Red Ribbon Week activities announced

Red Ribbon Week will be celebrated across the country during the week of October 26-30. Friona Primary and Elementary Schools have a full week of fun activities planned to help local students understand that drugs, alcohol and smoking are bad for them. Red Ribbon Week began in 1988 in honor to a Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) Agent named Enrique Camarena. His friends knew him as "Kiki". In 1985, he was kidnapped and killed in Mexico. He had uncovered a multi-billion dollar drug scam that may

have involved the Mexican Army, police force and government. As he left his office one day, five men kidnapped him. He was found approximately a month. Kiki had been tortured and beaten before being buried in a shallow grave.

In 1988, the U.S. Congress proclaimed the first Red Ribbon Week supporting the cause that Kiki had given his life for. The red ribbon was the first ribbon used to support a cause.

No Social Security increase for 2016

With consumer prices down over the past year, monthly Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits for nearly 65 million Americans will not automatically increase in 2016.

The Social Security Act provides for an automatic increase in Social Security and SSI benefits if there is an increase in inflation as measured by the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W). The period of consideration includes the third quarter of the last year a cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) was made to the third quarter of

the current year. As determined by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, there was no increase in the CPI-W from the third quarter of 2014 to the third quarter of 2015. Therefore, under existing law, there can be no COLA in 2016.

Other adjustments that would normally take effect based on changes in the national average wage index also will not take effect in January 2016. Since there is no COLA, the statute also prohibits a change in the maximum amount of earnings subject to the Social Security tax, as well as the retirement earnings test exempt

amounts. These amounts will remain unchanged in 2016. The attached fact sheet provides more information on 2016 Social Security and SSI changes.

The Department of Health and Human Services has not yet announced Medicare premium changes for 2016. Should there be an increase in the Medicare Part B premium, the law contains a "hold harmless" provision that protects approximately 70 percent of Social Security beneficiaries from paying a higher Part B premium, in order to avoid reducing their net Social Security benefit. Those not protected in-

clude higher income beneficiaries subject to an income-adjusted Part B premium and beneficiaries newly entitled to Part B in 2016. In addition, beneficiaries who have their Medicare Part B premiums paid by state medical assistance programs will see no change in their Social Security benefit. The state will be required to pay any Medicare Part B premium increase.

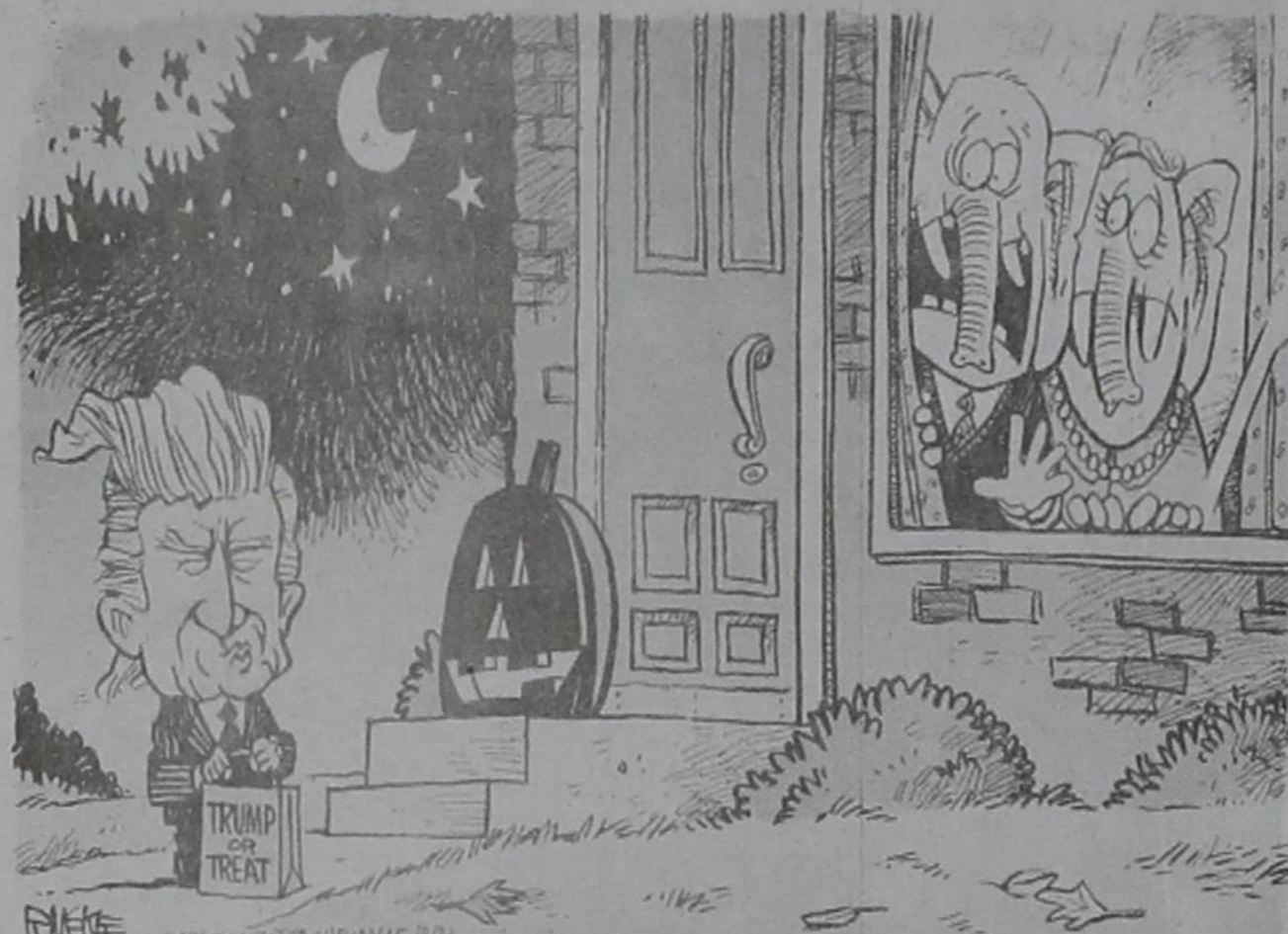

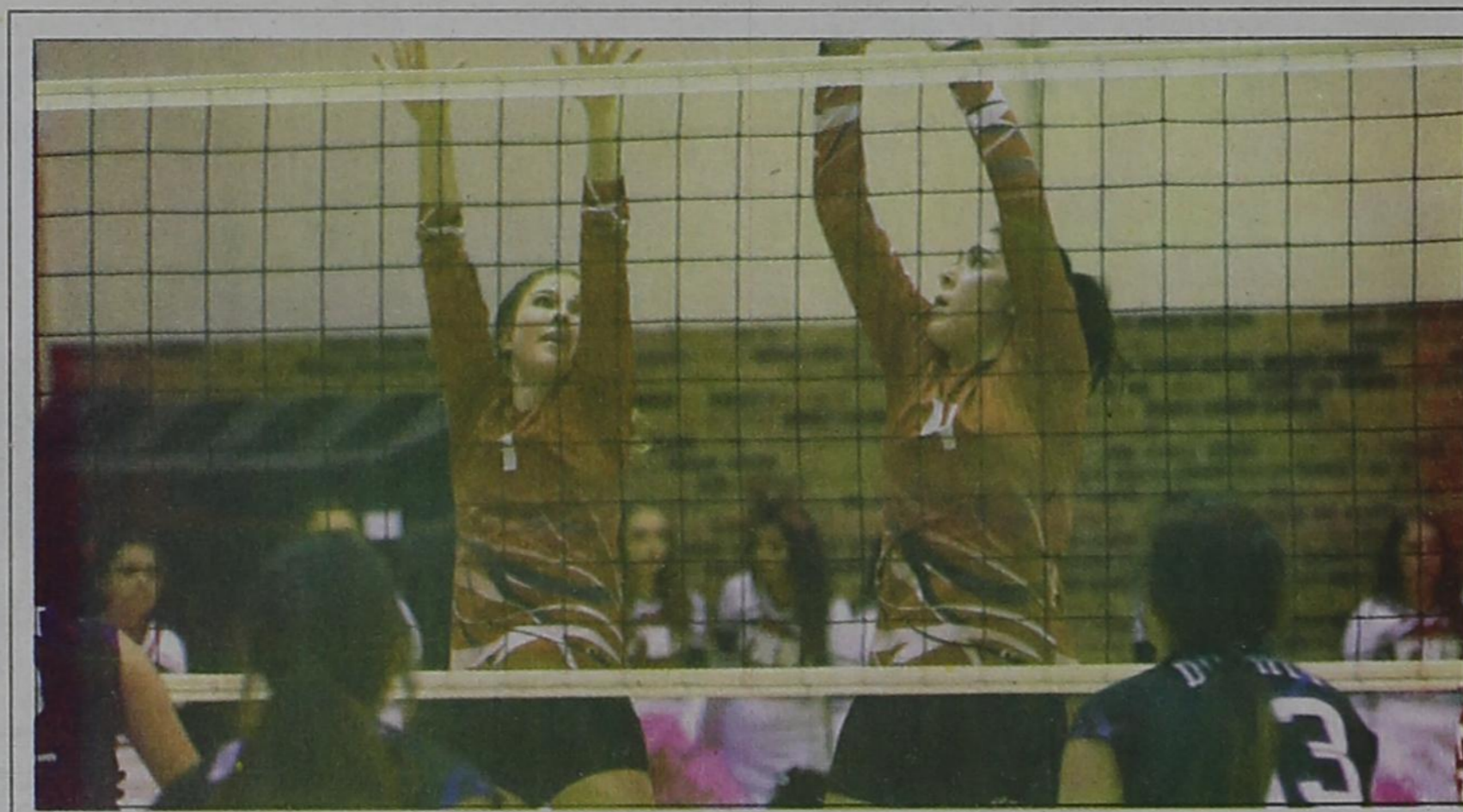
The bookshop is fully stocked with almost every category of book as well as a large number of VHS and audio tapes.

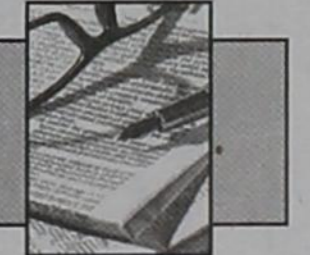

News from the week of October 21, 1954

Arthur Drake of the Friona Wheat Growers said that without a question more trucks were lined up than at anytime since 1949, with the peak of (maize harvest) activity still several days away! On Tuesday the Wheat Growers here dumped 51 carloads of maize—a total of over 5,000,000 pounds, or 370 truckloads with an average load of 13,780 pounds.

was elected Saturday to serve on the board of directors of the West Texas State College Ex-Students Association. Reeve graduated from WT with the class of '35.

Don Lewis, senior high school student, won first place in the talent contest held last week in Muleshoe. We had 10 members and no guests at the Thursday, October 15 Noon Lions Club meeting. Several members were absent because of harvest season.

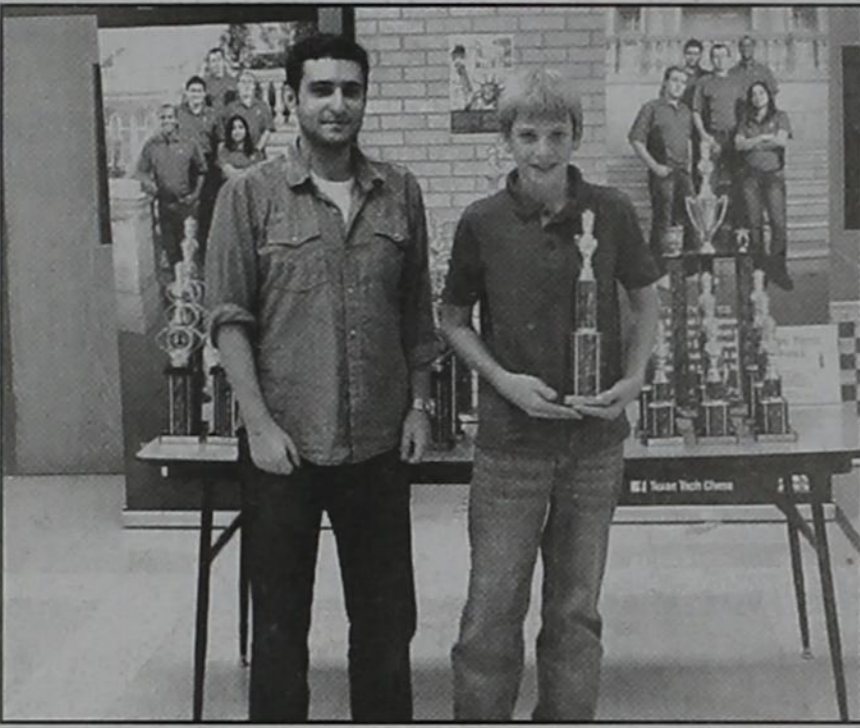

The next meeting of the Noon Lions will be Thursday, November 5 at Headquarters Restaurant. Visitors and prospective members are welcome.



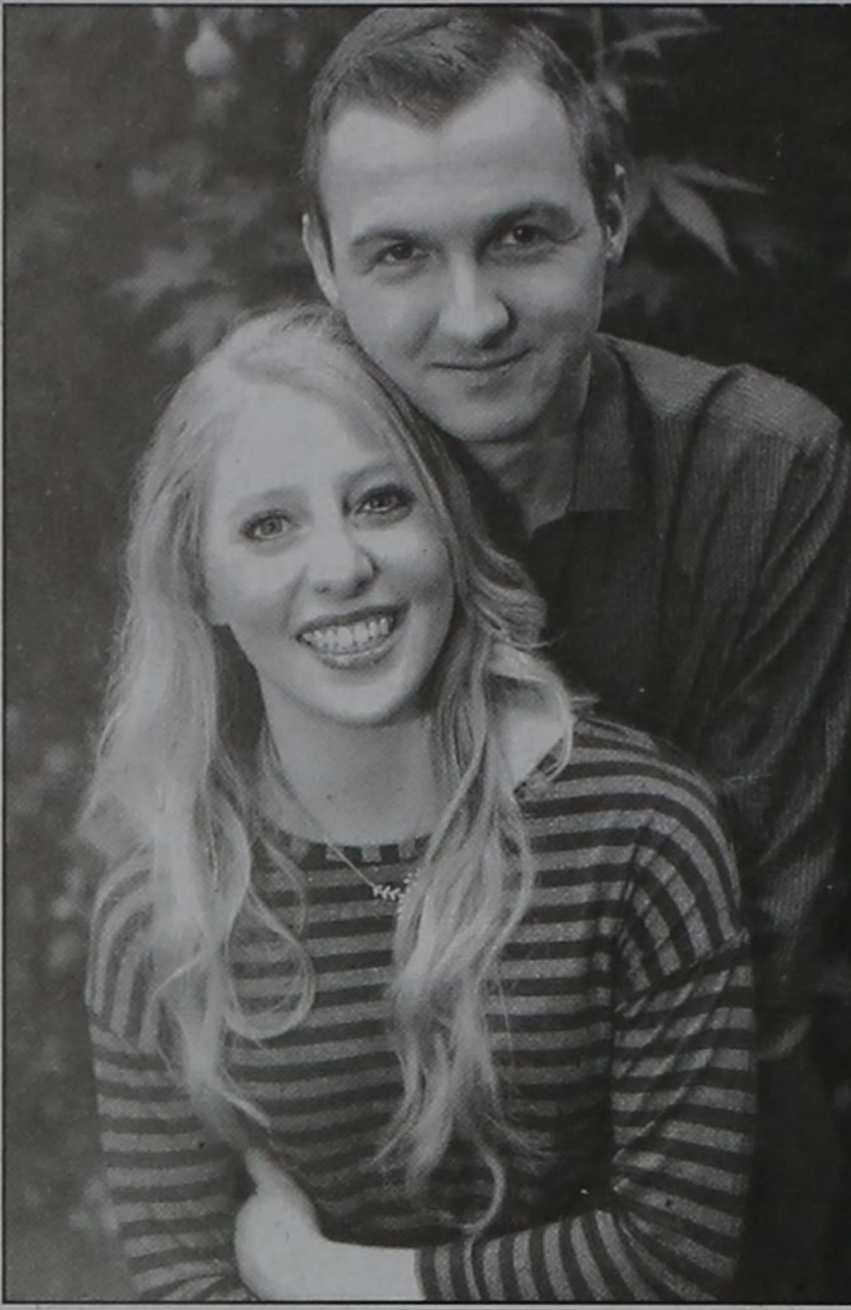

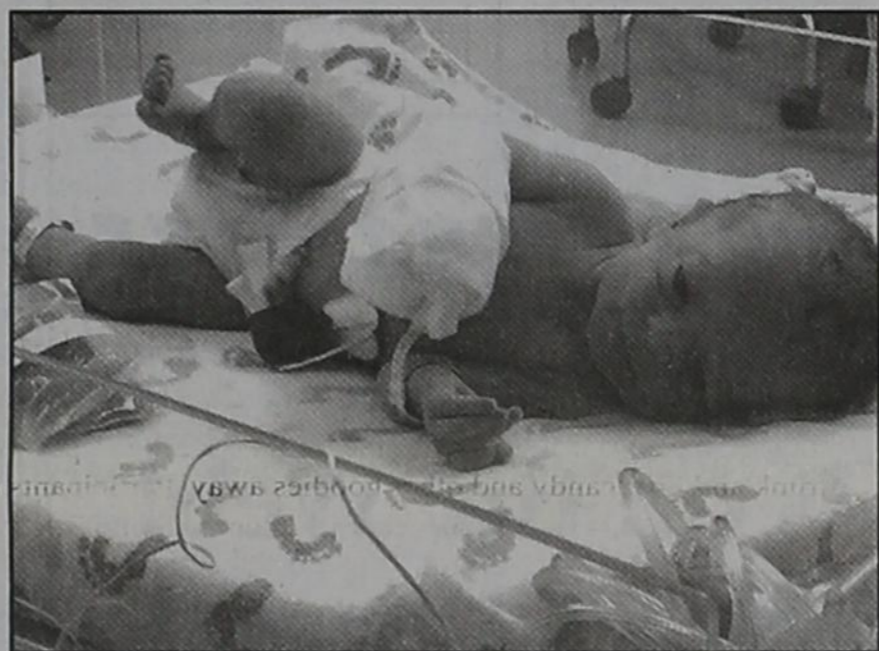

Texas Panhandle volunteer drivers needed for transport

Getting to and from medical treatments is one of the greatest concerns cancer patients face during treatment. To ensure patients get to those much-needed treatments, the American Cancer Society provides free rides through its Road To Recovery® program.

The Society is currently looking for volunteer drivers in all communities of the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle so that all patients have transportation when they need it. An estimated 1,350 Texas Panhandle residents will learn that they have cancer this year; however getting to their scheduled treatment may be a challenge.

"One cancer patient requiring radiation therapy could need anywhere from 20 to 30 trips to treatment in six weeks," said Meagan Crawford, Road to Recovery volunteer coordinator for the American Cancer Society. "A patient receiving chemotherapy might report for treatment weekly for up to a year. In many cases, a patient is driven to hospitals or clinics by relatives or friends, but even these patients must occasionally seek alternative transportation. That's where the Road To Recovery program comes in."

"The program not only helps patients, but is also rewarding for the volunteer. Several of our drivers have volunteered for a number of years," added Jason McCoy, Senior Market Manager of Community Engagement for the Amarillo American Cancer Society.



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
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Four runners qualify for Cross Country regional competition

Varsity girls competing were Briana Alvarado who placed 2nd with a time of 13:09.90 and Beatris Molina with a time of 18:09.30.

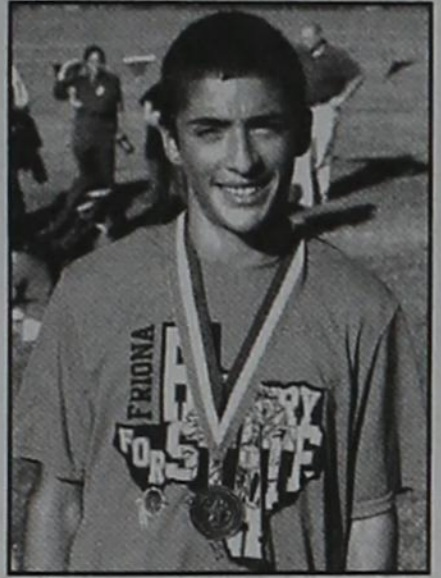

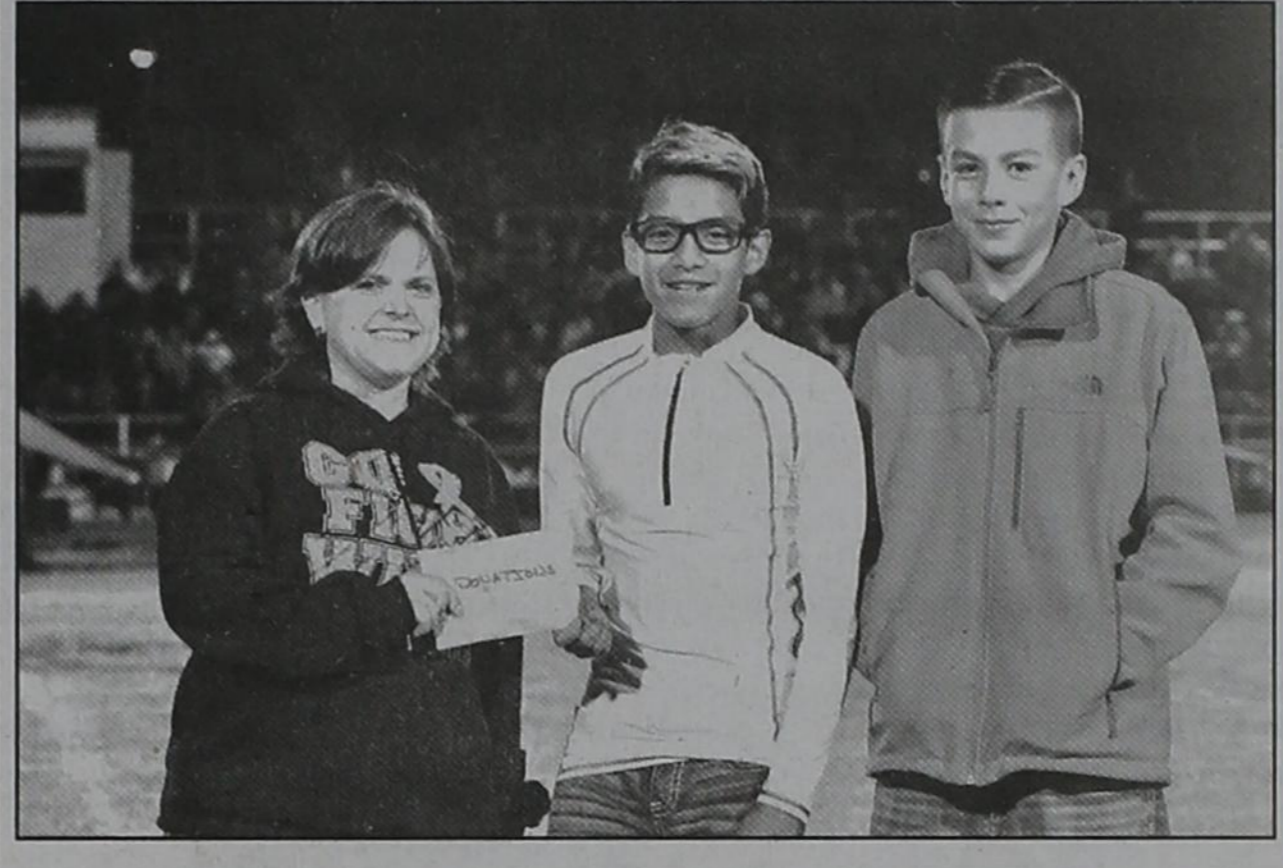
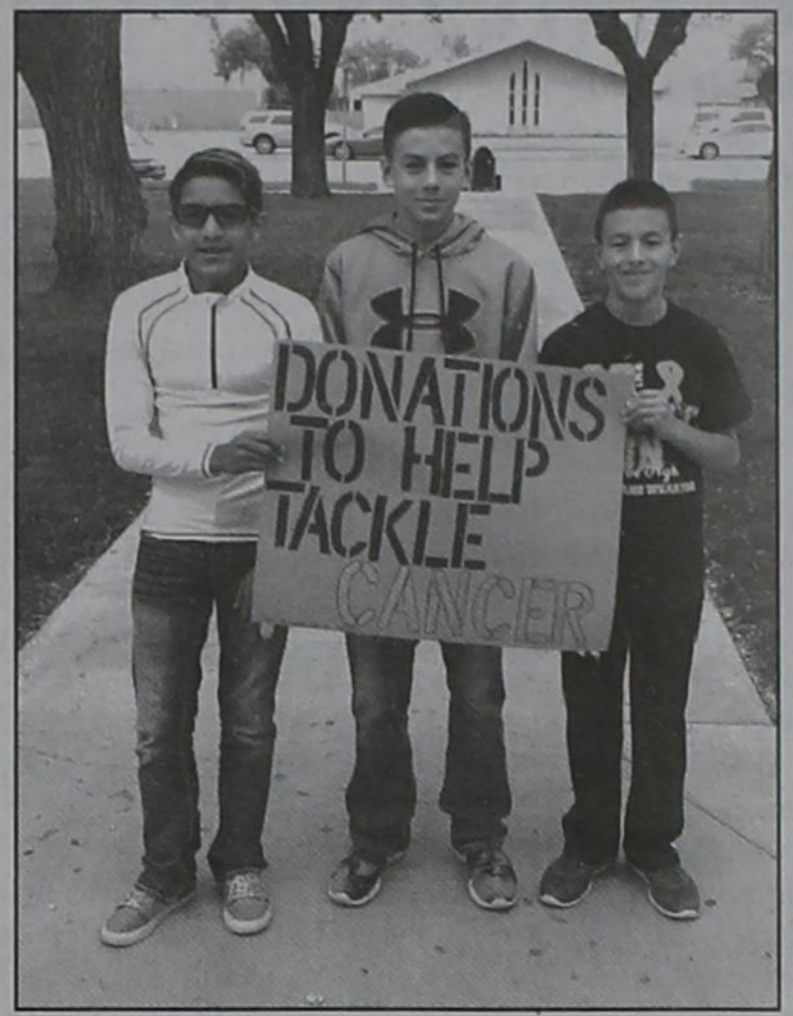

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Virtual conference offered to caregiving professionals

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension and Military Families Learning Network military caregiving team will provide a three-part virtual learning event for military helping professionals beginning Oct. 28.

"Reimagine Your Skills as a Helping Professional: Working with Military Family Caregivers" will be a virtual conference, with sessions set from 10-11:30 a.m. Oct. 28, Nov. 4 and Nov. 28.

The series provides a unique opportunity to obtain professional development and interactive resources for end users who may not be able to leave their homes for training, said Andy Crocker, co-principal investigator and AgriLife Extension gerontology and health program specialist in Amarillo.

"Unlike any webinar, this virtual conference is centered on a theme of re-energizing and rejuvenating personal and professional growth," said Rachel Brauner, co-principal investigator and program coordinator with AgriLife Extension's Military Program in College Station.

"Each session will provide an opportunity for in-depth engaged learning through instruction, discussion and introspection," Brauner said.

The focus will be on foun-

dational tools for professionals working with family caregivers of both wounded service members and those working with special needs children and adult dependents, she said.

The event is free and open to anyone, including non-military caregivers who would like to learn more. It is in addition to the monthly webinars held by AgriLife Extension's Military Program.

The Military Families Learning Network will offer one and a half continuing education credits after each segment from the National Association of Social Workers. Also, certificates of completion will be available for service providers.

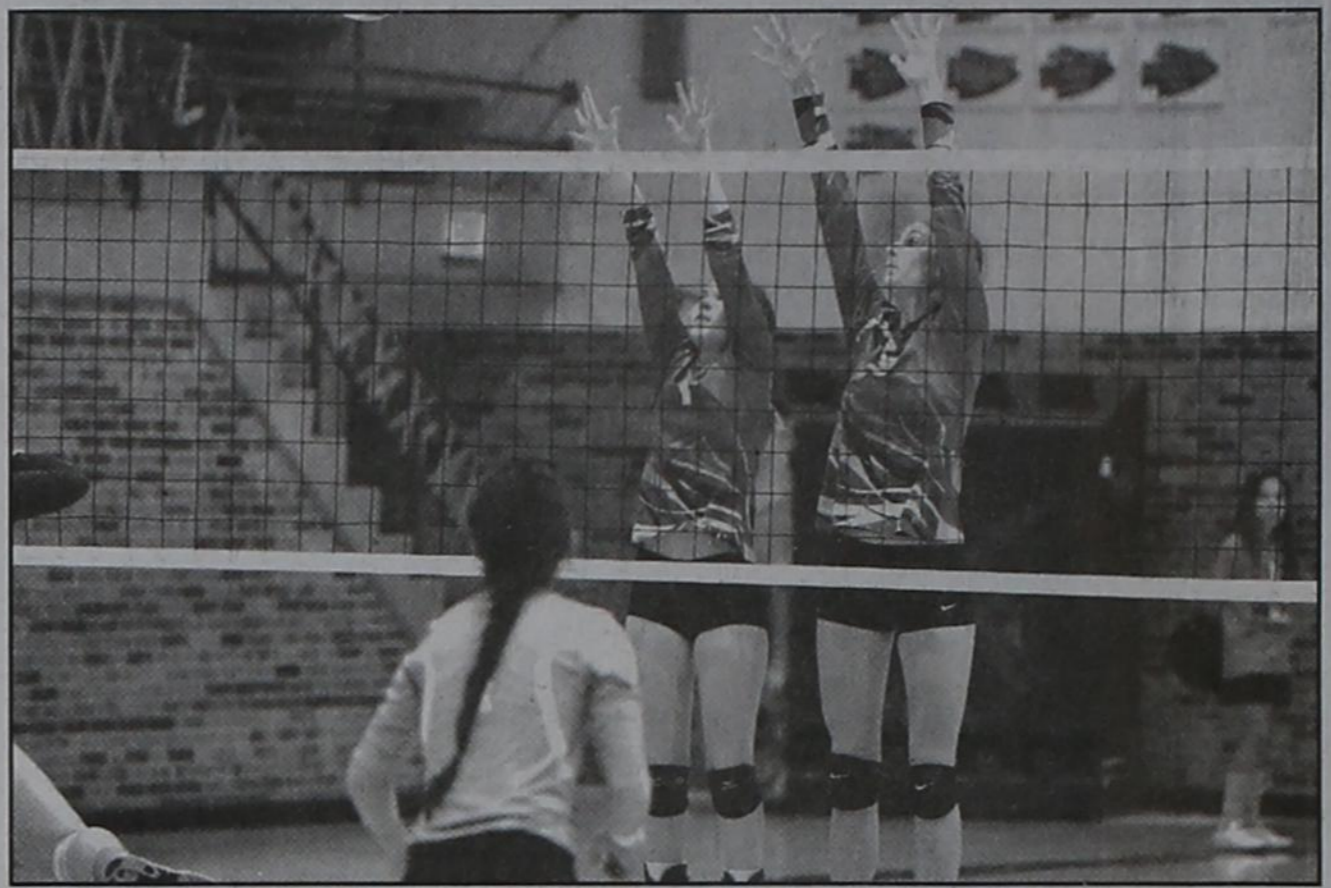

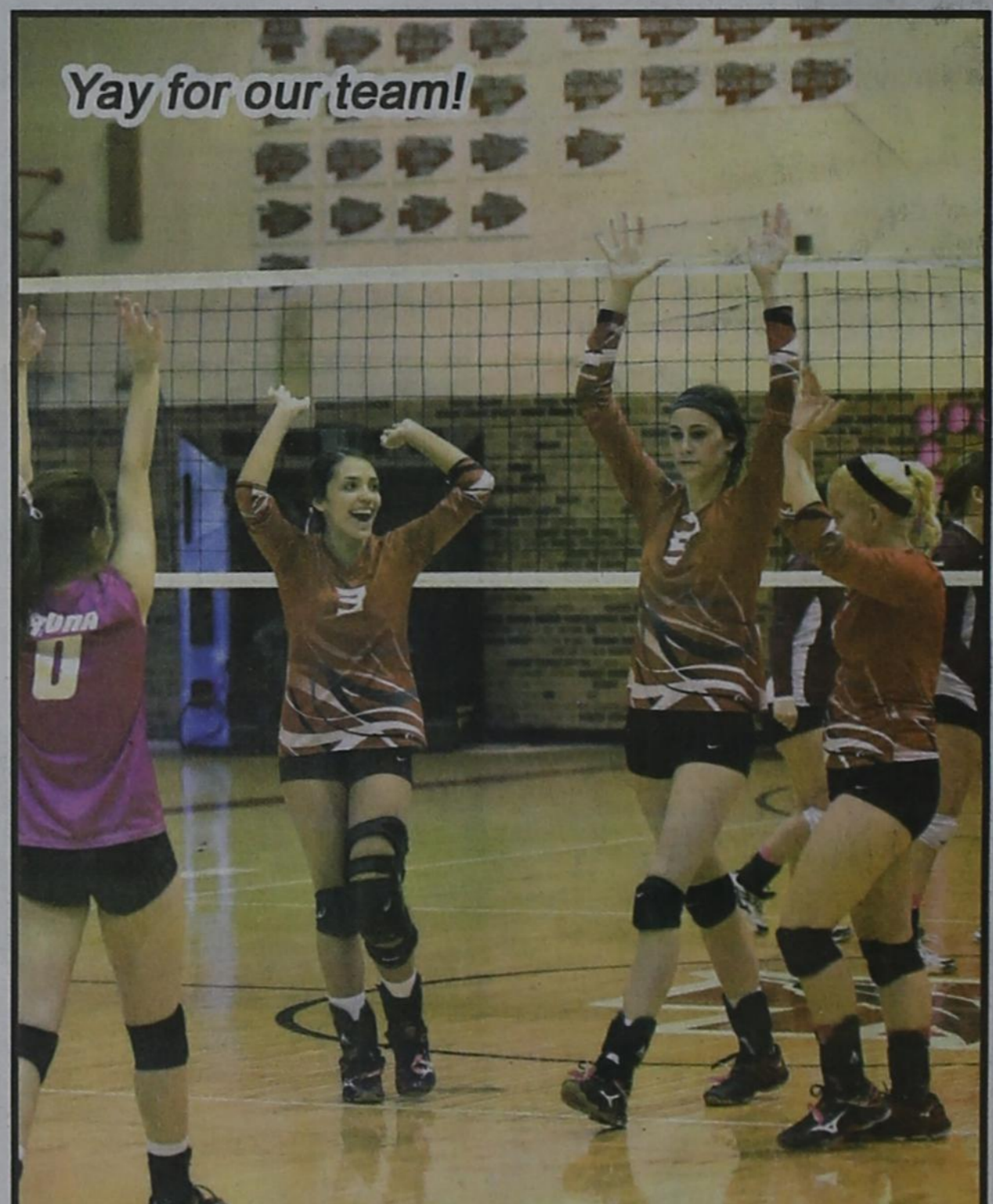
