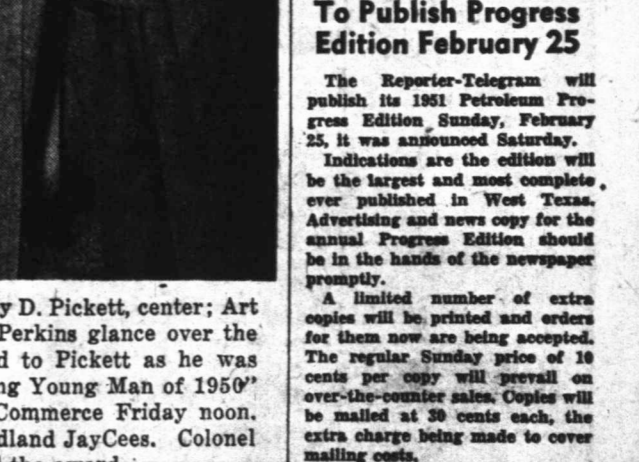

Snyder Aims At Mr. Average With Suggested Excise Taxes

By PETER EDSON NEA Washington Correspondent WASHINGTON—New tax bill proposals unveiled by Treasury Secretary John W. Snyder would hit Mr. Average Guy right where he lives.

The tax on a new car which the manufacturer sells to the dealer for \$1,500 would be raised from \$106 to \$300. The rate jumps from seven per cent to 20 per cent.

Three and three-quarters cents. In other words, the 20-cent cigar will cost 24 cents, instead of 22. Bowling alleys and billiard tables, instead of being taxed \$20 a year each, paid by the operator, would be taxed 20 per cent of the use charge, paid by the customer.

Drilling Started At C-S Quay Wildcat; To Dig 5,000 Feet

HOBBS, N. M.—Thirty miles due south of Tucumcari and in extreme Central-South Quay County, Paul E. Lewis has spudded his No. 1 W. C. Lee, 5,000-foot wildcat 660 feet from west and 1,890 feet from south lines of section 32-6n-30e.

The prospector is at total depth of 1,305 feet waiting for rotary rig to be erected.

In Southeast Chaves County, three quarters of one-mile north of the Eddy County line, E. J. McCurdy & McElroy will drill their No. 2 Key as a wildcat to a possible bottom of 3,300 feet.

Drillite is 1,980 feet from north and east lines of section 34-15e-29e. That makes it 18 miles southeast of Hagerman.

Official Potential

The Texas Company has reported official completion for its No. 1-AN State, two-mile north extension to the Saunders field of Central-West Lea County.

It was potentialized for a calculated daily flow of 288 barrels of 42.1-gravity oil, and 5.4 percent basic sediment and 24 percent water.

The new well is getting its production through perforations at 9,875-9,900 feet opposite the Pennsylvanian. They were washed with 500 gallons of mud acid.

The potential is based on an actual 20-hour flow of 240 barrels of fluid through a 15/64-inch choke. Gas-oil ratio during that flow was 1,560-1. Casing pressure was 1,300 pounds and tubing pressure 1,200 pounds.

Location of the new oiler is 660 feet from south and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 22-14s-33e.

Stepout Se

Atlantic Refining Company has staked a three-location south step-out to Texaco No. 1-AN State. It will be dug as Atlantic No. 1-R State, 1,980 feet from south and west lines of section 27-14s-33e.

It is contracted to go to around 10,000 feet to test for the Pennsylvanian pay found in the Saunders field producers.

Amerasia Petroleum Corporation will drill the No. 2 Luther Cooper as a project in the extreme east side of the Knowles Devonian field of Central-East Lea County, 10 miles north of Hobbs.

Drillite has been set 660 feet from north and 3,300 feet from east lines of section 27-14s-33e.

That falls one location east of a Devonian dry hole and one location south of the same operators No. 1-A Rose Eaves, which was completed from the Devonian for a daily potential of 1,500 barrels of oil.

Producer Seen

Mid-Continent Petroleum Corporation No. 1-C U. D. Sawyer, exploration on the east side of the Crossroads multipay field of North-West Lea County, developed 6,600 feet of oil cut with 10 per cent drilling mud.

The Devonian was drillstem test from 12,024 to 12,100 feet for four hours. Nothing surfaced while the tool was open.

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New Prospector Is Drilling In Midland

Moore Exploration Company of Midland has spudded and is drilling ahead with cable tools at its No. 1 A. R. Bauman, North-Central Midland County wildcat. The prospector is located approximately three miles southeast of the city of Midland.

Drillite is 467 feet from west and 660 feet from south lines of the 220-acre A. R. Bauman tract in the southeast part of section 14, block 38, T&P survey, T-3-S.

Unofficial sources report that the venture might drill to 10,500 feet to explore the Pennsylvanian line. Those same sources say that a rotary rig will be moved in after surface casing is set.

There is no official verification of either of those reports.

HOC Sets Location For Deep Explorer In NE Floyd Sector

Drilling is to be started by March 1 on a wildcat in Northeast Floyd County which may dig to 9,800 feet to explore the Ellenburger.

The prospector will be Houston Oil Company of Texas No. 1 John S. Lackey and will be located one mile north and one mile west of Cedar Hill.

The drillite is 330 feet from south and 990 feet from east lines of section 11, block D-2, OCS&F survey. That makes 12 miles north and one mile east of Lockney and 10 miles north and five miles east of Floyd.

The exploration is to be on a checkerboarded spread of 3,133 acres of leases which Houston Oil has secured from P. N. Wiggins and associates of Dallas. Those leases were obtained for an unreported cash consideration, plus the assumption of an obligation to drill the wildcat development.

The contract calls for Houston Oil to drill the wildcat to at least 8,000 feet—regardless of what shows for production may be encountered above that point.

The 8,000-foot objective is calculated to allow a test of the Pennsylvanian line. Should it fail to produce above 8,000 feet the exploration is due to go to at least 9,800 feet—unless it gets a test of the Ellenburger before penetrating to 9,800 feet.

Ellenburger Wildcat Scheduled For Crane

Four miles south of the Block 31 field and in Southeast-Central Crane County, Humble Oil & Refining Company will drill its No. 3 Jax M. Cowden and others as a 9,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat.

The drillite is 660 feet from south and west lines of section 47, block X, CCSD&RNG survey and nine miles west of the City of Crane.

Operations are to start immediately.

Stepout To Opener Spotted In Midland

Humble Oil & Refining Company has staked location for an east offset to their recently completed No. 1 Lillie Midkiff, discovery of the Midkiff-Spraberry field of Southeast Midland County.

It will be drilled as their No. 2 Lillie Midkiff and others.

Drillite is 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 46, block 28, T&P survey and two locations east of the No. 1 Midkiff.

That makes it 21 miles southeast of the City of Midland.

Drilling with rotary to a possible bottom of 7,400 feet will start immediately.

SE Midland Wildcat Testing Spraberry

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Sam R. Preston, Southeast Midland County wildcat, 23 miles southeast of the City of Midland, is taking a drillstem test in the top of the Spraberry sand at 7,110-98 feet.

Cores through the section covered by the investigation had been sand and shale, with the sand sections showing good indications of possible production.

Top of the Spraberry is at 7,113 feet, which is on a datum of minus 4,378 feet. That makes it 23 feet high on that marker to the Ted Weiner and associates No. 1-16 Driver, a Spraberry discovery four miles to the northeast and it is 158 feet high to the Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Midkiff.

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OILC Places Stress On Mobilization At Meeting In Houston

HOUSTON—The Oil Industry Information Committee in its first quarterly meeting of 1951 here last week reshaped its program for the year to focus public attention on the increased responsibilities that mobilization places upon the industry.

Recognizing that the job ahead will greatly affect the industry, the committee restated its basic objective: "to help reaffirm the faith of the American people that their individual interests, as well as those of the nation, in peace or in war, are best served by competitive, privately-managed oil companies."

It is planned during the year to emphasize the reliance and the responsibility placed upon the industry by the public and the ways in which the vigor and strength of the industry enables it to meet those responsibilities. "The oil industry faces a tremendous job and we will try to show how thoroughly oilmen are doing that job," John L. Dupree, national OIIC chairman, said. It will be stressed that the reason the oil industry is able to perform its task (Continued On Page Six)

197 New Oil Wells Completed In Week

AUSTIN — Texas drilling activity brought in 197 oil wells last week and the year's total jumped to 1,288 compared with 1,090 a year ago.

The Railroad Commission also reported 15 gas well completions. The year's aggregate is 111 against 75 twelve months ago.

There were 94 dry holes.

Wildcat drilling included 16 oil wells, one gas and 50 dry holes. The total average calendar day crude allowable Saturday was 2,726,188 barrels, up 4,753 barrels from a week ago.

SE Borden To Be Site For Prospect

Location has been staked for an 8,000-foot wildcat in the southeast corner of Borden County by Rowan Oil Company of Fort Worth.

It is No. 1 C. H. Garner and is located 660 feet from south and east lines of section 20, block 20, Lavaca Navigation Company survey.

Drillite is two and one-quarter miles southeast of the Reinecke-Canyon reef limestone field and one and one-quarter miles north of the one-mile Gartner-Mississippi pool of Northeast Howard County. It is also one mile southwest of Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Conrad, an 8,541-foot Ellenburger failure in Borden.

Wildcat Slated For SE Lynn Region

Magnolia Petroleum Company is scheduled to drill a 6,500-foot wildcat in Southeast Lynn County nine miles southeast of Skeen and two and one-quarter miles southwest of the O'Donnell multipay pool.

It is No. 1 Pearl Callaway. Location is 660 feet from north and east lines of the southeast quarter of section 6, block 10, EL&RR survey.

Rotary tools will be used to drill the test, beginning in the near future.

SE Stonewall Gets 6,500-Foot Venture

Oxford Drilling Company of Albany spotted its No. 1 J. W. Hines as a wildcat in Southeast Stonewall County.

It is projected to 6,500 feet with rotary tools.

Drillite is five miles southeast of the Moutrey-Moore-Swaatika field and one-half of a mile north of the Jones County line.

No. 1 Hines is 330 feet from north and east lines of section 171, block 1, BBB&C survey.

Producer Added To Keystone In Winkler

Trebol Oil Company and E. G. Rodman, both of Odessa, completed their No. 1 J. H. Moss in the Keystone-Devonian field of Central Winkler County for a daily potential of 115.5 barrels of 32.1-gravity oil, flowing through a one-inch opening.

It was finished from open hole at 8,405-8,540 feet.

TEXAS OIL ROUNDUP— Defense Program Puts Increased Emphasis On Refineries' By-Products

HOUSTON — The defense program has caused increased emphasis to be placed on by-products of the nation's oil refineries.

Many companies are building or are planning projects which will increase output of scarce but vital raw materials.

Two such projects were announced last week.

Standard Oil Company of California is to build a \$10,000,000 Southern California plant to produce benzene, an important requirement of synthetic rubber manufacturers.

Gulf Oil Corporation plans to build at Port Arthur, Texas, a multi-million dollar unit to manufacture ethylene. This gas is used extensively in production of raw materials needed by manufacturers of plastics, synthetic rubber, and gasoline antiknock compounds.

Both plants are expected to be completed about the middle of next year.

Standard's plant will have an annual benzene output of 13,000,000 gallons a year. Gulf's ethylene production will approximate 2,500,000-3,000,000 cubic feet annually.

To Produce Toluene

The California project also will produce toluene, now in great demand in production of aviation gasoline.

Gulf officials estimate the Port Arthur plant will increase United States ethylene output by 12 percent. New pipe lines will carry the gas to chemical plants along the Gulf coast.

In that position he will supervise the exploration work of the concern in West Texas and Southeast New



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
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Mexico which is handled by the Sinclair district land and geological departments in Midland.

+ Jacoby On Canasta +

It looks as if I had better take time off to answer a few more canasta questions.

As a starter I will take up the so-called "concealed hand."

"Whenever a player can meld his entire hand including a canasta at one turn to play and without adding any cards to melds previously made by his partner he is said to have melded out "concealed."

Q—When a player melds out concealed is he allowed to discard?

A—Yes. He may discard or not as he chooses just as he may any other time he goes out.

Q—When a player melds out concealed does he need the count for the initial meld?

A—If he melds out concealed after drawing from the stock the minimum count is waived. If he takes the discard pile and his side has not previously melded he must fulfill all regular requirements for taking the pile including the minimum count if that is his side's initial meld.

Q—May a player take the discard pile and meld out concealed?

A—Yes.

Q—Must a player who melds out concealed have a canasta?

A—Yes.

Another bothersome point concerns just what is and what is not a meld.

Q—May I meld two deuces and an ace to go out?

A—No. A meld must include at least two natural cards.

Q—Is an initial meld of ace-ace-joker-deuce-deuce legal?

A—Yes. You may meld two or three wild cards with two or three natural cards.

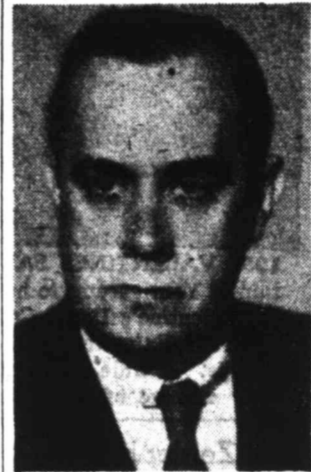
Q—I needed 120 and melded four deuces and two aces. My opponents said I could not do that. Who is correct?

A—Your opponents are correct. You are not allowed to meld four wild cards with only two or three natural cards.

As a final to this article I am going to discuss one of the old timers that keeps being asked no matter how often I answer it. This problem is that of the canasta player who wants to eat his cake and have it too.

His side has not made its initial meld but he has plenty of count in his hand. Thus needing 120 he holds two jokers, a deuce, a couple of pairs and some odd cards. A card is discarded that matches one of his odd cards. Now he wants to use his two jokers and one or two pairs to make his 120 count and then take the discard pile with his deuce and the matching odd card.

This double-barrelled play is specifically prohibited by the laws of canasta and is thoroughly illegal.

Sweaters Dried On Forms Keep Shape After Washing

Since many a beautiful sweater has lost its good looks after its first washing, it's a wise woman who practices common sense rules for sudsing knitwear.

As a first step before dipping a sweater, it's a good idea to shrir a thread through the neckline and

sleeve and waist ruffs, where it's most likely to stretch. Matching elastic thread is fine for this purpose, as it serves through wearing as well as washing.

Unless you have a sweater-drying frame, you might make a sweater dummy before washing, preferably while the garment is new and at its shapely best. Trace an exact outline on a piece of cardboard and then cut it out. Make a separate dummy for each sleeve as well as for the body of the sweater.

Round off all sharp edges of the frame with scissors to avoid snagging loose threads when slipping it into the damp garment.

Now whip up plenty of lukewarm soapsuds, leaving them a bit on the cool side. Don't soak the sweater. And don't rub, wring or twist it.

Instead, squeeze it gently, forcing suds through the soiled places and

taking care not to lift the sweater up without supporting it from underneath.

Press sudsy water against the side of the basin, and rinse with the same gentle care in clear water of the same temperature, using a hand-cupping motion.

Roll and knead the sweater in a towel until it's as dry as possible, then place it flat upon a fresh towel. Slip the cardboard body and sleeves inside and adjust gently to fit. Besides making an efficient blocking frame which can be used again and again, the cardboard hastens drying by its absorbency.

To finish the job, lay the sweater in an airy place away from sunlight or heat. When it's half dry, flip it over so the air will have a chance to circulate through both sides.

TCU May Return To Trimester Schedule

FORT WORTH—Texas Christian University's return to the trimester plan in the Fall to accommodate "an even larger military training program than during World War II" is a "strong probability," President M. E. Sadler announced Saturday.

The system would provide year-round schooling. Three normal semesters work could be completed in one calendar year.

The accelerated plan previously was used at TCU during World War II when school terms of 16 weeks each began on March 1, July 1 and November 1, with no break between terms.

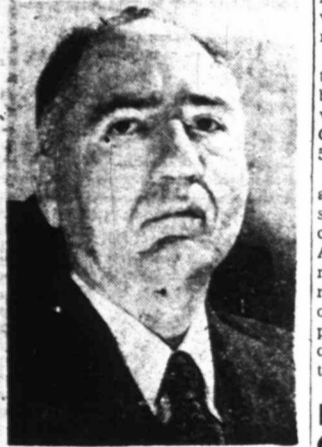
Grandmother Lewis

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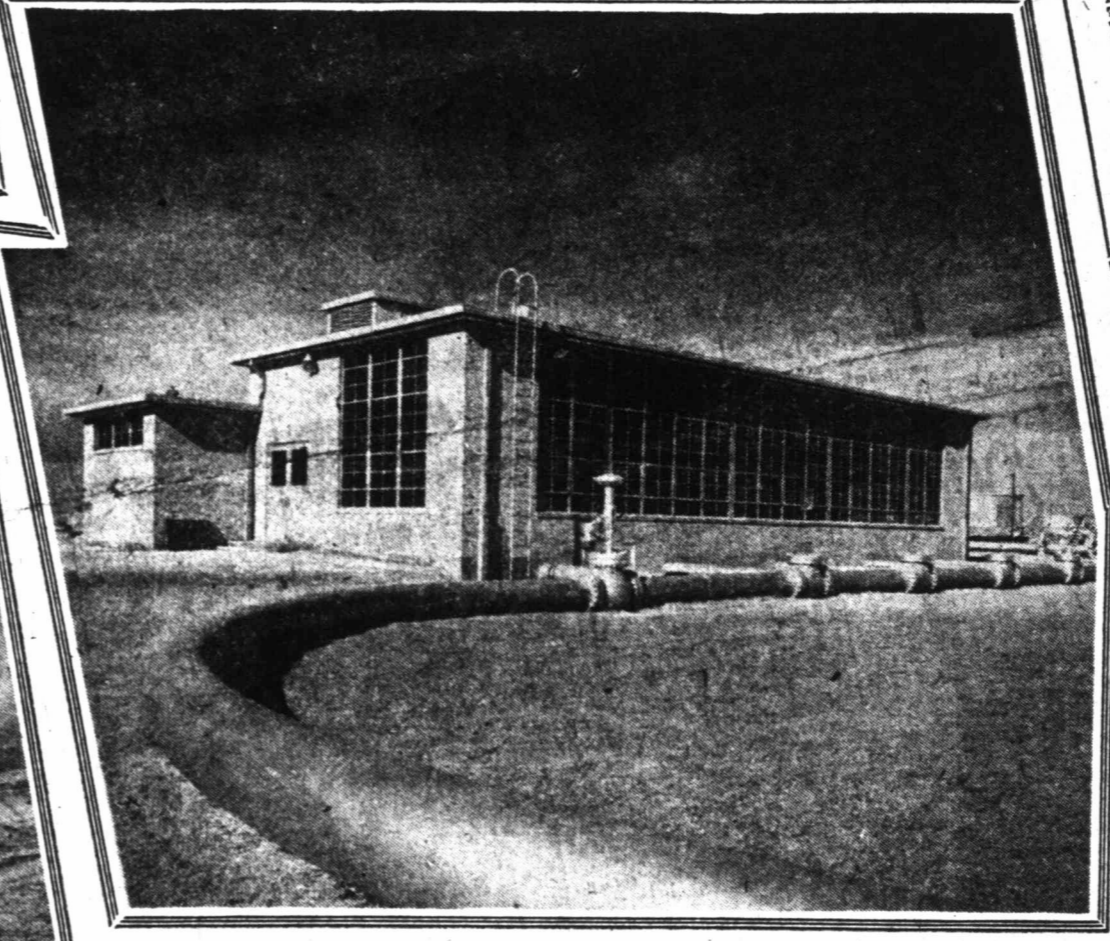
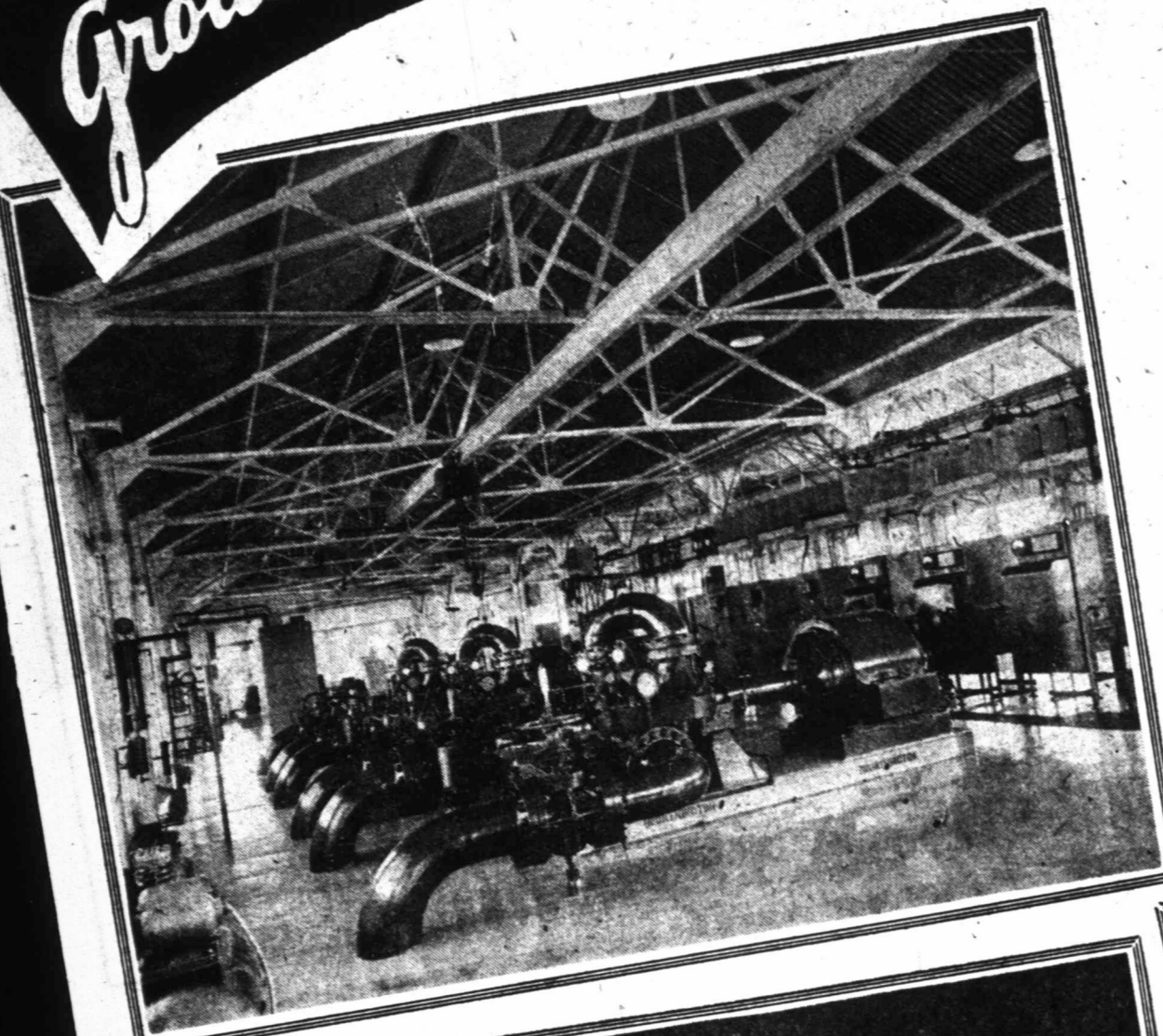
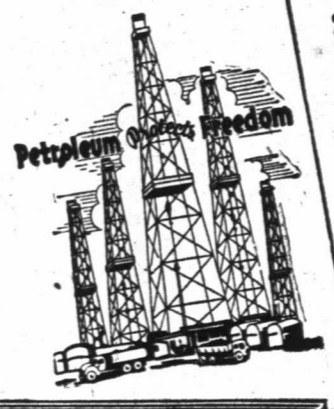
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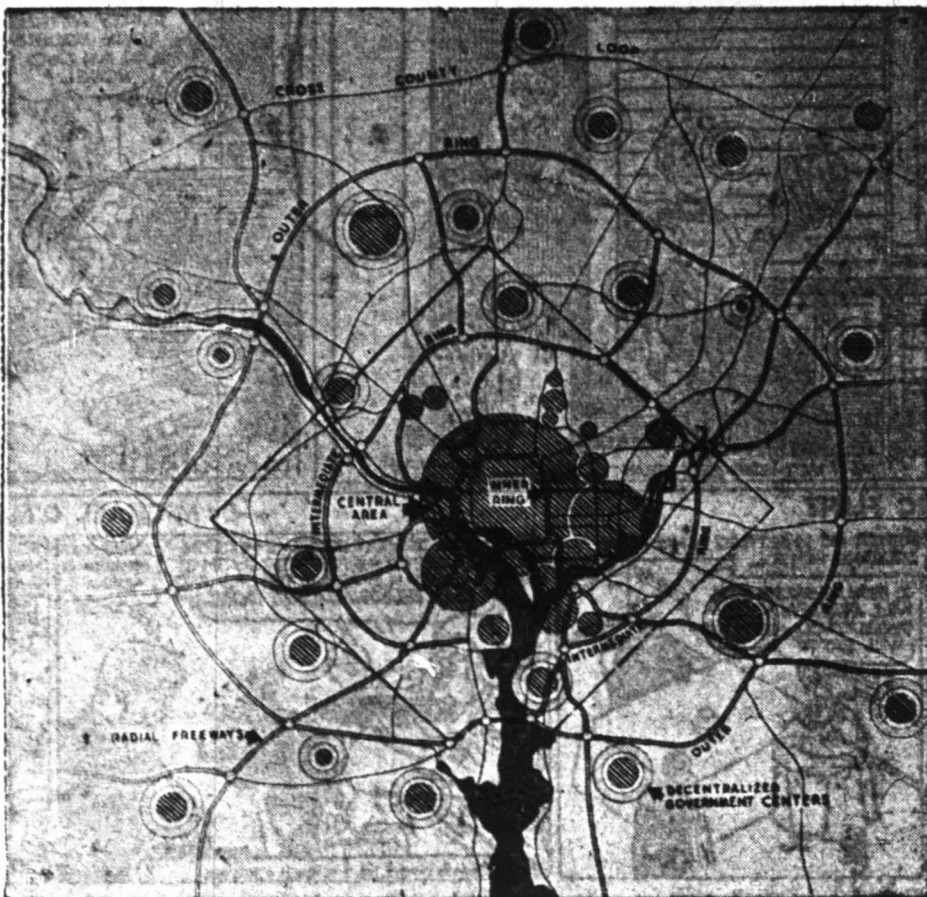
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Washington's Big 30-Year Plan For Dispersal To Spread U.S. Government Over Radius Of 50 Miles

WASHINGTON —(NEA)— During the next 30 years the U. S. Capital's government agencies will be dispersed over an area with a 50-mile radius. And by 1980 it is estimated that the Capital's population will be 2,000,000 persons.

When the dispersal and other revolutionary changes in the city of Washington are accomplished, according to President Truman, "It should be the best planned city in the world and a Capital befitting the dignity and ideals of a great nation in a family of nations."



Capital Dispersal: Here's how Washington's government agencies would be spread out into "intermediate" and "outer" rings by 1980 under the decentralization plan set up to ease crowding.

This great plan, which is supposed to completely make over Washington, is the work of the National Capital Park and Planning Commission, an organization created by Congress to act as sort of a parent in directing Washington's physical growth.

Dispersal of the government buildings over a vast area into Maryland and Virginia is both for defense and traffic purposes, according to the new NCPPC 30-year plan.

As in many other large U. S. cities the parking and traffic problems in Washington have become so serious as to jeopardize the efficiency of the city's businesses, the main one here being the government. And with so many key agencies like the Defense and State Departments clustered in a relatively small space, the town is a prime atomic bomb target.

The plan will freeze the number of government workers in the 10-square-mile District of Columbia proper at 140,000, the present figure. Expanding old agencies and any new ones will be located 10 to 15 miles out from the White House. Industrial, experimental or secret federal activities will be placed about 50 miles out.

Very wide highways will be built, ring the expanded city and connecting the dispersed agencies. Big, adequate parking areas will be set aside near each agency. Special lanes will be provided for buses during the rush hours. Autos and

delivery trucks probably will be banned on certain key streets during certain hours.

The plan also recommends fast completion of a new super-highway between Baltimore and Washington. The present four-lane highway—U. S. 1—connecting the two cities is considered one of the most dan-

gerous roads in the country because of the heavy traffic it carries.

According to the plan the whole area will be carefully zoned and the center of Washington re-zoned. It is recommended that the building of huge apartments in the midst of already densely populated neighborhoods be stopped. Agencies would be forced to give up space leased from private office buildings in the city. Neighborhoods for the homes of the government workers would be built near the spread-out offices for obvious convenience.

More trees would be planted and

all of the monuments would be more elaborately landscaped than they are now.

For the expected big increase in population, it is estimated that the Washington area will need one-third more homes than it has now. It would call for 25 new schools to be built with "progressive removal of race segregation." The same would be true for many new playgrounds and recreation centers which would have to be built under the plan.

No part of the plan, its authors insist, would remove any of the historical sites or charm of the nation's capital. Rather, they say the plan would make them more available and more pleasant for the thousands of sightseers who throng the city annually.

The title of this new plan is "Washington: Present and Future." Actually, it is the first of six such programs for the city being prepared by the NCPPC. The next one will be called "Housing and Redevelopment."

Who is to pay for all of this, and how much is it to cost? That's also for later reports, they say.



TEXANS IN WASHINGTON— Precautions Are Taken When Truman Dines Out

WASHINGTON—(P)—President Truman hasn't any official taster like the kings of old, but when he dines out you may be sure there are plenty of precautions.

Take, for instance, the dinner given by Speaker Sam Rayburn in honor of Texas members of Congress and their wives, at which President and Mrs. Truman were guests. It was held at the Carlton Hotel, about six blocks from Blair House, where the presidential family is living while the White House is being rebuilt.

The guests, in evening dress, were asked to be on hand at 7 p.m. It's customary at such affairs for everyone to be seated before the President appears. Apparently anticipating the evening with real pleasure—as contrasted with many affairs they must attend in line of duty, the President and Mrs. Truman arrived at the Texas party about 7:15 p.m., 15 minutes earlier than scheduled. But all was in readiness for them.

The big black presidential limousine carrying the Chief Executive and Mrs. Truman was trailed by another sedan, carrying secret service men. Other secret service men already were at the hotel.

Few persons knew of the President's plans that evening, so there were no curious individuals standing around as he entered the hotel. All the while the dinner was in progress, a half dozen secret service men sat quietly and unobtrusively in the hotel lobby. Persons passing through the hotel lobby during that time little suspected they were being carefully scrutinized by these alert well-armed gentlemen.

Checked carefully As for the precautions about the food served to the President, the man in charge of such things at the Carlton said all cooks and waiters having anything to do with the dinner were checked carefully by the FBI.

"Most of them have been with us for five or six years," he added. "The FBI knows all about them, and if they have any doubts as to their loyalty, they don't work this particular assignment."

Furthermore, he added, plainclothesmen stand in out-of-the-way places in the kitchen and around the back doors to keep an eye on things.

It is at such small, private gatherings that one gets a real insight into the character of individuals who are known to millions only through the headlines.

This was brought out by Rep. Walter Rogers of Pampa, the one new member of the Texas delegation in Congress.

"You know," he remarked later, "you find out that there really isn't a whole lot of difference in people. The very biggest people in our government were there, the President and the next two in line of succession, and the chief justice. Yet, when you talk with them across the table you find they are at heart just plain Americans, like the man next door or down the street from you."

Around The Capital Air Force Col. Hightower Smith, recently transferred to the Pentagon from San Antonio, ran into a lot of old friends on Capitol Hill.

Among them was Rep. Paul Kilday of San Antonio, who recalled he had encountered Smith in front of the Capitol just after Pearl Harbor and that he had had the pilot with him on the House floor when Congress declared war on Germany.

The officer, just recently promoted to full colonel, was privileged to go on the House floor because he had once served here as a page while studying law. Rep. Homer Thornberry and Smith, who calls both San Antonio and Fort Worth home, were classmates at the University of Texas.

Recent visitors here included Mr. and Mrs. Ray Lee, formerly of Austin, enroute to Pakistan. Formerly on the staff of the American Statesman, Lee now is with the State Department.

Poll Shows Shaving Brush Is On Way Out

NEW YORK —(P)— The shaving brush is on the way out, according to results of a recent poll of examining boards governing such matters. Even in states where regulations do not forbid brushes in barber shops for sanitary reasons, the trend is toward electrically-operated lather machines.

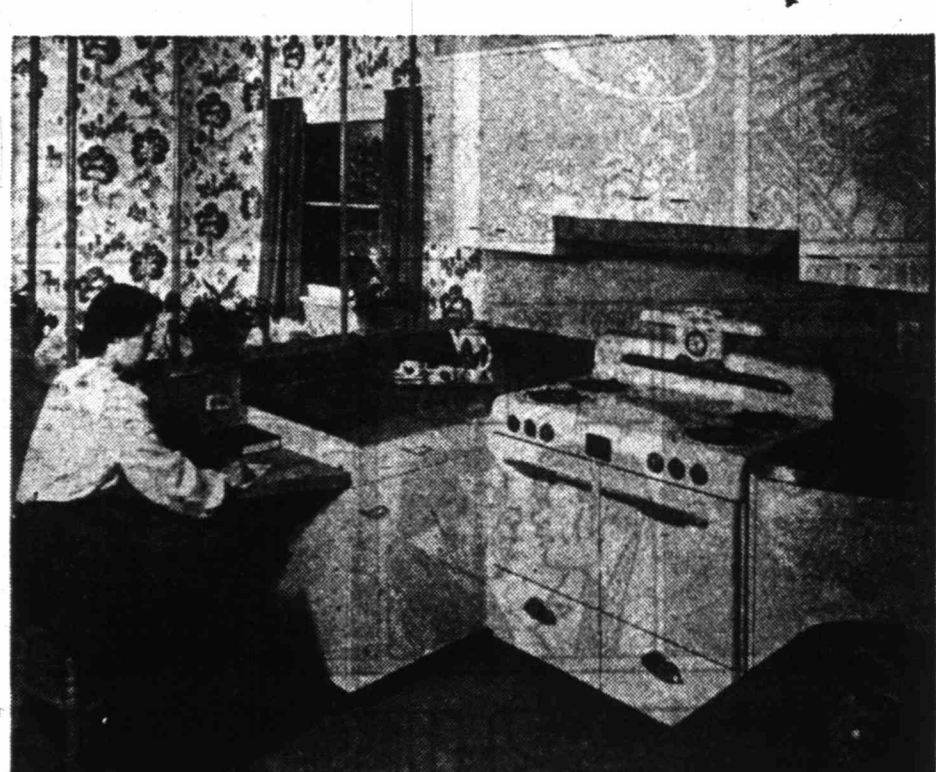

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The Washington Merry-Go-Round

Drew Pearson says: Senator Williams pushes for resignation of N. Y. internal revenue collector; New Russian-Chinese alliance is reported; Elliott Roosevelt won't take no for an answer.

WASHINGTON—With the nation facing one of its biggest tax bills in history, it is more important than ever that there be no tax chiselers. Supporting this idea, Senator John Williams, Delaware Republican, now has taken up a tax bribery scandal first exposed in this column and has demanded the ouster of internal revenue collector for New York's Third District. Located right in the center of Manhattan, this is the wealthiest tax district in the nation.

Williams' blast at Johnson is an outgrowth of bribery and corruption unearthed by this column on Jan. 30, 1950, more than a year ago. Naming names and giving details, this column revealed how five of Johnson's tax collectors had been shaking down business firms and collecting 10 percent bribes.

Months later, the same five collectors were brought to justice and sentenced to jail as follows—William A. Ganey, five years and \$14,350; Anthony V. Pisella, two years, six months and \$2,500; John A. Galgano, two years and \$2,850; Thomas J. Cannon, 18 months and \$2,500; and James A. Bessell, 10 years probation.

J. S. Johnson, the collector in charge of these men, also was cited by the commissioner of internal revenue for his "weak and ineffective" administration. This, however, failed to shame him out of office, and he then was formally asked to resign—as of last November. However, he has not resigned, but still is on the job, trying to weather the storm.

Senator Williams, citing some of these facts, recently told the Senate:

"Early in 1950, supervisors from Washington were sent to (the Third District) and they reported that conditions were worse than previous reports indicated. They reported that only one division in the entire office was functioning even in a fairly satisfactory manner. But the collector (Johnson), who is responsible for such an amazing state of affairs, is still in charge of the office."

Chinese-Russian Deal
Word of a new and highly important secret military agreement between Russia and Communist China has just reached Washington. The deal could be a serious one for our future position in Korea.

According to the best intelligence information, the agreement was signed in Moscow at about the time the United Nations' cease-fire order was under discussion. The deal probably was put across in order to bolster the Chinese and prevent them from yielding to the cease-fire proposals. In brief, here is what Russia gives to China under the new military pact.

1. The Kremlin will help train and equip ten new divisions for the Chinese Peoples' Republic. These divisions are to be composed of foreign troops, one-half Jap prisoners of war, plus an unspecified number of inner Mongolians.

2. The Kremlin to provide the Chinese Peoples' Republic with 100 jet planes.

3. Train 1,000 Chinese pilots.

4. Train 2,000 Chinese paratroopers.

5. Station 300,000 Russian troops in Manchuria.

6. Provide the Chinese army with heavy equipment including tanks and artillery—exact number not determined.

7. Russia will return to China 47 of the industrial plants it removed from Manchuria in 1945-46.

At present the U. S. military situation in Korea is better than ever, with Communist forces suffering terrible casualties. However, this new military deal between Moscow and the Chinese has aroused considerable U. S. worry regarding the future.

High-Pressure Salesman

Elliott Roosevelt, when inviting guests to participate in his mother's radio program, won't take no for an answer.

Recently, he called the British U. N. delegation and asked Sir Gladwyn Jebb to appear, saying he had some other big names scheduled for the same program.

Jebb, through his secretary, tried to stall. But Elliott phoned repeatedly. Jebb, meantime, found that the other "big names" had not accepted, and being busy, told his secretary he couldn't do it.

When Elliott pressed for a final answer, and the secretary gave a final no, Elliott countered: "I'm going to report Sir Gladwyn to the State Department."

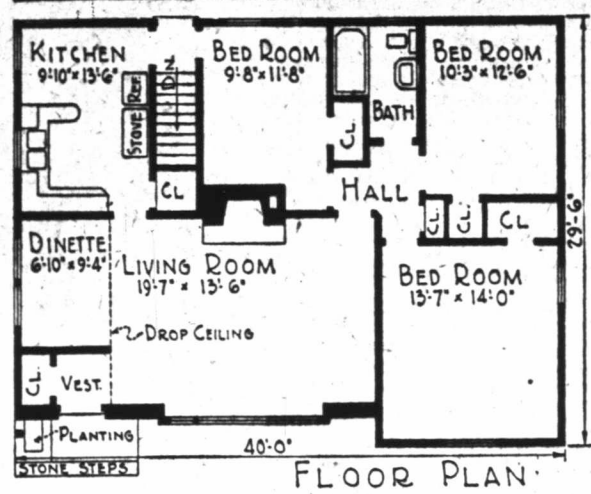
Popular South Carolinian
A resolution of special interest to the State of South Carolina was introduced at a closed-door meeting of the Senate Banking Committee the other day with the swiftest vote in the memory of its members.

Furthermore, the vote was unanimous, another rare feat for this committee, which has fought savagely in the past over public housing, rent control and other fair deal legislation.

The non-controversial resolution was one of congratulation to Chairman Burnet Maybank of South Carolina, who had just returned to the Banking and Currency Committee after being laid up two months in the hospital.

There was a clamor of "seconds," but portly Republican Senator Homer Capehart of Indiana was slightly ahead of everybody else. Not to be outdone, Democrat Allen Fear of Delaware injected a new twist of parliamentary procedure by "thirding" the motion.

Attaching Garage To House Is Space-Saver For Small Plot

Because many post-war purchasers of small homes did not need garages, builders saved cost by eliminating them. With so many families acquiring cars since that time, the majority of these home-owners require car shelter.

Questions most often asked are where the garage should be located; what material for its construction; and whether a car-port will suffice.

If the plot is small but has side yard large enough to meet local zoning law requirements, the garage should be attached to the house. By building it of the same material and of harmonizing architectural design, house and garage will form a pleasing unit. The attached, fully-enclosed garage give a rambling effect to the small house and uses a minimum of valuable yard space. A long driveway to a garage in the rear takes up about 16 per cent of a 50'x100' plot; if the garage is near the front of the house, within 20 or 25 feet of the street, only four per cent of yard is sacrificed.

'Glass In Action' Display Features Philadelphia Show

PHILADELPHIA — Home builders and architects can put the sun in its place any time of the day in part of the United States or Canada by means of a unique device which was demonstrated at the recent International Heating and Ventilating Exposition held in Philadelphia.

The device, known as a Solarmeter, was built under the supervision of Libbey-Owens-Ford Glass Company research men to demonstrate to architects and builders how a home can be oriented to obtain the maximum benefits from the sun.

Through the use of this instrument, architects can plan the overhang of a roof so as to obtain the correct shading in solar houses.

The exhibit, built around the theme of "Glass In Action," illustrated the use of glass and heat-conducting glass on land, at sea and in the air.

Careful Planning Can Make Bath Fit Needs Of Everyone

The bathroom, most-used room in the home, requires more ingenuity and foresight in its planning than any other part of the house. Even the kitchen presents relatively fewer problems, for it is a larger space and is designed primarily for the needs of only one person, the homemaker.

The bathroom, to be efficient, must suit the needs of the new baby, the child in kindergarten, the parents and their guests. Properly designed, it's both functional and appealing to the eye, but it can't be either if it is cluttered with towels, cleaning materials and cosmetics. Adequate storage space therefore is a "must" and fortunately it can be provided in many ways:

- 1. Double medicine cabinets provide extra space and allow the homemaker to put on her make-up while Dad is shaving.
- 2. A full-length door mirror with storage space behind it holds much more than an ordinary medicine cabinet.
- 3. The newest washbasins are built to fit into a counter, under which storage can be provided.
- 4. A neat rack over the washbasin will hold cold cream jars and cosmetics, and give added space in the medicine cabinet.
- 5. Even though the bathroom is small, a cosmetic shelf can be recessed into the tilework above the tub.

It's the tradition here that customer in public markets is entitled to a sample before he buys liquor. And who's to object if the prospective customer shakes his head after the sampling and rejects the quality?

A reporter on a Belgrade newspaper recently trailed such a sampler and found that after eight samplings, his quarry still hadn't made a purchase. This sampler is very likely at the end of his free ride, however. His picture was published in the paper, showing him in the act, and a complete expose of his racket was included.

REGINA—(AP)—Movies are improving morale and discipline in Saskatchewan government jails, stated Welfare Minister J. H. Sturdy.

Common Language Is Sought For Congo

BRUSSELS, BELGIUM—(AP)—After trekking for 18 months through jungle, bush and steppe in the Belgian Congo, Belgian Jesuit Father Van Bulck, and a British colleague, Dr. J. Hackett, of London, have completed a monumental linguistic inquiry.

The two men were trying to discover what native languages should be encouraged as a common tongue out of the more than 500 languages now spoken in the colony. Authorities are seeking a language that will be suitable for higher education and scientific terms, as well as for every day expressions. Father Van Bulck considers such a language could be found in the Bantu dialects, since 12,000,000 of the 14,000,000 inhabitants of the Congo speak them.

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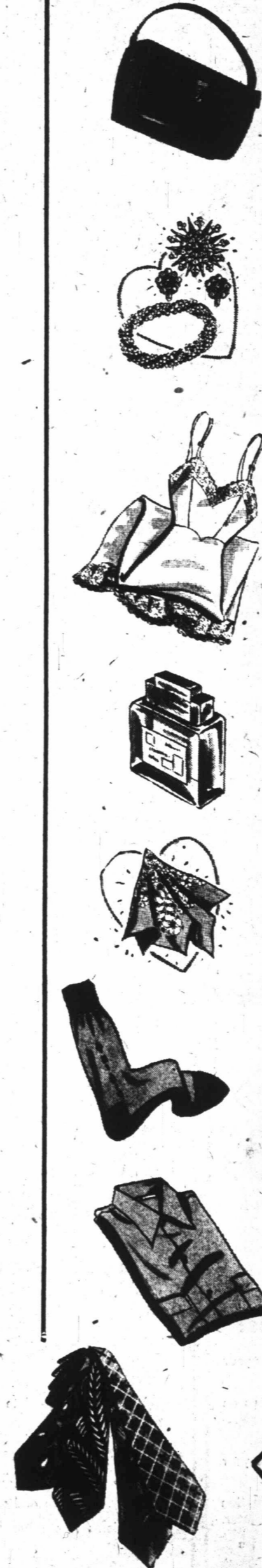
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
