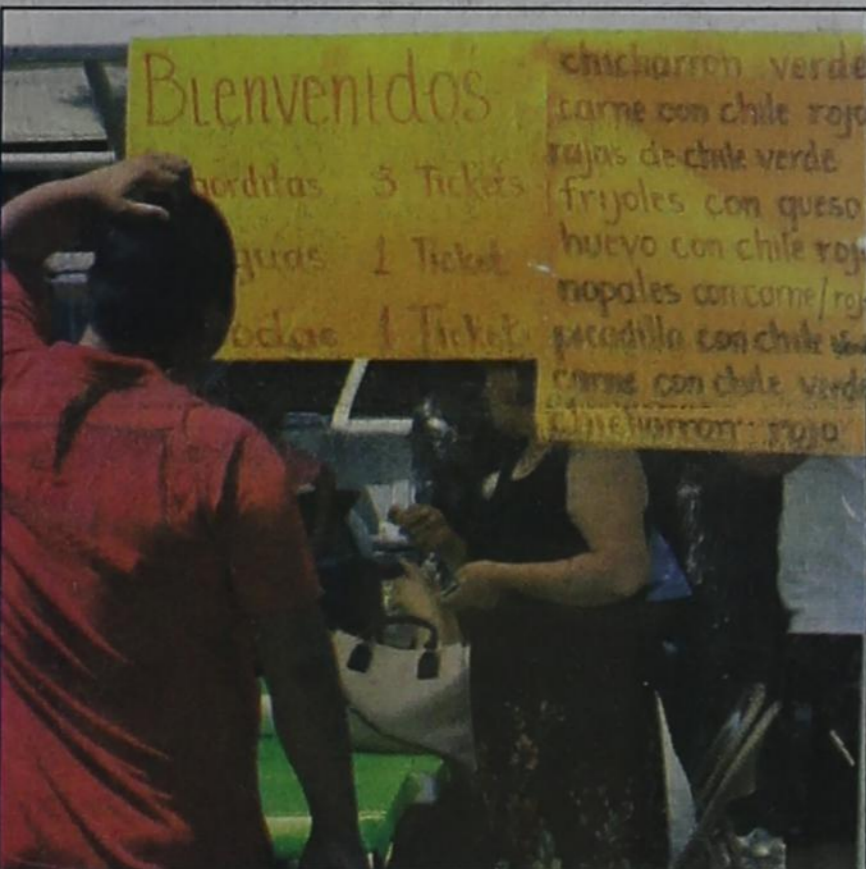

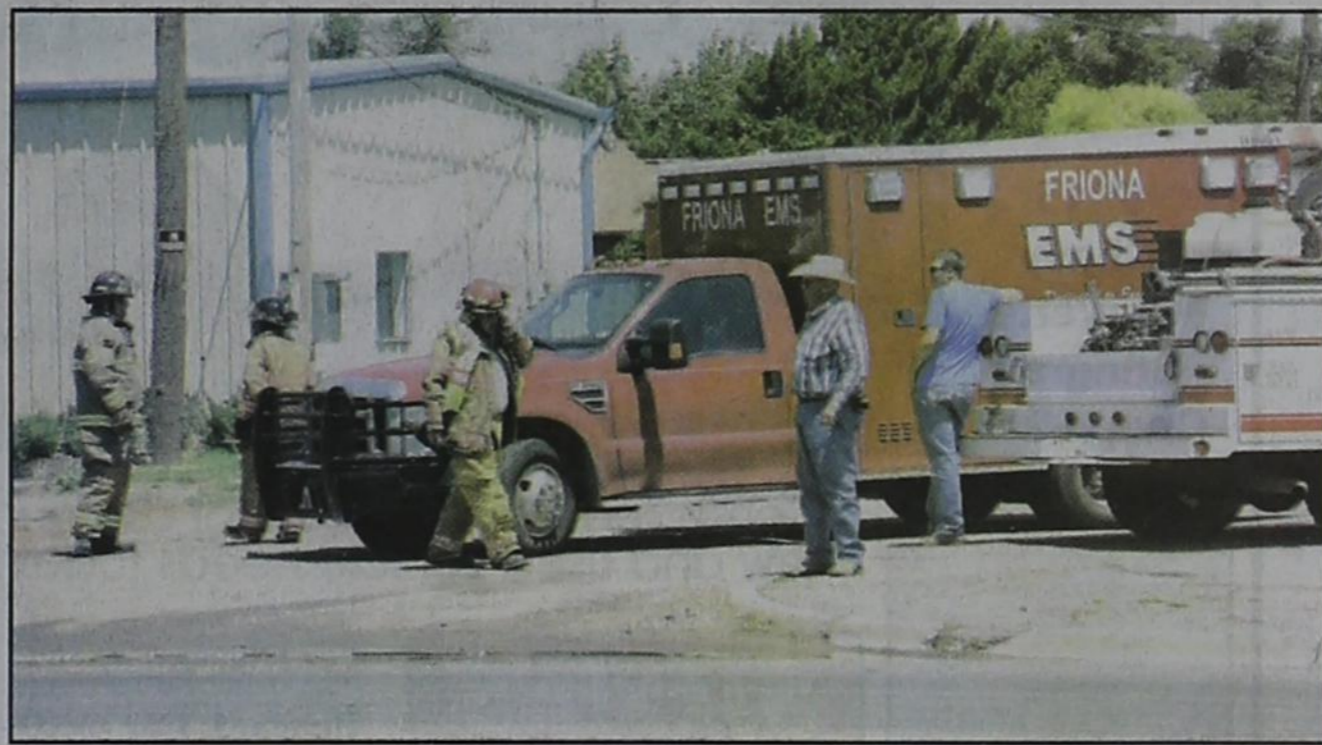

Friona Flashbacks: Historical Preservation

What to do to preserve the past effectively while moving into the future?

What is the best use of resources?

These and many other questions are asked as the current owners of Reeve Farm Incorporated considered the property close to Friona.

No one wants to see the past disappear, but there are few sources of revenue to see it preserved.

Citizens have been able to preserve the first church as the Parmer County Museum. They also moved the depot to the city park and made a scenic place for all to enjoy. A group would also like to see the Women's Club House preserved, and the Parmer County Historical Association is hoping to preserve the "oldest house in Friona" on the old Maurer property.

In light of these considerations, the houses on the Reeve Farm property on the edge of town have been demolished. That seems like such a permanent word, but memories surrounding the lives there will go on as they continue to be recorded.

Stories surrounding the two story

In Prairie Progress, the second Parmer County history book, one can find the George Corwin Messenger story written by Rosalie Messenger. The story records that George married Sarah Ruth Kirk, daughter of George L. and Elsie Livings who moved to Friona in 1908. Although this story doesn't specifically mention the property, apparently the Livings built what later became known as the "two story". Because Mrs. Livings was the Messenger children's grandmother all the children were born there in the late 20's and 30's. Steve Messenger, the first born, was the father of Jay Messenger who married Sally Kendrick Messenger, both Friona High School graduates. The triplets, Floyd, Loyd and Sarah Ruth were born there in December 1932. (Sarah Ruth died on the same date.)

As information was gathered for the 100th Reeve Reunion, Allo Reeve shared about life in the "two story", the main structure on the property. Allo and Glenn married February 7, 1935 and moved to Friona in May and lived in the two front rooms. (Glenn Jr. was born that same



year.) They had a "path" for a bathroom. "Dad Reeve" (F.W. Reeve) bought the land on which the house set on November 27, 1934 from George L. Livings (as recorded in Parmer County Courthouse records). It had been vacant for years, so much cleaning was required before they moved in. Allo and Glenn moved out and Glenn taught in Earth for a year. They eventually moved back into the "two story" in 1937 where there was now an indoor bath. Don was born in 1938 and Allo mentioned that the family moved into "one room" to make room for Chick Schlenker and his wife.

Fay Reeve shared the following in a story written in 1976: "On April 1, 1944, we moved to the farm just west of town one half mile. The "old two story house" built in 1909 was home for us for twenty two years." Their son, Floyd Scott Reeve, was six months old at the time having been born in Belleville, Illinois where his father, Hadley Reeve, was a civilian instructor at Scott Field. Sharon was born in 1944, David in 1950, and Carol in 1955.

In 1994-95, Fay wrote a detailed story of her life. From her writing: "Time marched on, we got the old two story

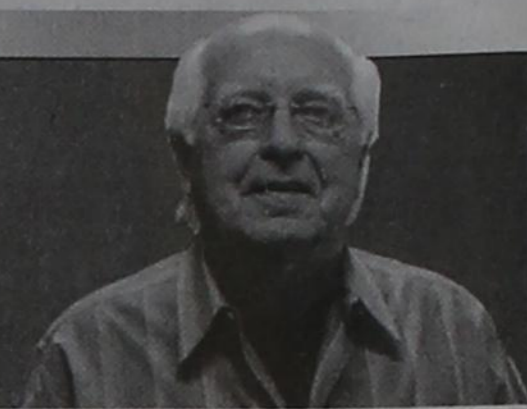
fixed up to where it was livable. I even did a lot of painting inside and helped Mrs. Monroe White, Ted's grandmother, paper the wall and high ceilings." "The house looked pretty good, so on August 31, 1947 my sister Sue had her wedding there.

The mention of the "two story" is when Fay moved out into a new home she had built on 10th Street in Friona. She writes: "Floyd and Betty lived in the 'old two story' when he finished at West Texas." "A memory that stands out in my mind is when we all came back from Abilene and Canyon (this was after the col-

lege graduations of Floyd and Sharon in 1966) Floyd backed the pickup into the yard at the old two story house and we started cleaning out the basement and getting other things we had not moved to the new house. Floyd would say, 'keep or throw away' and we would have to decide quickly if we wanted to 'keep'. Sharon, Carol and David were almost in tears as a lot of their cherished possessions were hauled to the junkyard. I was almost numb after the big weekend, but I said we would have to throw away what would not fit into the new house or store-room."

will tex finally be saved

Tex Randall. He is that 47-foot cowboy that stares down on Highway 60 in Canyon. A recent article in the Amarillo Globe-News said Tex is scheduled to be renovated in the coming months. We've heard that story before.

We have been hearing about repairing Tex for many years. I have lived out here for 20 years and the thought of fixing old Tex has been talked about all that time. Everybody seems to have good intentions but Tex continues to crumble and fade.

He was built in 1959 by William Harry Wheeler while he taught industrial arts at Canyon High School. He died in 1997 when he was 82 years-old. Mr. Wheeler's daughter, Judy Kingsberry, 71, of Denver, says Tex no longer depicts the cowboy her daddy lovingly and ardently built, so quotes the Amarillo paper. She is visiting Amarillo and Canyon to display a pictorial exhibit of her father's work, including Tex Randall.

After years of haggling over Tex's ownership and who should pay for his overhaul, the Canyon Main Street program has raised more than \$350,000

to update old Tex. I seem to remember when it was going to take \$25,000 to fix Tex and folks in Canyon were worried about where the money was coming from. Now they have \$350,000 and Tex is still in sad shape.

Canyon Main Street says his restoration will start late summer or early fall. They say he will be done rather quickly, about less than three months, probably. The area around Tex's feet will be turned into a park and a visitor center. I remember a Mexican food restaurant being there once upon a time.

Mrs. Kingsberry, the daughter, wants Tex to be restored as the original looked, and to add dimples and a wider smile. They have already done away with a cigarette he was holding. And they are donating away with his mustache and sideburns. They plan to patch his clothes and repair his parts. A company in Amarillo is doing that.

I'm not sure why they didn't just tear Tex down years ago and be done with it. It is neat to some people to see the tall cowboy staring down from the hill. Kids probably wave out the car window. Some

might even exit the highway to take a photo.

Tall cowboys are part of the heritage in the Panhandle but they don't live forever. Will they finally do something about Tex? Maybe.

Mrs. Kingsberry said her daddy accomplished many creative works during his lifetime, including training a mule to drink Coca-Cola out of a bottle.

Quite a legacy.

They approved the use of certain county roads for the Mariah Del Norte wind farm project. There will be no fees charged and the wind farm company will provide upgrades to the roads.

County Treasurer gave the 3rd quarter treasurer's report. The report is printed in this issue of the Star.

The \$10.00 road and bridge fee charged on vehicle registrations was renewed. The County Tax Assessor will collect license fees every two years from alcohol sales in the county.

Robert White was reappointed to the Central Plains Center Board, formerly MHMR. Continuing education hours for the Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace were approved. Sheriff Randy Geries reported he attended a Sheriff's conference in San Antonio last week and he is still seeking a source for a new Sheriff's Department vehicle.

County Judge Trey Ellis presides at the commissioners court meetings and all meetings are open to the public.

wish him a successful and speedy recovery.

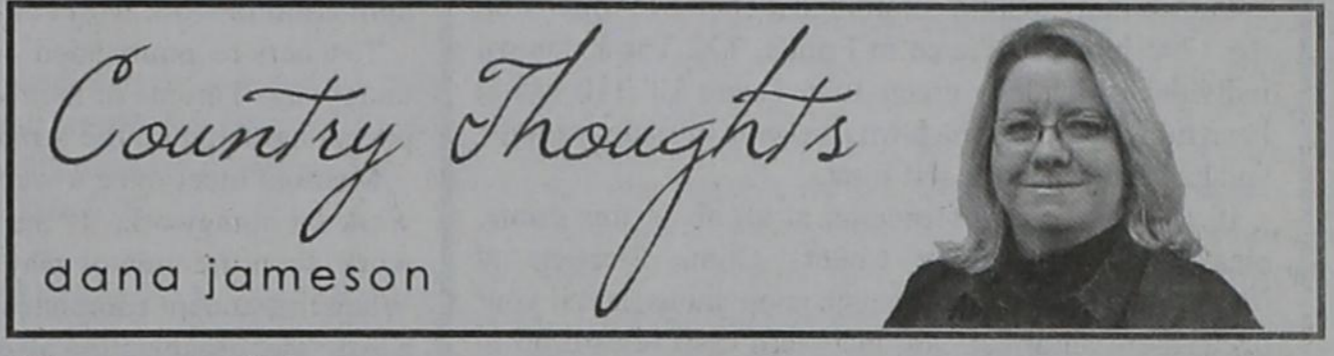

Finding the right direction and being the person you want to be are your responsibilities. Not someone on the outside with no idea who you really are inside.

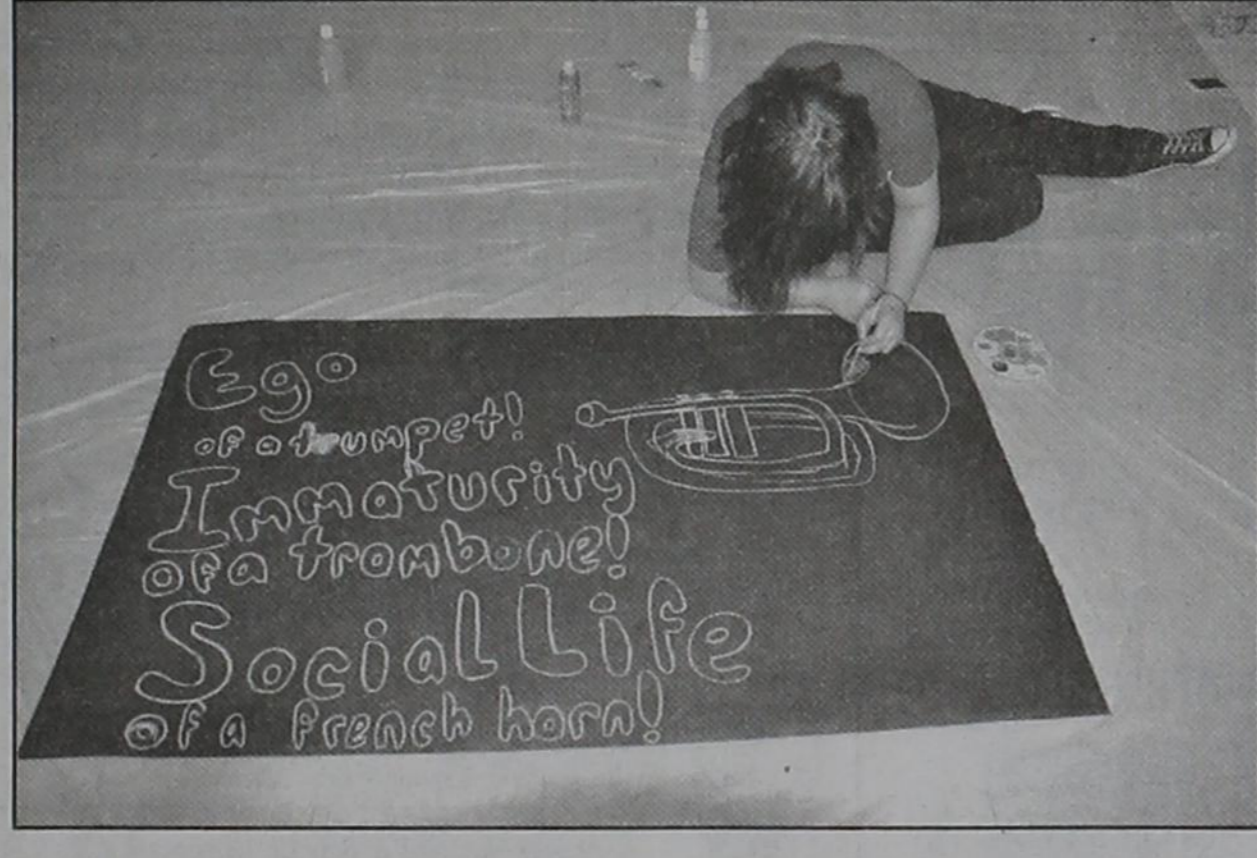
Depression and suicide are no laughing matter. They are real and affect more people than statistics show.

"I missed the students and I needed something to do. I have a friend in Hereford who was excited about the Bigs program and I decided to participate in that," Slagle said.

The Bigs program is part of the Big Brothers Big Sisters plan for helping children. The program is offered at five school campuses in Hereford and is open to children in grades 1-5 that are referred by their teacher, counselor or principal.

After mentoring in Hereford for a year, Slagle decided to initiate the program in the Friona Schools. Working with administrators, she easily recruited 12 volunteers as mentors. Mentors must undergo an extensive background examination to work with children.

Teachers recommended 12 students and the program got underway. Parents of the recommended students must sign papers agreeing on the arrangement.

Mentors meet once a week with the student at noon and work on homework. If the student is caught up on school work, then the mentor may choose something else to do. When the student completes seven assignments, he receives a gift. The organization also gives each one a gift at the end of school and at Christmas.

"I like to do fun science things if we have extra time," she said. "These kiddos need a grandma or grandpa. A little extra attention."

The Bigs program is operated through the Big Brothers Big Sisters office in Hereford.

Mrs. Slagle also is in charge of the Friends of the Library Book Store. A Walmart shopping bag may be filled with books and the charge is one dollar. The Book Store is open 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. on Thursdays and will be open four hours in the afternoon in the fall.

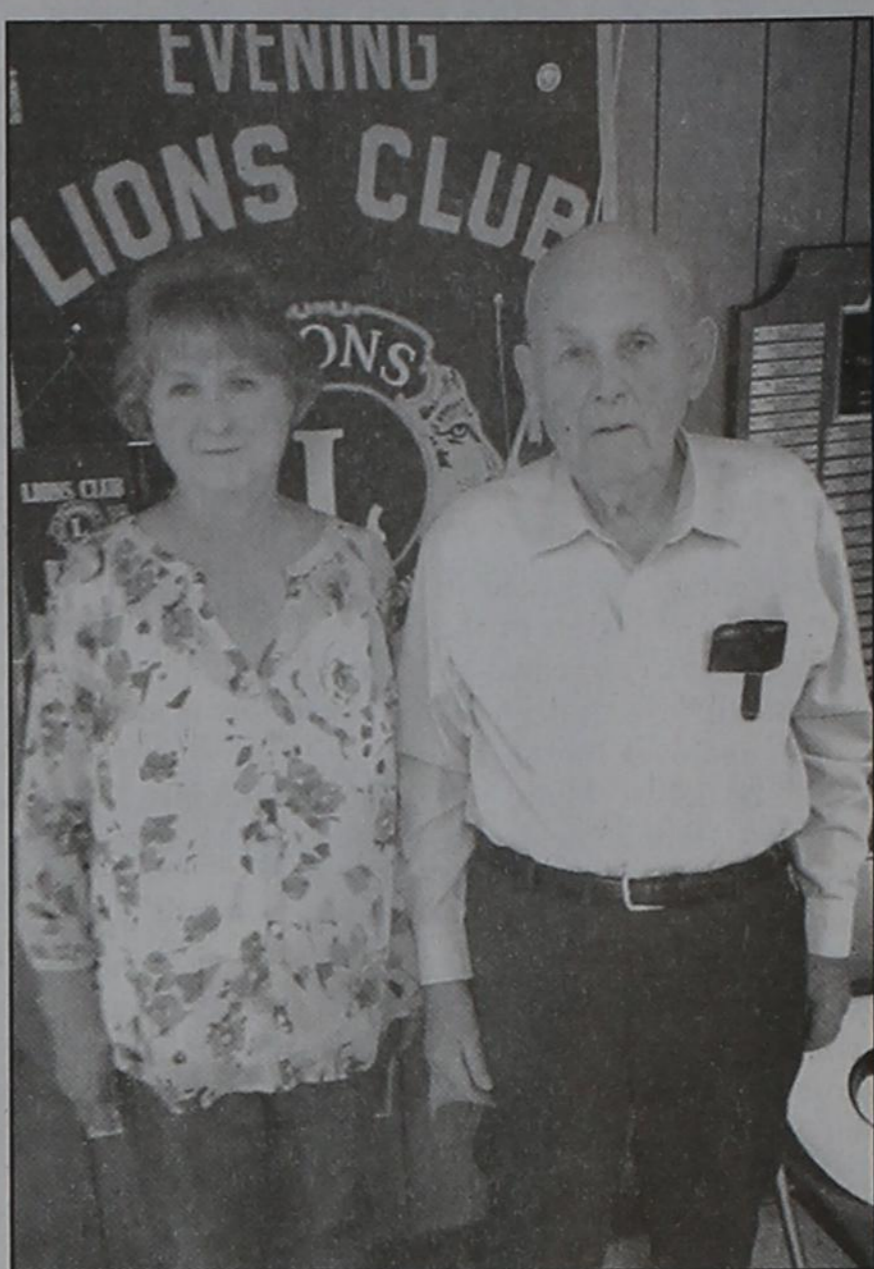

Texas Sales Tax Holiday is on the horizon

This year's Sales Tax Holiday is Aug. 7 - 9. As in previous years, the law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced under \$100 from sales and use taxes, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend. Subject to the criteria explained below, all sales of qualifying items made during the holiday period qualify for the exemption, including items sold online, or by telephone or mail. Lay-away plans can be used again this year to take advantage of the sales tax holiday. The dates for the sales tax holiday are set by the Legislature.
