

Truman spoke at a breakfast for Masonic leaders from all over the The breakfast was given at the Statler Hotel by an old Kansas City friend, Frank Land, who heads the DeMolays, an organiza-

tion for young men.
Truman said the moral forces in this country must be mobilized "to prevent selfishness of certain groups from an endeavor to take advantage of this situation.'

"Everybody, I don't care who he is, or what his condition or posi-tion is—from the President of the United States to the laborer who digs in the trench-must make some sacrifice in order that the whole country may be mobilized to meet the serious situation with which we are faced," he said.

Truman said he realized it's difficult for most people to understand what a serious situation the goyernment is in. He sized it up this way: "The most tremendous emergency that any government has ever been faced with in the history of the country.'

Political Facts Of Life

In asking now for only part of the \$16,500,000,000 in new taxes he wants, President Truman seems to be accepting the hard facts of life on Capitol Hill.

Congressional tax leaders have made it clear that \$8,000,000,000 to \$10,000,000,000 is the most the President is likely to get in the months ahead. Truman's tax message settled on the latter figure.

He hasn't abandoned his overall goal, however, and plans to request more taxes later. Possibly he is counting on the painful logic of appropriations for defense to convince the lawmakers they must do still more.

Of the sum he's seeking now, the President thinks \$4,000,000,000 should come from higher individual income levies, \$3,000,000,000 from raised corporate taxes, and \$3,000,000,000 in new excise taxes.

To get the added \$4,000,000,000 from personal incomes, Truman proposes upping rates about four percentage points in each bracket. But he would keep the present exemption of \$600, rather than lower it to \$500

Even though the exemption may remain unchanged, it's obvious that if the President's plan goes through, all of us will know we've been hit. There is no painless way to arm ourselves and help arm the free world and still maintain civilian life at a reasonably high level.

Congress may drag its feet for many weeks on a new tax bill, but ultimately it will undoubtedly approve a measure close to the President's figure. The alternative is too grim even for a politician to contemplate. For taxation is acknowledged on all sides to be one of the chief brakes on inflation. Without it, controls and other weapons are not believed likely to work effectively.

That point is unquestionably more persuasive with the lawmakers than the argument of a balanced budget.







Army Reveals New 'No Call' Policy On National Guardsmen

WASHINGTON -(P)- The plan of the Army to release National guardsmen when their federal service time runs out next year apchanged the probability that at least two of the presently federal-ized six guard divisions will be sent

overseas in the next few months.

The Army also disclosed, in conference Tuesday by its training chief, Maj. Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, that it will call no more guard divisions "unless the world situation changes."

This latter statement startled some Congress members and brought predictions that the lawmakers would make inquiries. Senstor Bridges (R-NH) of the Senate Armed Services Committee called it "change in policy" and said he thought the committee would want to look into it.

And Senator Jenner (R-Ind) said he was confused. If the guard isn't to be used, he asked, why "are they retting set to buy equipment for No Choice On Release

Under existing law, the Army General Clark Says has no choice about releasing guardsmen when the tenure of the federal service expires. The draft act, under which the government has called in the guard units, provides the units may be kept in federal service 21 months. Legislation pending in Congress would extend that time to 24 or 27 months. the time varying with different bills which have been offered.

Four National Guard infantry divisions and two regimental combat teams were federalized last September. Two more divisions wer federalized last month. In addition, there have been a large number of guard units of sub-division size called since the start of the Korean

Even if only the 21-month service is retained, it will be early 1952 before the guardsmen are eligible for

Taylor said the Army was "encouraged" at the progress in training guard divisions which have been federalized and that the four divisions called up last September should be ready by June and the last two by September.


