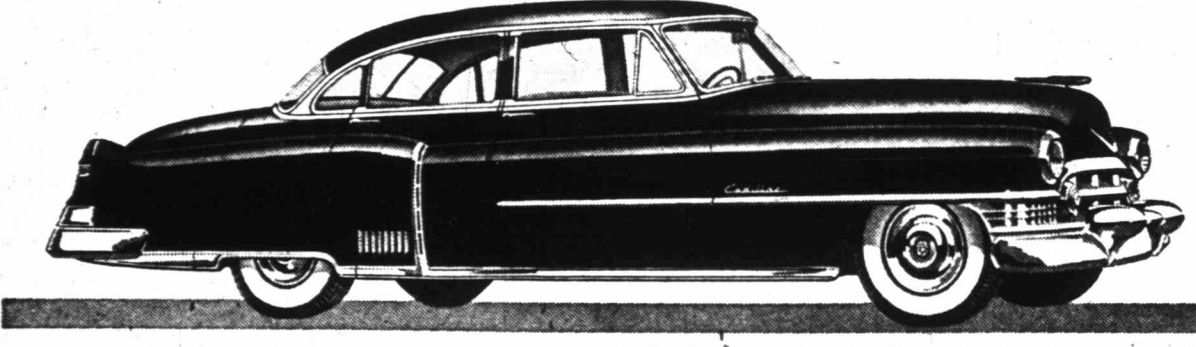

We Still Can't Cope With Flu, Dread Epidemic Disease

Of all the great epidemic diseases influenza—the dread "flu"—is perhaps the most mysterious. Today we again are faced with great peril from this source. Reports of influenza in continental Europe and the British Isles indicate that this disease is again rampant. Even before these words see print the "flu" may have struck the Western Hemisphere. And sad to relate, as it spreads, influenza tends to get worse.

Long before good records were kept on the epidemic diseases, the flu must have taken its toll as judged by historical accounts which were blood curdling even if not scientific. Just when a worldwide epidemic will start, however, still cannot be predicted even though it is now known that influenza is caused by a virus.

But there are several varieties or strains of the flu virus and since the last world epidemic of the disease occurred in 1917-18 and the virus was only identified in the 1930's there has been up to now no chance to study the two together. If and when we really are hit by

a general epidemic what can we do about it? Unfortunately not much. Vaccination has been tried, but because there are several kinds of viruses involved, building up resistance to one does not mean that the next one which comes along will not knock us down.

The time may come when vaccination will bring protection, and indeed some of the most intelligent scientists in the world are working on this problem, but until this can be accomplished we are as helpless to resist the disease as our ancestors were.

Influenza strikes the healthy and strong as easily as the weak or infirm. Indeed the man who "has never been sick a day in his life" and then gets the flu is perhaps running the greatest risk of all because he is not used to giving in to illness.

Go To Bed
If what is coming is really one of the great influenza epidemics and behaves at all like those of the past, it will strike suddenly causing fever and severe prostration. The best thing to do is to go to bed at once, drink plenty of fluids and call the doctor. There is grave danger of pneumonia, and the heart may be weakened.

It is most important to stay in bed until the fever has gone and for some time afterwards. Getting out of bed too early may lead to complications or even death.

11 Traffic Deaths Head List Of Texas Fatalities

Eleven traffic fatalities led the list of at least 24 violent deaths in Texas during the weekend. Five died in shootings, four children apparently died of poisoning, two persons drowned, a man burned to death and one died of unknown causes.

The latest reported deaths include: O. W. Fraser, 61, and Fred E. Stone, 55, both of Clovis, N. M., killed Sunday night when their two-ton truck and a fast passenger train collided west of Dallas near Irving.

Mrs. Katherine W. Howard, 33, of Garland died when her car crashed into a railroad overpass on the outskirts of Dallas.

Drinks Lighter Fluid
Michael Elton Davis, one-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Troy M. Davis of Garland, died in a Dallas hospital Sunday night shortly after he drank some cigarette lighter fluid.

James A. Hodges, 22, of Rice and Ernest Eugene Dooler, 25, of Corsicana were killed Sunday in an automobile accident north of Corsicana.

Anthony C. Hillerman, 46, of Denison died Sunday of injuries received when he was struck by a car in Fort Worth Saturday night.

Walter Lee Green, 31, negro, was killed at Fort Worth Sunday in a two-car collision.

Two Young Hitchhikers
Two young hitchhikers—Patricia Louise Montgomery, 16, and Dorothy Jane Prizzell, 15, both of Abilene—died trapped in a blazing gasoline transport Saturday night after it was in collision with a refrigerator truck near Big Spring.

Thomas P. Cook of Houston died Saturday of injuries suffered when a taxi hit him.

Buren Carl Collicot, 47, was struck and killed by an automobile in Houston Sunday.

Howard Lee, 47, of Houston was found shot to death in his apartment Sunday. Police are questioning a 38-year-old man.

A former Victoria policeman, Alfred J. Tucker, 52, was shot to death on main street Saturday night. Another ex-policeman was arrested.

A 50-year-old man, wildly firing a pistol in Dallas Saturday, fatally wounded a 29-year-old Latin American bystander, John Rodriguez.

Mrs. Johnnie Mae Horn, 50, negro, was shot to death in Dallas by a 35-year-old negro man.

Children Die On Picnic
In Amarillo, Mrs. Jack Randall Smith, 23, accidentally shot herself to death as she was taking a small shotgun out of a closet.

Robert Henry Patton of Amarillo said three children he took on a picnic in Palo Duro Canyon got sick after eating and died while his car was stuck overnight in a stream-bed. The children were Robert Wesley Patton, three; John Wesley Patton, four months, and Kathrine King, 15. Patton's sister-in-law, Justice of the Peace E. F. Manchen of Canyon ordered an autopsy.

Louis D. Lock, 36, of Big Lake and Ronald Rogers, five, drowned Sunday night when their racing hull overturned in Lake Nisworthy near San Angelo.

J. E. Ivey, 50, died Saturday in his burning home in Dallas.

Clarence D. Crockett, about 60, was found dead in his Houston hotel room Sunday. Justice of the Peace W. C. Ragan ordered an autopsy to determine the cause of death. Detectives said they found a note in the room.

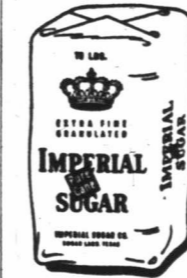

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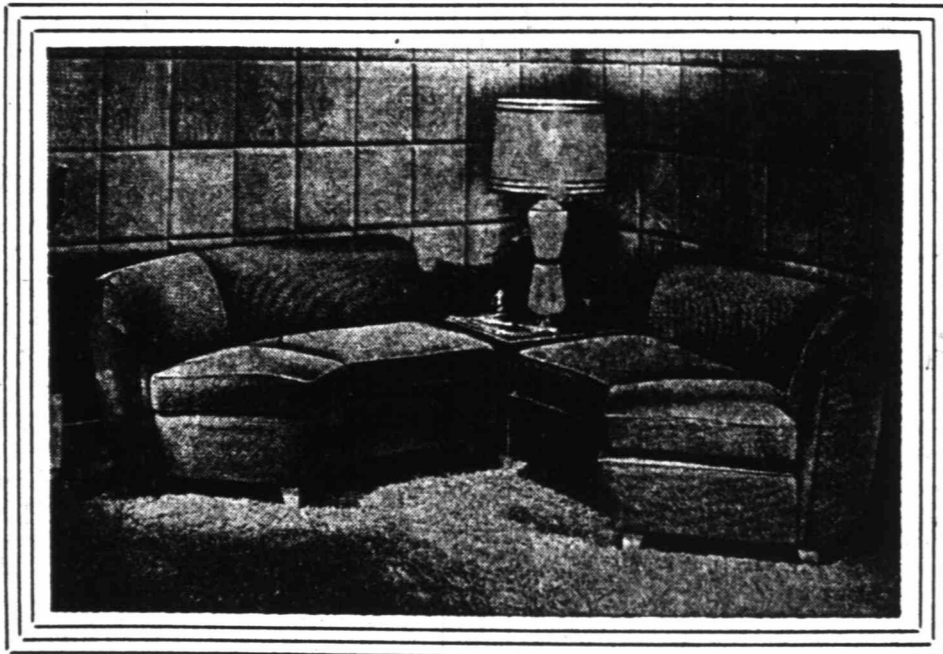
