By 1929 the same bill was able to bring two new subjects under its rule, a pound of bacon and a bag of gumdrops for the small fry. The bill, reigning in real glory in 1939, enabled the shopper to hit the jackpot for more than 20 pounds of groceries. In contrast, the once mighty monarch, its scepter steadied somewhat by a price freeze, now barely holds sway over five items.



Sudden Change Of Heart

Not too many weeks ago the American reading his daily newspaper would have gathered that the western world was unlikely to survive if the rearming of Germany did not occur in a short space of months.

Now, suddenly, the urgency has gone out of the issue. Apparently a change of heart has been taking place quietly among U. S. officials for some time. But it took General Eisenhower's visit to Germany to crystallize the new view and give it the status of formal policy.

What the general said in his report to Congress and the nation was that a host of political questions relating to Germany remains to be settled before a new German army can be created as part of the general European defense force.

This meant, plainly, that we have not yet succeeded in convincing the Germans themselves that they should rearm. In our concern over selling the idea to a reluctant France, we have tended to take German willingness to arm entirely for granted.

But the Germans have no wish to be a doormat in a war between the West and the Soviet Union. They are hanging back, waiting for evidence that there is to be a really effective western defense force which might hold Western Germany against invasion. Satisfied on that score, they may decide eventually to join the West.



JACOBY ON BRIDGE

Written for NEA Service Bridge players often ask for best way to play certain combi-nations of cards. Sometimes, however, there is no satisfactory answer to such a question. The best way to play a particular suit may depend on the cards you hold in the three other suits, or on how the bidding went, or on the skill of

In the hand shown today, 'for example, it looks as though every-



thing depends on the right way of playing the hearts. Should South take two heart finesses through West? Or should he lead a heart to the ace, return the ten of hearts, and then guess his play if East

One of those plays is bound to work—since one of the opponents is bound to have the king of hearts. Nevertheless South should not try to guess which opponent has that mportant card.

When Harry Fishbein, wellsnown New York expert played the hand, he wasted no time on the correct play of the hearts. The hand he saw was unbeatable no matter where the heart honors were.

Fishbein won the opening lead with the ace of clubs, led a trump to dummy's jack, ruffed a low club with a high trump, and then drew the rest of West's trumps. Dummy discarded two spades and a heart. South then led a low heart and finessed dummy's nine. If East could not win, the hand was over.

As it happened, East did win— but then he had to give dummy a free finesse in any of three differ ent suits. He could lead a spade to the ace-queen, a club to the king-jack, or a heart to the combined ten-ace of ace and queen Whatever East returned was sure to give declarer his twelfth trick.






