

Good Hunting Seen As Pheasants Debut

Thirty minutes before sunrise Saturday, you can expect to see hunters by the hundreds walking through fields of cover crops, searching for the elusive ringnecked pheasant.

That's when the 1993 pheasant season officially begins. Hunting season will continue through Sunday, December 26.

Legal hunting hours are 30 minutes before sunrise until 30 minutes after sunset each day. Bag limits are two cock pheasants daily, with four in possession, and one foot must remain attached to the carcass until it reaches its final destination. Only cock pheasants are "fair game," hens are off limits to hunters.

Local Game Warden Jerry Stucki, who covers Deaf Smith, Castro and Parmer Counties, said the pheasant prospects this year are as good or better than last year.

"Populations in my three counties look fairly good. Some of the southern counties don't seem to have as many birds," Stucki said.

Although Stucki said he didn't have actual numbers, the latest pheasant count taken by Texas Parks and Wildlife officials showed strong numbers equivalent to populations last year.

He said this spring's hatch was good, thanks to well-timed rainfall.

"And when the pheasants were on nests, I didn't notice as many skunks, coons or possums

bothering them," he added. He said hunters should be aware that it is illegal to shoot birds from public roads and they should have permission before hunting on private property.

Any violations should be reported to Operation Game Thief, 1-800-792-GAME, and callers will remain anonymous, Stucki said, adding that if an arrest and conviction is made because of a tip, the caller would be eligible for a cash reward.

Stucki encourages landowners who have problems with unauthorized hunters on their land to call the sheriff's department.

Several game wardens are expected to help Stucki patrol the Parmer County area during the pheasant season.

Deadline Nearing For Xmas Project

Deadline is nearing for the 1993 Project Christmas Card, December 17, it was announced this week by Modern Study club and The Friona

Project Christmas Card is being co-sponsored by the study club and the Friona Star for the 38th consecutive Christmas season.

Proceeds from the project will go to benefit Parmer County Community Hospital. Since its inception, Project Christmas Card has raised over \$102,000 for new hospital equipment. This is in addition to over \$12,500 in advertising space which has been donated to the project by the

newspaper. Last year the project raised \$4,300, which helped buy a new microfilm camera for the hospital's record-keeping department.

Proceeds from the 1993 project will go toward the purchase of two new IV pumps and an oximeter.

At the present time, the hospital has two IV pumps, and if they both are in use, an emergency situation could put the staff in a bind.

The oximeter measures the makeup of the blood.

The IV pumps will cost about \$2,000 each, and the oximeter could cost over \$1,000. "We may not raise that much, but we'll apply it to the purchases," said a hospital spokesperson.

Donations to Project Christmas Card may be made at Friona State Bank, as well as at a number of business firms throughout the community.

Residents are asked to donate the amount of money which they would customarily spend to send out Christmas cards to local friends.



A survey of the county's gins on Thursday revealed that 53,392 bales had been ginned at the eight gins that serve Parmer County.

Helped by the excellent harvest weather of the past month, ginners who first thought they might have to work through the Christmas season now expect to be finished by that time.

County Extension Agent Gary Patterson said "Parmer County farmers will harvest between 50,000 and 55,000 acres of cotton this year, compared to only 5,000 acres in 1992."

"Last year's yield was terrible due to the hail, poor weather and lack of rainfall. This year we had a nice hot summer, and that is what cotton likes," he said.

Patterson said the county's cotton farmers are averaging about two bales of cotton per acre. This



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

Fudge Is A Favorite As Snack Or Gift-Giving

Like turkey and dressing, fudge is one of those foods that most of us have only for the holidays. But, I've never been quite sure why. all of the ingredients are readily available year round, and it isn't difficult to make, but for some reason, we reserve the confection for not much more than a couple of months of the year.

It could be that the richness of fudge demands that we consume it

One of my favorite food gifts to give is a plate of fudges--specifically the Five Minute Fudge, the Snowy White Fudge and the Peanut Butter Fudge detailed

Fudge can be decorated with nuts, cherries, sprinkles or any cake decorating items. To make a plate of fudge even more festive, wrap each piece of fudge in clear plastic wrap and tie with gold or silver ribbon. Then, wrap the entire plate with plastic wrap and tie a big bow around the entire gift.

Try the following fudge recipes for gifts to give or just for you and your family to enjoy this Christmas season:

FIVE MINUTE FUDGE 2 tablespoons butter or margarine 2/3 cup evaporated milk 1-2/3 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon vanilla extract 2 cups miniature marshmallows 1-1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips

1/2 cup nuts Combine the butter, milk, into squares. sugar and salt in a saucepan. Bring to a boil over medium heat; cook 4 to 5 minutes, stirring constantly. (Start timing when the mixture starts to bubble around the edges of the pan.) Remove the pan from the 1 teaspoon vanilla extract heat. Stir in the marshmallows, 4-1/2 cups sugar chocolate, vanilla and nuts. Stir 1-7 ounce jar marshmallow cream vigorously for 1 minute (or until 1-1/2 cups evaporated milk the marshmallows melt and blend 1/4 cup butter Southwestern Public Service in). In a saucepan, combine the sugar, butter and milk. Bring to a rolling boil, and boil for 5 minutes over medium heat, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add peanut butter, marshmallow cream, vanilla and nuts. Beat until well blended. Pour and spread into a greased 13"x9" pan. Cool and cut

CHOCOLATE-PEANUT BUTTER FUDGE

2 cups peanut butter chips, divided 1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted 1/2 cup cocoa powder

Place 1 cup peanut butter chips in a medium bowl; set aside. In another medium bowl, blend the melted butter with the cocoa and vanilla until smooth; add the second cup of peanut butter chips. In a heavy 4-quart saucepan, combine the sugar, marshmallow cream, evaporated milk and 1/4 cup butter. Over medium heat, bring the

mixture to a rolling boil, stirring constantly. Boil, stirring, for 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Immediately add half of the hot mixture to the bowl with the peanut butter chips only and the other half of the hot mixture into the coca mixture; stir to blend. Beat the peanut butter mixture until the chips are completely melted; spread the mixture evenly in a foillined 13"x9" pan. Beat the cocoa mixture until the chips are melted and the mixture thickens. Spread it evenly over the top of the peanut butter layer. Cool. Remove from the pan and remove the foil. Cut the fudge into squares. Makes

> QUICK CHOCOLATE FUDGE

1/2 cup light corn syrup 1/3 cup evaporated milk 3 cups semi-sweet chocolate chips 2 teaspoons vanilla extract 3/4 cup powdered sugar, sifted

about 4 pounds.

1 cup chopped nuts In a heavy 2-quart saucepan, stir the corn syrup and milk. Add the chocolate. Stirring constantly, cook over medium heat until the chocolate is melted. Remove from heat and stir in the vanilla. Add the sugar. Beat until the mixture is smooth. Stir in the nuts. Pour the mixture into a greased 8-inch square pan. Refrigerate for 2 hours until firm. Cut into squares. Makes about 1-1/2 pounds.





Because mutual funds have posted such strong results over the past decade, it would be easy to overestimate their long-term potential. To avoid any misjudgments, investors should understand what mutual funds may or may not be able to do.

On Long-term Trends

Over the past ten years, the amount of money invested in bond mutual funds has grown from \$20 billion to \$550 billion. A large portion of that has come from firsttime investors looking for alternatives to low-rate CDs or retirement savings. During this period, the average annual return on bonds was 16.3 per cent, more than twice the average return over the past 30 years and close to three times the 40-year average (table A).

During the past decade, the assets of equity funds also increased, growing from \$50 billion to more than \$400 billion. The average annual return on stocks for the period was 17.6 per cent, about (table A).

future? History is no guarantee of decisions.

future performance--economic growth and interest rates ultimately decide investment results. Nonetheless, long-term trends can be reasonable criteria for investment planning. The longer the historical period you evaluate, the better your chance of accurate forecasting.

For example, the table illustrates that over the past ten years, the performance of stocks and bonds was almost identical: 17.6 per cent for stocks and 16.3 per cent for bonds. This can be attributed primarily to a steady decline from record high interest rates to the more typical historic rates. As interest rates fell, the market value of high-interest bonds rose. This accounted for the unusually high total return on bond funds (income + capital gains=total return).

Over the 40-year history, however, stocks outperformed bonds nearly two to one. With rates on new bonds now more in line with long-term historical trends, there is a lower chance of extraordinary gains in bond fund prices in the near future.



What Is Astigmatism?

Imagine, if you will, looking at the world through a clear, round window. If the glass is perfect, the image is true. If there's a bump or a bobble in it, though, the picture

is distorted.

Astigmatism is something like that bumpy window, except that the irregularity is in the cornea, the front surface of the eye, or sometimes in the lens itself. This imperfection prevents light rays from meeting in a focal point behind the retina.

Almost everyone has some degree of astigmatism. Everyone may experience some eye strain, fatigue, reddened eyes or headache after reading or doing close work. Higher degrees of astigmatism may cause blurred or distorted vision, too. If necessary, your optometrist can pre-scribe glasses or contact lenses to compensate for the distortion.

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
